## Expanded student services section

Now the UCLA online *Schedule of Classes*, at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/schedule>, includes powerful new search capabilities to let students easily find the courses they are looking for and the courses they need. Whether targeting courses that fulfill GE requirements or looking for something to fit into a busy work schedule, students have a range of options that make searching a snap.

In addition, beginning week nine of the quarter, students can link directly to final examination information — including exam code, date and time, and location — from their individual course selections in the online class listings.

# Registration

## Registration

Registration consists of paying fees and enrolling in classes.

- Registration fees and other University charges are paid through the UCLA Student Billing Statement, also called the BAR statement, mailed monthly to your UCLA mailing address by the Student Accounting Office
- Enrollment in classes is completed through URSA Telephone, (310) 208-0425 (see "URSA" for full details)

You must complete both processes by the established deadlines (see "Calendar") to be officially registered and enrolled for the term.

Payments can be mailed, deposited in the Administrative Main Cashier's drop slot (1125 Murphy Hall), sent Western Union Quick Collect, or paid via credit card online through Cyberpay (see "Billing" for details). After the published deadline, payments must be made in person at 1125 Murphy Hall and are assessed an additional \$50 late fee.

## Mandatory Medical Insurance Requirement

As a condition of registration, UCLA requires **international students** (graduate and undergraduate) on nonimmigrant visas and **graduate students** to have *adequate* medical insurance coverage during all periods of enrollment.

The following "insurance" plans are NOT acceptable and do NOT fulfill the University requirement for adequate medical/health insurance: (1) travel insurance plans of any kind, (2) any plans purchased outside the U.S. and/or not issued by a U.S. company, (3) reimbursement arrangements or vouchers, including those from home governments and consulates in the U.S.

The **Medical Insurance Plan (MIP)** that UCLA offers fulfills the University requirement for adequate medical insurance. For **graduate and international students**, the MIP fee is included each term in the BAR statement amount due. This is the only way to purchase MIP.

Students who decide to waive out of MIP because they have adequate private medical insurance must complete the Medical Insurance Waiver Request included each term with the BAR statement and submit the form when they pay their registration fees. Students whose fees are paid by financial aid, graduate fellowship funds, or other sources must submit their MIP waiver by the published registration deadline each term. Students may waive out of MIP from the Student Health Service website at <https://www.saonet.ucla.edu/health/insuranc/mipforms/auth.html>; Winter Quarter 1999 deadlines for this online service are December 1, 1998 to December 16, 1998.

Students who do not purchase MIP must have an *adequate* private medical insurance plan that provides all of the following *minimum* benefits:

- (1) A *minimum* of \$100,000 in lifetime benefits.
- (2) Coverage of at least 75 percent of medical expenses, with a deductible of \$500 or less and a copayment of 20 percent or less.
- (3) A policy issued in the U.S. by a U.S. carrier.
- (4) Inclusion of Medical Evacuation and Repatriation benefits for those on J-1 or J-2 visas.

If the private medical insurance plan does not meet all of the above requirements, students must purchase MIP.

For **all other undergraduate students**, the MIP fee appears as a voluntary option on the BAR statement and is in addition to the amount due each term. To request MIP, students must select it by marking that item on the remittance portion of the BAR statement. The remittance slip must be returned to the UCLA Administrative Main Cashier by the published registration deadline each term. This is the only way to purchase MIP.

This serves as notice of the mandatory medical insurance requirement; it is each student's responsibility to obtain the necessary information *before* they register. Changes and exceptions requested after students have registered cannot be honored. MIP cancellation requests must be made to the Student Health Service (SHS) Insurance Office within 10 days from the MIP effective date. For further information on MIP or adequate medical insurance requirements, call the SHS Insurance Office at (310) 825-4073, option 4.

## Holds

Students may have holds placed on their student record, which could affect registration, enrollment, financial aid, campus services and/or release of academic transcripts for the following reasons:

1. Failure to comply with admission provisions
2. Failure to settle financial obligations with the University
3. Failure to respond to official notices

Each student who becomes subject to a hold action is given advance notice and ample time to respond. In most cases, the hold must be released from the initiating office before a student may enroll in classes or receive various campus services. You can obtain holds information on URSA OnLine at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/> or a reading of your holds on URSA Telephone at (310) 208-0425.

## Enrollment in Classes

See "Class Listings" in this schedule for class times, meeting rooms, instructors, and other enrollment information. For the most up-to-date listings, see the online *Schedule of Classes*. Consult "Class Listings" and your school or college advisers (see "Academic Counseling"), to assemble a program of courses.

Plan two or three alternate programs in case your first choice of courses is not available (use the "Enrollment Worksheet" on the inside back cover of this schedule to list alternate courses). Do not choose two courses in the same final examination group (see the final examination chart in "Class Listings") or select classes that conflict in meeting times. If conflicts are unavoidable, consult with the instructor of each course at the first class meeting. For detailed enrollment instructions, see "Enrollment" in this schedule.

## Class Attendance

Class rosters, which identify enrolled or wait-listed students, are issued to each instructor by the Registrar's Office. Attendance in UCLA classes is limited to duly enrolled regular session or concurrent University Extension students. Guests may attend lectures only with the approval of the instructor. Students may be dropped from a course for academic reasons such as lacking the approved prerequisites and requirements (SR542). If attendance is an academic requirement established by the instructor, students may be dropped from a course because of excessive absences.

## Auditing Classes

With the consent of the instructor, registered students and interested individuals are permitted to audit classes. Arrangements are made directly with the faculty member under any rules the faculty member may establish, and those auditing ordinarily do not participate in discussions, exams, or written papers. Audited classes are not recorded on the Study List or on transcripts for regular session courses.

## Class Notes

Notes or recordings made by students are for purposes of individual or group study or for other non-commercial purposes reasonably arising from the student's membership in the class or the University.

## 6 / Registration

Permission to make notes or recordings falls within the instructor's discretion as informed by instructional purposes, classroom order, property interests or other reasonable issues arising in the academic context. Notes and recordings may not be exchanged or distributed for commercial purposes, for compensation, or for any other purpose other than study, either between students or between a student(s) and a third party. Unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the instructor, commercial use of class notes or recordings constitutes an unauthorized commercial activity in violation of the *UCLA Regulations on Activities, Registered Organizations and Use of Properties*, Section IV, Paragraph A (<http://www.saonet.ucla.edu/csp/regs.htm>). Students who violate of this policy are subject to University discipline.

Individual instructors retain intellectual property rights in lecture material, pursuant to U.S. copyright law and California Civil Code 980(a)(1). Misuse of course notes derived from lecture material may also subject an individual to legal proceedings brought by the instructor.

Pursuant to the guidelines reviewed by the UCLA Academic Senate (1973), lecture note subscription services are permitted, if authorized in advance by the University and if approved by the instructor. The Lecture Notes service offered by the Associated Students, UCLA is currently authorized by the University to provide a course notes subscription service for particular classes. For such classes, the note taker is approved in advance by the instructor, and the instructor may review the notes before their distribution and sale through the UCLA Store Lecture Notes office at Ackerman Union. The list of classes with such a subscription service is available at Ackerman Union.

## URSA

University Records System Access (URSA) enables all UCLA students to acquire information from their University academic records stored on the student system computer databases. Below is an overview of URSA features; see "URSA" for details.

### URSA Telephone Enrollment

Use URSA Telephone (310-208-0425) to process your class enrollment and confirm courses, by reviewing Study List information such

as day/time, location, examination code, and instructor name. Call to check your exact URSA Telephone enrollment appointment time, UCLA grades for any completed term, GPA, completed units, and outstanding holds. Verify registration fee payment, update or review selected student information ("degree expected term," ethnic-based mailing option, and ethnic background), or change the security code used to access URSA.

Through URSA Telephone's Student Records Menu, you can enroll in classes, add, drop, or exchange classes/sections, put yourself on the wait list for a class, add a class using a PTE #, change the grading basis for a class, obtain a reading of your Study List, check your wait-list position, and obtain instructor names for all courses. You enroll during your assigned appointment periods, which you also obtain through URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine.

### URSA OnLine

Use URSA OnLine (<http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/>) to view and print out your Study List, undergraduate Degree Progress Report (DPR), URSA Telephone enrollment appointment time, holds information, grades for a term, and registration status. You can also change your address information, including phone number and e-mail, privacy release designation, and PIN for accessing URSA.

## Study Lists

A Study List is the record of the courses you are enrolled in for the term. Friday of the second week of instruction, your Study List of enrolled courses becomes "official" and all wait lists are eliminated. You should check your Study List through URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine after all enrollment transactions. **You are responsible for all courses and the grading basis as listed on URSA, and you cannot receive credit for courses not listed.** Errors or omissions should be corrected before your academic dean's deadline for changes by petition. Unapproved withdrawal from or neglect of a course entered on the Study List results in a failing grade.

# Billing

## BAR Statement

The UCLA Student Billing Statement, also known as the BAR statement since it is generated by the Billing and Receivables (BAR) System, serves as each UCLA student's bill for registration fees and other University charges. Students are automatically assigned a BAR account and mailed a statement of activity each month. The statements, which include your registration fee assessment, are generated on the dates below and mailed within three to four days.

Term	Mailing Dates
Fall Semester — Medicine	July 1
Fall Semester — Law	August 1
Fall Quarter	September 1
Winter Quarter/Spring Semester	December 1
Spring Quarter	March 1

New and reentering students have their bills mailed to them according to the above schedule if they have filed both the Statement of Intent to Register and the Statement of Legal Residence and their residence for tuition is determined.

If you receive financial aid, the Financial Aid System automatically credits your BAR account with your financial aid to pay your registration fees and most other outstanding UCLA debts, such as student health or laboratory fees.

**All charges (other than registration charges) must be paid in full by the statement deadline, the 20th of each month (or the preceding workday if the deadline falls on a weekend or holiday), to avoid assessment of a \$20 delinquent fee.** If you decide not to attend UCLA, use URSA Telephone to declare nonattendance for a term (option 5# under the Students Records Menu). Check the readmission policies outlined in "Academic Policies" in order to protect your student status.

### Bruin Direct

With Bruin Direct, any credit balance refunds are deposited directly to your bank account. Notification of these transactions is sent to your current e-mail address before each deposit is made.

UCLA requires direct deposit for credit balance refunds in BAR. If you are not currently enrolled in Bruin Direct and did not receive an authorization form in the mail, you must pick up a form from the Administrative Main Cashier's Office at 1125 Murphy Hall or from Student Accounting at B303 Murphy Hall.

### Student Medical Insurance Plan (MIP)

As a condition of registration, UCLA requires **international students** (graduate and undergraduate) on nonimmigrant visas and **graduate students** to have *adequate* medical insurance coverage during all periods of enrollment. UCLA offers the Medical Insurance Plan, which fulfills the requirement. See the Mandatory Medical Insurance Requirement section in "Registration" for requirements.

### Paying Fees

Detach the bottom portion of the BAR statement and mail your remittance, or drop it in the Administrative Main Cashier's drop slot, 1125 Murphy Hall. Allow at least five working days for mail delivery. The University is not responsible for materials lost or delayed in the mail.

A **late payment fee** of \$50 is assessed to all students paying registration fees after the deadline. Missing or incomplete payments or payment documents may result in loss of classes, medical insurance or assessment of late fees. Verify on URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine that your fees have been received and processed before the dropping of classes deadline.

In the envelope provided, return the following to the **UCLA Administrative Main Cashier**, Box 95142, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1432:

- Bottom Portion** of BAR statement
- Payment.** Do not send cash. Write your nine-digit UCLA student I.D. number on all checks, money orders, or other forms of payment. Indicate method of payment:
  - Check or Money Order**  
Make payable to REGENTS-UC. A \$60 fine is assessed if any check for registration fee payment is returned by a bank.
  - VISA/MasterCard/Discover Card**  
Complete and sign the VISA/MC/Discover section on the BAR statement by the published fee payment deadline (see "Calendar"). Credit card statements must be signed and completed to be processed. Fax payments are no longer accepted. Please refer to the other payment methods below.
- MIP Waiver Request.** Return your BAR remittance document indicating that you are waiving out of the medical insurance along with the completed MIP Waiver Request, which is included with your bill. To complete the waiver request online, see the insurance links from the Student Health Services website at <https://www.saonet.ucla.edu/health/insuranc/mipforms/auth.html> or submit the waiver through Bruin OnLine. Students who fail to submit a completed MIP waiver request may be required to pay the mandatory medical insurance fee. Check your BAR account to verify that your waiver has been received and posted.

