## One Down — Kinsey Hall Seismic Renovation


In July 2004, the Kinsey Hall seismic renovation project begins. The project is expected to last until summer 2006. Most of the Kinsey departments will be housed in Hershey Hall during the renovation period. When the project is completed, the building will have a new name—the Humanities Building—and some new tenants including the English department. The name Kinsey will be dedicated to a wing in Knudsen Hall.

# Registration

Registration consists of paying fees and enrolling in classes.

1. Registration fees and other University charges are due the 20th of each month. BAR (Billing and Receivable) accounts can be viewed through URSA
2. Enrollment in classes is completed through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> (see "URSA" for full details)

Complete both processes by the established deadlines (see "Calendar") to be officially registered and enrolled for the term.

## Paying Fees

Payments can be mailed, deposited in the Administrative Main Cashier drop slot (1125 Murphy Hall), or paid by credit card through URSA. After the published deadline, payments must be made in person at 1125 Murphy Hall and are assessed an additional \$50 late fee. For more information on paying fees, see "Billing."

## Student Health Insurance Plan

Insurance is a condition of registration at the University of California. As such, the cost of the Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) is billed along with other UCLA fees each academic term. The SHIP fee is waivable if a waiver is submitted by the fee payment deadline for each term. Waiving SHIP is an online process.

SHIP fulfills all of the requirements mandated for adequate medical/health insurance as defined by the University. The Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center is the primary health care provider for SHIP and is where all nonemergency medical care must be initiated for SHIP claim payment consideration. ## Waiving Out of SHIP

Students may waive out of SHIP if they (1) maintain active enrollment in an adequate medical/health insurance plan that meets all established requirements, (2) apply for a SHIP waiver within established deadlines, and (3) correctly complete the online SHIP waiver form.

Students must apply for a SHIP waiver online. See the Ashe Center website for details, including a definition of qualifying adequate private medical/health insurance. Follow the Online Services link from <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

## Deadlines for Waiving Out of SHIP

Third-party individuals may not waive out of SHIP for a student. Waivers must be submitted by the stated deadlines whether or not fees have been paid by that date. Deadlines are strictly enforced.

The schedule for waiving out of SHIP is as follows:

Fall Quarter	September 1-20
Winter Quarter	December 1-20
Spring Quarter	March 1-20
Fall Semester	August 1-20
Spring Semester	December 1-20

The above information serves as official notice of the UCLA mandatory medical/health insurance requirement. All students are responsible for providing complete and accurate information that must be submitted by the stated deadlines.

## Reduced Fee Programs

Fee assessment for reduction in fees is based on total units enrolled as of Friday of the third week of classes.

Certain undergraduate students, when properly approved by the dean of their College/school for enrollment in 10 units or less, may be eligible for a one-half reduction in the educational fee. File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week. Except for these qualified and approved part-time students, there is no reduction in the University registration, educational, student union, or Undergraduate Students Association fee.

Undergraduate nonresident students with College/school approval for enrollment in 10 units or less pay only half the nonresident tuition fee. File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week of classes for the applicable term.

For graduate students there is no reduction in the University registration, educational, nonresident tuition, student union, or Graduate Students Association fee for less than full-time programs.

Full-time University employees may apply for a reduction of the registration and educational fees at their Campus Human Resources office. Applications are available on the Campus Human Resources website at <http://www.chr.ucla.edu>. If you receive the part-time fee reduction from your academic dean, you may not also use the UC employee reduction; you must use one or the other.

## Course Materials Fees

The College of Letters and Science and the UCLA professional schools assess course materials fees to cover the cost of equipment and to help offset the costs of providing course websites and computer laboratories. Depending on how the fees were approved, they are assessed with registration fees or after Friday of the fourth week of the quarter.

Materials Use fee (sometimes known as a lab fee) and the Instructional Enhancement fee (IEI) are course materials fees that are assessed by course unit at the end of the fourth week of the quarter. Students are responsible for ensuring that all Study List errors and omissions are corrected prior to the end of the second week. Students are assessed these fees regardless of major. Students who are approved for "Late Add" enrollment after the third week of classes are required to pay course material fees. The fees are billed once a quarter through BAR and are non-refundable once assessed.

Education Abroad Program reciprocity students and CAPPP (Washington Internship) students are exempt from the Instructional Enhancement fee. For more information about the Instructional Enhancement fee, see the Online section of the *Schedule*. ## Fee Waiver Requests

Late registration, processing, and penalty fees are waivable on request in writing to the office assessing the fees only if they were incurred through the fault of the University or because a student suffered sudden and debilitating injury or accident.

## Holds

Students may have holds placed on their student records which could affect registration, enrollment, financial aid, campus services, and/or release of academic transcripts for the following reasons:

1. Failure to comply with admission or academic provisions
2. Failure to settle financial obligations with the University
3. Failure to respond to official notices

Each student who becomes subject to a hold action is given advance notice and ample time to respond. The hold must be released by the

initiating office before a student may enroll in classes or receive various campus services. Obtain information on holds through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>.

## Enrolling in Classes

See "Class Listings" for class times, rooms, instructors, and other enrollment information. For updated listings, see the online *Schedule of Classes*. See "Class Listings" and your school or College advisers (listed in "Academic Counseling") to assemble a program of courses.

Plan two or three alternate programs in case your first choice of courses is not available. Do not choose two courses in the same final examination group (see the final examination chart in "Class Listings") or select classes that conflict in meeting times. If conflicts are unavoidable, consult with the instructor of each course at the first class meeting. For enrollment instructions, see "Enrollment" in this *Schedule*.

## Hepatitis B Vaccine Requirement

The California State Legislature requires as a condition of enrollment that students 18 years and younger demonstrate immunity from hepatitis B. The Ashe Center offers the hepatitis B vaccine to eligible students. Students who have not had the vaccine should start the series before their first term begins. Because this is a state requirement, students who have not completed the immunization series by the time their third term begins will have a hold placed on their records.

## URSA Enrollment

University Records System Access (URSA) enables UCLA students to acquire information from their University academic records and to enroll in classes. Use URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> to process class enrollment and determine assigned appointment periods.

Students may also use URSA for other enrollment-related tasks, such as adding, dropping, or exchanging classes, signing onto a wait list or checking wait-list status, or changing the grading basis for a class. See "URSA" for more information on services and features.

## Study Lists

A Study List is the record of the courses a student enrolls in for the term. Friday of the second week of instruction, the Study List of enrolled courses becomes "official" and all wait lists are eliminated. Check Study Lists through URSA after all enrollment transactions.

Students are responsible for all courses and the grading basis as listed on URSA and cannot receive credit for courses not listed. Errors or omissions should be corrected before the academic dean's deadline for changes by petition. Unapproved withdrawal from or neglect of a course entered on the Study List results in a failing grade.

## UCLA Policy on Cell Phones and Pagers

Any disruption of a class due to the audible beeping or use of cell phones or pagers will be treated as a violation of Section 102.13 of the *UCLA Student Conduct Code* and will subject a student to sanctions up to and including suspension or dismissal. Cell phones and pagers must be turned off while in classes, libraries, or other quiet areas.

# Billing

## Fee Disclaimer

Fees shown represent the amounts currently estimated for this quarter. Every effort will be made to keep fees at this level for the term. However, given continuing budget uncertainties, circumstances may require an adjustment in these amounts during the term.

## BAR Accounts and Charges

All students are assigned a BAR (Billing and Accounts Receivable) account. A BAR account records all charges and payments (excluding housing) associated with registration along with other service charges that are assessed to students. Accounts are administered electronically (eBill, through URSA); paper statements are issued only on request.

Students must pay all charges in full by the 20th of each month or the preceding workday if the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday. After the payment deadline, students are assessed a \$20 delinquent fee. If registration fees are not paid in full by the payment deadline, a \$50 late registration fee is assessed, and classes are dropped in accordance with the drop class deadline (see the "Calendar" section). Note: the Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) fee is part of registration fees and is due and payable at the time registration fees are paid. For information about waiving the SHIP fee, see <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

Failure to settle financial obligations with the University may result in a hold being placed on the student's record. Such a hold could affect registration, enrollment, financial aid, campus services, and release of academic transcripts. See the "Registration" section for additional information about holds.

Students with a valid e-mail address established through URSA receive monthly e-mail reminders prior to payment deadlines.

## Methods of Payment

**eBill.** BAR accounts are administered electronically (eBill) through URSA. Monthly financial activity is displayed as well as past account activity for the last six months. URSA also provides a link to the Student Accounting website (<http://www.studentaccounting.ucla.edu>) where students can find important communications from the university regarding registration and university policies. Students can pay their BAR account electronically using Visa, MasterCard, or Discover Card. Students can also print out a remittance document from the eBill webpage and mail in payments with a check or money order.

**Paper BAR Statement.** Students may request to have a paper BAR statement sent. A paper BAR statement is generated each month if the unpaid balance due is \$25 or more. To request a paper statement, students must go in person to the Student Accounting Office, located at 1121 Murphy Hall. Paper statements are mailed after the first of each month and may be paid by check or money order or by Visa, MasterCard or Discover Card.

**In-Person Payment.** Students may make payments in person at the Administrative Main Cashier Office located at 1125 Murphy Hall (310-825-2201, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays). See <http://www.amco.ucla.edu>. Fax payments are not accepted.

**Drop-Off Payment.** Payments may be dropped off at the BruinCard center at 150 Sproul Hall (9 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays). They will be picked up and processed on the next business day.

## Financial Aid Distribution

The Financial Aid System automatically credits BAR accounts of students who receive financial aid. Registration fees and other outstanding UCLA debts, such as student health or laboratory fees, are deducted. Students must be enrolled at least half time to receive financial aid disbursements. See "Financial Support."

## Bruin Direct

With Bruin Direct, BAR system refunds are deposited directly to student bank accounts. Students are notified of transactions via e-mail before each deposit is made. UCLA requires Bruin Direct for BAR refunds, and students not currently enrolled must pick up a form from the Administrative Main Cashier Office in 1125 Murphy Hall or from Student Accounting in 1121 Murphy Hall. The form is also available at <http://www.amco.ucla.edu>. Bruin Direct refunds are processed daily. Refunds by mail are processed weekly.

## Medical Insurance Waivers

As a condition of registration, UCLA requires all students to have adequate medical insurance. The UCLA Student Insurance Plan (SHIP) fulfills this requirement and is billed through BAR. Students with adequate private medical insurance may waive out of SHIP by completing the online waiver and submitting it by the published deadline. Students who do not waive out by the deadline may be required to pay the SHIP fee. Students should verify that the waiver has been posted through BAR. For waiver requests, see <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu> or link to the site through URSA.

## Student Responsibilities

### Address Change

Students must keep their UCLA mailing and e-mail addresses up to date and may change them

1. On URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>
2. In person at Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall

Three times each year, student mailing addresses are updated from the change of address list on file with the U.S. Postal Service. Students must, however, still inform UCLA when they change addresses and verify that their addresses are correct on URSA.

### Registration Confirmation

Check registration status on URSA to confirm that registration fee payments have been processed. For proof of payment, print a copy of the Registration Status screen in URSA. Present this and a UCLA BruinCard as proof of student status for the specified term.

## Late Payment

A late payment fee of \$50 is assessed to all students paying registration fees after the deadline. Late registration is complete once students pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

## New and Reentering Students

New and reentering students must pay their fees in person once they receive an URSA notification letter or appointment letter from the Registrar's Office. Payments are accepted at the Administrative Main Cashier Office, 1125 Murphy Hall, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

## After Friday of the Second Week

Students who enroll in classes and pay registration fees after Friday of the second week of classes are assessed both the \$50 late Study List fee and the \$50 late registration fee, resulting in an extra \$100 to register and enroll.

Undergraduate students must obtain the instructor's signature for each course listed and obtain approval from the academic College or school.

Graduate students (GD college code) must obtain approval from their authorized departmental adviser.

Dentistry, Law, and Medicine students must have the written approval of their respective Student Affairs Office.

File the Enrollment Petition at 1113 Murphy Hall after paying fees for the term. Late registration is complete when students pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

## Refunds and Reductions

Under the conditions described below, some UCLA students may be eligible for a full or partial refund of fees paid.

**Cancellation of Registration.** Prior to the first day of instruction, students may cancel registration by mailing a written notice to the Enrollment and Degree Services Office, Attn: Cancellation Clerk, 1113 Murphy Hall, UCLA, Box 951429, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1429. Refund is as follows: new students receive a 100 percent refund for fees paid except for the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and a \$10 service fee; all other students receive a 100 percent refund for fees paid minus the \$10 service fee.

**Withdrawal.** Students who withdraw from the University during the course of a term must file an acceptable Notice of Withdrawal form. Undergraduates may obtain this form at the office of the academic dean. Graduate students may obtain it from their respective departments.

Failing to attend classes, neglecting courses, or stopping payment on checks tendered for registration does not constitute notice of withdrawal. A \$60 fine is assessed if any check for registration fee payment is returned by a bank for any reason, including stopped payment or insufficient funds. If no credit for courses is received, a full refund of the University registration fee for the regular session is granted to all students entering the armed forces prior to the end of the sixth week of the term, with no refund thereafter.

A percentage of the registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Notice of Withdrawal or Leave of Absence form is submitted to the academic dean.

The schedule of refunds is applied to the fee paid as follows:

Refund is as follows: a \$10 service fee is deducted from all 100 percent refunds; for new students, the schedule of refunds is applied to the fees paid minus the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and a \$10 service fee. Fees paid by new M.B.A. and Dentistry students are refunded except for their respective nonrefundable acceptance of admissions deposit. Students who receive a 100 percent refund and purchased SHIP are not eligible for any SHIP benefits for that entire term. For students who receive less than a 100 percent refund and purchased SHIP, the SHIP policy remains in effect for the remainder of the term, and refunds are calculated on the remainder of their registration fees minus the SHIP fee. Registration fee refunds take one to two weeks to process.

If a sponsored student (on financial aid) pays registration fees with personal funds, a refund is initiated automatically through BAR. Students who initially pay registration fees with financial aid, a fee deferral, or a fee waiver, and subsequently cancel or withdraw, do not receive a cash refund.

## Graduate Students

**Graduate Leaves of Absence.** For graduate students on official leave of absence, a percentage of registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Request for Leave of Absence is submitted to the Graduate Division. For refund information, see the chart above; for more on graduate leaves of absence, see "Academic Policies."

**Filing Fee.** Graduate students may be eligible for and billed the filing fee (half the quarterly registration fee) in lieu of full registration fees for the term in which they expect to complete final degree requirements. See "Academic Policies" for requirements.

**Reduced Nonresident Tuition.** Nonresident graduate doctoral students who have advanced to candidacy are eligible for a 75 percent reduction in their annual nonresident tuition fee. See "Academic Policies" for requirements.

**Fee Deferrals.** Academic apprentice personnel are eligible to receive a fee deferral for part or all of the registration fees assessed during the term in which they serve as an academic apprentice. Students are responsible for paying fees by the deferred payment deadline, which is generally two months after the standard term due date. Whether students attend UCLA, take a leave of absence, or withdraw from the University, they are responsible for the fees but may be eligible to receive a partial fee refund, according to the refund schedule above. Fees not paid by the deadline are subject to the late fee charge.

# Financial Support

Financial support at UCLA is handled by the Financial Aid Office, Student Loan Services, and Graduate Student Support Office. Students and their families should also be aware of tax benefits that could help offset the cost of fees and tuition.

At the Financial Aid Office students can

1. Obtain information on the Federal Family Educational Loan Program (FFELP), Federal Pell and Cal Grants, or undergraduate scholarships
2. Get counseling on how to prepare the Financial Aid Application and supporting documents
3. Report changes in their financial situation
4. Pick up petition and revision forms
5. Submit all requested documentation

## Financial Aid Online Services

The Financial Aid Office website (<http://www.fao.ucla.edu>) provides full service information to students. In addition to information about applying for, evaluating, and awarding financial aid, the website allows students to access and print important publications and required forms. Students can also use the homepage to access their electronic Financial Aid Notification (eFAN) and to submit summer financial aid and renewal scholarship applications. An electronic bulletin board highlighting important events and upcoming deadlines also appears on the website, as well as important links to grants, scholarships, and loan programs.

The Financial Aid Office uses electronic communication as its primary method of communicating with students. Students will be notified electronically if additional documentation is required to complete their file, when they have been awarded financial aid and have an eFAN available for review, and for other important events that require student interaction. To ensure that students receive all important notifications, it is imperative to maintain a valid e-mail address on URSA and periodically check MyUCLA for financial aid notifications.

## Financial Aid Distribution through BAR

UCLA uses a central Billing and Receivables (BAR) system to process bills and payments, including financial aid. Each student is assigned an individual BAR account. See the "Billing" section for methods of payment. Statements list charges, such as registration fees, health insurance, or outstanding debts, and may include anticipated financial aid activity and the amount of funds available for a refund.

The Financial Aid System automatically credits BAR accounts with students' financial aid. Students must, however, be enrolled on at least a half-time status (6 units for undergraduate and 4 units for graduate students) for financial aid to be credited to their BAR account.

BAR uses financial aid as a credit to pay student registration fees and most other outstanding UCLA debts (such as student health visits or recreational fees). BAR does not pay housing charges. Students who live on campus must make payment arrangements directly with the housing office.

## Bank Loans and Electronic Processing

Federal Family Educational Loan Program (FFELP) loans include Federal Subsidized and Unsubsidized Stafford loans. These programs are outlined in the *FFELP Guide*, which explains how to apply for loans electronically. Loans processed electronically are credited to student accounts, and any credit balance can be transferred directly to personal checking or savings accounts using Bruin Direct (see below).

Another type of FFELP loan is the Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS), which is explained in the *PLUS Guide*. When parents apply for PLUS loans, they can have electronic disbursements sent to BAR, which pays registration fees and any outstanding debts, then forwards remaining funds to a specified student's account. Alternatively, parents may request paper PLUS checks, which are mailed to the parents once Student Loan Services verifies the student's half-time enrollment.