### Home Banking

You can make BAR payments by using one of many consumer bill payment services available. Contact your bank for more information about establishing UCLA as a payee for your home banking services. See the Administrative Main Cashier Office/Student Accounting website at <http://www.bafnet.ucla.edu/studentacctg/homepage.htm>.

### Western Union Quick Collect Payment

Go to any Western Union agent location worldwide and complete a Quick Collect form for UCLA. Provide the amount of payment, your name and UCLA student I.D. number. Indicate the payment is for registration fees and the term to which it should apply. Reference: Administrative Main Cashier, Ca. The Western Union agent will collect your payment in U.S. currency and enter the transaction into their system. It is transmitted within minutes and recorded to your BAR account when the funds are received.

### AutoPay

Students can have BAR account balances automatically paid by credit card. Credit cards are charged around the 15th of each month and payments are posted to BAR. See the Administrative Main Cashier or Student Accounting offices for information on how to sign up

### CyberPay via URSA

Beginning Winter term 1999, students may use CyberPay to pay their BAR accounts by credit card through the financial section of URSA OnLine.

### Address Change

It is extremely important that your **UCLA Mailing Address** is always accurate. You may change your address any of the following ways:

- On URSA OnLine at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/>
- By filling out the Change of Mailing Address portion on the reverse of the UCLA Billing Statement
- In person at the Enrollment and Degree Services Office, 1113 Murphy Hall.

## Registration Confirmation

Check URSA OnLine or URSA Telephone to confirm that your registration fee payment has been processed by the Administrative Main Cashier. For paper proof of payment, print a copy of the "Registration Status" screen in URSA OnLine. This can be presented with the UCLA BruinCard as proof of student status for the specified term.

## Late Payment

### Late Payment in Person

Anyone who did not pay registration fees by the deadline must pay a \$50 **late payment fee** between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays at the Administrative Main Cashier's Office, 1125 Murphy Hall.

**New and Reentering Students** must pay their fees directly at the Administrative Main Cashier's Office once they receive an URSA notification letter or appointment letter from the Registrar's Office.

Late registration is complete when you pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

### Late Payment after Friday of the Second Week

If you enroll in classes and pay registration fees after Friday of the second week of classes, you are assessed **both the \$50 late study list fee and the \$50 late registration fee**. This means it is an extra **\$100** to register and enroll after Friday of the second week.

Once fees are paid, complete an Enrollment Petition (undergraduates obtain petitions from the Registrar's Office, graduate students from their department).

**All undergraduate students** must obtain the instructor's signature for each course listed and obtain approval from the academic college or school.

**Graduate students** (GD college code) must obtain approval from their authorized departmental adviser.

**Dentistry, Law, and Medicine students** must have the written approval of their respective Student Affairs Office.

File the Enrollment Petition at 1113 Murphy Hall. Late registration is complete when you pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

## Refunds

### Cancellation of Registration

Prior to the first day of instruction, students may cancel registration by mailing a written notice to the Enrollment and Degree Services Office, Attn: Cancellation Clerk, 1113 Murphy Hall, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1429. Refund is as follows: **new students** receive a refund for fees paid except the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and a \$10 service fee; all **other students** receive a refund for fees paid minus the \$10 service fee.

### Withdrawal

Students who withdraw from the University during the course of a term must file an acceptable Notice of Withdrawal or graduate Leave of Absence form (see the Graduate Leaves of Absence section below). The form containing complete instructions is issued at the office of your academic dean (undergraduates) or in your department (graduates).

Failing to attend classes, neglecting courses, or stopping payment on checks tendered for registration does not constitute notice of withdrawal. A \$60 fine is assessed if any check for registration fee payment is returned by a bank for any reason, including stopped payment or insufficient funds. If no credit for courses is received, a full refund of the University registration fee for the regular session is granted to all students entering the armed forces prior to the end of the sixth week of the term, with no refund thereafter.

A percentage of the registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Notice of Withdrawal or Leave of Absence form is submitted to the academic dean.

For new graduate, continuing, and reentering students, the schedule of refunds is applied to the fee paid:

100%	on or before January 11
90%	January 2 - 17
50%	January 18 - 28
25%	January 29 - February 14
0%	on or after February 15

See the refund chart in "Financial Support" for new students who receive federal financial aid and withdraw in their first term.

Refund is as follows: a \$10 service fee is deducted from all 100 percent refunds; for new students, the schedule of refunds is applied to the fees paid minus the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and a \$10 service fee. If you receive a 100 percent refund and purchased MIP, you are not eligible for any MIP benefits for that entire term. An additional \$20 processing fee is applied to all MIP cancellation refunds. If you receive less than a 100 percent refund and you purchased MIP, your MIP policy remains in effect for the remainder of the term, and your refund is calculated on the remainder of your registration fees.

Registration fee refunds take one to two weeks to process. The length of time is standardized due to the volume of refunds processed.

If a sponsored student (on financial aid) pays registration fees with personal funds, a refund is initiated automatically through BAR. The Accounting Office processes a refund in one to two weeks.

Students who initially pay registration fees with financial aid, a fee deferral, or a fee waiver, and subsequently cancel or withdraw, do NOT receive a cash refund.

### Graduate Leaves of Absence

Continuing graduate students in good standing (3.0 GPA or above) who have completed at least one term of UCLA graduate work may, with the support of their department and the approval of the Graduate Division, be eligible for leaves of absence. Graduate students are allowed a maximum of six quarters of official leave of absence.

Students approved leave of absence are not permitted to use faculty time or make use of University facilities for more than 12 hours since their last registration and are not eligible for apprentice personnel employment or other services normally available to registered students.

Obtain a Request for Leave of Absence form at Graduate Admissions/Student and Academic Affairs, 1255 Murphy Hall. See "Calendar" regarding the deadline for filing the request.

A percentage of the registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Request for Leave of Absence form is submitted to the Graduate Division. See refund chart above.

A \$10 service fee is deducted from all 100 percent refunds; fees paid by new M.B.A. and Dentistry students are refunded except for their respective nonrefundable Acceptance of Admissions deposit. If you receive a 100 percent refund and purchased MIP, you are not eligible for any MIP benefits for that entire term. An additional \$20 processing fee is applied to all MIP cancellation refunds. If you receive less than a 100 percent refund and you purchased MIP, your MIP policy remains in effect for the remainder of the term, and your refund is calculated on the remainder of your registration fees.

You do not need to apply for readmission as the approved leave is for readmission to a specific term. The Registrar's Office sends forms for you to request registration information when your leave is due to expire.

## Financial Aid Distribution through BAR

UCLA uses a central Billing and Receivables (BAR) system to process UCLA bills and payments. Each student is assigned an individual student account and receives a statement of activity in the mail each month. Your statement lists charges, such as registration fees, health insurance, or outstanding debts, and may include anticipated financial aid activity and the amount of funds available for a refund.

The Financial Aid System automatically credits your BAR account with your financial aid. BAR uses your financial aid as a credit to pay your registration fees and most other outstanding UCLA debts (such as student health visits or recreational fees). BAR does not pay housing charges. If you live on campus, you must make payment arrangements directly with the housing office.

## Bank Loans and Electronic Processing

Federal Family Educational Loan Program (FFELP) loans include Federal Subsidized and Unsubsidized Stafford loans and the Parent Loan to Undergraduate Student (PLUS) loans. Information on these programs is outlined in the *FFELP Guide*, which explains how to apply for loans electronically. Loans processed electronically are credited to your student account and any credit balance can be transferred directly to your personal checking or savings account using Bruin Direct (see below). Note: Plus Loans can not be processed electronically. Paper checks are mailed to parents for the Plus Loan amount.

## Bruin Direct

Bruin Direct is the newest electronic process for the effective delivery of your financial aid funds. Bruin Direct offers you the option to have your refund check electronically transferred directly to your personal checking or savings account rather than waiting for refund checks to be generated and mailed to you.

With Bruin Direct, the Financial Aid office uses your financial aid funds to pay your registration fees and any outstanding debts. Any remaining funds are then forwarded to your personal checking or savings account for your access.

Bruin Direct enrollment information is available in the Student Accounting Office, B303 Murphy Hall. **Bruin Direct is not available if you selected a nonelectronic lender or if you have a PLUS loan.**

## Financial Aid Online Services

Answers to many financial aid questions can be found through the Student Affairs homepage and through an option on URSA Telephone (see "URSA").

The Financial Aid website at <http://www.saonet.ucla.edu/fa.htm> contains valuable information on all aspects of financial aid. Topics available include a financial aid calendar with deadline dates, general information about applying for, evaluating, and awarding of financial aid, university and private scholarships, federal and state grants, various loan programs, disbursement of checks, and budget adjustments and reevaluations.

## Scholarships for Undergraduate Students

The purpose of the Undergraduate Scholarship Program at UCLA is to reward academic excellence and promise and to provide assistance to students in need. A scholarship is expected to create opportunities for further academic growth and development.

Each scholarship is awarded for one academic year. A renewal of scholarship application must be submitted yearly. Students must also apply for financial aid by submitting a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Semifinalists in the Regents Scholarship competition are given preference for these awards.

The Scholarship Resource Center (SRC) helps undergraduate students search for scholarship information. The SRC, located at 233 Covell Commons, is open to all UCLA undergraduates, regardless of financial aid eligibility. The center provides referrals and serves as an information base for scholarships, fellowships, and endowments. The SRC works in conjunction with the Division of Honors and Undergraduate Programs, the Financial Aid Office, and the UCLA community.

Special features of the SRC include counseling for students in the application process, a small library of current scholarship books, a proofreading service for scholarship applications, computer access to various scholarship listings, and workshops and general information sessions. For more information, call (310) 206-2875.

## Maintaining Satisfactory Progress

Federal regulations require UCLA to establish, publish, and apply standards of Satisfactory Academic Progress for financial aid eligibility. Students who fail to meet the standards become ineligible to receive financial aid until they are in compliance with these requirements. See *Satisfactory Academic Progress Guide*, available at the Financial Aid Office, for a detailed explanation.

If your unit load is below twelve units as of the third week of class in any term, your Federal Pell Grant and Cal Grant B subsistence checks are reduced or cancelled. Increase in units after the third week of class will not result in automatic reinstatement of aid. You must contact the Financial Aid Office for information regarding an appeal. If you have been awarded a Federal Pell Grant as a full-time student and you fall below full-time status, you are billed for the difference between your original award and the actual amount to which your units entitle you. If you are dismissed or drop below half-time status (six units for undergraduates and four units for graduate students), your financial aid is cancelled, and you are billed for all awards (including loans) received.

## Withdrawal and Cancellation

Students who decide not to enroll for one or more terms must notify the Financial Aid Office, A129J Murphy Hall. Students are not entitled to receive financial aid for these terms. If you leave school without advising that office, **your financial aid is cancelled.**

When you withdraw, the refund/repayment policy prorates financial aid based on your last day of attendance. You are billed for any funds owed to the University and Federal Student Aid Programs. If you receive an administrative cancellation, all your financial aid for the affected term is canceled and you are billed for any funds received.

Additionally, any type of withdrawal may result in having to reapply for Stafford and/or PLUS loans. Contact the Financial Aid Office for addi-

Services offered by Student Loan Services include

- Distribution of nonelectronic FFELP loans
- Processing and distribution of Student Short-Term Educational Loan Program (9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays)
- Debt management sessions and loan exit interviews

## Loan Fund Distribution

Students who pick up a nonelectronic loan check must present a valid driver's license, California DMV I.D. card, or passport, and have no outstanding financial holds on their records in order to receive the check. Current registration fees and all outstanding University debts are deducted from your loan funds before the balance is distributed to you (see "Bruin Direct" in this section about direct deposit).

## Unit Requirement for Loans

According to federal regulations, undergraduate students must be enrolled in at least six units and graduate students in at least four units continuously throughout the stated loan period to receive loan funds. This information is verified before the loan is distributed to you.

**If you withdraw or carry insufficient units during the stated loan period, any remaining loan funds are returned to the lender, any remaining portion of your loan is cancelled, and you may be billed for funds you have already received.** If this happens, you must reapply for a new FFELP loan that reflects your new loan period. For more information, contact the Financial Aid Office, A129J Murphy Hall.