## Bruin Direct

With Bruin Direct students may have refund checks electronically transferred to a personal checking or savings account. The Financial Aid Office uses available financial aid to pay registration fees and any outstanding debts, then forwards remaining funds to the specified account.

Bruin Direct enrollment information is available in the Student Accounting Office. Bruin Direct is not available to students if they selected a nonelectronic lender. Contact the Financial Aid Office for a list of preferred electronic lenders or see the FFELP/PLUS guides.

## Scholarships for Undergraduate Students

The Undergraduate Scholarship Program at UCLA rewards academic excellence and promise, and provides assistance to students in need. A scholarship is expected to create opportunities for further academic growth and development.

Each scholarship is awarded for one academic year. A renewal of scholarship application must be submitted yearly. See <http://www.fao.ucla.edu> to complete the application online. Students must also apply for financial aid by submitting a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Semifinalists in the Regents Scholarship competition are given preference for these awards.

Information about university and outside agency scholarship programs is at <http://www.fao.ucla.edu>. More information is on FastWeb (financial aid search through the Web), an interactive scholarship search database at <http://www.studentservices.com>.

**Scholarship Resource Center.** The Scholarship Resource Center (SRC) helps undergraduate students search for scholarship information. The SRC is open to all UCLA undergraduates, regardless of financial aid eligibility. The center provides referrals and serves as an information base for scholarships, fellowships, and endowments. The SRC works in conjunction with the Division of Honors and Undergraduate Programs, the Financial Aid Office, and the UCLA community.

Special features of the SRC include counseling for students in the application process, a small library of current scholarship books, a proofreading service for scholarship applications, computer access to various scholarship listings, and workshops and general information sessions. 233 Covel Commons, (310) 206-2875, <http://www.college.ucla.edu/up/SRC/>.

## Unit Requirements

The Financial Aid Office checks units on the census date at the end of the third week of classes. Enrollment below half time on that date results in cancellation of aid and billing for funds received. Once aid is reduced or cancelled, it is not reinstated automatically if the unit count increases after the census date. Federal Pell Grants are not reinstated if the unit count increases after the census date.

For undergraduate students, half-time enrollment is 6 units. Some undergraduate awards (Federal Pell Grant, Cal Grant B Stipend) require enrollment in 12 units to maintain maximum eligibility. Enrollment below 12 units on the census date results in reduction of and billing for these awards.

For graduate students, half-time enrollment is 4 units.

## Maintaining Satisfactory Progress

Federal regulations require UCLA to establish, publish, and apply standards of satisfactory academic progress for financial aid eligibility. Students who fail to meet the standards become ineligible to receive financial aid until they are in compliance with these requirements. For more information, see *A Guide to Satisfactory Academic Progress*, available from the Financial Aid Office and online at <http://www.fao.ucla.edu>.

## Withdrawal and Cancellation

Students who decide not to enroll for one or more terms must notify the Financial Aid Office. Students are not entitled to receive financial aid for those terms.

For students who withdraw for a term, the Return of Federal Aid policy determines the amount of financial aid they are eligible to keep for that term. The calculation is based on the date students submit the official withdrawal form to their College/school or department.

The amount of financial aid students are entitled to keep is prorated based on the number of days they were enrolled. Any financial aid received in excess of the prorated eligibility must be repaid. Students who have completed 60 percent of the enrollment period at the time they withdraw are not required to return any funds for the term.

For more information about the exact amount of financial aid students are eligible to keep after withdrawal, see the *Guide to the Return of Federal Aid*, available in the Financial Aid Office.

For students who receive an administrative cancellation for a term, all financial aid for the effected term is cancelled. They are not entitled to receive any funds for the term and are expected to repay any amount received.

Students who withdraw or are cancelled for a term may have to reapply for Stafford and/or PLUS loans. They should contact the Financial Aid Office and indicate the term they plan on returning to UCLA.

Services offered by Student Loan Services include

1. Distribution of paper FFELP and auxiliary loan checks
2. Processing and distribution of short-term loans (eLOAN) 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays
3. Debt management sessions and loan exit interviews

## Loan Fund Distribution

Students who wish to pick up a paper loan check must present a valid driver's license, California DMV I.D. card, or passport and have no outstanding financial holds on their records in order to receive the check.

## Unit Requirement for Loans

According to federal regulations, undergraduate students must be enrolled in at least 6 units and graduate students in at least 4 units continuously throughout the stated loan period to receive loan funds. This information is verified before loans are distributed. If a student withdraws or carries insufficient units during the stated loan period, any remaining loan funds are returned to the lender, any remaining portion of the loan is cancelled, and the student may be billed for funds already received. In such cases, students must reapply for a new FFELP loan that reflects the new loan period. For more information, contact the Financial Aid Office.

## Federal Family Educational Loan Program

Federal Family Educational Loan Program (FFELP) loans come from banks and are issued each term based on a student's application date.

Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) FFELP loans are distributed through BAR. Current registration and all outstanding University debts are deducted from the student's loan funds before the balance is distributed (see Bruin Direct in this section about direct deposit).

Non-EFT FFELP loan checks are available at the beginning of each term at Student Loan Services. Non-EFT FFELP loan checks are held for pick up for thirty (30) days, then returned to the lender.

Students must notify the Registrar, Student Loan Services, and their FFELP lender in writing within 10 days if they

1. Drop below half-time status, withdraw from UCLA, or transfer to another school
2. Change their address or telephone number, graduation date, name, and/or Social Security number (also notify Registrar's Office, either through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> or in person at 1113 Murphy Hall)

## First-Time UCLA Borrower Requirement

Federal regulations governing the student loan programs require that anyone borrowing student loans at UCLA for the first time must attend a debt management session prior to receiving loan funds. This workshop explains the rights and responsibilities associated with loans and provides solutions for minimizing debt loads. Until this requirement is fulfilled, a University hold will prevent loan(s) from being disbursed. For a schedule of debt management sessions, call (310) 825-9864 or see <http://www.loans.ucla.edu>.

## Exit Interview Requirement

Students who have ever received a university-based loan from the Financial Aid Office and are about to graduate, transfer, withdraw, or take a leave of absence from UCLA are required to complete exit interview documents with Student Loan Services, A227 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-9864.

## Short-Term Loans

Interest-free loans are available in Student Loan Services. Applications are accepted in person only. To qualify for such loans, students must be enrolled at UCLA within the current quarter, have paid registration fees, and have not defaulted on previous short-term loans within the past year. Students must present one of the following photo I.D.s: BruinCard, driver's license, state I.D. card, military I.D., or passport. Three loan types are currently available:

1. Emergency Loan: A loan of up to \$200 for those who meet the above criteria
2. Living Expense Loan: A loan of up to \$350 for those who meet the above criteria and are employed. Written employment verification on letterhead must be provided from the employer
3. Financial Aid Advance: A "bridge loan" to fill the gap between the awarding of current-quarter Financial Aid and the actual receipt of funds. Loans are generally made against Federal Stafford, Federal Perkins, University, and electronically disbursed Parent Loans

The loan must be repaid on time or a \$10 late fee is assessed. The defaulted loan may be subject to further collection actions, and future loan eligibility may be jeopardized. Past-due short-term loans must be paid with cash, money order, or cashier's check in order to receive University services.

### Merit-Based Awards

Merit-based awards funded by the Graduate Division take the form of stipend, fee, and/or nonresident tuition awards. To receive these awards, students must return a signed contract and necessary supporting documentation to Graduate Student Support, 1228 Murphy Hall.

### Fee Remissions

As a result of employment in an eligible academic apprentice personnel title, graduate students may receive certain fee remissions. Eligibility is determined by the following criteria:

1. Appointment(s) must be at least 25 percent time, not to exceed 50 percent time, and only under eligible title codes (students should see their departments for specific details)
2. Work at least 25 percent time during the term
3. Register and enroll in a minimum of 12 units no later than the third week of instruction
4. Cumulative GPA must be 3.0 or better

### Fee Deferrals

Academic apprentice personnel can obtain a Fee Deferral from their department to extend the registration fee and nonresident tuition payment deadline by approximately two months. It is the students' responsibility to pay back the deferral with either personal funds or a fee award credited to their accounts. Students who do not meet the extended deadline are charged a late fee.

## Medical Insurance Plan Premiums

The mandatory insurance premium is paid for all eligible academic apprentice personnel. Students should not waive out of health insurance if they want the premium paid as part of their employment. To waive out of GSHIP, submit the online waiver before the original registration fee payment deadline. A waiver out cannot be reversed during the term even if students have been given a fee deferral.

## Extramural Support

The Graduate and Postdoctoral Extramural Support (GRAPES) database contains information on over 300 awards for graduate study, dissertation research, travel grants, and postdoctoral research. ## Educational Tax Benefits

A number of educational tax benefits may have an impact on the federal income tax liability of students and their families. To assist the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) monitor eligibility for tax credits, UCLA must provide certain information to the IRS on its students. A brief summary of the provisions that may apply to students in attendance at UCLA follows:

**Hope Scholarship Tax Credit** is a nonrefundable tax credit up to a maximum amount of \$1,500 for qualified tuition and fees paid by or on behalf of a student. The credit is generally available for students in their first two years enrolled at least half time in coursework leading to a recognized degree or certificate.

**Lifetime Learning Credit** is a nonrefundable credit equal to 20 percent of the first \$5,000 of qualified tuition and fees paid by or on behalf of a student in years in which the Hope Scholarship Credit is not claimed. The credit is generally available for students enrolled in coursework leading to a recognized degree or certificate. Individuals enrolled in coursework to acquire or improve job skills may also be eligible for the Lifetime Learning Credit.

**Student Loan Interest Deduction** is a federal income tax deduction for an amount up to \$2,500 in interest paid on loans incurred to pay qualified education expenses.

As required by law, UCLA will report to the IRS the identity of students who have paid educational fees that may be eligible for the Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Credit. On or before February 1 of the current tax year, students will receive a corresponding report. # Enrollment

Use URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> to enroll in classes, add, drop, exchange, or change the grading basis of classes, join a wait list, and view Study Lists. Students enroll during appointment times, which they obtain through URSA.

## URSA Enrollment

URSA operates Sunday night from 6 p.m. through Tuesday at 1 a.m. and Tuesday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m., including holidays. See "URSA" for detailed instructions on using URSA.

## Appointments

Enrollment appointments are based on class level and assigned within the time and dates shown on the chart at the end of this section or at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/soc/enrolcht.htm>.

Current-term degree candidates must redeclare candidacy for a later term to receive enrollment appointment times.

## Graduate Student Enrollment

Law, Medicine, and Dentistry students enroll as instructed by their respective Student Affairs Office.

All other graduate students eligible to enroll for the next term are randomly assigned one appointment time or pass and can use URSA from the beginning of the specified appointment time through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes. Students should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by the deadline to avoid the \$50 late filing of Study List fee and to avoid having to obtain instructor signatures.

## Undergraduate Student Enrollment

A two-pass system is used for UCLA's 25,000 undergraduates to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to enroll in required premajor, major, and GE courses and to graduate.

Undergraduates eligible to enroll for the next term enroll on URSA during two randomly assigned appointments, which fall within pass periods that are prioritized as follows:

1. Students in priority groups
2. Seniors with 160 or more units
3. New and reentering students eligible for advance payment and/or enrollment
4. Seniors with less than 160 units
5. Juniors with less than 135 units
6. Sophomores with less than 90 units
7. Freshmen with less than 45 units

Priority enrollment groups include students in academic difficulty, Regents and Alumni Scholars, recruited scholarship recipients, Letters and Science Honors Programs participants, athletes in NCAA sports, and students served by the Office for Students with Disabilities. Sections are carefully monitored during each priority group pass to ensure that any one group does not exceed 30 percent and that all groups do not exceed 50 percent of a section's spaces, in accordance with recommendations of a task force appointed by the Committee on Educational Policy.

URSA does not allow students to enroll before their specified time and informs them of their correct appointment day and time.

Changes in the appointment sequence are made only to correct an appointment based on an incorrect class level. To request an appointment change, go to 1113 Murphy Hall with a photo I.D. prior to the assigned appointment.

**Priority Pass.** Students in a priority group who do not enroll during their priority pass appointment period must wait until their first pass appointment to enroll.

**First Pass.** During their first pass, students may only enroll in 10 units. This gives all undergraduates a better chance to obtain at least two courses needed toward graduation. Students who do not process their enrollment during the assigned first pass must wait until their second pass appointment to enroll.

**Second Pass.** During their second pass, students can add courses up to the maximum units allowed by their College or school. They can enroll from the beginning of the specified appointment day and time through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes when wait lists are eliminated and Study Lists of enrolled courses become official. Students should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by that date to avoid paying the \$50 late Study List filing fee and obtaining instructor signatures and College/school approval on Enrollment Petitions (for more details, see Official Study Lists below).

After second pass appointments begin, undergraduates may

1. Use a Permission to Enroll (PTE) number (see the Enrollment in Restricted Classes section below) to enroll through URSA or submit approved PTE forms for restricted or closed classes
2. Submit approved petitions for special studies 195-199 courses
3. Request enrollment in Passed/Not Passed (P/NP) courses over the eligible limit of units (URSA informs students if this applies)
4. Submit approval for an **excess unit** Study List (more than 19 units for Letters and Science; more than 18 for Engineering; more than 17 for Arts and Architecture/Theater, Film, and Television)

## In-Person Enrollment

Any enrollment transactions that students cannot complete through URSA may be processed at 1113 Murphy Hall.

1. At any time
  - a. **Graduate students** may submit approved Permission to Enroll forms for restricted or closed classes
  - b. **Undergraduates** may submit approved major change forms that may affect enrollment in courses restricted to particular majors
  - c. **School of the Arts and Architecture students** may have their enrollment processed at 194 Kinross Building South
2. After second pass appointments begin, undergraduates may complete any of the four enrollment processes above in person

## Wait Lists

Wait lists are maintained through Friday of the second week of classes unless a department deletes them earlier. This may happen on the first day of classes for some sections, especially laboratories. Check the notes under the course listing in the *Schedule of Classes*. Students should not assume they will be added to a class or dropped from a class (if, for example, they are number one or number 100 on the wait list). Students must drop themselves before the official Study List deadline if they do not want the class.

A wait-list position within 10 percent of enrollment capacity (for example, number five for a class of 50), indicates a good chance of being enrolled. Many students drop classes after the first meeting, at which point other students may enroll in the class or advance on the

wait list. Sometimes departments increase the enrollment capacity of the class, which automatically enrolls additional students from the wait list. Check URSA before Friday of the second week of classes to determine wait-list status.

Students may move backward on wait lists if a class is overenrolled through the use of PTE numbers or PTE forms. For example, a student who is first on the wait list for a course that has an enrollment capacity of 100 and is not overenrolled may move from position 101/100 to 105/100 if four students with PTE numbers enroll. The student cannot be enrolled until five people drop the course and the enrolled number is less than the enrollment capacity.

## Enrollment in Special Studies 195-199 Courses

Beginning in Fall 2004, the old 199 petition forms will no longer be used. New forms for special studies courses can be found on the MyUCLA website. Look under MyUCLA Features and scroll down to Special Studies Courses. See <https://be.my.ucla.edu/specialstudies/default.asp>.

Fill out the petition according to instructions. After obtaining the signatures of the instructor and the instructor's department chair, students must check with the department of the course in which they are enrolling, or with their College or school, to confirm which of the following options to use to complete enrollment in the course:

1. Through URSA using the PTE number provided by the department
2. Through the department by leaving the form for processing
3. Through the appropriate school by taking the form to
  - a. 194 Kinross Building South for the School of the Arts and Architecture
  - b. 6426 Boelter Hall for the Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science
  - c. 103 East Melnitz Building for the School of Theater, Film, and Television

4. Through the Registrar's Office by taking the form to 1113 Murphy Hall. NOTE: Departments must set up a section for the course in order for the Registrar's Office to process enrollment.

The deadline to enroll in a Special Studies course without a fee is Friday of the second week of classes; to enroll with a fee, the deadline is Friday of the third week of classes.

Once a petition is processed, students should print out their study list to serve as a receipt.


## Enrollment in Restricted Classes

Students may enroll in a restricted class if they get a five-digit PTE number through URSA. A PTE number is issued at the discretion of the instructor or department offering the class. When used with the nine-digit course I.D., they guarantee enrollment through URSA or in person. Inquire at the respective departmental office regarding any internal department procedures for receiving a PTE number.

PTE numbers may be issued in the following cases:

1. The department/instructor offering the class may authorize **selective enrollment** if the enrollment capacity is filled. This is at the instructor's discretion and may only be approved based on criteria established by the instructor and/or department
2. As an exception to published **restrictions** (consent of instructor, department consent, specified majors, class levels—freshmen only, juniors or above) in the *Schedule of Classes*
3. **Closed classes** (enrollment capacity reached). When the enrollment capacity is reached, students may choose to be on a wait list. They are moved into the class as enrolled students drop out or if the department increases the enrollment capacity

If the instructor/department assigns a PTE number, use the nine-digit course I.D. to enroll in the class through URSA.

## Enforced Requisites

Undergraduate students are prevented from enrolling in lower division Letters and Science courses with enforced requisites (as listed in the *UCLA General Catalog* or the online *Schedule of Classes*) if those requisites have not been met. Some courses with requisites may be in warning status, which allows enrollment but informs students that the course requisite has not been met. In "Class Listings," courses with enforced requisites are notated with a Y in the ENF REQ column, located after the course title.

Students with transfer or AP credit that was not evaluated as equivalent to a specific requisite should consult the department offering the course for review of the transfer or AP credit as shown on their DPR. Decisions by the department concerning meeting requisites are final.

## Impacted Courses: Letters and Science Students

The College of Letters and Science designates certain lower division courses as "impacted," which refers to Letters and Science courses that

1. Meet once a week and are difficult to complete if a student has not attended by the end of the second week of classes
2. Have high enrollment demand that deny qualified students enrollment because of limited resources
3. Have high instructor/student ratios, and/or
4. Involve large commitments of other resources

Each impacted course is clearly indicated in "Class Listings" by a Y in the IM (Impacted) column and an accompanying note.

Students cannot drop an impacted course after the second week of a term for other than exceptionally extenuating circumstances as described in Drop Procedures below.

## Official Study Lists

A Study List is a record of all courses students enroll in for a term. A registered student's Study List of enrolled courses becomes official at midnight on Friday of the second week of classes. Each student is responsible for all courses and grading basis, as listed on URSA, and cannot receive credit for courses not listed. Errors or omissions should be corrected before the student's academic dean's deadline for changes by petition.

## Undergraduate Changes to Official Study List

After Friday of the second week, when the Study List becomes official, undergraduate students are charged a fee to (1) add courses (a PTE number is required if the class is closed or restricted) through Friday of the third week, (2) drop courses or change variable units through Friday of the fourth week, and (3) change the grading basis of courses through Friday of the sixth week (see the chart later in this section). A student's BAR account is charged the appropriate fee for each change. For all other changes—including registering late, filing a late Study List, adding a course after the third week, dropping a course or changing variable units after the fourth week, changing grading basis after the sixth week, and so on—students must file an Enrollment Petition by the published deadline (see "Calendar"). See Enrollment Petitions below for details.

Student athletes may not drop a class after the first day without their counselor's approval.

## Graduate Student Changes to Official Study List

Graduate students can use URSA to add, drop, or change grading basis or change variable units with a fee through the end of the last day of instruction. To add a course that is closed or restricted, students must input a valid PTE number. Their BAR account will be charged the appropriate fee per transaction.

## Petitions

A petition is a form submitted to explain an exception from any standard rule or regulation of the University. It is the only way to obtain formal approval from the department, the College or school, the Registrar, or office with authority over the particular request. Some petitions carry a fee.

Some of the uses of petitions are to change the College, school, or major; take more or fewer units than regulations permit; make changes to the Study List after URSA processing ends; or obtain credit by examination. In addition, students may petition for concurrent enrollment, double major, or waiver of scholarship requirements.

## Enrollment Petitions

Required approvals, which vary by college/school/division, are outlined on the Enrollment Petition form. No petition is accepted for processing enrollment without all required approval signatures. Such approvals must be CURRENT (an approval dated prior to a published deadline is not acceptable two weeks after the deadline). See the petition for processing locations.

**Undergraduates:** Required for (1) adds with instructor's signature, (2) late Study Lists, (3) late adds/drops/credit changes, (4) late drop of impacted courses, and (5) retroactive changes. Items 3 through 5 require a separate petition process with the College/school. An Enrollment Petition is only given to the student if the request is granted.

**Graduate Students:** Required for late registration and late Study Lists. Departmental signatures are required for late registration but not for late Study Lists. Retroactive petitions require signatures of the department and instructor(s) as well as a supportive memorandum from the department. These are submitted to the Graduate Division, 1255 Murphy Hall, for consideration.

Do not use an Enrollment Petition when URSA enrollment processing is available.

Changes requested after published deadlines (see "Calendar") are considered only under extraordinary circumstances by the College/school, and supportive information may be required prior to approval.

## Changing Grading Basis Courses with Optional Grading Basis

Courses with an optional grading basis allow students to choose either a Letter grade or a Passed/Not Passed grade (for undergraduates) or Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory grade (for graduate students). Students can change the grading basis on these courses through URSA. The deadline for undergraduates to make changes is Friday of the sixth week of the term. Graduate students can make changes through Friday of the tenth week of the term. See the Grading Detail item on the course description page in the online *Schedule of Classes* to determine if a course has optional grading.

## Courses with Mandatory Grading Basis

Courses with a mandatory (non-optional) grading basis (Letter Grade only, Passed/Not Passed, Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory) are designated G, PN, or SU in URSA. The grading basis of these courses cannot be changed through URSA. Students must petition to request a change in grading basis. The deadline for undergraduates to petition for change is Friday of the sixth week of the term. Graduate students can petition for change through Friday of the tenth week of the term.

1. Using a Student Petition form, obtain approval to change grading basis from the department offering the class.
2. If departmental approval is granted, you must file the petition at your college or school if you are an undergraduate student or at Graduate Division if you are a graduate student.
3. If your request is approved by the College, school, or Graduate Division, the petition is sent to the Registrar's Office and the change in grading basis is recorded on the Study List.

## Drop Procedures

Dropping a course may reduce a Study List below minimums required for full-time status, financial aid, the minimum progress requirement, and eligibility for residence halls and other services that require a specific enrollment status. The drop forms remind students about these requirements and consequences that may be triggered if the particular petition is processed. However, it is each student's responsibility to satisfy these other requirements.

## Dropping Nonimpacted Courses

Nonimpacted courses constitute the vast majority of courses and may be dropped on or before Friday of the second week through

URSA with no fee or transcript notation. These courses may be dropped during the third and fourth week on URSA with no transcript notation and a \$3 per course fee. Drops after Friday of the fourth week may be made by obtaining a Late Drop Petition from College Academic Counseling.

## Dropping Impacted Courses: Letters and Science Students

Impacted courses may be dropped after the second-week deadline only under extraordinary circumstances. Each impacted course is indicated by a Y in the IM (Impacted) column in the class listings in the Schedule of Classes.

Students have only two weeks to drop an impacted course without a notation on their transcript. After the end of the second week, students who need to request a drop of an impacted course should first consult their instructor for advice on other options.

If dropping is advised due to exceptional or extreme circumstances (such as severe illness), pick up the Late or Retroactive Impacted Drop Petition from your College Counseling unit (honors students at Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; AAP students at AAP Counseling, 1209 Campbell Hall; athletes at the Morgan Center; all other Letters and Science students at College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall). Students must explain their situation on the form and obtain a signature from the instructor. Impacted course drop requests are considered by a faculty subcommittee of the Letters and Science Faculty Executive Committee. If approved, the dropped course appears on the student's transcript with a notation indicating the date and week of the term in which the drop was filed with the College.

## Study List Changes Through URSA

Fees for URSA adds/drops/changes are automatically charged to a student's BAR account on a per transaction basis of \$3. Anything submitted or requested as an exception to a published deadline is subject to a **penalty fee of \$10**. See "Calendar" for deadlines.

- a. Undergraduate students adding courses during the third week are assessed a \$3 per course fee. For courses added after the official add deadline of Friday of the third week, undergraduates are assessed a fee of \$3 per course plus a penalty fee of \$10 per course.
- b. Graduate students adding courses during the third week are assessed a \$3 per course fee. The official graduate add deadline is Friday of the third week. For courses added after this date, graduates are assessed a fee of \$3 per course plus a penalty fee of \$10 per course and the enrollments are not counted toward departmental budget allocations.
- c. Letters and Science students may not drop impacted courses through URSA after Friday of the second week. Students in the schools of Arts and Architecture, Theater, Film, and Television, Nursing, and Engineering and Applied Science need approval from their school for any drop after the fourth week.

## Transcript Notation for Late Drops

Drops of nonimpacted courses processed after Friday of the fourth week are recorded on the permanent undergraduate transcript. The entry records the week the course was dropped using the following format:

## Late Study Lists

Any registered student who is not officially enrolled in courses for credit as of Friday of the second week of instruction must file a **late Study List**. Use an Enrollment Petition for this process.

There is a \$50 late fee, which is charged in addition to the late payment fee, for filing a Study List after Friday of the second week of instruction as described under Late Payment in "Billing."

1. Obtain the appropriate form (undergraduate students from academic dean; graduate students from department adviser) and complete as instructed
2. File the approved form at the processing locations noted on the Enrollment Petition form. You are given a receipt of the approved/processed Study List and are responsible for all courses and grading basis as recorded. Your BAR account is charged the \$50 late fee

## Incomplete Grade Procedure

Students who receive an Incomplete grade in a course and who plan to complete the requirements to remove it should not reenroll in the course. Have the department send a UCLA Report of Academic Revision to the instructor. Once the grade is received by the Registrar's Office, a confirmation is issued to the department and/or instructor and a \$5 fee is then charged to the student's BAR account. Fees are subject to change at any time.

The petition and grade assigned must be on file in the Registrar's Office by the end of the student's next registered term to prevent the I grade from lapsing to an F, NP, or U. The UCLA Report of Academic Revision can also be used to remove Incompletes that have lapsed.

Confirm that a grade has been received through URSA and check which term the I grade was removed. If the grade is not recorded, students should check that the instructor forwarded the form with final grade and proper date of completion to the Registrar's Office.

University Records System Access (URSA) gives UCLA students, and those who have been students within the past 10 years, real-time access to their University academic records.

URSA operates Sunday night from 6 p.m. through Tuesday at 1 a.m. and Tuesday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m., including holidays.

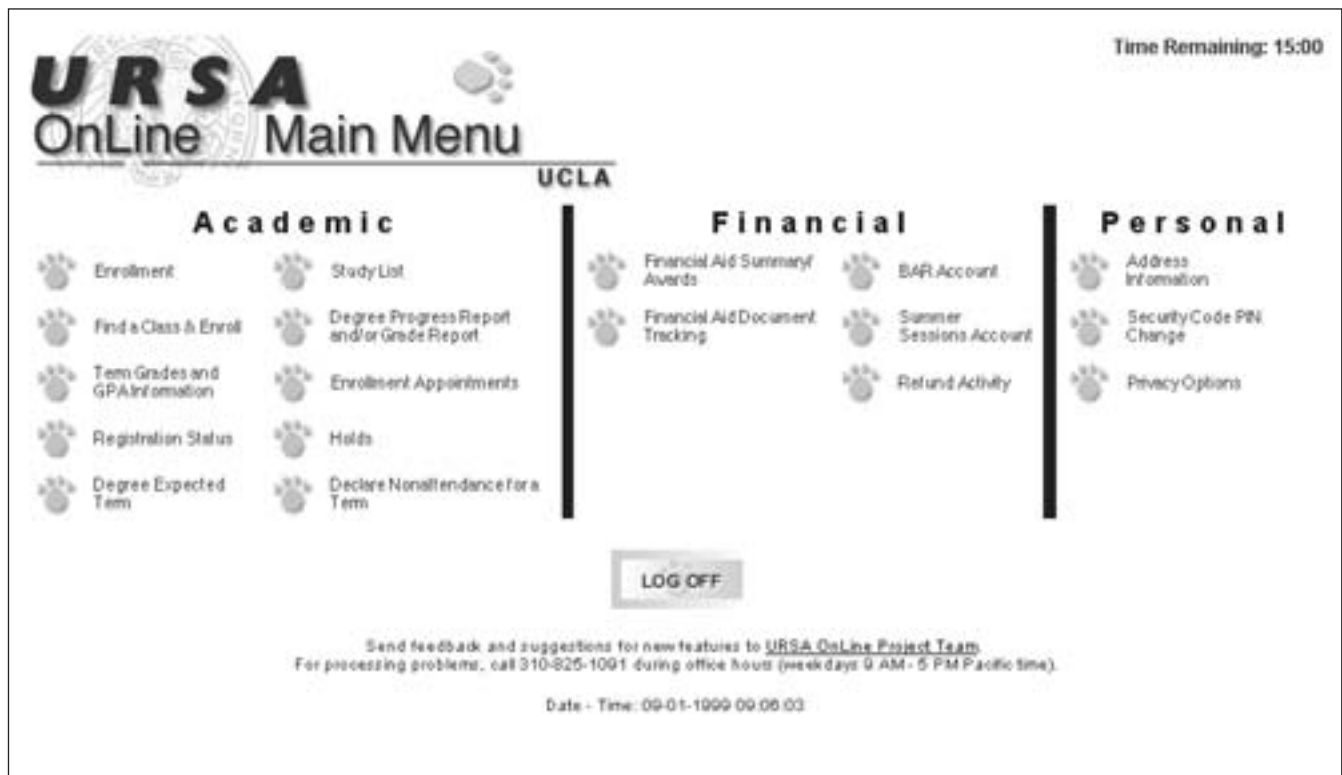
URSA is accessed by logging on to <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>.

Security features ensure that only you have access to your information. The first time you access URSA, you are asked to verify your e-mail address, create a challenge question and response phrase, and change your assigned security code (personal identification number or PIN) to a four-digit number of your choice. At any time, you may change this PIN through URSA.

Do not give your security code to anyone. If you tamper with another student's enrollment or personal data, you are subject to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension.

If the privacy of your security code has been compromised, or if you misplace your code, go to 1113 Murphy Hall with your BruinCard. Your security code is not given over the telephone unless an authorization to release your security code is on file in the Registrar's Office.

URSA provides the easiest way to enroll in classes and to gain real-time access to academic, financial, and personal records. The site is designed with an intuitive visual interface that walks you through the different steps of the procedure you are trying to accomplish, whether it be to check your BAR account, change address information, view your Study List, or see your term grades.

Bruin OnLine (BOL) is a collection of software and services that provide UCLA students, faculty, and staff with access to e-mail, campus network services, and the Internet. Services include dialup access using PPP at speeds up to 56 kbps and access to the campus network through ethernet ports.

Use Bruin OnLine to

1. Check class availability in the online *Schedule of Classes*
2. Access class webpages and discussion groups
3. Search the UCLA Library or online databases
4. Create e-mail mailing lists
5. Download software—Internet browsers, anti-virus software, and FTP programs
6. Create personal webpages
7. Join discussions on UseNet newsgroups
8. Authenticate to use the BOL Proxy Server, which allows access to UCLA-restricted resources from non-UCLA Internet Service Providers
9. Gain access to the UCLA wireless network

## Accessing Bruin OnLine Services

The main places to connect to Bruin OnLine from campus are at

1. Campus computing laboratories, such as the CLICC laboratory, Center for Digital Humanities, or Social Sciences Computing laboratories, which post instructions for BOL access; consult your department or campus laboratory staff for further instructions
2. Campus residence hall rooms where, in order to access BOL, students must purchase a network card from the Student Technology Center in Delta Terrace, (310) 825-3400. BOL software and related instructions are included with the card

The two ways to access BOL from off campus are

1. By downloading software from <http://www.bol.ucla.edu>. Once the software is installed and configured, users pay all telephone charges to access the BOL modem pool (310 area code). Setup and configuration instructions are available at 4302 Math Sciences and at <http://www.bol.ucla.edu>.
2. Using your own Internet Service Provider (ISP), you can make use of the BOL proxy server to access UCLA restricted resources such as software and library journals. See <http://www.bol.ucla.edu/services/proxy/> for more information.

## System Requirements

To use BOL from home or a campus residence hall, your computer must meet the minimum configurations below. Departments may have additional recommendations for graduate student computers.

6. Minimum 14.4 kbps modem, maximum 56 kbps (must support V.90 for 56 kbps speeds); external modem requires hardware handshaking cable; modem NOT required in campus residence halls
7. Network card for campus residence hall connections
8. Windows 98/ME/2000/XP or Windows NT 4.0 workstation with Service Pack 6 installed

To use BOL, you need a BOL I.D., password, and a computer that connects to UCLA's network. You can access BOL from many locations throughout campus or from home. If you are new to BOL, you can learn its features through classes and online tutorials. Personalized assistance is also available from the BOL Help Desk.

## Campus Computer Laboratories

Student computer laboratories are supported through Academic Technology Services (ATS) and the College Library Instructional Computing Commons (CLICC), a collaborative effort between ATS, Center for Digital Humanities, Social Sciences Computing, Office of Instructional Development, and College Library. Some 16 computer laboratories are available throughout campus, each with computers, peripherals, software, and services that cater to specific areas of study.

Access to the laboratories varies; departmental laboratories may require enrollment in either the major or a class. General purpose laboratories merely require a Bruin OnLine I.D. (BOL I.D.), which is available free of charge to UCLA students, faculty, and staff. Kiosks to set up an I.D. are available at several laboratory locations.

## Electronic Mailing Lists (Listservs)

Bruin OnLine offers a mailing list service that manages electronic mail discussion and e-newsletter distribution to list subscribers. Mailing lists are available for any academic purpose; new list requests from students require verification of faculty sponsorship. ## Instructional Enhancement Initiative

The Instructional Enhancement Initiative is designed to

1. Provide course websites for faculty, teaching assistants, and enrolled students. The sites facilitate the distribution of supplementary course materials, lecture notes, homework assignments, research links, and electronic communication, including virtual office hours and class bulletin boards for interactive question and answer sessions. Instructors decide which of these online capabilities are best suited to their course websites
2. Provide enhanced computer laboratories with expanded hours of access for student use

Students enrolled in undergraduate non-tutorial courses in the College of Letters and Science and undergraduate courses in the Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science are assessed a per-unit course materials fee, called the Instructional Enhancement Fee. For fee amounts, see the miscellaneous fee chart in "Registration" or online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/fees/>. Fee assessment through BAR is based on actual enrollment at the end of the fourth week of the quarter. Instructional Enhancement fees apply to all students except Education Abroad Program reciprocity students and CAPP (Washington Internship) students.

## MyUCLA

MyUCLA at <http://my.ucla.edu> provides a portal to individual student information. Students can personalize the site by entering either their BOL I.D. and password or their University I.D. and the same four-digit PIN used to access URSA. Features of MyUCLA include

1. Full featured WebMail support, including personal address books, enabling access to POP3 or IMAP4 compliant mail systems and including additional functionality when accessing Bruin OnLine
2. A personalized Study List showing classes and class information for current and previous quarters, including grades and links to course websites
3. A notifications section for important announcements
4. A subscriptions section where students access online information from newspapers, journals, or magazines or from University departments, clubs, and organizations
5. Links to UCLA online resources, including URSA, the *Schedule of Classes* and *UCLA General Catalog*, and much more
6. A personal calendar that includes academic deadlines, subscription calendars, class specific deadlines, and personal entries
7. Scoped InfoSeek searches
8. General academic information

Letters and Science students obtain additional services, including the ability to view their counseling appointments, check the status of petitions, and track their honors progress.