## Federal Family Educational Loan Program

Federal Family Educational Loan Program (FFELP) loans come from banks and are issued each term based on a student's application date. Electronic fund transfer (EFT) FFELP loans are distributed through BAR. Non-EFT FFELP loan checks are available at the beginning of each term at Student Loan Services, A227 Murphy Hall. Non-EFT FFELP loan checks are held for pick up for 30 days, then returned to the lender.

Notify Student Loan Services and your FFELP lender in writing within 10 days if you

- Drop below half-time status, withdraw from UCLA, or transfer to another school
- Change your address or telephone number, graduation date, name, and/or Social Security number (also notify Registrar's Office, either via URSA OnLine at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/> or in person at 1113 Murphy Hall)

## Debt Management Session for First-Time UCLA Borrowers

UCLA requires, first-time loan recipients to attend a debt management session **prior** to receiving loan funds. If you are a first-time borrower at UCLA, you must attend a debt management session before your loan funds are distributed to you or credited to your BAR account. ## Leaving UCLA? Schedule an Exit Interview

If you have ever received a loan from the Financial Aid Office and are about to graduate, transfer, withdraw, or take a leave of absence from UCLA, you are required to complete an exit interview with the Student Loan Services, A227 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-9864.

## Student Short-Term Educational Loans

Interest-free short-term loans are available in Student Loan Services to all registered students with sound credit histories with the office. Three types are currently available:

**Emergency.** To meet very short-term emergencies; loan amount does not exceed \$100.

**Living Expenses.** To meet specific and nonrecurring financial obligations. Employment verification is required.

**Financial Aid Advance.** To fill the gap between the Financial Aid Office award of loans and/or grants and the actual receipt of them. Loan and grant checks are collateral for this type of loan, and the student borrower authorizes Student Loan Services to endorse financial aid checks to pay for the loan.

To apply, you must be currently registered (or using the loan to register) and present a driver's license, California DMV I.D. card, or passport. The loan must be repaid on time or a \$10 late fee is assessed, the defaulted loan may be subject to further collection actions, and your future loan eligibility may be jeopardized. Past-due short-term loans must be paid with cash, money order, or cashier's check in order for you to receive University services.

## Merit-Based Awards

Merit-based awards funded by the Graduate Division take the form of stipend, fee, and/or nonresident tuition awards. To receive these awards, you must return a signed contract and necessary supporting documentation to Graduate Student Support, 1228 Murphy Hall.

## Fee Remissions

As a result of employment in an eligible academic apprentice personnel title, graduate students may receive certain fee remissions. Eligibility is determined by the following criteria:

1. Appointment(s) must be at least 25 percent time, not to exceed 50 percent time, and only under eligible title codes (see your department for specific details).
2. Work at least 25 percent time during the term.
3. Register and enroll in a minimum of eight units no later than the third week of instruction; Graduate Student Researchers (GSRs) enrolled in 12 units may qualify for a second fee remission.
4. Previous quarter's GPA must be 3.0 or better.

All eligible academic apprentice personnel receive partial fee remissions from the Office of the President; eligible GSRs receive an additional fee remission from the campus.

## Fee Deferrals

Academic apprentice personnel can obtain a Fee Deferral from the department to extend the registration fee and nonresident tuition payment deadline by approximately two months. It is your responsibility to pay back the deferral with either personal funds or a fee award credited to your account. Students who do not meet the extended deadline are charged a late fee.

## Medical Insurance Plan Premiums

The mandatory insurance premium is paid for all eligible academic apprentice personnel. **Do not waive out of health insurance** if you want the premium paid as part of your employment. To waive out of MIP, submit the MIP waiver before the original registration fee payment deadline, because a waive out cannot be reversed during the term even if you have been given a fee deferral.

## Extramural Support

The Graduate and Postdoctoral Extramural Support (GRAPES) database contains information on over 300 awards for graduate study, dissertation research, travel grants, and postdoctoral research. ## Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 includes a number of educational tax benefits that may have an impact on students and their families. The act includes the following sections that involve the University reporting information on students to the Internal Revenue Service:

**Hope Scholarship Tax Credit** (effective 1/1/98) is a nonrefundable credit equal to a maximum of \$1,500 in out-of-pocket qualified tuition and fee expenses paid by or on behalf of a student for two tax years during which the student is enrolled at least half time in the first or second year of postsecondary education leading to a recognized degree or certificate.

**Lifetime Learning Credit** (effective 7/1/98) is a nonrefundable credit equal to 20 percent of the first \$5,000 of qualified out-of-pocket tuition and fee expenses paid by or on behalf of a student enrolled in postsecondary course work leading to a recognized degree for certificate or to improved job skills.

**Student Loan Interest Deduction** (effective 1/1/98) is a deduction from income of up to \$1,000 in qualified education loan interest due and paid during the first 60 months of repayment.

# Enrollment

## URSA Telephone Enrollment

Use URSA Telephone (310-208-0425) to enroll in classes, add, drop, or exchange classes, sign on to a class wait list, change the grading basis for a class, obtain a reading of your Study List, or get instructor names. Enroll during your assigned appointment periods, which you obtain from URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine.

URSA Telephone operates Sunday 6 p.m. through Tuesday 1 a.m. and Tuesday to Saturday from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m. including holidays. See "URSA" for detailed instructions on using URSA Telephone.

## Real-Time Enrollment Counts

Log onto URSA OnLine to check current, real-time class enrollment counts and waitlist numbers. The online files are updated to reflect enrollment.

## Enrollment Worksheet

Refer to the Enrollment Worksheet on the inside back cover of this schedule. Read the directions carefully and fill out the worksheet before calling URSA Telephone.

## URSA Telephone Enrollment Appointments

Based on your class level, your undergraduate enrollment appointment, or pass, is assigned within the time and dates shown on the URSA Telephone enrollment appointment chart at the end of this section. URSA OnLine also provides appointment days and times.

**If you are a current-term degree candidate**, you must redeclare candidacy for a later term to receive enrollment appointment times.

## Graduate Student Enrollment: One-Pass System

**Law, Medicine, and Dentistry students** enroll as instructed by their respective Student Affairs Office.

**All other graduate students** eligible to enroll for the next term are randomly assigned one appointment time or "pass." You can call URSA Telephone from the beginning of your specified appointment day and time **through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes**. Do NOT wait until the deadline day to enroll, as phone lines may be busy. **You should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by the deadline** to avoid the \$50 late filing of study list fee and to avoid having to obtain instructor signatures.

## Undergraduate Student Enrollment: Two-Pass System

The two-pass system has been created to provide you and UCLA's 23,000 other undergraduates a more equal opportunity to obtain the courses you need for your premajor and major, to meet general education (GE) requirements, or to graduate.

Undergraduates, including those in priority groups, enroll on URSA Telephone during the **telephone enrollment** appointments obtained through URSA OnLine or URSA Telephone. Spaces used in each section are carefully monitored during each priority group pass. A group may not exceed 30 percent of the spaces in any section, and all groups may not exceed 50 percent of the spaces in any section. This is based on the recommendations of a joint student/faculty task force appointed in 1989 by the Committee on Educational Policy. Groups receiving priority enrollment include students in academic difficulty, Regents and Alumni Scholars, recruited scholarship recipi-

ents, L&S Honors Programs participants, athletes in NCAA sports, and students served by the Office for Students with Disabilities.

Call only as specified, or you infringe on the appointment time of other students. If you request the Enrollment function before your appointment time, you are informed of your correct appointment day and time and returned to the Student Records Menu.

Each undergraduate eligible to enroll for the next term is given two randomly assigned appointments based on the following hierarchy:

1. Students in priority groups
2. Seniors with 160 or more units
3. New and reentering students eligible for advance payment and/or enrollment
4. Seniors with less than 160 units
5. Juniors with less than 135 units
6. Sophomores with less than 90 units
7. Freshmen with less than 45 units

Changes in the appointment sequence are made only to correct an appointment based on an incorrect class level. To request an appointment change, go to 1113 Murphy Hall with a photo I.D. prior to the assigned appointment.

## Priority Pass

**If you are in a priority group** and do not enroll during your priority pass appointment period, you must wait until your first pass appointment to enroll. If you do not process your enrollment during your assigned first pass appointment period, you must wait until your second pass appointment to enroll.

## First Pass

**During your first pass, you may only enroll in 10 units.** This gives you and all other undergraduates a better chance to obtain at least two courses you need toward graduation.

## Second Pass

During your **second pass**, you can add courses up to the maximum units allowed by your college or school. **You can call from the beginning of your specified appointment day and time through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes.** This is when wait lists are eliminated and your **study list of enrolled courses becomes official. You should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by that date** to avoid the \$50 late filing of study list fee and to avoid having to obtain instructor signatures and college/school approval on an Enrollment Petition (for more details, see "Study List").

## After Second Pass Appointments Begin

After second pass appointments begin, undergraduates may

1. Use PTE # (see the "Enrollment in Restricted Classes" section below) to enroll through URSA Telephone or submit approved PTE forms for restricted or closed classes.
2. Submit approved petitions for special studies 199 courses.
3. Request enrollment in Passed/Not Passed (P/NP) courses over your eligible limit of units; you are informed by URSA Telephone if this applies to you.
4. Submit approval for an **excess unit** Study List (more than 18 units for Letters and Science/Engineering; more than 17 for Arts and Architecture/Theater, Film, and Television).

## In-Person Enrollment

Any enrollment transactions you cannot complete by URSA Telephone may be processed at 1113 Murphy Hall.



1. At any time
  - a. **Graduate students** may submit approved Permission to Enroll forms for restricted or closed classes.
  - b. **Undergraduates** may submit approved major change forms that may affect enrollment in courses restricted to particular majors.
  - c. **School of the Arts and Architecture students** may have their enrollment processed at 1100 Dickson Art Center.
2. After second pass appointments begin, undergraduates may
  - a. Use PTE # (see "Enrollment in Restricted Classes" below) to enroll through URSA Telephone or submit approved PTE forms for restricted or closed classes.
  - b. Submit approved petitions for special studies 199 courses.
  - c. Request enrollment in Passed/Not Passed (P/NP) courses over your eligible limit of units; you are informed by URSA Telephone if this applies to you.
  - d. Submit approval for an **excess unit** Study List (more than 18 units for Letters and Science/Engineering; more than 17 for Arts and Architecture/Theater, Film, and Television).

## Wait Lists

Wait lists are maintained through Friday of the second week of classes unless a department deletes them earlier. This may happen on the first day of classes for some sections, especially laboratories. Check the notes under the course listing in the *Schedule of Classes*. **Do not assume you will be added to a class** (if, for example, you are first on the wait list) or that you will be dropped from a class (if, for example, you are number 100 on the wait list). You must drop yourself **before the official study list deadline** if you do not want the class.

A wait-list position within 10 percent of enrollment capacity (for example, number five for a class of 50), means you have a good chance of being enrolled. Many students wait until after the first meeting to drop a class, so wait-list positions usually change on the first and second days of classes. You advance on a wait list as enrolled students or those ahead of you on the wait list drop the course. Sometimes departments increase the enrollment capacity of the class, which automatically enrolls additional students from the wait list. Check your wait list status on URSA before Friday of the second week of classes.

You may move **backward** on wait lists if a class is **overenrolled** through the use of PTE #s or PTE forms. For example, if you are number one on the wait list for a course that has an enrollment capacity of 100 and is not overenrolled, your position is 101/100. If four students with PTE #s enroll, your position is 105/100. You are still number one on the wait list, but four people have been added to the enrolled list. You can not be enrolled until five people drop the course and the enrolled number is less than the enrollment capacity.

## Enrollment in 199 Courses

You cannot enroll in 199 courses through URSA Telephone. To enroll, use the following procedure:

1. Department provides you with Petition for Enrollment in Special Studies 199 Course.
2. You complete Section I of the petition and obtain the signature of the instructor and the instructor's department chair.
3. The department retains the green copy of the petition; you receive the remainder of the petition (white and yellow copies).
4. You present the approved petition for enrollment processing at 1113 Murphy Hall during published dates. SOAA students submit the form at 1100 Dickson Art Center.
5. After processing the petition, Enrollment and Degree Services retains the original (white) portion and gives the yellow portion to you.

6. All petitions filed with Enrollment and Degree Services are returned to designated departmental personnel during the seventh week of the term, or as received if course is added after published deadlines.
7. When you complete the course, the instructor completes Section II, "Grade Report Form," in addition to recording the final grade on the Registrar's "Course Report."
8. The department office retains all completed 199 petitions "for an appropriate period of time."

## Enrollment in Restricted Classes

You may enroll in a restricted class if you get a five-digit PTE # through URSA Telephone or an approved PTE form. A PTE # or approved form is issued at the discretion of the instructor or department offering the class. When used with the nine-digit course ID., they guarantee enrollment through URSA Telephone or in person. Inquire at the respective departmental office regarding any internal department procedures for receiving a PTE # or approved form.

PTE #s or approved PTE forms may be issued in the following cases:

1. The department/instructor offering the class may authorize **selective enrollment** if the enrollment capacity is filled. This is at the instructor's discretion and may only be approved based on criteria established by the instructor and/or department.
2. As an exception to published **restrictions** (consent of instructor, department consent, specified majors, class levels — freshmen only, juniors or above) in the *Schedule of Classes*.
3. **Closed classes** (enrollment capacity reached). When the enrollment capacity is reached, you may choose to be on a waiting list. The computer moves you into the class as enrolled people drop out or if the department increases the enrollment capacity.

If the instructor/department gives you a PTE #, call URSA Telephone to enroll in the class. You need the nine-digit course I.D. number for this transaction.

If you receive an approved PTE form:

1. **List one class per form** and include term, your name and student I.D. number, nine-digit course I.D. number, department and catalog number, section number, units (if variable), and grading basis. Authorized approval signature is monitored by the Registrar's staff before processing. Approval is nontransferable, and alteration of a form, misrepresentation, or forgery is cause for disciplinary action by the Dean of Students.
2. **Submit** the white portion of the form for processing at 1113 Murphy Hall; the department/instructor issuing the approved form keeps the yellow copy.
3. **Receive** the white portion of the processed form as your receipt, along with a printout of your Study List.

## Enforced Requisites

Undergraduate students are prevented from enrolling in lower division L&S courses with enforced requisites (as listed in the *UCLA General Catalog* or the online *Schedule of Classes*) if those requisites have not been met. Some courses with requisites may be in warning status, which allows enrollment but informs you that the course requisite has not been met. In "Class Listings," courses with enforced requisites are notated with a Y in the ENF REQ column, located after the course title.

If you have transfer or AP credit that was not evaluated as equivalent to a specific requisite, consult the department offering the course for review of the transfer or AP credit as shown on your DPR. Decisions by the department concerning meeting required requisites are final.

## Impacted Courses: L&S Students

The College of Letters and Science designates certain lower division courses as "impacted," which refers to a few L&S courses that

1. Meet once a week and are difficult to complete if a student has not attended by the end of the second week of classes
2. Have high enrollment demand that deny qualified students enrollment because of limited resources
3. Have high instructor/student ratios, and/or
4. Involve large commitments of other resources.

Each impacted course is clearly indicated "Class Listings" by a Y in the IM (Impacted) column and an accompanying note.

You cannot drop an impacted course after the second week of a term for other than exceptionally extenuating circumstances that must be approved by the L&S Executive Committee on referral by college counseling units. Exceptionally extenuating circumstances do not include circumstances of short duration where other alternatives exist, including but not limited to a late drop of other (nonimpacted) courses or taking an Incomplete in the impacted course (see "Drop Procedures" below).

## Official Study Lists

A Study List is a record of all courses you are enrolled in for the term. A registered student's Study List of enrolled courses becomes official at midnight on Friday of the second week of classes. Each student is responsible for all courses and grading basis as listed on URSA Telephone and/or URSA OnLine and cannot receive credit for courses not listed. Errors or omissions should be corrected before your academic dean's deadline for changes by petition.

## Changes to Official Study List

### Undergraduate Students

Most undergraduates can add courses with a PTE # and drop courses with a fee on URSA Telephone through the end of the fourth week of classes (refer to Study List Changes chart later in this section). You can also make grading basis changes on URSA Telephone through the end of the sixth week of classes. Your BAR account is charged the appropriate fee per transaction. For all other changes, an Enrollment Petition (available for purchase in the school supplies section at any UCLA Store) is necessary and must be filed within the published deadlines (see "Calendar") for a requested action (for example, late registration, late study list, late add/drop/change grading basis, change units of variable-unit course).

URSA enrollment appointments end at midnight on the published deadline date.

**Student athletes** must check with their L&S counselor before attempting **any** add or drop after fourth week.

### Graduate Students

Graduate students can add, drop, or change grading basis or variable-unit courses with a fee on URSA Telephone through the end of the last day of instruction. If a course you are adding is closed or restricted, you must input a valid PTE #. Your BAR account will be charged the appropriate fee per transaction.

## Enrollment Petitions

Required approvals, which vary by college/school/division, are outlined on the Enrollment Petition form. No petition is accepted for processing enrollment without all required approval signatures. Such approvals must be CURRENT (an approval dated prior to a published deadline is not acceptable two weeks after the deadline). Enrollment

Petitions may be purchased at UCLA Stores. See the petition for processing locations.

*Changes requested after published deadlines (see "Calendar") are considered only under extraordinary circumstances by each college/school, and supportive information may be required prior to approval.*

## Drop Procedures

Dropping a course may reduce your study list below minimums required for full-time status, financial aid, the minimum progress requirement, and eligibility for residence halls and other services that require a specific enrollment status. The drop forms remind you about these requirements and consequences that may be triggered if the particular petition is processed. **However, it is your responsibility to satisfy these other requirements.**

## Dropping an Impacted Course: L&S Students Only

Impacted courses may be dropped after the second-week deadline only under extraordinary circumstances. Each impacted course is indicated by a "Y" under the IM (Impacted) column in the class listings in the midsection of this *Schedule*. The majority of courses, however, are "nonimpacted."

You have only two weeks to drop an impacted course without a notation on your transcript. **After the end of second week, should you need to request a drop of an impacted course, consult your instructor first.** The instructor of an impacted course is committed to assisting you and may advise another academic option other than dropping the impacted course (for example, taking an Incomplete if appropriate or dropping another course that is not impacted).

If dropping is advised due to exceptional or extreme circumstances (for example, a severe illness of long duration), pick up a Dropping an Impacted Course form from your College Counseling unit (honors students at Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; AAP students at AAP Counseling, 1209 Campbell Hall; athletes at the Morgan Center; all other L&S students at L&S Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall). You must explain your situation fully on the form, following its instructions carefully, and obtain a signature from the instructor. Impacted course drop requests are considered by a faculty subcommittee of the L&S Executive Committee. If approved, the dropped course appears on your transcript with a notation indicating the date and week of the term in which the drop was filed with the college.

## Dropping Nonimpacted Courses

Nonimpacted courses constitute the vast majority of courses and may be dropped on or before Friday of second week through URSA Telephone with no fee or transcript notation. These courses may be dropped during third and fourth week on URSA Telephone with no transcript notation and a \$3 per course fee. Drops after Friday of fourth week may be effected by obtaining a Late Drop of Nonimpacted Course form from your L&S College Counseling unit. The course instructor (or designee) must sign and verify that you have not taken the final exam (or completed the course in any way). Students in other schools should consult their school office for proper procedures.

## Transcript Notation for Late Drops

Processed drops of nonimpacted courses after Friday of the fourth week is recorded on your permanent undergraduate transcript. The entry records the week the course was dropped.

## Late Study Lists

Any registered student who is not officially enrolled in courses for credit as of Friday of the second week of instruction must file a **Late Study List**. Use an Enrollment Petition for this process.

There is a \$50 late fee for filing a Study List after Friday of the second week of instruction. This is charged in addition to the late payment fee (see the Late Payment in Person section in "Billing").

1. Obtain the appropriate form (undergraduate students from academic dean; graduate students from department adviser) and complete as instructed.
2. File the approved form at the processing locations noted on the Enrollment Petition form. You are given a receipt of the approved/processed Study List and are responsible for all courses and grading basis as recorded. Your BAR account is charged the \$50 late fee.

structor. Once the grade is received by the Registrar's Office, a confirmation is issued to the department and/or instructor and a \$5 fee is then charged to your BAR account. **NOTE: Fees are subject to change at any time.**

The petition and grade assigned must be on file in the Registrar's Office by the end of your next **registered** term to prevent the I grade from lapsing to an F, NP, or U. The **UCLA Report of Academic Revision** can also be used to remove Incompletes that have lapsed.

## Incomplete Grade Procedure

If you receive an Incomplete grade in a course and will be completing the requirements to remove it, do not reenroll in the course. Have the department send a **UCLA Report of Academic Revision** to the in-

Confirm that a grade has been received through URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine. Check which term the I grade was removed. If the grade is not recorded, check that your individual instructor forwarded the form with final grade and proper date of completion to the Registrar's Office.

# URSA

## University Records System Access

The University Records System Access (URSA) allows UCLA students to access their University academic records from Sunday night 6 p.m. through Tuesday 1 a.m. and Tuesday to Saturday from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m., including holidays. URSA is accessed two ways:

1. By calling **URSA Telephone** at (310) 208-0425
2. By logging onto **URSA OnLine** at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/>

Options for URSA Telephone are detailed below, while the "URSA Telephone Command Guide" in this section is for quick reference.

URSA OnLine currently does not allow for enrollment processing. It does, however, let students view and print undergraduate Degree Progress Reports (DPRs), a service that is not available on URSA Telephone. URSA OnLine features are detailed following the URSA Telephone section.

### Security

Both URSA Telephone and URSA OnLine are interactive systems with security features to insure that only you have access to your information. Access is based on your nine-digit UCLA student I.D. and a four-digit security code (provided initially on admission).

The first time you access URSA Telephone or OnLine, you are asked to change your assigned security code (personal identification number or PIN) to a four-digit number of your own choosing. At any time, you may change this to a different pin through URSA Online.

**DO NOT GIVE YOUR SECURITY CODE TO ANYONE. If you tamper with another student's enrollment or personal data, you are subject to disciplinary action, up to and including suspension.**

If the privacy of your security code has been compromised, or if you misplace your code, go to 1113 Murphy Hall with your BruinCard. Your security code is not given over the telephone unless an authorization to release your security code is on file at the Registrar's Office.

## URSA Telephone (310) 208-0425

With a touchtone phone, use URSA Telephone to access student records, get financial aid information, or change your security code. Use the Student Records Menu options to (1) **process your class enrollment** and obtain course confirmation through a reading of your Study List; (2) determine your URSA Telephone enrollment appointment time; (3) find out your grades for any completed term or your overall GPA; (4) check for outstanding holds; (5) confirm registration fee payment; and (6) update or review selected student information.

The message, "URSA is not operational at this time; call back later," means that the system is down. The down period should be only a few minutes and no more than one hour.

Access for enrollment processing is controlled by an appointment structure (see "Enrollment"). Get your appointment times through URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine. If you request the Enrollment function before your appointment time, you are informed of your correct appointment day and time and then returned to the Student Records Menu. Because you share your appointment beginning time with at least one other student, it is possible for the line to be busy when you call. If so, hang up and call back. You may call as often as you wish once your appointment period begins for each pass.

You may access URSA up to 10 years after your last term of attendance for grades, GPA, units, and holds information. If you have outstanding holds, you are informed at the beginning of your call.

When the system requests that you enter information, you are given approximately 10 seconds to make an entry and three attempts to make a correct entry, after which you are disconnected. You can enter information before the instructions are over; however, you should NOT do this until you are thoroughly familiar with the URSA Telephone system and all the messages.

A time limit is announced at the beginning of each call. If you exceed the limit, you are disconnected. If you are in the middle of processing a transaction when your time is up, the system allows you to complete it before disconnecting you.

## URSA Telephone Main Menu

After you pass the system security check (see the "Security" section above), URSA Telephone informs you that you are in the URSA Main Menu, which allows you to select the **Student Records Menu (1#)**, **Financial Aid Information (2#)**, or **Change Security Code (7#)**.

See the "URSA Telephone Command Guide" later in this section for a quick reference to the commands detailed below.

### 1# Student Records Menu

The Student Records Menu offers the following options:

#### 1# Class Enrollment

Use the Class Enrollment option to add, drop, or exchange classes or sections, put yourself on a class waitlist, request or change the optional grading basis of a course, have courses on your Study List read to you, check your wait-list position, or have instructor names spelled. You may stop any transaction (add, drop, or exchange) when the system prompts you for the course I.D. number by entering nine zeros and the # button (00000000#).