## Newsgroups

UCLA has many newsgroups that can only be accessed from campus accounts. Bruin OnLine has its own newsgroups, for example, that post announcements about its service and where students can ask questions about computer software and hardware ([ucla.bol.announce](mailto:ucla.bol.announce), [ucla.bol.general](mailto:ucla.bol.general), and [ucla.bol.webpages](mailto:ucla.bol.webpages)). Other newsgroups help with platform questions ([ucla.pc](mailto:ucla.pc) and [ucla.mac](mailto:ucla.mac)), while still others post announcements and offer forums (for example, [ucla.general](mailto:ucla.general), [ucla.announce](mailto:ucla.announce), [ucla.rumor](mailto:ucla.rumor), and [ucla.forsale](mailto:ucla.forsale)). Some classes have their own newsgroups as well (see [ucla.classes.\\*](mailto:ucla.classes.*) hierarchy).

Newsgroups offered by [news.ucla.edu](mailto:news.ucla.edu) can be accessed from off campus by authenticating with your BOL username and password.

## Online Directory

The UCLA Online Directory offers directory information about faculty, staff, students, and departments. Student listings in the directory are generated through URSA and are updated nightly (excluding week-ends) by the Registrar's Office, which administers student privacy rights for release of student information. A student may change address, telephone number, e-mail address, and privacy options through URSA. Changes to address and privacy options may also be submitted using a change form, available in the Murphy Hall north lobby and filed at 1113 Murphy Hall. For more details on privacy options, see Disclosure of Student Records in the Official Notices section or see URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>. To access the Online Directory, see <http://www.directory.ucla.edu>.

## Student Technology Center

The Student Technology Center coordinates computing connectivity to the campus network for students living in on-campus housing, including network card purchase and installation, Bruin OnLine software, and technical support. The center houses a computer laboratory with Macintosh and Windows computers. It also offers scanning, CD burning, and printing services. Located opposite Covel Commons at 330 De Neve Drive, (310) 825-3400; see <http://www.resnet.ucla.edu>.

## UCLA Homepage

The UCLA homepage (<http://www.ucla.edu>) offers access to information on campus teaching, research, and service. Its main menu links to sites for admissions, health sciences, resources, technology, the library, arts and museums, continuing education, and athletics. It also offers access to the Online Directory, MyUCLA, and pages for alumni. In addition, the students menu connects to URSA, student services, computing laboratories, and campus news. A search feature allows for easy browsing through the thousands of webpages that comprise the UCLA site, including those for departments, programs, and services.

## UCLA Library Electronic Resources

Locate and identify materials through the library's web-based online information systems (see below), which can be accessed from the library website at <http://www.library.ucla.edu>. Reference librarians are available in all library units to answer questions about using online systems, as well as to provide assistance with reference and research topics.

The **UCLA Library Catalog** contains records for all UCLA Library holdings and other campus collections, including the Archive Research and Study Center of the Film and Television Archive, Chicano Studies Research Center Library, Ethnomusicology Archive, Institute for Social Science Research Data Archives Library, and Instructional Media Library. It also provides library item location and circulation status, and users can request document delivery services and SRLF items online.

The **Melvyl Catalog**, which is also available through telnet, contains information on holdings at all University of California campuses as well as a number of other collections.

While continuing to develop and manage collections of traditional printed materials, the UCLA Library also makes a number of digital resources available for campus use through the library site. These include electronic reserves and many electronic journals, texts, reference resources, periodical indexes, and abstracts.

# Student Services

Student Services support the teaching, research, and public service functions of the University while they promote the academic success of UCLA students and enhance the quality of campus life.

## Registrar's Office Services

In addition to enrollment services, the Registrar's Office helps students determine residence status, change names on official records, and obtain transcripts and degrees. See the Registrar's Services Guide for a complete list of services.

## Establishing Residence for Tuition Purposes

Specific criteria for establishing residence for tuition purposes is included in the Appendix of the current *UCLA General Catalog* and in the Registrar's Office Frequently Asked Questions at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/faq/>. Direct inquiries about residence requirements to the Residence Deputy, 1113 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-3447. No other University personnel are authorized to supply information about residence requirements for tuition purposes.

Petition for Resident Classification is obtained on the Registrar's Office website and filed at 1113 Murphy Hall prior to the late registration period for the term in which you are eligible for classification from nonresident to resident status. Documentation of residence will be requested at that time.

## Name Change

To change their names on official University records, or to identify capitalization, punctuation, or accent marks (for their diploma) that computer files do not accommodate, students must obtain and file (no fee) the UCLA Correction or Change of Name form at Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall. Forms are available in the Murphy Hall North Lobby and at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. A new BruinCard must be obtained at 123 Kerckhoff Hall for a \$20 replacement fee.

## Official Transcripts

Two versions of official UCLA student records are available from Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall. These are the academic transcript and the verification transcript. Each is designed to meet specific needs.

Academic Record Services provides transcripts for regular and summer sessions. For UCLA Extension courses, order from UCLA Extension, P.O. Box 24901, Los Angeles, CA 90024.

Official UCLA transcripts are printed on security paper to safeguard against unauthorized duplication, alteration, and misrepresentation. The security paper is blue with a faint background design and a border with the words "University of California, Los Angeles." Authentication details are located in the lower right hand corner of the transcript, and the transcript legend is located on the reverse of the document.

## Academic Transcript

The academic transcript is a student's complete academic record, including a listing of courses taken, transfer credit, units, grades, grade-point average (GPA), earned UCLA degrees, and in-progress term information, which includes a list of the courses that student enrolled in during the term the document was requested, and other in-progress information such as a change in major or the removal of an I grade.

Grades for completed terms are processed immediately following the conclusion of final examinations. Complete academic transcripts are available approximately 30 working days after the last day of the term. For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. If you require earlier proof of graduation, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall. A fee may be charged for this service.

The minimum period required for processing and issuing academic transcripts for both registered and former students is three working days. Expedited service (processing within 24 hours) is available for an additional \$10 charge per addressee.

## Verification Transcript

The verification transcript certifies registration (fee payment), enrollment status, and degrees. For auto insurance "good student" discount, insurance forms should be presented at 1134 Murphy Hall. The verification fee is required for this service. Verification transcripts confirm student status only after registration fees have been paid for the term. Verification of student workload is based on actual enrolled units and does not consider wait-listed units or list courses for a term.

Verification of degree can be issued after your degree has been posted to your student record approximately seven weeks after the term ends. If you require verification before your degree is posted, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall.

The fee for a verification transcript is waived if requested for loan or student aid verifications (proof of request required). Most enrollment verifications for loans and creditors, however, are processed for the University by the National Student Clearinghouse. Approved by the U.S. Department of Education, the clearinghouse is a national organization that facilitates and expedites student enrollment verifications for creditors and other student service-related agencies. The clearinghouse abides by all provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

## Ordering Transcripts

Academic and verification transcripts can be ordered by sending a request to the Registrar's Office, Attn: [Academic or Verification] Transcripts, 1105 Murphy Hall, UCLA, Box 951429, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1429.

Requests should include

1. The name under which you were registered at UCLA
2. Your dates of attendance
3. Your date of birth
4. Your social security number and/or your student I.D.
5. Your complete address and telephone number
6. The number of copies you need
7. Detailed mailing instructions including any special handling
8. Your full signature

## Fees and Payment

Transcripts are regularly \$5 per copy. Current students' transcript fees are billed to their BAR account. BAR accounts are administered

electronically (eBill) through URSA. Non-current students will be mailed a paper statement after the first of each month. Payment may be made by check or money order payable to Regents-UC, or by Visa, MasterCard, or Discover Card. Payments are processed by the Administrative Main Cashier Office.

In some cases, additional fees may apply. Forms that must be completed by the Registrar's Office are charged a special handling fee of \$15 per form. Forms that require official signatures on envelopes are charged \$15 per addressee. Expedited service (processing within 24 hours) is available for an additional \$10 per addressee. Express Mail or Federal Express services are also available; consult Academic Record Services for special mailing fees.

Transcripts can be faxed with payment of an additional fee of \$5 for domestic and \$10 for international faxes. Transcripts that are faxed are generally not considered official, and confidentiality can not be guaranteed.

Transcript requests are not processed for anyone with outstanding obligations to the University. Fees are subject to change at any time.

## Other Student Services

Programs and services are geared to supporting the mental, social, and physical development needs of students in a healthy, safe, and intellectually challenging environment.

### Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center

The Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center (Student Health Service) is the campus health service and an outpatient health facility for all registered UCLA students. Most services are subsidized by registration fees, but there are minimal fees for all services. Visit, core laboratory, and X-ray fees for students with the Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) are written off by SHIP. There are co-pays for pharmaceuticals. Service fees for students without SHIP are billed directly to students' BAR accounts.

If students withdraw during a term, the Ashe Center continues to be available for the remainder of the term on a full-fee basis from the date of withdrawal. If students withdraw with no refund, SHIP is maintained and services remain available as described above.

The cost of services received outside the Ashe Center is each student's financial responsibility. Students who waive out of the UCLA Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) need to ensure that they are enrolled in a plan adequate to cover expenses incurred outside of the Ashe Center.

Office hours during the academic year are weekdays 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. except Friday, when service begins at 9 a.m. Patients without appointments (walk-ins) are seen on the first floor. Patients with appointments are seen on the first, second, or third floor. Physical therapy and the insurance office are on the fourth floor. Located at 221 Westwood Plaza; see <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

For emergency care when the Ashe Center is closed, students may obtain treatment at the UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room on a fee-for-service basis. It is the student's responsibility to have insurance billed.

### Center for Student Programming

The Center for Student Programming (CSP) helps students start a club or join an existing one and serves as the official registry for all campus organizations. Staff members advise activities ranging from the Spirit Squad and greek life to campus retention and student outreach. CSP assists students with program and leadership development and fund-raising, interprets and enforces University rules and regulations, and administers bulletin boards on campus. Located at 105 Kerckhoff Hall; see <http://www.studentactivities.ucla.edu>.

## Center for Women and Men

The Center for Women and Men offers services to all UCLA students, with special focus on gender-related issues and concerns and reentry/nontraditional student services.

In addition to individual counseling, the center presents workshops and support groups on a variety of topics, including assertiveness training, child care, career and leadership development, healthy relationships, men's issues, returning to school, single parenting, sexual violence prevention and education, and health and wellness. It also offers referrals for medical, legal, career planning, personal counseling, and other services both on and off campus. In addition, rape services consultants (RSCs)—individuals who provide information, support, and resources for members of the UCLA community who have been raped or sexually assaulted—can discuss options and alternatives, help identify and assist in contacting the most appropriate support services, and answer any questions that may arise. The center is also a designated Sexual Harassment Information Center available to all UCLA students. Located at B44 Student Activities Center; see <http://www.thecenter.ucla.edu>.

## Cultural and Recreational Affairs

The Department of Cultural and Recreational Affairs (UCLA Recreation) coordinates recreational programming and supervises campus recreational activities, facilities, and services. Located at 2131 Wooden Center; see <http://www.recreation.ucla.edu>.

## Dean of Students

The Office of the Dean of Students assists students with whatever needs they might have. Direct services include general counseling; sending emergency messages to students; and assisting in understanding University policies and procedures, including grievance procedures regarding student records, discrimination, and student debts. ## Housing Services

### University Housing

Applications for on-campus housing and university apartments require a \$30 nonrefundable application fee. Contact the UCLA Housing Assignment Office for questions regarding the application process. Located at 360 De Neve Drive, (310) 825-4271; see <http://www.housing.ucla.edu/myhousing/>.

### Off-Campus Housing

The Community Housing Office offers rental assistance for students, faculty, and staff interested in off-campus housing. The office maintains a website for a variety of living alternatives from the private sector, including apartments, roommate situations, and rooms in private homes. ## Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Campus Resource Center

The Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender (LGBT) Campus Resource Center provides education, information, and advocacy services for the UCLA community. The center offers support groups, educational workshops, and training seminars and maintains a library of books and periodicals. The staff provides confidential assistance and support to students, faculty, and staff who feel they have experienced harassment or discrimination or who wish to connect to the campus LGBT community. ## Libraries

The UCLA Library, a campuswide network of libraries serving programs of study and research in many fields, is among the top 10 ranked research libraries in the U.S. The total collections number more than 7.6 million volumes, and nearly 80,000 serial titles are received regularly.

Undergraduates are encouraged to use the College Library, which features collections and services in support of the undergraduate curriculum. The scholarly and research needs of undergraduate and graduate students and faculty are served by the Arts Library, Louise M. Darling Biomedical Library, Richard C. Rudolph East Asian Library, Hugh and Hazel Darling Law Library, Eugene and Maxine Rosenfeld Management Library, Music Library, Charles E. Young Research Library, and Science and Engineering Library. Lower-use materials for which there is not adequate shelving space on campus are located in the Southern Regional Library Facility (SRLF).

Locate and identify materials through the library's web-based online information systems, which include the UCLA Library Catalog and the Melvyl Catalog. These systems can be accessed from the library website at <http://www.library.ucla.edu>.

## Office for Students with Disabilities

The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD) provides a wide range of academic support services to regularly enrolled students with documented permanent or temporary disabilities in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, and University policies. Academic support services are determined for each student based on specific disability-based requirements. Services include campus orientation and accessibility, note takers, readers, sign language interpreters, Learning Disability Program, registration assistance, test-taking facilitation, special parking assistance, real-time captioning, assistive listening devices, on-campus transportation, adaptive equipment, support groups and workshops, tutorial referrals, special materials, housing assistance, referral to UCLA's Disabilities and Computing Program, and processing of California Department of Rehabilitation authorizations. There is no fee for any of these services. All contacts and assistance are handled confidentially. ## Disabilities and Computing Program

The Disabilities and Computing Program (DCP) provides adaptive technology and information access support and services for students, faculty, and staff with disabilities. Applications include voice input, Braille print, large print, screen-reading software, and learning disability software. Consulting and training for individuals and departments are available. The program also offers Web accessibility evaluations and guidelines. The Disabilities and Computing Laboratory is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday. ## Office of Ombuds Services

The Office of Ombuds Services is a resource that provides assistance in resolving conflicts, disputes, or complaints on an informal basis to all members of the UCLA community. ## Parking and Commuter Services

### Commuter Assistance-Ridesharing

The Commuter Assistance-Ridesharing (CAR) Office informs students about transportation options. Many students form or join

existing UCLA carpools or vanpools. More than 130 vanpools commute to UCLA from nearly 80 Southern California communities. Full- and part-time vanpool riding opportunities are available. Registered two- and three-person student carpools are given top priority to receive parking (see below).

These and other commuting options, including an extensive network of public transit, are described in the *UCLA Commuter Guide* available online or at the CAR office, located at 100 Strathmore Building (Strathmore Drive and Westwood Plaza), 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, (310) 794-RIDE. ### Parking Permits

Due to limited availability, parking at UCLA is offered to students who demonstrate the greatest need. Student parking permits are assigned through a point system that considers class standing, commute distance, previous attendance, employment, dependent children, and professional school obligations. Students are encouraged to apply on time and follow all application and payment guidelines in order to increase their chances of receiving a permit. Permits are not guaranteed.

When assigning parking permits to students, UCLA Parking Services gives the highest priority to carpools. Carpool permits are guaranteed to all qualified two- and three-person student carpool groups that apply on time. Student carpools park in central campus parking areas and share a discounted permit fee. Students interested in forming a carpool who need help finding other students living near them should call (310) 794-RIDE. All members of a proposed student carpool must apply in person as a group.

Most student permits are assigned for the academic year and can be paid for annually or quarterly. Renewal forms for students paying quarterly are automatically mailed before the Winter and Spring Quarter payment due dates. Students who are not offered a parking assignment during a given term or who wish to change their parking area need to reapply the following quarter.

Student Parking Request forms, along with important quarterly due dates and information on how to apply for a parking permit, are available online, by calling (310) 825-9871, or in person weekdays from 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Parking Services. Students are encouraged to complete and submit parking applications online, check parking status and, if approved for parking, pay for their permit through a secure online payment process. See <http://www.parking.ucla.edu/appmain.htm>.

Students with permanent disabilities who have disabled persons' placards or DMV-issued disabled persons' license plates, and students with short-term disabilities, may apply to the Office for Students with Disabilities, (310) 825-1501, for parking assignments and on-campus transportation assistance.

Parking permits and access cards to campus lots and structures are not transferable and may be purchased only from UCLA Parking Services. Resale is prohibited and subjects both buyer and seller to disciplinary action.

## Services for International Students

### Office of International Students and Scholars

The Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS) assists students with questions about immigration, employment, government regulations, financial aid, academic and administrative procedures, cultural adjustment, and personal matters. OISS is also a designated Sexual Harassment Information Center for international students and a Harassment Information Center available to all UCLA students. OISS also provides visa assistance for faculty, researchers, and postdoctoral scholars. Located at 106 Bradley International Hall; see <http://www.intl.ucla.edu>.

## Dashew International Center for Students and Scholars

The Dashew International Center in Bradley International Hall offers programs and services to help international students and scholars adjust to life on campus and in Los Angeles, and to build bridges between UCLA's international and domestic communities. The center offers an orientation program during the summer, English programs, discovering Los Angeles trips, an international connections program, conferences and workshops, and special events. Volunteer opportunities are also available.

## Student Legal Services

Currently registered and enrolled students with legal problems or questions about their legal rights can get assistance from attorneys or law students under direct supervision of attorneys who help students resolve legal problems, including those related to landlord/tenant relations; accident and injury problems; criminal matters; domestic violence and harassment; divorces and other family law matters; automobile purchase, repair, and insurance problems; health care, credit, and financial aid issues; consumer problems; and University-related problems. Assistance is available only by appointment from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. Located in 70 Dodd Hall, (310) 825-9894; see <http://www.studentlegal.ucla.edu>.

## Student Psychological Services

Student Psychological Services (SPS) offers short-term personal counsel and psychotherapy at 221 Westwood Plaza (Wooden Center West), (310) 825-0768. Psychologists, clinical social workers, and psychiatrists assist with situational stresses and emotional problems that may include problems with interpersonal relationships, academic stress, loneliness, difficult decisions, sexual issues, anxiety, depression, or other concerns affecting the personal growth of students. See <http://www.sps.ucla.edu>.