Before calling URSA Telephone, prepare for enrolling by filling out the Enrollment Worksheet on the inside back cover of this schedule. You will not have time to check I.D. numbers while on the phone, as you only have 10 seconds before the system prompts you for input.

**1# Add a Section/Class.** Press 1 and the # button to add a class, including a class with variable units, to your Study List. **For compound classes, you must begin the enrollment process with the secondary (such as, laboratory or discussion) section of the class — called the ENROLLMENT section** (see the "Course Listing Format" section in "Class Listings"). This increases the importance of secondary sections; cancellation of a section means you lose the entire class. Be sure to recheck your courses a few days before classes begin by using function 6# for a reading of your Study List and course information or checking URSA OnLine, as sections may be cancelled by departments.

If you try to ADD a course that is full and has a wait list, you are informed of the status (for example, the enrollment capacity is full and there is a wait list of XX students). You will be given options to place yourself on the wait list or to check other sections.

**2# Drop a Class.** Use this function (2#) only if you are certain you want to drop a class. Use function 3# to switch sections in which you are already enrolled/wait listed.

When you request the drop function, URSA Telephone warns you about the consequences and allows you to either stop the DROP action or continue. Enter the nine-digit I.D. number of the **enrollment section** to drop the course.

**3# Exchange Classes/Sections.** Use this function (3#) if you wish to conditionally drop a class or switch sections within a class. For example, if you are enrolled in Course A but want to be in Course B, this function allows you to check if Course B is open while still holding your space in Course A. If Course B is open, you are dropped from A and enrolled in B. If Course B is not open, you remain enrolled in A.

There are only two types of exchanges permitted:

1. Exchange a lecture section for another lecture section
2. Exchange a quiz/discussion/laboratory section only for another that is listed for the same lecture section on your Study List

URSA Telephone prompts for allowed exchanges.

If the system notifies you that the course I.D. numbers you have entered cannot be processed, you may repeat your request for another section or stop the transaction. Check the course listing in the *Schedule of Classes* and make sure you have entered the appropriate nine-digit I.D. numbers.

If the exchange is successful, the original class or section is dropped and the new one takes its place. If the new class is **compound**, URSA Telephone either prompts you for appropriate I.D. numbers or automatically enrolls you in required sections. If the transaction is not successful, you are not dropped from the previous class or section, and your Study List remains the same as it was before the attempted switch.

- 4# **Change Optional Grading Basis.** Use this function (4#) and input the nine-digit course I.D. number for the **enrollment section** to switch from a letter grade basis to one of the following:

P/NP (Passed/Not Passed) if you are an undergraduate student enrolled in at least 12 units

S/U (Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory) if you are a graduate student

When you change the grading basis, it is automatically changed for all parts of the class. For some classes, the grading basis cannot be changed, because the class can only be taken for a mandatory P/NP, a mandatory letter grade, and so forth.

**NOTE:** Undergraduates may change grading basis on URSA Telephone through Friday of the sixth week of classes and graduate students may change grading basis through the last day of instruction. No enrollment petition is needed unless college/school approval is required. Your Billing and Receivables (BAR) account is charged the appropriate fee per transaction.

- 5# **Change Variable-Unit Course Limit.** Use this function (5#) and input the nine-digit course I.D. number for the **enrollment section** to change the number of units for a variable-unit class in which you are already enrolled.

- 6# **Study List and Course Information Submenu.**

This function (6#) reads your current Study List and the class information menu. Options include

- 3# **Your Wait-list Position in a Section.** To inquire, input the nine-digit course I.D. number of the **enrollment section**; the system then informs you of your position (identifying the section number) and the enrollment capacity of the section (see "Wait Lists" in "Enrollment").
- 4# **Spell Instructor Names.** To inquire, input the nine-digit course I.D. number of the **enrollment section** for any class on your Study List; the system then spells the last name of the instructor or states that the instructor is a teaching assistant or "The Staff."
- 5# **Meeting Time and Place of a Class.** To inquire, input the nine-digit course I.D. number of the **enrollment section** and receive the following information:

 Catalog Course Number  
 Class Type  
 Section Number  
 Days/Start Time  
 Building/Room  
 Examination Code

- 7# **Use PTE Authorization Number.** Use this function to enroll in a class using the nine-digit course I.D. number and a five-digit PTE Authorization Number (PTE #) given to you by the instructor/department of a class that has restricted or closed enrollment. You may ADD a class with a PTE #, MOVE from wait-list to enrolled status, or EXCHANGE a class or secondary section. **NOTE: If you are given a PTE #, you can do all processing through URSA Telephone and do not need the paper Permission To Enroll form.**

\* **END CALL.** It is important to press the star (\*) button on the telephone keypad before hanging up, as the telephone line is then immediately available to someone else. The system gives you a sign-off message and then disconnects you.

## 2# Enrollment Appointment Times

Obtain a reading of your enrollment appointment times (first pass/second pass/priority) for a specified term using this option (see the "URSA Appointments" section in the "Enrollment"). You can also receive your exact enrollment appointment time via URSA OnLine.

## 3# Grades

Obtain readings of the following:

- 1# Term grades and courses and confirmation of any grade changes (including the replacement of an Incomplete grade in the term in which the work was completed)
- 2# Term and cumulative grade-point average (GPA)
- 3# Term unit total (that is, term units attempted and passed on a graded A+ to F basis, plus term Passed/Not Passed — P/NP — or Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory — S/U — units)
- 4# Cumulative unit total (that is, total graded units plus total P/NP or S/U units and transfer units)
- 5# Allows you to choose another term to access its grades, GPA, and term and cumulative unit totals

Information on URSA Telephone is the same as that available to the Registrar's Office staff. Grade changes and the replacement of Incomplete grades are updated daily. If grades are not available on the telephone, they have not been received from the instructor or are still being processed. All grades for a recent term should be accessible no later than two weeks after the last day of final examinations.

You may obtain a free printout of your grades for the most recent graded term at Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall, by presenting your valid BruinCard. Letters and Science undergraduates admitted since Fall Quarter 1988 may request a Degree Progress printout at any time at A316 Murphy Hall. This report provides a detailed evaluation of transfer credit, courses and grades for each completed term, degree requirements completed, and requirements still outstanding. You can view and print out your undergraduate DPR via URSA OnLine.

## 4# Holds

Obtain a reading of outstanding holds that affect your eligibility for fee assessment, enrollment, grades, transcripts, diploma, and campus services. To remove a hold and reinstate restricted services, contact the issuer of the hold. Holds information is also available on URSA OnLine.

## 5# Fees

Verify that your registration fees were received or declare nonattendance for a term.

- 1# Use this function to verify that your registration fees were received and to confirm the date they were processed. Fee payment information is also available via URSA OnLine.
- 2# Use this function if you are not planning to attend UCLA for a term (not including summer session) and your registration fees have not been paid. If you use this function, see readmission information under "Academic Policy."

## 6# Update or Review Selected Student Data

Update or review your degree expected term (undergraduates only) or allow or discontinue ethnic based mailings, and specify (one time only) your ethnic background.

1# Use this function to enter or change your **Degree Expected Term** (the term in which you expect to graduate). You can change this term freely until you have completed 160 units (172 units for Engineering students). Once you have reached the unit limit, your BAR account is charged a late fee of \$13 each time you change your degree expected term.

You can only enter the current term through Friday of second week. If you are a current-term candidate over the unit limit, you may complete the UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form at 1113 Murphy Hall.

5# Use this function to be included or excluded in **Ethnic Based Mailings** that use ethnicity as a selection criterion. Such mailings are generally approved for providing you with information regarding graduate school recruitment or other opportunities.

6# Use this function to specify your **Ethnic Background**. This information is used to monitor the University's compliance with federal and state civil rights laws. Once entered, this information cannot be changed through URSA Telephone.

## 2# Financial Aid Information

Use Financial Aid Information option to get up-to-date information regarding the status of your financial aid application, to track documents that you submitted, to check the progress of your financial aid award, and to verify the amounts of your disbursements.

## 7# Change Security Code

Use this option to change the four-digit security code, or PIN, you use to access URSA Telephone or URSA OnLine. When changing your PIN, select one that you can easily remember but is difficult for someone else to guess. You can also change your PIN via URSA OnLine.

If you forget your security code, you can obtain this information in person at 1113 Murphy Hall with proper identification. You cannot receive this information over the telephone unless an authorization to release your security code is on file in the Registrar's Office. This authorization must contain your signature and a copy of some photo identification. Authorizations may be faxed to (310) 206-4520.

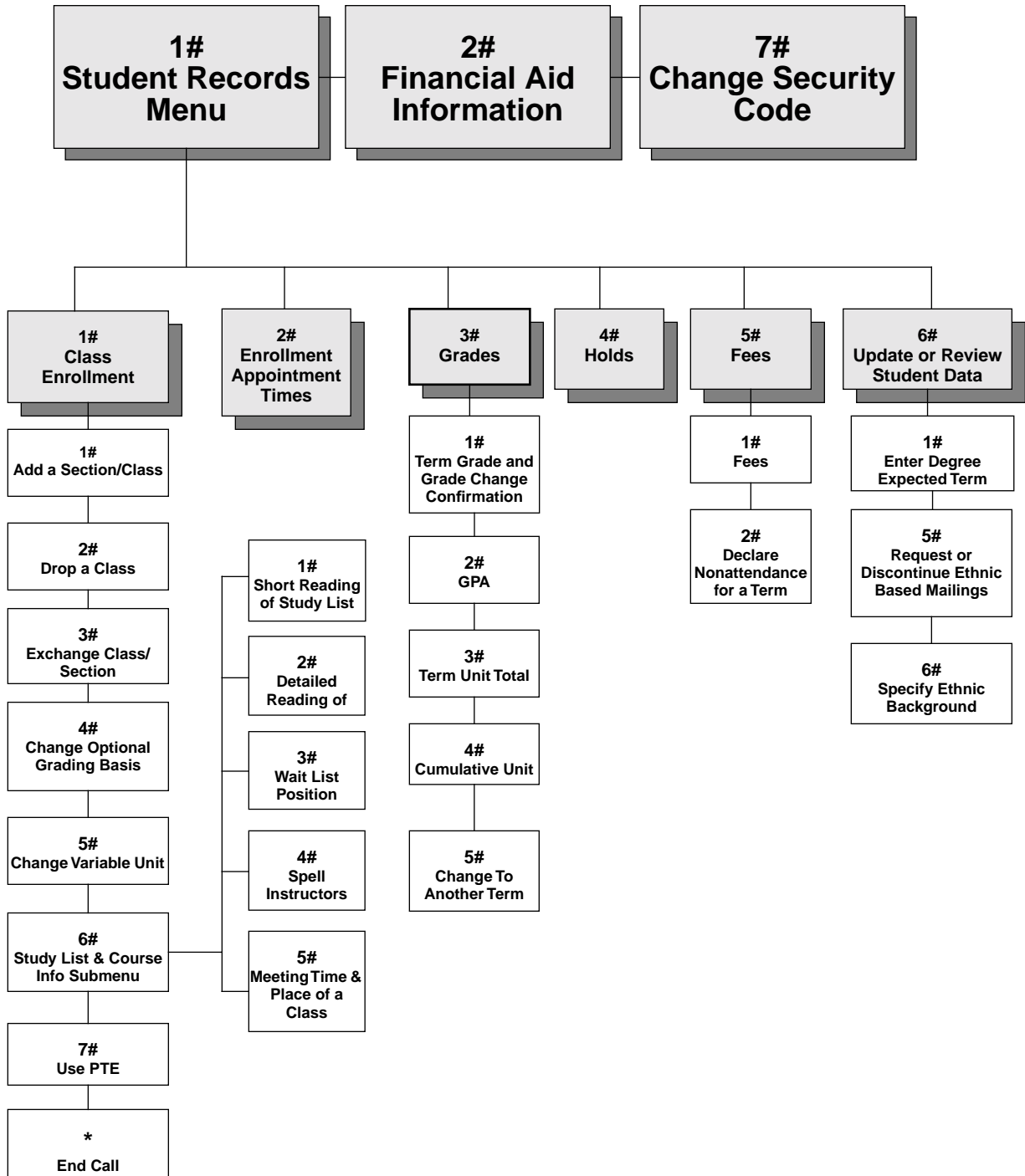

# UCLA Online

## Bruin OnLine

Bruin OnLine (BOL) gives current UCLA students, staff, and faculty access to campus network communication via the internet. Use Bruin OnLine with either your home computer and a modem or a with a "hard wired" campus workstation, and you are able to

- check class availability and enrollment in the *Schedule of Classes*
- access your student records via URSA OnLine, including your Study List and your undergraduate Degree Progress Report (see "URSA" for more on URSA OnLine)
- search the UCLA Library via ORION to see, for example, if a book you need is checked out
- browse the Calendar of Events for cultural and sporting events
- check the campus directory for phone numbers or e-mail addresses

Bruin OnLine services include dial-up access to the UCLA campus backbone network (and the Internet) using the PPP protocol at speeds up to 33.6 kbps. An e-mail account and space for you to create and publish your personal webpages are also provided.

### Accessing Bruin OnLine services

Access Bruin OnLine services from Macintosh or Windows 95/98 and Windows NT workstation computers in the following locations:

- at home via modem
- in residence hall rooms with a network adapter
- in many of the school or divisional student labs on campus (see <http://www.ucla.edu/campus/computing/labs/>)
- in the OAC computer commons (at 4328 and 4909 Math Sciences, A1-228 CHS, and 2035 Public Policy)
- in the College Library Instructional Computer Commons (CLICC), 145 Powell Library
- from a laptop or notebook computer with ethernet adapter connected to ports in the college library reading rooms or stacks, in 4328 Math Sciences, or a general assignment classroom

### Platforms and configurations

To use Bruin OnLine from your home or residence hall, we recommend the configurations below for Mac and Windows PCs. Graduate students may wish to contact their departments to find out if they have additional recommendations.

- Color monitor highly recommended (with 256 colors or more)
- Modem — 14.4K minimum speed recommended (modems capable of 33.6K must support true v.34, not just V.FAST or V.FC). For external modems, a cable capable of hardware handshaking is necessary. A modem is not needed in residence halls.
- Network adapter for LAN access (On-Campus Housing Network or departmental network).
- Windows 95 or Windows NT 4.0 with Service Pack 3 installed.

### Getting started

To use Bruin OnLine at home, purchase BOL internet access software at the UCLA Store or download it from the BOL website. Instructions on how to configure the software are available from 4328 Math Sciences.

To use BOL from a residence hall room, a network adapter, which can be purchased from the Student Technology Center, is required. Installation instructions come with the software. Additional instructions and tutorials are online and can be accessed using Bruin OnLine itself. Instructions for using Bruin OnLine in the OAC computer commons are available in the labs.

### Access for persons with disabilities

The Disabilities and Computing Program (DCP) of OAC has developed specifically adapted configurations of the Bruin OnLine software. Contact the DCP at (310) 206-7133 for more information.

## MyUCLA (<https://my.ucla.edu>)

MyUCLA provides an online gateway to personalized student information. Access the site by entering your University I.D. and the same four-digit passcode you use to access URSA OnLine. Features of the MyUCLA site include

- a personalized study list showing the classes a student is currently enrolled in and links to each class's website, as well as classes and final grades from previous quarters and, when available, enrollment information for future quarters;
- a notifications section for important announcements;
- a subscriptions section where students access information from online newspapers, journals, or magazines they select;
- links to UCLA online resources, including URSA OnLine, the *Schedule of Classes*, and *UCLA General Catalog*;
- general academic information.

Letters and Science students are able to obtain additional services including the ability to view their counseling appointments, check the status of petitions, and track their honors progress.

## Instructional Enhancement Initiative

The Instructional Enhancement Initiative, which was launched by the College of Letters and Science, is designed to

1. Provide all Letters and Science undergraduate courses, except independent studies and other similar courses, with an individual course website for faculty, teaching assistants, and enrolled students. The sites facilitate the distribution of supplementary course materials, lecture notes, homework assignments, research links, and electronic communication, including virtual office hours and class bulletin boards for interactive question and answer sessions. Instructors decide which of these online capabilities are best suited to their course websites.
2. Provide enhanced computer laboratories with expanded hours of access for student use

Students enrolled in most Letters and Science courses are assessed a course materials fee — the Instructional Enhancement Fee (see the "Miscellaneous Fees" section in "Registration"). Fee assessment through the BAR billing statement is based on actual enrollment at the end of the fourth week of the quarter.

## Newsgroups

UCLA has many newsgroups that can only be accessed from campus accounts. Bruin OnLine has its own newsgroups, for example, that post announcements about their service and where students ask questions and offer advice about computer software and hardware (ucla.bol.announce, ucla.bol.general, and ucla.bol.webpages). Other newsgroups at UCLA help computer users with specific platform questions (ucla.pc and ucla.mac), while still others post announce-

ments and offer forums for students to ask all sorts of questions or even advertise (for example, ucla.general, ucla.announce, ucla.rumor, and ucla.forsale, to name just a few). Some classes have their own newsgroups as well.

## UCLA Library Electronic Resources: Orion 2 and Melvyl©

Identify and locate UCLA Library holdings through two online information systems, both of which are accessible on- and off-campus through the Library's website at <http://www.library.ucla.edu>. ORION2, a new World Wide Web-based system, contains records for all UCLA Library holdings and other campus collections including the Archive Research and Study Center of the Film and Television Archive, Chicano Studies Research Center Library, Ethnomusicology Archive, Institute for Social Science Research Data Archives Library, and Instructional Media Library. ORION2 also identifies library item location and circulation status information. The MELVYL© System, which is also available via telnet (melvyl.ucop.edu), provides information on library holdings at all nine UC campuses and access to 25 periodical databases, several of which include article abstracts and/or full text.

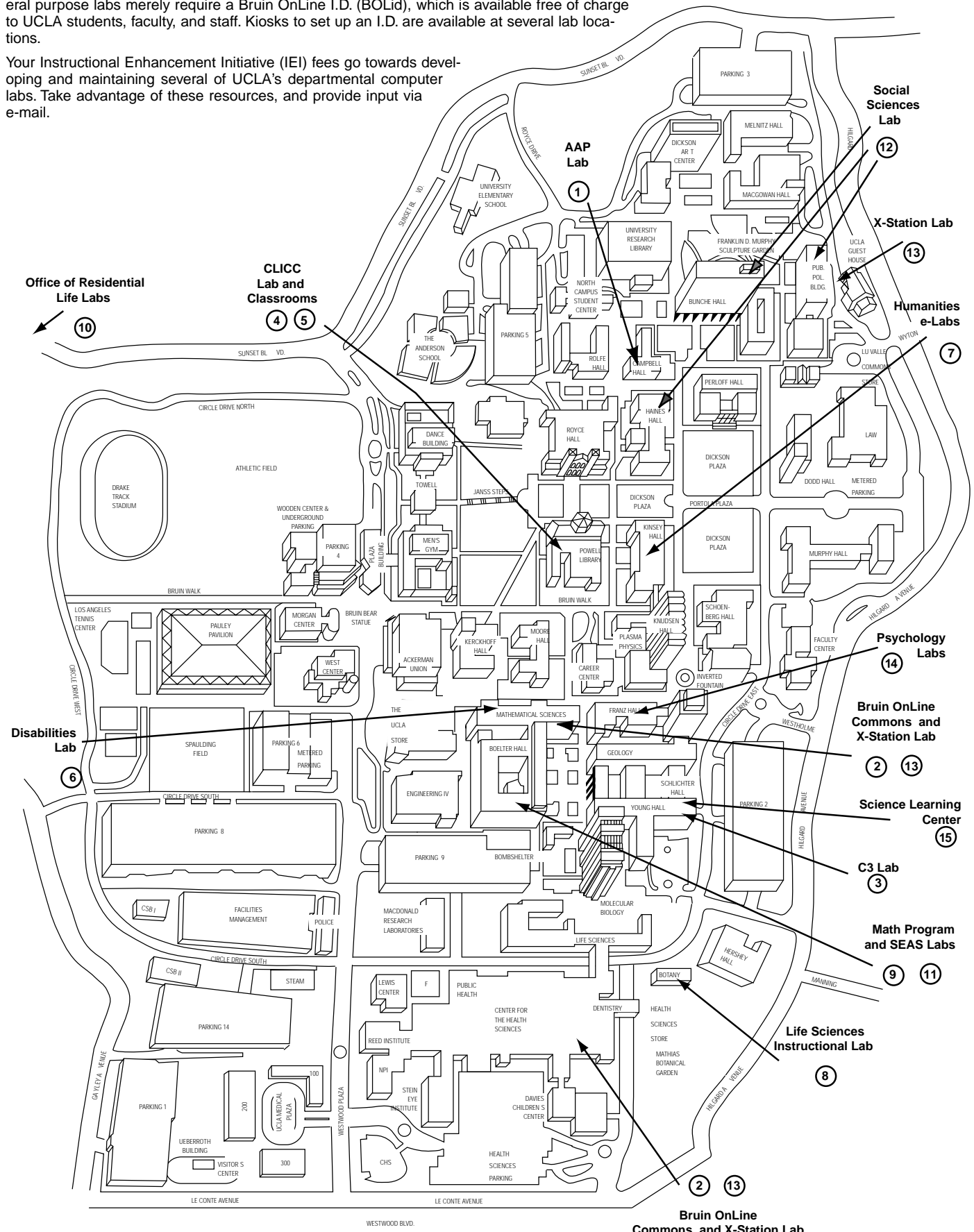
While continuing to develop and manage collections of printed and traditional non-print materials, the UCLA Library makes digital resources available for campus use through the Library website. The Web site provides access to the College Library electronic reserves; a number of electronic journals, texts, reference resources, and periodical indexes and abstracts; and several self-service circulation options, which will be phased in throughout the 1998/99 academic year. These will include viewing personal borrowing records, renewing items, placing holds on items in circulation, and requesting ORION Express and SRLF items.

## Registrar's Office Services

### Establishing Residence for Tuition Purposes

Specific criteria for establishing residence for tuition purposes is included in the Appendix of the current *UCLA General Catalog* and in the Registrar's Office Frequently Asked Questions at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/>. Inquiries regarding residence requirements must be directed to the Residence Deputy, 1113 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-3447. **No other university personnel are authorized to supply information relative to residence requirements for tuition purposes.**

**Petition for Resident Classification** is obtained and filed at 1113 Murphy Hall prior to the late registration period for the term in which you are eligible for classification from nonresident to resident status. Documentation of residence will be requested at that time.

### Name Change

To change your name on official University records, or to identify capitalization, punctuation, or accent marks (for your diploma) that computer files do not accommodate, obtain and file (no fee) the UCLA Correction or Change of Name form at Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall. Forms are available in the Murphy Hall North Lobby. A new BruinCard must be obtained at 123 Kerckhoff Hall; there is a \$15 replacement fee.

### Official Transcripts: Academic and Verification

Effective Winter 1999, official UCLA transcripts will be printed on security paper to safeguard against unauthorized duplication, alteration, and misrepresentation of the UCLA transcript. The front page of the paper is white with a background design in blue lettering, which contains a shading gradient that incorporates the safety features of the paper. A blue border with "University of California, Los Angeles" surrounds the document. The reverse of the document includes the transcript legend and details regarding authentication of the document.

Two versions of your official UCLA student record are available from Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall. These are the academic transcript and the verification transcript. Each version, as described below, has been designed to meet specific needs.

Academic Record Services provides transcripts for regular and Summer Sessions. For UCLA Extension courses, order from UCLA Extension, P.O. Box 24901, Los Angeles, CA 90024.

Transcripts are regularly \$5 per copy and can be ordered in person or by sending your requests to UCLA Registrar's Office, Attn: Transcripts, 1105 Murphy Hall, Box 951429, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1429. Forms for requesting transcripts in person are available in the Murphy Hall North Lobby.

All requests should include the name under which you were registered and your dates of attendance at UCLA, your date of birth, your social security number, your complete address and telephone number, number of copies needed, detailed mailing instructions including any special handling, and your full signature.

Transcripts can be faxed with payment of an additional fee: \$5 for domestic and \$10 for international faxes. For continuing students, fees can be billed to your BAR account. For all others, you may be billed or you may submit payment in the form of a check or money order payable to "Regents-UC."

Transcript requests are not processed if you have outstanding obligations to the University. Fees are subject to change at any time. Tran-

script ordering information is also available by calling (310) 825-3801 or by sending a message to [transcript@registrar.ucla.edu](mailto:transcript@registrar.ucla.edu).

### Academic Transcript

The academic transcript is your complete academic record, including a listing of courses you have taken, your grades, your grade-point average (GPA), and your earned UCLA degrees.