The service is confidential and available to regularly enrolled students. Students are seen individually or may choose from a number of groups offered each term. Appointments are made weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Emergency counseling is also available. There is a \$10 fee for all clinical services. If a student is enrolled in SHIP, these clinical fees are paid by SHIP.

SPS is also a designated campus Sexual Harassment Information Center. These services are available to all UCLA students.

## UCLA BruinCard

The UCLA BruinCard is a mandatory student identification card that is used to electronically confirm student status and eligibility for services. Supportive photo identification, such as a driver's license or passport, is required when the initial card is issued.

The primary benefit of the BruinCard is convenience. It is a versatile card that serves the following functions:

1. Confirmation of student status
2. I.D. card for faculty, staff, and students
3. Residence halls access card
4. Library card
5. Recreation card
6. Debit card (if activated) for purchases at campus stores and restaurants on and off campus
7. Time-management card for departments using the Kronos system
8. Access to Big Blue Bus

New services allow students to check BruinCard balances, make deposits, view recent transactions, and report lost and stolen cards online at <http://www.bruincard.ucla.edu>.

Students with holds from an office with which they have an outstanding obligation (financial, academic, or administrative) may not receive services until the hold is released by the initiating office. BruinCard centers in 123 Kerckhoff Hall, 107 UCLA Wilshire Center, and 150A Sproul Hall are open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., (310) 825-2336. Deposits only can also be made at the Administrative Main Cashier, 1125 Murphy Hall.

## UCLA Career Center

Services include career counseling; career laboratory; graduate and preprofessional school planning; letters of reference service; credentials file services; Ph.D. career services; career fairs; information sessions; BruinView™ jobs, internships, and interviews; and Bruin AlumLink™ career counseling for UC eligible alumni.

Workshops are offered on a variety of topics, including skills assessment, graduate and professional school preparation, résumé and curriculum vitae writing, mock interviews, and Internet job search strategies.

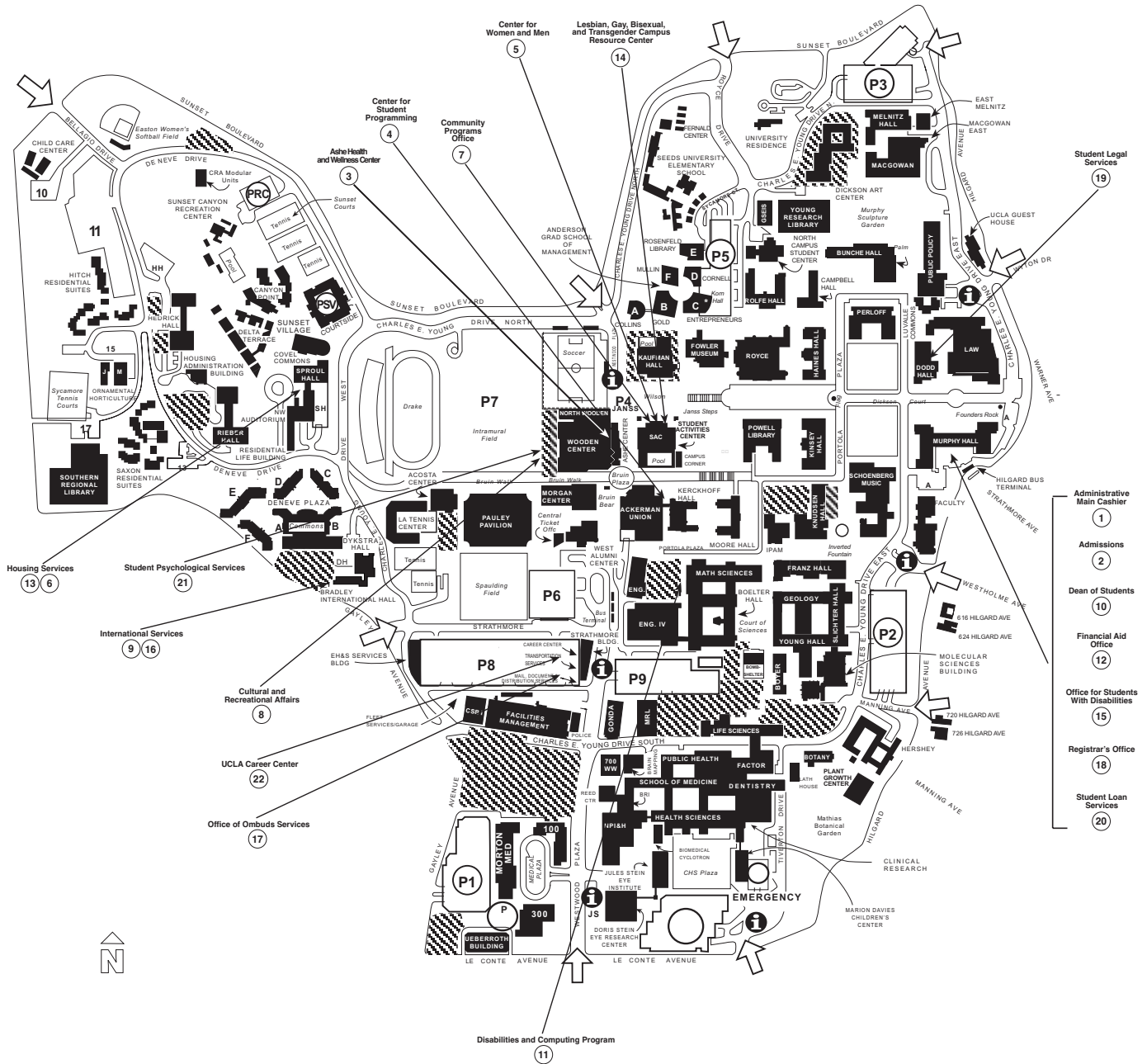

# Academic Policies

## Admission Policies

An application for admission must be submitted and accepted in accordance with the schedule specified in the “Calendar” section before a new student may register at the University. Preliminary information about registering is mailed to new students by their Admissions Office (Undergraduate, Graduate, Law, Medicine, or Dentistry). Please note: Your admission to the University is only guaranteed for the term you are admitted. If you do not register for this “admit” term, you must apply for admission again.

## Undergraduate Readmission

### One-Term Absence

Students who complete a term (Fall, Winter, Spring), and do not register the following term, may return to UCLA the subsequent term as a continuing student and be eligible to register and enroll in advance.

Students on a one-term absence who plan to attend another institution, including UCLA Extension, should discuss plans with their College or school counselor before enrolling elsewhere. On returning to UCLA, they must have an official transcript mailed from the institution directly to UCLA Undergraduate Admissions and Relations with Schools (UARS). Once students request a transcript, they must complete a Transfer Credit Evaluation Request form at UARS, 1147 Murphy Hall, to have coursework evaluated.

### Reentering Students

To return to the University after an absence of more than one term, complete an Undergraduate Application for Readmission form and file it with the Registrar’s Office in accordance with deadlines published in the “Calendar” section. A nonrefundable fee of \$40 applies.

Students must submit official transcripts from all institutions (including UCLA Extension) with readmission applications. Coursework is evaluated when official transcripts are received. The paper records of nonregistered students, including transcripts submitted for transfer credit, are retained by the Registrar’s Office for five academic years after the last registered term. Students must resubmit official transcripts of all work completed outside UCLA if their records have been destroyed.

## Graduate Registration and Readmission

### Continuous Registration Policy

Graduate students must be either registered and enrolled or on an official leave of absence every term until their degrees are awarded. As an exception, certain graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee (see below). Failure to register or be on an official leave of absence for any term (Fall, Winter, Spring) constitutes withdrawal from UCLA.

### Filing Fee

Graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee (half the quarterly registration fee) in lieu of full registration fees for the term in which they expect to complete final degree requirements and receive their degree. Doctoral students are not eligible to pay the filing fee unless registered the immediately preceding term. International students must pay the filing fee by the deadline for registration at the beginning of a term.

Students who pay the filing fee are not eligible for University services beyond a maximum of 12 hours of faculty and staff time required to complete degree requirements and are not considered in the same status as registered students.

### Graduate Leave of Absence

Continuing graduate students in good standing (3.0 GPA or above) who have completed at least one term of UCLA graduate work may, with the support of their department and the approval of the Graduate Division, be eligible for leaves of absence. Graduate students are allowed a maximum of six quarters of official leave of absence.

Students on approved leave of absence are not permitted to use faculty time or make use of University facilities for more than 12 hours since their last registration and are not eligible for apprentice personnel employment or other services normally available to registered students. International students must consult with the Office of International Students and Scholars before applying for a leave of absence. There is no need to apply for readmission, since the approved leave is for readmission to a specific term. The Registrar’s Office notifies students about registration information when their leave is due to expire.

Obtain a Request for Leave of Absence form at Graduate Admissions/Student and Academic Affairs, 1255 Murphy Hall. See “Calendar” for the filing deadline.

### Readmission

Students who fail to register or take an official leave of absence are required to apply for readmission and are held to any changes in degree program requirements. Complete the online Application for Graduate Admission. A nonrefundable fee of \$60 must be paid when the application is filed in accordance with deadlines published in the “Calendar” section.

### Reduced Nonresident Tuition for Doctoral Candidates

Nonresident graduate doctoral students who have advanced to candidacy are eligible for a 75 percent reduction in their annual nonresident tuition fee. The reduced nonresident tuition begins with the first academic term following the advancement to candidacy term. Students are eligible for reduced nonresident tuition for a maximum of three years (includes nonregistered time periods).

## Enrollment Policies

### Concurrent Enrollment

Concurrent enrollment—defined as taking courses during regular sessions for credit at UCLA and, at the same time, at another college institution, including UCLA Extension—is not permitted except in extraordinary circumstances, and no credit is given for such courses unless the approval of the UCLA College or school has been obtained by petition prior to enrollment.

### Intersegmental Cross-Enrollment

At the discretion of the appropriate campus authorities on both campuses, California Education Code sections 66755 and 66756 (amended by SB 361 passed in 1999) allow undergraduate students enrolled in any campus of the California community colleges, the California State University, or the University of California to enroll without formal admission in a maximum of one course per academic term at

a campus of either of the other systems on a space-available basis. Enrollment in precollege courses is excluded.

UCLA students qualify for intersegmental cross-enrollment if they meet all the following requirements:

1. Complete at least one term at UCLA as a matriculated student
2. Enroll for a minimum of 6 units for the current term
3. Earn a grade-point average of 2.0 (C) for work completed
4. Pay appropriate tuition and fees at UCLA for the current term
5. Complete appropriate academic preparation as determined by the host campus
6. Have California residence status

Obtain a concurrent enrollment application from the College or school. An administration fee is charged for each academic term such enrollment is requested.

## Intercampus Visitor Program

Undergraduates enrolled at one campus of the University of California may have the opportunity to attend another UC campus for one quarter or semester on the Intercampus Visitor Program. UCLA students obtain applications from Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall. Observe the deadlines on the application. Applications are reviewed by a student's College or school. Letters and Science students should consult College Academic Counseling in A316 Murphy Hall; students in Arts and Architecture should contact the Student Services Office in 194 Kinross Building South; Theater, Film, and Television students should consult the Student Services Office in 103 East Melnitz Building; Engineering students should see the Student Services Office in 6426 Boelter Hall.

## Simultaneous UC Enrollment

Undergraduate students may enroll simultaneously in courses offered by another UC campus. Eligible students must be registered (fees paid), in good standing, and enrolled in at least 12 units at UCLA. Students may simultaneously enroll in no more than one UC host-campus course not to exceed 6 units. Before attending the host campus, both campuses must give approval. Approval to enroll simultaneously on another UC campus does not guarantee credit toward specific degree or General Education requirements. Application of host-campus courses to UCLA graduation requirements is determined by the College or school. Details are on the application form. Obtain applications and directions for submitting forms from the following offices: honors students, A311 Murphy Hall; student athletes, Morgan Center; AAP students, 1209 Campbell Hall; all other Letters and Science students, College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall; Arts and Architecture, Theater, Film, and Television, Engineering and Applied Science, and Nursing students, their respective Student Affairs Office.

# Degree Policies

## Undergraduate Degrees

To qualify for a bachelor's degree, that is, to graduate in any school or College at UCLA, students must earn at least a C (2.0) average in all courses taken at any UC campus. In addition to the grade-point average requirement, students must satisfy (1) University requirements, (2) College or school requirements, and (3) department requirements. See the *UCLA General Catalog* for details.

## Degree Checks

Anytime prior to graduation students may request a review of degree progress. Official degree checks detail requirements remaining to complete the bachelor's degree. The degree check process varies by College or school:

**College of Letters and Science.** The Degree Progress Report (DPR) serves as the degree check. The DPR is a computer-generated assessment of all degree requirements and the courses taken to fulfill them. View and print DPRs through URSA or order one at a College counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell Hall; Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall). Students should review questions about their DPR with departmental undergraduate advisers and/or College counselors, as appropriate.

Students who entered UCLA prior to Fall Quarter 1988 should consult their College counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell Hall; Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall).

**School of the Arts and Architecture.** Degree Progress Reports are available through URSA as well as on request from the Office of Student Services, 194 Kinross Building South. Students should consult an adviser in the Office of Student Services when they have questions about degree requirements or when they print a DPR. Questions regarding major requirements should be referred to the departmental counselor.

**Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science.** Students starting their upper division major field course work must submit a "satisfied" Academic Program Proposal to the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, 6426 Boelter Hall. All engineering students may pick up a Graduation Evaluation Report at 6426 Boelter Hall. The report outlines each category requirement for an engineering degree and the courses completed for each category. Students should obtain an official degree check at least one term prior to their graduation term. For details, see [http://www.seasoasa.ucla.edu/degree\\_check.html](http://www.seasoasa.ucla.edu/degree_check.html).

**School of Nursing.** Students may initiate a request for an updated degree check by contacting the student services coordinator in the Student Affairs Office, 2-200 Factor Building.

**School of Theater, Film, and Television.** Students entering as freshmen receive a written degree check on achieving junior standing. Students entering as juniors receive a degree check on entry. Students may initiate or request an updated degree check by making an appointment with their departmental counselor in the Student Services Office, 103 East Melnitz Building.

## Transfer Credit

Students who take courses at a college or university other than UCLA should first check the Articulation Agreements to determine how the courses will transfer. Articulation Agreements are lists of transferable courses from institutions other than UCLA. For questions, or if no Articulation Agreement exists, consult a counselor.

Once students complete the courses, they must have the other institution send transcripts to UARS, 1147 Murphy Hall, Box 951436, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1436. They must also go to UARS to submit a Transcript Locator Card (also known as a Transfer Credit Evaluation Request) to initiate a credit evaluation. Transfer students (who attended another college or university prior to attending UCLA) should discuss transfer credit with their College or school counselor and/or departmental adviser.

## Declaration of Candidacy

To initiate the steps leading to the award of a bachelor's degree, students must identify the term they expect to complete degree requirements through URSA by the time they complete 160 units (172 units for engineering students) to avoid a \$13 late candidacy fee. The identified term must fall within the academic year (four quarters) subsequent to the term in which students reach or expect to reach the 160- or 172-unit mark. Once they complete 160/172 or more units, a fee is assessed each time students change the degree expected term.

Current-term or past-term candidates over the unit limit must purchase the UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form at any UCLA Store and file it at 1113 Murphy Hall. The form is also available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>.

Friday of the second week is the last day to declare candidacy for the current term (with fee depending on units completed). Declaration of candidacy after the second week may result in a degree award date for the following term and additional penalty fees.

Verify the degree expected term through URSA. For questions about degree candidacy status, Letters and Science students may inquire at 1113 Murphy Hall. Arts and Architecture, Engineering, Theater, Film, and Television, and Nursing students should see their school office. A photo I.D. is required. Declaring candidacy is not a guarantee of graduation. Current-term candidates are not assigned enrollment appointments for the following term.

## In Absentia Graduation

Students who intend to complete degree requirements while nonregistered (those who take a course through UCLA Extension or at another institution, remove an Incomplete grade, and so on) must file a request to graduate "in absentia" with their degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall by the second-week candidacy deadline. Students graduating "in absentia" are assessed the undergraduate in absentia degree service fee in addition to the declaration of candidacy fee if they were also not registered in the term immediately prior to their degree expected term.

## Minors

Letters and Science students must petition to enter a minor through the department/office administering the program. School of Arts and Architecture, Engineering, Theater, Film, and Television, and Nursing students must also obtain the approval of their school. The last day to obtain the required approval(s) is Friday of the second week of the degree expected term. Late entry to a minor may result in a degree award date for the following term.

Satisfactory completion of the requirements for a minor is reflected on the final transcript and diploma.

## Final Degree Audits and Graduation

Degree auditors in the Registrar's Office for Letters and Science students (194 Kinross Building South for Arts and Architecture students, 6426 Boelter Hall for Engineering students, 2-200 Factor Building for Nursing students, and 103 East Melnitz Building for Theater, Film, and Television students) are responsible for verifying each candidate's eligibility for a bachelor's degree. Degree auditors have information pertaining to a student's graduation only if that student has declared candidacy and completed 160 quarter units (172 units for engineering students).

During their graduating term, students should inform a degree auditor of grade changes, petitions for substitutions or exemptions, transfer credits, or similar changes that may affect their degree. Degree auditors notify students whose graduation eligibility cannot be verified of any requirements still outstanding and other problems in completing the degree.

Contact degree auditors only for questions about degree audits. Phone numbers are in the Registrar's Services Guide in "Student Services." For graduation ceremony procedures, contact the College or schools. Names of students who request that no public information be released do not appear in commencement ceremony programs. Students may change their privacy status on URSA.

## Honors

### Latin Honors

The College and schools award Latin honors according to overall grade-point average at graduation. Honors are reflected on official transcripts and diplomas. Eligible students must have completed at least 90 (98 for the School of Nursing) University of California units for a letter grade. The levels of honors are summa cum laude, magna cum laude, and cum laude. The minimum GPA requirements for the 2004-2005 academic year are as follows:

1. **School of the Arts and Architecture:** 3.918 for summa cum laude, 3.883 for magna cum laude, 3.800 for cum laude
2. **College of Letters and Science/School of Nursing:** 3.846 for summa cum laude, 3.758 for magna cum laude, 3.620 for cum laude
3. **Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science:** Contact the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, 6426 Boelter Hall, for specific information
4. **School of Theater, Film, and Television:** 3.879 for summa cum laude, 3.850 for magna cum laude, 3.797 for cum laude

Requirements are subject to yearly change and other eligibility restrictions. Contact the College or school for information.

### Departmental Honors

Some departments in the College of Letters and Science award honors, which are reflected on official transcripts and the diploma, to graduates of their programs. Inquire about the availability of these honors in the department office.

## Tips For Graduating Seniors

1. All students should verify the degree expected term through URSA. If the degree expected term is incorrect, change it through URSA or by filing a UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form (available for purchase at any UCLA Store or online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>) at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of the last quarter
2. All students should verify majors, minors, and specializations as they appear on the DPR and Grade Report during the final term. If any information is in error, contact the appropriate office or degree auditor
3. Students finishing degree requirements without being enrolled at UCLA in the final term (because, for example, they are removing Incomplete grades, adding or dropping courses, attending another institution) must file a request to graduate "in absentia" at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of the degree expected term
4. Students completing coursework at another institution, including UCLA Extension, must make sure their official transcripts (with grades) are received by the degree auditor in the Registrar's Office no later than three weeks after the end of the degree expected term
5. Students completing their work in Spring Quarter through the Education Abroad Program should declare for Summer graduation. Check with Honors counselors and major departments about necessary petitions before going abroad
6. All students must satisfy any outstanding requirements before graduating. Any petitions to amend records must be filed no later than the last day of the degree expected term
7. Students in their final term should inform the Registrar's Office of mailing address changes. An address change can be initiated on URSA, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or on the monthly BAR statement. Students who plan to move at the end of the degree expected term and who will not have access to URSA should

file an address change, identifying a future mailing address and effective date, before leaving

8. Students may not graduate in one term and then retroactively add majors, minors, or specializations or add and drop courses, and so forth. On degree conferral, the undergraduate record is closed
9. Students should submit name changes to Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall, by the last day of the degree expected term for it to appear correctly on the diploma. Inform the Registrar's Office of any special accents or punctuation that should be reflected on the diploma. The name on record is the name that appears on the diploma

### Master's Degrees

Students who expect to complete master's degree requirements should submit an Advancement to Candidacy form to their department no later than the Friday of the second week of classes. See "Calendar" for deadlines.

After you complete all course requirements and the comprehensive examination or the thesis, the Registrar's Office reviews your courses and grades in order to confirm the awarding of your degree. Once the process is completed (approximately six weeks after the end of the term), your degree is recorded on your record and appears on any official transcript that you order.

During the final term, inform the Registrar's Office of address changes. An address change can be initiated on URSA, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or through the monthly BAR statement.

### Transcripts and Diplomas

For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. Students requiring earlier proof of graduation may contact degree auditors in 1113 Murphy Hall and request a certificate of completion. The first certificate of completion is free of charge. A \$5 fee is charged for each additional copy. An additional \$21 processing fee may be assessed if

1. The request for a certificate is made before grades are posted for the term and
2. The auditor must take special action to verify a grade or grades, expedite a transfer credit evaluation, or obtain other documentation necessary to clear you for the degree

Diplomas for both undergraduate and graduate students are available approximately three to four months after the degree award date. Information about obtaining diplomas in person (no fee) or by mail (with fee) is sent to student mailing addresses approximately seven weeks after the end of the final term. To expedite receipt of diplomas, students are encouraged to return the diploma mailer form and remit the mailing fee. A diploma hot line with current recorded diploma information, (310) 825-8883, is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day. The Registrar's Office retains diplomas for five years from graduation date.

To be reflected on the diploma, name changes must be submitted to Academic Record Services, 1113 Murphy Hall, by the last day of the degree expected term. Students submitting name changes after that date must request a replacement diploma at 1113 Murphy Hall. The special order diploma fee is assessed.

If an original diploma is destroyed, a duplicate may be ordered from the Registrar's Office, Diploma Reorder, 1113 Murphy Hall. There is a fee for the replacement diploma, and it bears a reissue date and the signatures of the current officials of the state and University.

### Closure of Student Record

Student records are closed to revisions in enrollment, grading, and academic actions upon award of a degree. Students are responsible for requesting review of their record prior to award of their degree.

Changes requested by an individual after award of a degree are considered by the College or school only under extraordinary circumstances. Supportive documentation is required. Upon action of the academic dean, a statement of the request for revision and a note of the change will be recorded only in the memoranda section of the transcript.

Many courses and programs are offered that require fieldwork in the form of internships or community service projects. AAP students who participate in the Rosa Parks Community Development Internship Program and Teachers for Tomorrow can earn academic credit by enrolling in CCL-sponsored community-based service learning projects.

### Chicana and Chicano Studies

**100SL. Barrio Service Learning. (4)** (Formerly numbered 195.) Seminar, two hours; field placement, eight hours. Limited to juniors/seniors. Service learning placement in community-based organization, labor union, or service-oriented nonprofit organization. Study of role that these organizations play in improvement and change of Chicana/Chicano communities. Students meet on regular basis with instructor and provide periodic reports of their experience. Individual contract with supervising faculty member required. Letter grading. O. Pescador

### Communication Studies

**185. Field Studies in Communication. (2 to 4)** Lecture, two hours. Requisite: course 10. Designed for juniors/seniors. Fieldwork in communication. Students participate in two-hour seminar sessions and spend seven hours in approved community settings each week for each 2 units of credit. May be taken for a maximum of 4 units per term. P/NP grading. M. Gregory

### Ecology and Evolutionary Biology

**195. Community or Corporate Internship in Organismic Biology, Ecology, and Evolution. (4)** (Formerly numbered 199I.) Tutorial, three hours. Internship course for juniors/seniors to be supervised by Center for Community Learning, fieldwork site, and faculty adviser. Consult Undergraduate Office for more information. Students meet on regular basis with instructor and provide periodic reports of their experience. May not be applied toward requirements for departmental majors. May be repeated twice for credit. Individual contract with supervising faculty member required. P/NP grading. Staff

### Education

**192B. Undergraduate Teaching Practicum in America Reads. (2)** (Formerly numbered 193C.) Seminar, two hours. Requisite: course 185. Enforced corequisite: course 170B. Limited to juniors/seniors. Training and supervised practicum for advanced undergraduate students that provides opportunity to reflect on both content and experience pertaining to America Reads sites. Letter grading. P. Bailis

### Film and Television

**195. Corporate Internship in Film, Television, and Digital Media. (2 to 6)** (Formerly numbered 192.) Tutorial, two hours; fieldwork, 14 or 20 hours. Corequisite: course 194. Limited to juniors/seniors. Non-majors must complete application in Center for Community Learning, A233 Murphy Hall, to be considered. Corporate internship in supervised setting in business related to film and television industries. Student meet on regular basis with instructor and provide periodic reports of their experience. Individual contract with supervising faculty member required. Letter grading. D. Mann

### History

**195. Community or Corporate Internship in History. (4)** (Formerly numbered 199I.) Tutorial, three hours. Limited to juniors/seniors. Internship in supervised setting in community agency or business. Students meet on regular basis with instructor and provide periodic reports of their experience. Individual contract with supervising faculty member required. P/NP or letter grading. Staff

### Social Welfare

**190A. Community Research and Services Seminar. (4)** Seminar, three hours; service learning, four hours; outside study, five hours. Limited to juniors/seniors. History and roles of social welfare policy within government, organizations, and communities. Reflections about service-learning site experiences, with application of issues related to lecture and seminar readings. Students to be assigned to two-term tutoring/mentoring site where they apply tutoring techniques as they assist middle school children living in impoverished areas of Los Angeles County. In Progress grading. J. Prover

### Sociology

**195. Community or Corporate Internship in Sociology. (4)** (Formerly numbered 199I.) Tutorial, three hours. Limited to juniors/seniors. Internship in community agency or business to be supervised jointly by Center for Community Learning and faculty adviser. Students meet on regular basis with instructor and provide weekly reports of their experience. Normally only 4 units of internship are allowed. Individual contract with supervising faculty member required. P/NP or letter grading. Staff

### World Arts and Cultures

**103. Arts in the Community. (4)** Lecture, four hours. Requisite: course 90. Following up on discussions of impoverishment of theatrical performance, many artists and scholars have turned attention to full engagement with communities in which they live. Investigation of practical application of those engagement strategies, culminating in a pilot community project. Letter grading. A. Shimshon-Santo

## Departmental Courses and Seminars

No special program courses are scheduled for Fall Quarter 2004.

## Distance Learning at UCLA

Distance learning courses at UCLA offer students and faculty live real-time interaction with sites outside UCLA, including other universities and institutions around the world. For example, students wishing to take a foreign language not offered at UCLA may be able to enroll in such a course at another UC campus and participate through videoconferencing.

Through the use of videoconference technology, participants at both sites can see and hear each other, and multisite conferencing is available to enable students at three or four different locations to take the same course together.

Distance learning courses and videoconferencing can take place wherever there is a network connection to the Internet, which include 80 percent of general assignment classrooms. In addition, there are two facilities on campus dedicated for use as distance learning classrooms and for videoconferencing: 62-073 Center for the Health Sciences and 285 Powell Library Building.

### Comparative Literature

**2BW. Survey of Literature: Middle Ages to the 17th Century. (5)** Lecture, two hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1B or 4BW. Study of selected texts from Middle Ages to the 17th century, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts may include works by authors such as Chaucer, Dante, Cervantes, Marguerite de Navarre, Shakespeare, Calderón, Molière, and Racine. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

**2CW. Survey of Literature: Age of Enlightenment to the 20th Century. (5)** Lecture, two hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1C or 4CW. Study of selected texts from the Age of Enlightenment to the 20th century, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts may include works by authors such as Swift, Voltaire, Diderot, Rousseau, Goethe, Flaubert, Ibsen, Strindberg, M. Shelley, Dostoevsky, Kafka, James Joyce, Garcia Marquez, and Jamaica Kincaid. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

**4AW. Literature and Writing: Antiquity to Middle Ages. (5)** Discussion, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1A or 2AW. Study and discussion of selected texts from antiquity to the Middle Ages, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts include works and authors such as *Iliad*, *Odyssey*, *Gilgamesh*, Sappho, Greek tragedies, *Aeneid*, Petronius, *Beowulf*, or Marie de France. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### English

**4HW. Critical Reading and Writing (Honors). (5)** Lecture, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for former course 4H. Introduction to literary analysis, with close reading and carefully written exposition of selections from principal modes of literature: poetry, prose fiction, and drama. Minimum of four papers (three to five pages each) and two in-class essays. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

**4W. Critical Reading and Writing. (5)** Lecture, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for former course 4. Introduction to literary analysis, with close reading and carefully written exposition of selections from principal modes of literature: poetry, prose fiction, and drama. Minimum of four papers (three to five pages each) and two in-class essays. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### English Composition

**100W. Interdisciplinary Academic Writing. (5)** Lecture, four hours. Requisite: course 3 or 3H. Designed for sophomores/juniors/seniors. Course in academic writing suitable for both lower and upper division students that helps them develop academic papers with a range of complexity and length. Focus on conventions of academic prose and genres across the disciplines. Written assignments include common forms of academic writing such as argument, research paper, and/or critical essay. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### French

**14W. Introduction to French Culture and Civilization, in English. (5)** Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 14. Study of contemporary French institutions and issues in cultural, political, and socioeconomic realms. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### Honors Collegium

**21W. Rise and Fall of Modernism. (6)** Seminar, three hours; writing laboratory, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Study of early and middle 20th-century's attempt to construct significance in a general climate of disillusionment by way of literature, literary criticism, and other intellectual movements. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### Russian

**25W. Russian Novel in Translation. (5)** Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 25. Designed for nonmajors. Study of major works by the great 19th-century Russian novelists. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

### Scandinavian

**50W. Introduction to Scandinavian Literatures and Cultures. (5)** Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 50. Designed for students in general and for those wishing to prepare for more advanced and specialized studies in Scandinavian literature and culture. Selected works from literatures of Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Iceland, and Finland, ranging from myth, national epic, saga, and folktale through modern novel, poem, play, short story, and film, read in English and critically discussed. Satisfies Letters and Science Writing II requirement. Letter grading.

# Class Listings

## Course Listing Format

The *Schedule of Classes* (<http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/schedule/>) is available online in both HTML and PDF versions. The HTML version is updated every four hours with class information that includes the enrollment and wait list status of classes. The online *Schedule* has links to department homepages, course webpages, library reserves, and the UCLA Store. It also includes search features for classes, General Education courses, and course units. The PDF version is printer-friendly and represents data at the time of publication. It is not updated. To enroll in classes or view Study Lists, use URSA (<http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>).

In the class listing midsection, departments are listed alphabetically, followed by their associated subdepartments or programs in alphabetical order. Under each department, course information is presented in separate columns across the page.

Most courses numbered 199, 296, 375, 400 (field studies), and 590 do not appear in the PDF version of the *Schedule*. For individual sections of these courses, see the online *Schedule*.

### CATALOG NUMBER

The catalog number is used to identify particular courses. Courses numbered 1-99 are undergraduate lower division, 100-199 are undergraduate upper division, 200-299 and 500-599 are graduate level, 300-399 are professional teacher training, and 400-499 are other professional courses.

Concurrently scheduled courses (identified by a capital C before the catalog number) are pairs of courses, usually within a single department or program, for which credit is given at both the undergraduate and graduate level. Concurrently scheduled courses are offered at the same time and place with the same instructor, but work levels and performance standards are evaluated differently for students at each level.

Multiple-listed courses (identified by a capital M before the catalog number) are courses of the same format and level offered jointly by more than one department. For example, Language in Culture is offered by the Department of Anthropology (Anthropology M140) and the Department of Linguistics (Linguistics M146).

### COURSE TITLE

Course title is the 19-character abbreviation of the course that appears on the transcript. See the *UCLA General Catalog* for the full title and description of the course.

### ENF REQ — Enforced Requisites

Courses with enforced requisites are indicated with a Y; those without have an N. Undergraduates are prevented from enrolling if certain requisites have not been met as described in "Enrollment."

### IM — Impacted Course (Letters and Science students only)

The impacted course column contains a Y for courses that are impacted and is blank for courses that are not. Letters and Science

undergraduates are prevented from dropping impacted courses after the second week of a term except in exceptionally extenuating circumstances as described in "Enrollment."

### ID NUMBER

The nine-digit I.D. number must be used for enrolling in a section. Numbers are printed only for the enrollment section of the course. This section controls official enrollment in the course. URSA requires the I.D. number for the appropriate section for enrollment and indicates multiple parts, such as lecture and discussion, required. The enrollment section, or secondary section, is generally the part of the course with the smallest enrollment capacity (discussion, laboratory, quiz, recitation). Generally, a lecture, seminar, or tutorial is called a primary section.

### CLS TYP — Class Type

Class type, also called activity type, indicates the teaching format of the course, which is defined as follows:

1. ACT (Activity): Students develop technical or creative skills such as painting, music, drama, or design
2. CLI (Clinic): Students learn professional skills by actual practice involving patients or clients
3. CNF (Conference): Students and faculty interact through small classroom sessions involving substantial class participation
4. DEM (Demonstration): Students take part in presentations and exhibitions involving substantial class participation
5. DIS (Discussion): Students and faculty interact through small classroom sessions that involve substantial class participation
6. FLD (Fieldwork): Students participate in short or extended field trips or in other types of nonclassroom settings
7. LAB (Laboratory): Students carry out experiments requiring special laboratory equipment and facilities
8. LEC (Lecture): Students attend faculty lectures that involve little or no student participation
9. LSN (Listening): Students participate in audio presentations and exercises
10. QIZ (Quiz): Students participate in sessions designed to review and test their understanding of course material
11. REC (Recitation): Students take part in oral presentations and exhibitions involving substantial class participation
12. RGP (Research Group Meeting): Students participate in graduate research group meetings
13. SEM (Seminar): Students and faculty interact through small classroom sessions that involve substantial class participation
14. STU (Studio): Students develop technical or creative skills such as painting, music, drama, or design
15. TUT (Tutorial): Students meet individually with faculty to review work that each student conducts independently

### SEC — Section Number

A course may have multiple class types that must be taken together, such as lecture and discussion or lecture and laboratory. These class types are linked and are identified by the sequence printed and numbering schemes below:

1. Primary (lecture, seminar) sections are numbered sequentially (1-99). If a course has secondary sections belonging to a specific primary section (i.e., a compound class), they are numbered with the corresponding primary section number followed by a letter (A to Z). For example, for Chem 11A lecture section 1, you must choose from discussion sections 1A to 1Z. The class is listed as:

2. Any section type that may be associated with several other section types is indicated by the section number prefixed with a capital M. Combinations include
  - a. A course with secondary (discussion, laboratory, quiz) sections associated with any of several primary sections (e.g., Chinese 2)
  - b. A course with multiple primary (lecture) sections and multiple secondary (both laboratory and discussion required) sections, with the laboratory section associated with any of the primary sections, such as Physics 6. These courses identify the section type (lecture, laboratory, discussion), which is the ENROLLMENT SECTION

### FEE — Materials Use Fee

The Materials Use Fee is assessed in addition to term fees for each course that you are enrolled in as of the fourth week of classes. Multiple-part class series (such as lecture, laboratory, and discussion) list the fee with the primary section only. It covers the price of materials and supplies used in the course and appears on your BAR statement.

Days of the week are abbreviated as follows:

TBA — To be arranged (time was not available at publication; contact the instructor or department)

### TIME

Courses begin and end at the time listed. Minimum class meeting time is 50 minutes. Sometimes sections have more than one meeting time, which are listed on separate lines.

### BUILDING/ROOM

The meeting location of a section is indicated by the building name abbreviation followed by the room number. Multiple meeting locations are listed on separate lines.