Grades for completed terms are processed immediately following the conclusion of final examinations. Complete academic transcripts are available approximately 30 working days after the last day of the term. For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. If you require earlier proof of graduation, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall. A fee may be charged for this service.

The minimum period required for processing and issuing academic transcripts for both registered and former students is three working days. Same-day processing service is available for an additional \$10 charge. To arrange for same-day processing service, contact an Academic Records Services specialist, 1134 Murphy Hall, or call (310) 825-3801.

Academic transcripts that are faxed are generally considered unofficial and may not remain confidential.

### Verification Transcript

The verification transcript is intended for registration (fee payment), enrollment status, degrees, and "good student" auto insurance certification forms completed by the Registrar's Office. Verification transcripts confirm student status after registration fees have been paid for the term. Verification of student workload is based on actual enrolled units and does not consider wait-listed units or list courses for a term.

Verification of degree can be issued after your degree has been posted to your student record approximately seven weeks after the term ends. If you require verification before your degree is posted, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall.

The fee for a verification transcript is waived if requested for loan or student aid verifications (proof of request required). Most enrollment verifications for loans and creditors, however, are processed for the University by the National Student Loan Clearinghouse. Approved by the U.S. Department of Education, the clearinghouse is a national organization that facilitates and expedites student enrollment verifications for creditors and other student service-related agencies. The clearinghouse abides by all provisions of the Family Federal Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

### Veterans Affairs and Social Security Services

The Veterans Affairs coordinator, 1113 Murphy Hall, provides information for veterans and eligible dependents about VA educational benefits and tutorial assistance; issues fee waivers to dependents of California veterans who are deceased or disabled because of service-connected injuries and who meet the income restrictions in Education Code Section 10652; and certifies student status for recipients of Social Security benefits.

## Other Student Services

### Center for Student Programming

The Center for Student Programming (CSP) helps students start a club or join an existing one and serves as the official registry for all campus organizations. CSP assists students with program and lead-

ership development and fund-raising, interprets and enforces University rules and regulations, and administers bulletin boards on campus.

## Cultural and Recreational Affairs

The Department of Cultural and Recreational Affairs coordinates recreational programming and supervises campus recreational activities and services. See <http://www.saonet.ucla.edu/recreate>.

## Dean of Students

The Office of the Dean of Students assists students with whatever needs they might have. ## Housing Services

### On-Campus Housing

Applications for on-campus housing require a \$25 nonrefundable application fee. To be eligible, students must apply by the published deadlines. Randomly assigned numbers determine the order in which they are offered assignment to on-campus housing.

If there are more applicants than spaces available, some applicants may not be offered an assignment prior to the beginning of the term for which they are applying. The Commuter Assistance-Ridesharing (CAR) Office informs students about transportation options. Many students form or join existing UCLA **carpools** or **vanpools**. More than 130 vanpools commute to UCLA from nearly 80 southern California communities. Full- and part-time riding opportunities are available, and registered two- and three-person student carpools are given top priority to receive parking (see below).

These and other commuting options, including an extensive network of public transit, are described in the *UCLA Commuter Guide* at <http://www.transportation.ucla.edu/> or at Parking and Commuter Services on the corner of Strathmore Place and Westwood Plaza (Parking Structure 8, Level 2) weekdays from 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. For more information, call (310) 794-RIDE.

### Parking Permits

Due to limited availability, parking at UCLA is offered to students who demonstrate the greatest need. Student parking permits are assigned through a need-based point system that considers class standing, commute distance, previous attendance, employment, dependent children, and professional school obligations. Students are encouraged to apply on time and follow all application and payment guidelines in order to increase their chances of receiving a permit.

When assigning parking permits to students, UCLA Parking and Commuter Services gives the highest priority to carpools. Carpool permits are guaranteed to all qualified two- and three-person student carpool groups that apply on time. Student carpools park in central campus parking areas and share a discounted permit fee. Students interested in forming a carpool who need help finding other students who live near them should call (310) 794-RIDE and ask for a free *RideGuide*. **All members of a proposed student carpool must apply in person as a group.**

Most student permits are assigned for the academic year and can be paid for annually or quarterly. Renewal forms for students paying quarterly are automatically mailed before the Winter and Spring Quarter payment due dates. Students who are not offered a parking assignment during a given term or who wish to change their parking area need to reapply the following term.

Student Parking Request forms, along with important quarterly due dates and information on how to apply for a parking permit, are available by calling (310) 825-9871 or in person weekdays from 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Parking and Commuter Services on the corner of Strathmore Place and Westwood Plaza (Parking Structure 8, Level 2).

Students with permanent disabilities who have disabled persons' placards or DMV-issued disabled persons' license plates may apply to the Office for Students with Disabilities (310-825-1501) for parking assignments and on-campus transportation assistance.

Parking permits and access cards to campus lots and structures are not transferable and may be purchased only from UCLA Parking and Commuter Services. **Resale is prohibited and subjects both buyer and seller to disciplinary action.**

## Office for Students with Disabilities

The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD), A255 Murphy Hall (voice 310-825-1501, TDD 310-206-6083, fax 310-825-9656), provides a wide range of academic support services to regularly enrolled students with documented permanent or temporary disabilities in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. Free support services include readers, note takers, sign language interpreters, Learning Disabilities Program, special parking, registration assistance, fee deferments authorized by the California Department of Rehabilitation, on-campus transportation, campus orientation and accessibility, proctor and test-taking arrangements, tutorial referral, housing assistance, support groups, workshops, special materials, adaptive equipment, and referral to the Disabilities and Computing Program. Accommodations are varied and specifically designed to meet the documented disability-related needs of each student. All contact and assistance is confidential. ## Disabilities and Computing Program

The Disabilities and Computing Program (DCP) offers consulting and training on adapted computer equipment to assist students with disabilities in their academic work. ## Ombuds Office

The Campus Ombuds Office responds to grievances or concerns from students, staff, faculty, and administrators. Acting impartially, ombudspersons may investigate unresolved grievances or facilitate the resolution of problems for which there are no established guidelines and may also, where possible and when requested by the grievant, assist in resolving an issue through mediation (including sexual harassment cases). ## Services for International Students

### Office of International Students and Scholars

The Office of International Students and Scholars (OISS) assists students with questions about immigration, employment, government regulations, financial aid, academic and administrative procedures, cultural adjustment, and personal matters. OISS is also a designated Sexual Harassment Information Center for international students and a Harassment Information Center available to all UCLA students. OISS also provides visa assistance for faculty, researchers, and post-doctoral scholars.

### Dashew International Student Center

The Dashew International Center seeks to improve student and community relationships and helps international students with language, housing, and personal concerns in addition to sponsoring cultural, educational, and social programs.

## Student Health Service

The Student Health Service (SHS) is an outpatient clinic for UCLA students. Most services are prepaid by registration fees, and students may be seen by appointment or on a walk-in basis. Core (prepaid) services include visits, most procedures, X rays, and some laboratory procedures. Noncore (fee) services, such as pharmaceuticals, injections, orthopedic devices, and some laboratory procedures, are less costly than elsewhere. If students withdraw during a school term, all SHS services continue to be available on a fee basis for the remainder of that term, effective from the date of withdrawal.

The cost of services received outside of SHS is *each student's* financial responsibility. Students are strongly encouraged to purchase supplemental medical insurance either through the UCLA-sponsored Medical Insurance Plan (see "Registration") or other plans that provide adequate coverage.

Student Health Service is in the Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center. Office hours weekdays are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. except Tuesday, when service begins at 9 a.m. Patients without appointments and patients with orthopedic or surgery appointments are seen on the first floor; Women's and Men's Clinics, social service, and internal medicine appointments are on the second floor; all other patients with appointments (including immunizations) are seen on the third floor. For emergency care when SHS is closed, students may obtain treatment at the UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room or UCLA Family Practice on a fee-for-service basis.

## Student Legal Services

Currently registered and enrolled students with legal problems can get assistance from attorneys or law students under direct supervision of attorneys, who help students solve legal problems, including those related to landlord/tenant relations, domestic relations, accident and injury problems, criminal matters, and contract and debt problems. Assistance is available only by appointment from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays in 70 Dodd Hall (310-825-9894). See <http://www.saonet.ucla.edu/slgs/>.

## Student Psychological Services

Student Psychological Services (SPS) offers short-term personal counsel and psychotherapy at two locations—4223 Math Sciences (310-825-0768) and A3-062 CHS (310-825-7985)—where psychologists, clinical social workers, and psychiatrists assist with situational stresses and emotional problems that may include problems with interpersonal relationships, academic stress, loneliness, difficult decisions, sexual issues, anxiety, depression, or other concerns affecting the personal growth of students.

The service is confidential and free to regularly enrolled students. Students are seen individually or may choose from a number of groups offered each term. Appointments are made on weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Emergency counseling is also available.

SPS is also a designated Sexual Harassment Information Center, as well as a campus Harassment Information Center, available to all UCLA students.

## UCLA BruinCard

The UCLA BruinCard is a mandatory student identification card that is used to electronically confirm student status and eligibility for services. Supportive photo identification, such as driver's license or passport, is required when the card is issued.

The primary benefit of the BruinCard is convenience. It is a versatile card that serves the following functions:

- Confirmation of student status
- I.D. card for faculty, staff, and students
- Residence halls access card
- Library card
- Recreation card
- Debit card (if activated) for purchases at all campus stores and restaurants
- AT&T calling card (if this feature is elected)
- Time-management card for departments using the Kronos system.

Students with holds from an office with which the students have an outstanding obligation (financial, academic, or administrative) may not receive services until the hold is released by the initiating office. For details on outstanding holds and initiating offices, check with URSA Telephone (310) 208-0425 or URSA OnLine.

BruinCard centers are located in 123 Kerckhoff Hal, 107 Wilshire Center, 150B Sproul Hall, weekdays 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (310) 825-2336.

To report lost or stolen cards, call (310) 206-3199.

## UCLA Career Center

The UCLA Career Center offers services and resources to help students explore academic and nonacademic career possibilities, make career decisions, obtain employment and internship leads, and develop skills for conducting a successful job search.

Services include career counseling and consulting, career resources library, graduate school planning and preparation assistance, career fairs, internship and job listings, and the BruinView™ campus Interviews. Workshops are offered on a variety of topics, including skills assessment, graduate and professional school preparation, résumé and curriculum vita writing, interviewing skills and practice, internet job search strategies, and researching corporations.

The Career Center's website provides convenient 24-hour access to BruinTraks™ listings of current full-time, part-time, seasonal, and internship positions. Students may also post their resumes online to enhance their job search.

Cyberlink™, the Career Center's on-premise computer laboratory, makes it easy to tap into a vast array of employment information during regular office hours, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays (Tuesdays until 7 p.m.).

Two branch locations – Expo Internship and Study Abroad Services, 109 Kerckhoff Hall, and Engineering and Science Career Services, 5289 Boelter Hall – offer specialized career services.

## Women's Resource Center

The Women's Resource Center offers services to all UCLA students, with special focus on women's needs.

The center presents workshops and support groups on topics, including child care, self-defense, assertiveness training, rape prevention and education, career development, single parenting, health, returning to school, and personal relationships. It also offers referrals for medical, legal, career planning, personal counseling, and other services both on and off campus. A library includes specialized publications on gender-related issues. In addition, rape services consultants (RSCs) — individuals who provide information, support, and resources for members of the UCLA community who have been

raped or sexually assaulted — can discuss options and alternatives, help identify and assist in contacting the most appropriate support services, and answer any questions that may arise. The WRC is also a designated Sexual Harassment Information Center, as well as a campus Harassment Information Center available to all UCLA students.

## UCLA Store: Textbooks and Course Materials

Textbooks and course readers for most classes are available in the **UCLA Store – Ackerman Union**, located on the A Level of Ackerman Union. For store hours, refund policies, and textbook information, call (310) 206-0790. For information on book buyback, call (310) 206-0785.

Law, management, urban planning, social welfare, public policy, architecture, art, urban design, library and information sciences, and theater, film, and television textbooks are available at the **UCLA Store – Lu Valle Commons**. On-campus UCLA Extension textbooks are also stocked there. Call (310) 825-7238 for more information.

Textbooks for medicine, dentistry, nursing, public health, and the health sciences are available at the **UCLA Store – Health Sciences**. For more information, call (310) 825-7721.

The best times to shop are on weekends, or before 10 a.m. and after 5 p.m. on weekdays. **Save your cash register receipts**, since they are required for returns or refunds. See the "Calendar" for refund deadlines.