### INSTRUCTOR

The faculty member responsible for a course is listed with last name

and first initial. "The Staff" indicates an instructor was not assigned as of publication.

### ENRL CAP — Enrollment Capacity

Enrollment capacity indicates the number of students allowed to enroll in the section and is subject to departmental change. When you attempt to enroll and the capacity is full, you are informed of the wait-list size and your possible wait-list position.

### XC — Examination Code

The code number indicates the examination period for the course final, which is generally based on the meeting time of the lecture section (see Final Examinations later in this section). Examination code information is available through URSA. Be sure to check your examination codes prior to finals week.

Do not enroll in courses that have conflicting meeting times as this creates a conflict in examination times. You must discuss any conflict with both instructors and may have to change sections or drop the course to avoid the conflict. Faculty members may use their discretion to establish ground rules for attendance, missed examinations, late term papers, or any other means of evaluation for the course.

### CRTP — Credit Type

Credit type is indicated by the following grading detail codes:

1. G — Letter grade only
2. PN — Passed/Not Passed
3. SU — Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory
4. T1, T2, T3, T4 — A two-, three-, or four-term course (In Progress) in which no credit is granted until the completion of the series
5. TP — A multiterm course with a final grade of Passed or Not Passed
6. TS — A multiterm course with a final grade of Satisfactory or Unsatisfactory

### UNITS

Unit value is the workload credit given for a course. It is generally the same as credit toward a degree, except that some courses (e.g., English A, AP, 2P, 3P) may have less degree credit and/or no credit toward a degree (check the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*). **The unit value of a multiple-part class series is listed with the primary section.**

### RESTRICT — Restrictions

Course restrictions **print on the line following the section entry when enrollment is restricted to certain designations** of students:

1. **Department Consent or Instructor Consent.** A PTE number is required. Consent of department or instructor is no longer listed in the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*. Such a restriction is subject to change by individual instructors and is only noted in the *Schedule of Classes*
2. **Level.** Only students as indicated by the class level may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE number is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Levels are indicated as follows:
 

FR — Freshmen only
SO — Sophomores and above
JR — Juniors and above
SR — Seniors and above
GR — Graduate students only

See Class Levels in the "Academic Policies" section for unit breakdown for each level

3. **College and/or Major.** Only students with the noted college and/or major(s) may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE number is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Thus, if a restriction reads "MATH/APP, ECON BUSINESS, BUS-ECON," the course is restricted to the specified majors

## Final Examination Policies

Final examinations, unless otherwise announced by the instructor, are held in the same room as class meetings. Examination codes are listed for each course in the *Schedule of Classes* and in the Study List selections on URSA.

An instructor's method of evaluation must be announced at the beginning of the course. Final written examinations may not exceed three hours' duration and are given only at the times and places established and published by the department chair and the Registrar's Office (Senate Regulation A-332A). **In planning courses for a term, students are responsible for avoiding class conflicts and avoiding conflicting or multiple same-day final examinations. No student shall be excused from assigned final examinations except as provided in the following paragraphs.**

## Policy on Alternate Examination Dates

In compliance with Section 92640(a) of the California Education Code, the University must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates for any test or examination at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. This requirement does not apply in the event that administering the test or

examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably be avoided.

Accommodation for alternate examination dates are worked out directly and on an individual basis between the student and the faculty member involved.

1. In general, students should make such requests of the instructor during the first two weeks of any given academic term, or as soon as possible after a particular examination date is announced by the instructor
2. Students unable to reach a satisfactory arrangement with their instructor should contact the Office of Ombuds Services, 105 Strathmore Building, or the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall, for assistance
3. Instructors who have questions or who wish to verify the nature of the religious event or practice involved should contact the Office of Ombuds Services or the Office of the Dean of Students for assistance

This policy has been reviewed and approved by the Academic Senate Undergraduate Council. Faculty members should remember that while it is fully in their discretion to make arrangements with individual students for alternate examination times, including final examinations, faculty members must conduct the scheduled final examination for the class as a whole at the times and places established by the department chair and the Registrar's Office.

## College Academic Counseling

## ASK Peer Counselors

ASK Peer Counselors are trained undergraduates who provide academic information and advice for Letters and Science students from a unique peer perspective. The program encourages students who might not otherwise seek academic guidance to obtain information with greater convenience and a minimum of formality. Counselors advise students on College rules and regulations, deadlines, referrals, petitions, and general academic issues. ASK also publishes a weekly survival tips newsletter and updates the College online frequently-asked questions webpage. Counselors are available weekdays on a walk-up basis at six different campus locations: A-level Ackerman Union from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday, 203 Covell Commons from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday, Math Sciences (northwest corner) and Royce Quad from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., A316C Murphy Hall (ASK Web Lab) from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., and adjacent to 1104 Murphy Hall from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Counselors can also answer e-mail questions at [ask@college.ucla.edu](mailto:ask@college.ucla.edu). ## Academic Advancement Program

Academic Advancement Program (AAP) counselors work with AAP students to plan their academic programs, monitor their progress toward a degree, provide them with information about different majors' requirements and requisites, and discuss graduate school

and career options. AAP counselors also encourage students to explore their talents and abilities, are there to listen to students, and talk with them about academic and personal problems. For AAP students who entered UCLA fall 1994 or later, AAP counselors have full signature authority as professional Letters and Science counselors. AAP students' official folders are housed in 1209 Campbell Hall, where petitions and other official paperwork must be submitted. ## AAP Peer Counseling

AAP Peer Counseling consists of 19 advanced standing undergraduate peer counselors who work under the direct supervision of a professional counselor. Peer counselors work with entering students and support them in the transition from high school or community college to UCLA. They focus on the students' adjustment to university life and refer them to both AAP and campus resources and services. Peer counselor appointments for entering students can be made in person or by phone weekdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in 1228 Campbell Hall, (310) 206-1572.

## Pregraduate/Preprofessional Undergraduate Mentoring Programs

The Pregraduate/Preprofessional Undergraduate Mentoring Program (PUMP) provides outreach to and counseling for AAP students who are interested in pursuing advanced degrees. Graduate mentors advise AAP undergraduates on the graduate and professional school application process. Mentors hold workshops on the application process, statement of purpose, and letters of recommendation; present forums with faculty and professionals; and coordinate internship and field studies opportunities. ## Letters and Science Honors Programs

# Official Notices

The Office of the Dean of Students publishes "Official Notices" in the *Daily Bruin* at various times during the year. Such notices are important, and all students are held responsible for the information in them.

## Official Publications

Students are responsible for observing procedures and deadlines published by the Registrar's Office in the following publications:

1. *UCLA General Catalog*. The catalog includes courses and programs approved by the UCLA Academic Senate. The print edition is issued biennially and is for sale at the UCLA Store. The online edition (<http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/catalog/>) has updates for course descriptions and undergraduate programs (i.e., majors, minors, specializations)
2. *Schedule of Classes*. There is no print edition of the *Schedule*. The online *Schedule* (<http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/schedule/>) lists courses offered each term. It includes fee charts, an academic calendar with key deadline dates, and academic policies and procedures; registration, enrollment, and billing information; and Official Notices

## Class Attendance

Class rosters, which identify enrolled or wait-listed students, are issued to each instructor by the Registrar's Office. Attendance in UCLA classes is limited to duly enrolled regular session or concurrent University Extension students. Guests may attend lectures only with the approval of the instructor. Students may be dropped from a course for academic reasons such as lacking the approved requisites and requirements (SR542). If attendance is an academic requirement established by the instructor, students may be dropped from a course because of excessive absences.

## Auditing Classes

With the consent of the instructor, registered students and interested individuals are permitted to audit classes. Arrangements are made directly with the faculty member under any rules the faculty member may establish, and those auditing ordinarily do not participate in discussions, examinations, or written papers. Audited classes are not recorded on the Study List or on transcripts for regular session courses.

## Class Notes

Notes or recordings made by students are for purposes of individual or group study or for other noncommercial purposes reasonably arising from the student's membership in the class or the University. Permission to make notes or recordings falls within the instructor's discretion as informed by instructional purposes, classroom order, property interests, or other reasonable issues arising in the academic context. Notes and recordings may not be exchanged or distributed for commercial purposes, for compensation, or for any other purpose other than study, either between students or between a student(s) and a third party. Unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the instructor, commercial use of class notes or recordings constitutes an unauthorized commercial activity in violation of the *UCLA Regulations on Activities, Registered Organizations, and Use of Properties*, Section IV, Paragraph A (<http://www.studentactivities.ucla.edu>). Students who violate this policy are subject to University discipline.

Further, AB 1773 was signed into law on September 23, 2000, to be effective January 1, 2001. This State law amended the California Education Code as follows:

66450. (a) Except as authorized by policies developed by the University in accordance with subdivision (a) of Section 66452, no business, agency, or person, including, but not necessarily limited to, an enrolled student shall prepare, cause to be prepared, give, sell, transfer, or otherwise distribute or publish, for any commercial purpose, any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction by an instructor of record. The prohibition applies to a recording made in any medium, including but not necessarily limited to, handwritten or typewritten class notes.

The full text of AB 1773, including a description of civil penalties and the legal and financial remedies available to the University and an individual instructor for violations of this State law, can be found at <http://www.leginfo.ca.gov>. This notice has been prepared for distribution to all UCLA students as requested by AB 1773.

Individual instructors retain intellectual property rights in lecture material, pursuant to U.S. copyright law and California Civil Code 980(a)(1). Misuse of course notes derived from lecture material may also subject an individual to legal proceedings brought by the instructor.

Pursuant to the guidelines reviewed by the UCLA Academic Senate (1973), lecture note subscription services are permitted, if authorized in advance by the University and if approved by the instructor. The Lecture Notes service offered by the Associated Students UCLA is currently authorized by the University to provide a course notes subscription service for particular classes. For such classes, the note taker is approved in advance by the instructor, and the instructor may review the notes before their distribution and sale through the UCLA Store Lecture Notes office in Ackerman Union. The list of classes with such a subscription service is available in Ackerman Union.

Nothing in this policy precludes an instructor from posting the course lecture notes, which they prepare or authorize to be prepared, on the UCLA-provided course website for the class, which the instructor controls. Students who are permitted by the instructor to review such course lecture notes are reminded that these policies apply to their use of any such course lecture notes posted on the course website by the instructor.

## Plagiarism and Student Copyright

Plagiarism of any form is a violation of UCLA Student Conduct Code Section 102.1--Academic Dishonesty. Instructors are permitted to use one or more plagiarism-detection services to assist in the confirmation that the academic work submitted by a student is original work and has not been duplicated from an existing work.

Instructors may require that: (a) all students enrolled in the class submit their work for such confirmation; and (b) failure by a student to submit such assigned work to the plagiarism-detection service used by the instructor is the equivalent, at the discretion of the instructor, to the student failing to submit the paper for grading.

Students retain full copyright ownership to their academic work. However, if the plagiarism-detection service used by the instructor includes a protocol that the vendor retains a copy of the submitted work, such practice is approved by UCLA for the vendor's sole purpose of comparison with other academic work subsequently submit-

ted by others. The vendor may not use academic work submitted by UCLA students for any other purpose.

Instructors are encouraged to indicate to all students at the start of the academic term whether (a) a plagiarism-detection service will be used in the class for academic assignments; and (b) whether the service will be applied to all students enrolled in the class or on a spot-check basis. Nonetheless, instructors may decide to use a plagiarism-detection service after the start of the academic term, either on an across-the-board or spot-check basis. The instructor's discretion in such matters is final and not subject to appeal.

Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the UCLA Student Conduct Code and the official statements regarding cheating and plagiarism. These and other relevant documents are available on the website of the Office of the Dean of Students at: <http://www.deanofstudents.ucla.edu/studentconduct.htm>.

The grading process for a student suspected of having engaged in plagiarism or other form of cheating is described in the Academic Senate Manual Regulations, Section 4, Paragraphs A-306 and A-315 (see <http://www.senate.ucla.edu>).

## Examination Policies

### Midterm Examinations

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 6: Midterm examinations are expected to be held during regularly-scheduled class meeting times. However, large classes with multiple sections requiring a common midterm examination can schedule examinations outside regular class meeting times on a space-available basis with the following limitations:

- a. Notice of the midterm dates and times must be published in the Schedule of Classes and URSA before enrollment begins. Late requests will not be scheduled.
- b. Instructors must put the midterm examination dates in the course syllabus.
- c. Instructors must announce the midterm dates on the 1st day of class and inform students that it is acceptable to request alternate times.
- d. Instructors should make a good faith effort to accommodate alternate examinations times for students with course conflicts.
- e. To comply with Section 92640(a) of the California Education Code, instructors must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. See UCLA Policy 870, Section II (B) 8, Alternate Examination Dates.

### Final Examinations

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 7: An instructor's method of evaluation must be announced at the beginning of the Course. Final written examinations may not exceed three hours' duration and are given only at the times and places established and published by the department chair and the Registrar's Office. See UCLA Senate Regulation A-332 (A) for the policy on final examinations.

Final examinations are generally held in the same room as Class meetings; however, by prior arrangement with the Registrar's Office, common final examinations can be scheduled and extra room locations may be booked on a space-available basis. Changes in classroom location must be arranged through the Registrar's Office. Examination codes, times, and locations are listed in the online Schedule of Classes and URSA.

### Alternate Examination Dates

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 8: No student shall be excused from assigned final examinations except as provided in Senate Regulation

A332 or in Section 92640(a) of the California Education Code policy on alternate examinations. The University must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. This requirement does not apply in the event that administering the test or examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably be avoided. Accommodation for alternate examination dates are worked out directly and on an individual basis between the student and the faculty member involved.

Faculty members should remember that while it is fully at their discretion to make arrangements with individual students for alternate examination times, including final examinations, they must conduct the scheduled final examination for the Class as a whole at the times and places established by the department chair and the Registrar's Office.

## Nondiscrimination

The University of California, in accordance with applicable Federal and State Laws and University Policies, does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, age, medical condition (cancer-related), ancestry, marital status, citizenship, sexual orientation, or status as a Vietnam-era veteran or special disabled veteran. The University also prohibits sexual harassment. This nondiscrimination policy covers admission, access, and treatment in University programs and activities.

Students may complain of any action which they believe discriminates against them on the ground of race, color, national origin, marital status, sex, sexual orientation, disability, or age and may contact the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall, and/or refer to Section 111.00 of the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students* (available in 1206 Murphy Hall or at <http://www.ucop.edu/ucophome/wnnews/aospol/toc.html>) for further information and procedures.

## Student Conduct Policies

Students are members of both society and the academic community with attendant rights and responsibilities. Students are expected to comply with the general law, University policies, and campus regulations.

### A. Jurisdiction

The University shall have jurisdiction over student conduct that occurs on University property, or in connection with official University functions whether on or off University property. Although the University will not routinely invoke its disciplinary processes over student conduct that occurs off campus except in connection with an official University function, the University shall have discretion to exercise jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus and that would violate student conduct and discipline policies or regulations if the conduct had occurred on campus when

1. The alleged misconduct indicates the student poses a threat to the safety or security of any member(s) of the University community or
2. The alleged misconduct involves academic work or the forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification.

Specifically, the University may choose to exercise jurisdiction over off-campus incidents under item 1 above where the alleged misconduct involves

- a. Physical abuse, including but not limited to rape, sexual assault, sex offenses, and other physical assault; threats of violence; or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person;
- b. Stalking (as defined in Section 102.10 of the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*);
- c. Sexual harassment (as defined in Section 102.09 of the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*);
- d. Hazing or any method of initiation or preinitiation into a campus organization or any activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization which causes, or is likely to cause, bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm to any student or other person.

In determining whether or not to exercise off-campus jurisdiction in cases under item 1 above, the University will consider the seriousness of the alleged misconduct; whether the alleged victim is a member of the campus community; the ability of the University to gather evidence, including the testimony of witnesses; or whether the off-campus conduct is part of a series of actions that occurred both on and off campus.

This section is intended only to provide guidance for the exercise of discretion by the University in invoking its jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus. It may not be relied on by any student charged under this section to create any rights, substantive or procedural, or as a basis for a challenge to the exercise of the University's jurisdiction.

## B. Grounds for Discipline

The chancellor may impose discipline for violation of, or an attempt to violate, any University policies or campus regulations. The lack of intent to commit a violation is not a factor in determining if a violation occurred; however, the lack of intent may be considered a mitigating factor in determining the appropriate sanction if it has been determined that a violation has occurred. Violations or attempted violations include, but are not limited to, the following types of misconduct (Sections 102.01 through 102.26 below are adapted from the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*):

## C. Types of Misconduct

**102.01: Academic Dishonesty.** All forms of academic misconduct, including but not limited to cheating, fabrication, plagiarism, multiple submissions, or facilitating academic dishonesty. For the purposes of this Code, the following definitions apply:

**102.01a: Cheating.** Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the use of unauthorized materials, information, or study aids in any academic exercise; or helping another student commit an act of academic fraud; or the failure to observe the expressed procedures or instructions of an academic exercise (e.g., examination instructions regarding alternate seating or conversation during an examination).

**102.01b: Fabrication.** Fabrication includes, but is not limited to, falsification or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise.

**102.01c: Plagiarism.** Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the use of another's words or ideas as if they were one's own; including but not limited to representing, either with the intent to deceive or by the omission of the true source, part of or an entire work produced by someone other than the student, obtained by purchase or otherwise, as the student's original work; or representing the identifiable but altered ideas, data, or writing of another person as if those ideas, data, or writing were the student's original work.

**102.01d: Multiple Submissions.** Multiple submissions includes, but is not limited to, the resubmission by a student of any work which has been previously submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a second course, without the informed permission/consent of the instructor of the second course; or the submission by a student of any work submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a concurrent course, without the permission/consent of the instructors of both courses.

**102.02: Other Forms of Dishonesty.** Other forms of dishonesty, including but not limited to fabricating information or knowingly furnishing false information or reporting a false emergency to the University or to University officials acting in the performance of their duties.

**102.03: Forgery.** Forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification. Section 102.03 applies to any individual for whom the University maintains records, regardless of current student status.

**102.04: Theft.** Theft of, conversion of, misappropriation of, or damage to or destruction of any property of the University or property of others while on University premises or at official University functions; or possession of any property of the University or others stolen while on University premises or at official University functions; or possession of any property when the student had knowledge or reasonably should have had knowledge that it was stolen.

**102.05: Computers.** Theft or abuse of University computers and other University electronic resources such as computer and electronic communications facilities, systems, and services. Abuses include (but are not limited to) unauthorized entry, use, transfer, or tampering with the communications of others, and interference with the work of others and with the operation of computer and electronic communications facilities, systems, and services. Violation of the *University of California Electronic Communications Policy* (available at <http://www.ucop.edu/ucophome/policies/ec/>), or of any UCLA acceptable or allowable use policy, is also considered a violation of Section 102.05.

**102.06: Unauthorized Conduct.** Unauthorized entry to, possession of, receipt of, or use of any University services; equipment; resources; or properties, including the University name, insignia, or seal. Sale or unauthorized transfer of commencement tickets.

**102.07: University-Owned Housing.** Violation of policies, regulations, or rules governing University-owned, -operated, or -leased housing facilities or other housing facilities located on University property.

**102.08: Physical Abuse.** Physical abuse, including but not limited to rape, sexual assault, sex offenses, and other physical assault; threats of violence; or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person.

**102.08a: Rape.** For the purposes of this Code, rape refers to "rape" as defined by the California Penal Code (as it may be amended from time to time). Among other acts, the Penal Code prohibits the following acts:



1. Sexual intercourse against a person's will accomplished by force or threats of bodily injury
2. Sexual intercourse against a person's will where the person has reasonable fear that she (or he) or another will be injured if she (or he) does not submit to the intercourse
3. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of giving consent, or is prevented from resisting, due to alcohol or drugs, and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused
4. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of resisting because she (or he), at the time, is unconscious or asleep, and this is known to the accused

**102.08b: Sexual Assault.** The act of sexual assault includes forced sodomy (anal intercourse); forced oral copulation (oral-genital contact); rape by foreign object (forced penetration by a foreign object, including a finger); and sexual battery (the unwanted touching of an intimate part of another person for the purpose of sexual arousal). These also include situations when the accused sexually assaults a complainant incapable of giving consent, including where the complainant is prevented from resisting due to alcohol or drugs and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused. NOTE: For the purpose of this regulation, students should understand that

1. Forced intercourse or other unwanted sexual contact is defined as rape or sexual assault whether the assailant is a stranger or an acquaintance of the complainant
2. Intoxication of the assailant shall not diminish the assailant's responsibility for sexual assault

**102.09: Sexual Harassment.** Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal, non verbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute sexual harassment when:

- a. A student who is also an employee of the University makes submission to such conduct, either explicitly or implicitly, a term or condition of instruction, employment, or participation in other University activity over which the student has control by virtue of his or her University employment; or
- b. A student who is also an employee of the University makes submission to or rejection of such conduct a basis for evaluation in making academic or personnel decisions affecting an individual, when the student has control over such decisions by virtue of his or her University employment; or
- c. Such conduct by any student has the purpose or effect of creating a hostile and intimidating environment sufficiently severe or pervasive to substantially impair a reasonable person's participation in University programs or activities, or use of University facilities.

In determining whether the alleged conduct constitutes sexual harassment, consideration shall be given to the record of the incident as a whole and to the totality of the circumstances, including the context in which the alleged incidents occurred.

**102.10: Stalking.** Stalking behavior in which a student repeatedly engages in a course of conduct directed at another person and makes a credible threat with the intent to place that person in reasonable fear for his or her safety, or the safety of his or her family; where the threat is reasonably determined by the University to seriously alarm, torment, or terrorize the person; and where the threat is additionally determined by the University to serve no legitimate purpose.

**102.11: Harassment.** Harassment by a student of any person. For the purposes of this Code, 'harassment':

- a. is the use, display, or other demonstration of words, gestures, imagery, or physical materials, or the engagement in any form of bodily conduct, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, alienage, sex, religion, age, sexual orientation, or physical

or mental disability, that has the effect of creating a hostile and intimidating environment sufficiently severe or pervasive to substantially impair a reasonable person's participation in University programs or activities, or use of University facilities;

- b. must target a specific person or persons; and
- c. must be addressed directly to that person or persons.

**102.12: Hazing.** Hazing or any method of initiation or preinitiation into a campus organization or any activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization at any time that causes, or is likely to cause, physical injury or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in psychological harm to any student or other person.

**102.13: Obstruction or Disruption.** Obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures, or other University activities.

**102.14: Disorderly Conduct.** Disorderly or lewd conduct.

**102.15: Disturbing the Peace.** Participation in a disturbance of the peace or unlawful assembly.

**102.16: Failure to Comply.** Failure to identify oneself to, or comply with directions of, a University official or other public official acting in the performance of their duties while on University property or at official University functions, or resisting or obstructing such University or other public officials in the performance of or the attempt to perform their duties.

**102.17: Controlled Substances.** Unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of controlled substances, identified in Federal and State law or regulations.

**102.18: Alcohol.** Manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of alcohol which is unlawful or otherwise prohibited by, or not in compliance with, University policy or campus regulations.

**102.19: Destructive Devices.** Possession, use, storage, or manufacture of explosives, firebombs, or other destructive devices.

**102.20: Weapons.** Except as expressly permitted by law, possession, use, storage, or manufacture of a firearm or other weapon capable of causing bodily injury.

**102.21: Violation of Disciplinary Conditions.** Violation of the conditions contained in the terms of a disciplinary action imposed under this Code.

**102.22: Violation of Emergency or Interim Suspension Conditions.** Violation of the conditions contained in a written Notice of Emergency or Interim Suspension issued pursuant to Section IV of this Code.

**102.23: Unauthorized Use or Sale of Course Notes.** Selling, preparing, or distributing for any commercial purpose course lecture notes or video or audio recordings of any course unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the course instructor in writing. The unauthorized sale or commercial distribution of course notes or recordings by a student is a violation of this Code whether or not it was the student or someone else who prepared the notes or recordings.

Copying for any commercial purpose handouts, readers or other course materials provided by an instructor as part of a University of California course unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the course instructor or the copyright holder in writing (if the instructor is not the copyright holder).

**102.24: Violation of Campus Restraining Order.** Violation of the conditions contained in a written Campus Restraining Order issued pursuant to Section III.A.2.a.(1) of this Code.

**102.25: University Properties.** Using University properties for the purpose of organizing or carrying out unlawful activity.

**102.26: Violations of Law.** Violation of Federal, State, or local laws.

## Rape and Other Forms of Sexual Assault

UCLA does not tolerate sexual assault in any form, including rape, acquaintance rape, or date rape. Where there is probable cause to believe that the campus regulations prohibiting sexual assault have been violated, the campus pursues disciplinary actions which may include sanctions up to and including dismissal from the University.

A student charged with sexual assault can be prosecuted under California criminal statutes and disciplined under the campus student conduct policies and regulations. Even if the criminal justice authorities choose not to prosecute, the campus can pursue disciplinary action.

### If a Person Has Been Raped or Sexually Assaulted

Those who believe that they are the victims of rape or other forms of sexual assault should

1. **Immediately call the police department.** If possible, call 911 or the UCLA Police Department at (310) 825-1491; see <http://www.ucpd.ucla.edu>
2. **Get medical attention.** Campus police will provide transportation to the Santa Monica UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room for emergency medical treatment and evidence collection. A counselor from the Santa Monica Rape Treatment Center will be available at that time, free of charge

Utilize campus and community support services:

1. **Contact a Rape Services Consultant (RSC)** at the Center for Women and Men. RSCs have expertise in working with victims of rape or sexual assault. They can discuss options and alternatives, help identify the most appropriate support services, and provide information about medical care, psychological counseling, academic assistance, legal options, how to file a police report, and how to file a complaint through the Office of the Dean of Students. RSCs are available to assist UCLA faculty, staff, and students regardless of where or when the assault occurred. 2. **Contact the Rape Treatment Center** at Santa Monica UCLA Medical Center, (310) 319-4000, for free emergency medical treatment and counseling services

### Campus Discipline Process When the Assailant is a Student

Those who believe that they are the victims of rape or other forms of sexual assault by a student on University properties or in conjunction with an official University function may file a complaint directly with the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall.

Cases referred to the Office of the Dean of Students are treated under the hearing procedures set forth in the *UCLA Student Conduct Code*. Where the allegation is of rape or other forms of sexual

assault, and the case is referred to the Student Conduct Committee, the following *additional* procedures shall apply:

1. The complainant shall be entitled, for support, to have up to two persons of the complainant's choice accompany the complainant to the hearing. A support person may be called as a witness, and the fact that he or she is to act as a witness shall not preclude that person's attendance throughout the entire hearing. If a support person is also a witness, the committee chair (or the hearing officer) may require him or her to testify prior to the complainant. Neither of these persons shall be entitled to represent or defend the complainant. Similar rights shall be afforded to the accused student
2. The complainant shall have the right to be present during the entire hearing, notwithstanding the fact that the complainant is to be called as a witness
3. Evidence of the complainant's past sexual history, including opinion evidence, reputation evidence, and evidence of specific instances of the complainant's sexual conduct, shall not be admissible by the accused student unless the committee chair or hearing officer makes a specific finding of relevance after an offer of proof by the accused student. Under no circumstances is past sexual history admissible to prove consent. The offer of proof must be made and resolved by the panel before the complainant testifies
4. The hearing shall be closed to spectators

## Harassment

### Sexual Harassment

Every member of the campus community should be aware that the University is strongly opposed to sexual harassment and that such behavior is prohibited both by law and by University policy. See <http://www.sexualharassment.ucla.edu>.

### Definitions

### Complaint Resolution

Experience has demonstrated that many complaints of sexual harassment can be effectively resolved through informal intervention. Individuals who experience what they consider to be sexual harassment are advised to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly.

Additionally, an individual who believes that she or he has been sexually harassed may contact the alleged offender's supervisor and/or a Sexual Harassment Information Center counselor for help and information regarding sexual harassment complaint resolution or grievance procedures at one of the locations listed below as determined by the complainant's status at the University at the time of the alleged incident:

## Other Forms of Harassment

The University strives to create an environment which fosters the values of mutual respect and tolerance and is free from discrimination based on race, ethnicity, sex, religion, sexual orientation, disability, age, and other personal characteristics. Certainly harassment, in its many forms, works against those values and often corrodes a person's sense of worth and interferes with one's ability to participate in University programs or activities. While the University is committed to the free exchange of ideas and the full protection of free expression, the University also recognizes that words can be used in such a way that they no longer express an idea, but rather injure and intimidate, thus undermining the ability of individuals to participate in the University community. The *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students* (hereafter referred to as *Policies*) presently prohibit a variety of conduct by students which, in certain contexts, may be regarded as harassment or intimidation.

For example, harassing expression which is accompanied by physical abuse, threats of violence, or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person on University property or in connection with official University functions may subject an offending student to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.08 of the *Policies*.

Similarly, harassing conduct, including symbolic expression, which also involves conduct resulting in damage to or destruction of any property of the University or property of others while on University premises may subject a student violator to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.04 of the *Policies*.

Further, under specific circumstances described in the *University-wide Student Conduct Harassment Policy*, students may be subject to University discipline for misconduct which may consist solely of expression. ## Complaint Resolution

One of the necessary measures in our efforts to assure an atmosphere of civility and mutual respect is the establishment of procedures which provide effective informal and formal mechanisms for those who believe that they have been victims of any of the above misconduct.

Many incidents of harassment and intimidation can be effectively resolved through informal means. For example, an individual may wish to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly. An individual who chooses not to confront the alleged offender and who wishes help, advice, or information is urged to contact any of the Harassment Information Centers listed immediately above.

In addition to providing support for those who believe they have been victims of harassment, Harassment Information Centers offer persons the opportunity to learn about the phenomena of harassment and intimidation; to understand the formal and informal mechanisms by which misunderstandings may be corrected and, when appropriate, student perpetrators may be disciplined; and to consider which of the available options is the most useful for the particular circumstances.

With regard to the *Universitywide Student Conduct Harassment Policy*, complainants should be aware that not all conduct which is offensive may be regarded as a violation of this *Policy* and may, in fact, be protected expression. Thus, the application of formal institutional discipline to such protected expression may not be legally permissible. Nevertheless, the University is committed to reviewing any complaint of harassing or intimidating conduct by a student and intervening on behalf of the complainant to the extent possible.

## Disclosure of Student Records

Pursuant to the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the California Information Practices Act, and the *University of California Policies Applying to the Disclosure of Information from Student Records*, students at UCLA have the right to

1. Inspect and review records pertaining to themselves in their capacity as students, except as the right may be waived or qualified under Federal and State Laws and University Policies
2. Have withheld from disclosure, absent their prior written consent for release, personally identifiable information from their student records, except as provided by Federal and State Laws and University Policies

3. Inspect records maintained by UCLA of disclosures of personally identifiable information from their student records
4. Seek correction of their student records through a request to amend the records or, if such request is denied, through a hearing
5. File complaints with the U.S. Department of Education regarding alleged violations of the rights accorded them by the FERPA

UCLA, in accordance with Federal and State Laws and University Policies, has designated the following categories of personally identifiable information as "directory information" which UCLA may release and publish without the student's prior consent: name, address (local/mailling, permanent, and/or e-mail), telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, enrollment status, grade level, number of course units in which enrolled, degrees and honors received, the most recent previous educational institution attended, participation in officially recognized activities (including intercollegiate athletics), and the name, weight, and height of participants on intercollegiate athletic teams.

Students who do not wish certain items (i.e., name, local/mailling, permanent, and/or e-mail address, telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, number of course units in which enrolled, and degrees and honors received) of this "directory information" released and published may so indicate through URSA (<http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>). To restrict the release and publication of the additional items in the category of "directory information," complete the UCLA FERPA Restriction Request form available from Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall.

Student records which are the subject of Federal and State Laws and University Policies may be maintained in a variety of offices, including the Registrar's Office, Office of the Dean of Students, UCLA Career Center, Graduate Division, and the offices of a student's College or school and major department. Students are referred to the *UCLA Telephone Directory* which lists all the offices that may maintain student records, together with their campus address and telephone number. Students have the right to inspect their student records in any such office subject to the terms of Federal and State Laws and University Policies. Inspection of student records maintained by the Registrar's Office is by appointment only and must be arranged three working days in advance. Call (310) 825-3801 or inquire at Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall.

A copy of Federal and State Laws, University Policies, and the *UCLA Telephone Directory* may be inspected in the office of the Information Practices Coordinator, 600 UCLA Wilshire Center. Information concerning students' hearing rights may be obtained from that office and from the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall.

In addition to the directory information described above, information related to students' Social Security number, sex, and marital status, and the name(s), address(es), and telephone number(s) of their parents or next of kin are made available to the UCLA External Affairs Department for use in alumni, development, and public relations activities. To restrict the release of this additional information, complete a Request for External Affairs Information Restriction form available from Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall.

## Emergencies

Students should be familiar with safety instructions posted in classrooms, laboratories, and other campus facilities. Be prepared to respond safely and appropriately to a fire, earthquake, toxic spill, or accident.

At UCLA, 911 is the "all-purpose" emergency phone number. You do not need to dial an outside line from a campus phone, and you do not need any coins to dial 911 from a pay phone. When you call 911, try

to remain calm and do not hang up until you answer all of the operator's questions.

You may also obtain general instructions during a major emergency by calling the 24-hour emergency hot line at (800) 900-UCLA and by listening to the UCLA emergency radio at AM810. See <http://www.ehs.ucla.edu> for more information.

Here are some general guidelines for specific emergencies:

### Earthquake

When an earthquake hits, take cover immediately. If you are indoors, get under a desk or table, or between seating rows in a lecture hall. **DO NOT RUN OUTSIDE.** If you are in a hallway or if you are outside, move to an open area quickly and drop to the ground, covering your head and neck as best you can. If you are in your car, stop carefully and stay in the car.

After the shaking stops, check for injuries. Do not use telephones for personal calls, as this overloads phone lines and prevents emergency personnel from reporting injuries. After a severe quake at UCLA, department heads and emergency coordinators will lead building evacuations. Do not use elevators. Go to campus evacuation areas, which are wide open spaces like the quads, athletic fields, and uncovered parking lots. Wait for instructions before entering buildings or parking structures. Refrain from spreading rumors and do not go sightseeing. Remain calm and help others.

### Fire

If you see a fire, close the door where the fire is located, activate the nearest alarm, and call 911. When you sound the alarm or hear the alarm signal, get out of the building as quickly and calmly as possible. Do not use the elevators. Do not reenter the building until the all-clear signal has been given by emergency personnel.

UCLA does not expect students or employees to fight fires. Use a fire extinguisher only if you have had the training and you feel it is safe to do so. Be aware of campus fire alarm and extinguisher locations before a fire occurs.

### Hazardous Spill

Noxious odors may or may not indicate a toxic spill. Do not attempt to clean up any hazardous material spill involving toxic, chemical, radioactive, infectious, or flammable materials. If a spill occurs in a classroom or laboratory, alert the supervisor or laboratory manager. Call (310) 825-5689 (UCLA Office of Environment, Health, and Safety) or 911 (after hours) if the spill happens outdoors or in an unsupervised area.

### Accident and Injury

Call 911 immediately to get assistance. If you are qualified to do so, give first aid to injured persons. Do not attempt to move the seriously injured.

Basic emergency care training is available through the Red Cross at (310) 445-9900. For further information about emergency preparedness, call the UCLA Office of Environment, Health, and Safety at (310) 825-5689.

All work-related injuries must be reported to your supervisor. In addition, any serious injuries (including fatalities) must be reported to Cal/OSHA. Report the injury to the office of Environment, Health, and Safety on the 24-hour injuries report hot line at (310) 825-9797. Environment, Health, and Safety will notify Cal/OSHA.

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