To find out which textbooks are required for a specific class, or to print out a complete list of books for all your classes, go to the UCLA Store website, at <http://www.uclastore.ucla.edu/>, and click on the "textbooks" icon. You will need the nine-digit course I.D. number from the Schedule of Classes. Computer Store price lists and the UCLA BookZone database (for reference books, study aids, and so forth) are also available online.

Grade cards, blue books, scantron forms, and enrollment petition forms are available in the Ackerman, LuValle, and Health Sciences locations of the UCLA Store.

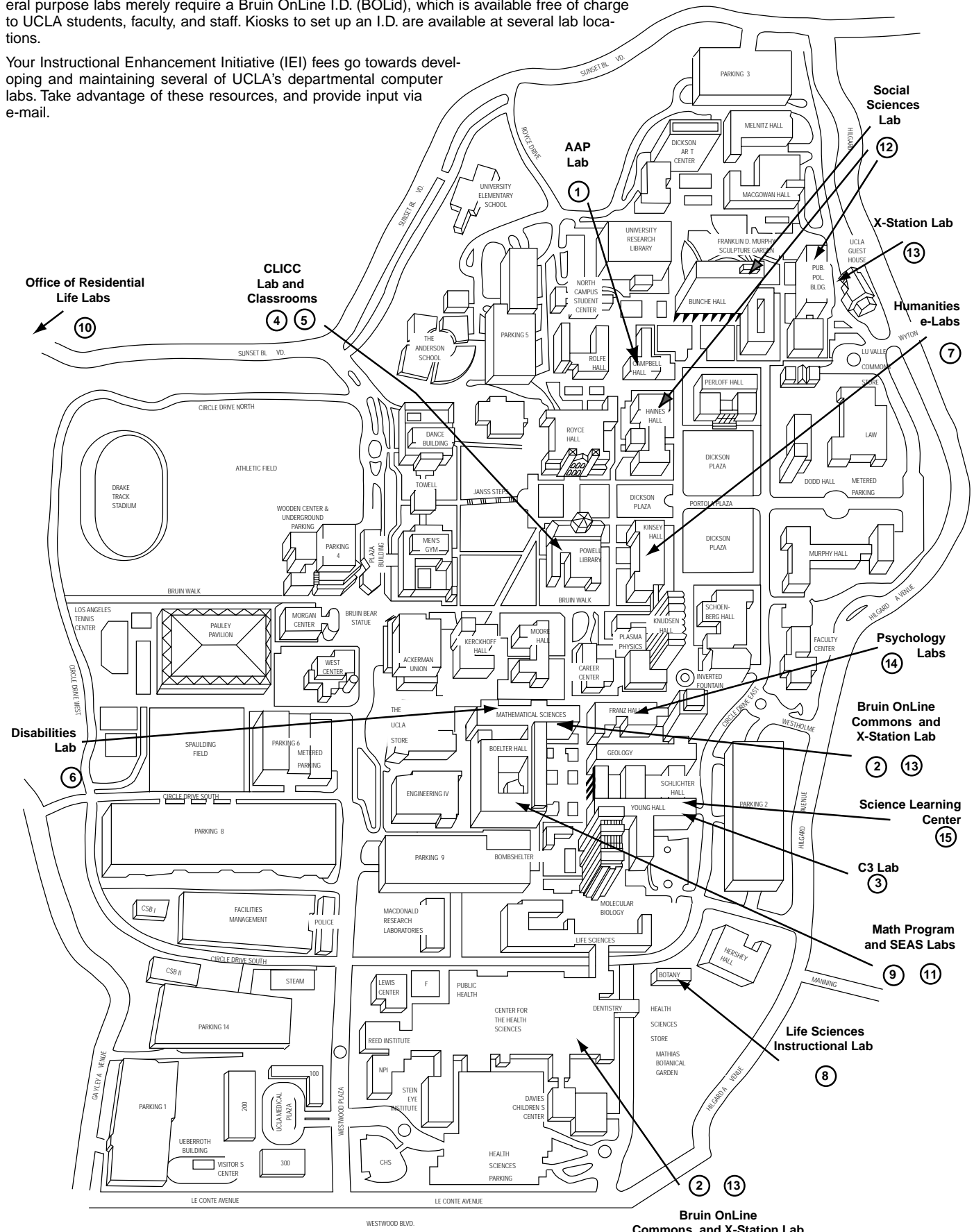

# Academic Policies

## Admission and Enrollment Policies

### Admission Applications

An application for admission must be submitted and accepted in accordance with the schedule specified in the "Calendar" section before a new student may register at the University. Preliminary information about registering is mailed to new students by their Admissions Office (Undergraduate, Graduate, Law, Medicine, or Dentistry).

### Undergraduate Readmission

#### Continuing Student: One-Term Absence

If, after completing a term (Fall, Winter, Spring), you do not register for the following term, you may return to the University the next subsequent term as a continuing student and be eligible to register and enroll in advance.

If during your one-term absence you plan to attend another institution (including **UCLA Extension**), you should discuss your plans with your college/school counselor before enrolling elsewhere. On returning to the University, you must have an official transcript mailed from the institution directly to the UCLA Undergraduate Admissions Office. Once you have requested a transcript, you must complete a Transfer Credit Evaluation Request form at the Undergraduate Admissions Office, 1147 Murphy Hall, to have your coursework evaluated.

#### Reentering Student

To return to the University after an absence of more than one term, complete an Undergraduate Application for Readmission form and file it with the Registrar's Office in accordance with deadlines published in the "Calendar" section. A nonrefundable fee of \$40 applies.

You *must* submit official transcripts from all institutions (including **UCLA Extension**) with your readmission application. **Coursework is evaluated when official transcripts are received.** The paper records of nonregistered students, including transcripts submitted for transfer credit, are retained by the Registrar's Office for five academic years after your last registered term. You must resubmit official transcripts of all work completed outside of UCLA if your records have been destroyed.

## Graduate Registration and Readmission

### Continuous Registration Policy

Graduate students are required to be either registered and enrolled or on an official leave of absence every term until their degrees are awarded. An exception to this policy exists for certain graduate students who may be eligible to pay the filing fee (see Filing Fee for Graduate Students later in this section). Failure to register or be on an official leave of absence for any term (Fall, Winter, Spring) constitutes withdrawal from the University. If you fail to register or take an official leave of absence, you will be required to apply for readmission and are held to any changes in degree program requirements.

Graduate students may request an Application for Graduate Admissions form from their department or program. A nonrefundable fee of \$40 must accompany the application when filed in accordance with deadlines published in "Calendar" section.

### Filing Fee for Graduate Students

You may be eligible to pay the filing fee (half the quarterly registration fee) in lieu of full registration fees for the term in which you expect to complete final degree requirements (master's comprehensive exami-

nation, doctoral final oral examination, filing master's thesis, or filing doctoral dissertation) and receive your degree.

Doctoral students are not eligible to pay the filing fee unless registered the immediately preceding term.

Students who pay the filing fee are not eligible for University services beyond a maximum of 12 hours of faculty and staff time required to complete the requirements listed above and are not considered in the same status as registered students.

### Reduced Nonresident Tuition for Students Advanced to Doctoral Candidacy

Nonresident graduate doctoral students who have advanced to candidacy are eligible for a 75 percent reduction in their annual nonresident tuition fee. The reduced nonresident tuition begins with the first academic term following the advancement to candidacy term. Students are eligible for reduced nonresident tuition for a maximum of three years (includes nonregistered time periods).

## SB1914 Concurrent Enrollment

Undergraduate students enrolled in any campus of the California Community Colleges, the California State University, or the University of California may enroll without formal admission in a maximum of one course per academic term at a campus of either of the other systems on a space-available basis at the discretion of the appropriate campus authorities on both campuses. Enrollment in precollegiate courses is excluded.

You are qualified to cross enroll if you have met all the following requirements:

1. Completed at least one term at UCLA as a matriculated student
2. Enrolled for a minimum of six units for the current term
3. Earned a grade-point average of 2.0 (C) for work completed
4. Paid appropriate tuition and fees at UCLA for the current term
5. Completed appropriate academic preparation as determined by the host campus
6. Are a California resident

Obtain an SB1914 Concurrent Enrollment application from your college or school. By respective college/school Academic Senate Regulation, concurrent enrollment is not permitted except in extraordinary circumstances and no credit will be given for such courses unless the approval of your UCLA college or school has been obtained by petition prior to enrollment. A \$10 administration fee is charged for each academic term such enrollment is requested.

## Visitor Status

Undergraduate students enrolled at one campus of the University of California may have the opportunity to attend another UC campus for one quarter/semester on Visitor Status. UCLA students interested in the program should obtain an application from Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall. Be sure to observe the deadlines stated on the application. All applications are reviewed by your college or school. Letters and Science students should consult the College Counseling Service, A316 Murphy Hall; students in Arts and Architecture should contact the Student Services Office, 1100 Dickson; Theater, Film, and Television students should consult the Student Services Office, 103 East Melnitz Building; Engineering students should see the Student Services Office, 6426 Boelter Hall.

## Reduced Fee Programs

Fee assessment for reduction in fees is based on total units enrolled as of Friday of the third week of classes.

Certain qualified **undergraduate** resident students, when properly approved by the dean of their college/school for enrollment in 10 units or less, may be eligible for a one-half reduction in the educational fee. **File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week of instruction.** Except for these qualified and approved part-time students, there is no reduction in the University registration, educational, student union, or Undergraduate Students Association fee. Full-time University employees may apply for a reduction of the registration and educational fees at their Campus Human Resources office. **If you receive the part-time fee reduction from your academic dean, you may not also use the UC employee reduction; you must use one or the other.**

Undergraduate nonresident students with college/school approval for enrollment in 10 units or less pay only half the nonresident tuition fee. File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week of classes for the applicable term.

For graduate students there is no reduction in the University registration, educational, nonresident tuition, student union, or Graduate Students Association fee for less than full-time programs.

## Course Materials Fees

The College of Letters and Science and certain professional schools are authorized to assess course materials fees for particular courses. Depending on the academic unit, schools either assess these fees at the start of the quarter or, based on actual enrollment at the end of the fourth week of classes. Students are responsible for ensuring that all Study List errors and omissions are corrected prior to this time. All students in a course with an approved course materials fee are assessed the fee, regardless of major. The fee is nonrefundable once assessed. Students who are approved for a "Late Add" enrollment in a course after the fourth week of classes are required to pay the course materials fee, which is billed through the BAR statement, for the entire quarter.

## Fee Waiver Requests

Late registration, processing, and penalty fees are waivable on request in writing to the office assessing the fees only if they were incurred through the fault of the University or because a student suffered sudden and debilitating injury or accident.

## Degree Policies

### Undergraduate Degrees

In order to qualify for a bachelor's degree, that is, to graduate, in any school or college at UCLA, you must earn at least a C (2.0) average in all courses taken at any University of California campus. In addition to the grade-point average requirement, you must also satisfy (1) University requirements, (2) college or school requirements, and (3) department requirements. See the *UCLA General Catalog* for details.

### Degree Checks

Anytime prior to graduation you may request a review of your degree progress. Official degree checks detail those requirements remaining to be satisfied for the completion of your bachelor's degree. The degree check process varies depending on your college or school.

**College of Letters and Science.** For students who entered UCLA in Fall Quarter 1988 and thereafter, a Degree Progress Report (DPR) serves as your degree check. The DPR is a computer-generated assessment of all requirements for your degree and the courses you have taken to fulfill them. You can view and print your DPR through URSA OnLine or order one at a college counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell; Honors Programs, A311 Mur-

phy; Letters and Science Counseling, A316 Murphy). Once you receive your DPR, study it carefully. If you have questions, review it with your departmental undergraduate adviser and/or college counselor, as appropriate.

For students who entered UCLA prior to Fall Quarter 1988, the degree check is a summary of all requirements for your degree and the courses you have taken to fulfill them. You may initiate the degree check by asking your departmental undergraduate adviser to prepare one. Your adviser fills in the parts pertaining to the lower division and upper division requirements within your major. You then take the form to your college counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell; Honors Programs, A311 Murphy; Letters and Science Counseling, A316 Murphy). During this appointment, the counselor completes the degree check by filling in college and University requirements, including the upper division requirements.

**School of the Arts and Architecture.** Degree Progress Reports are now available via URSA OnLine as well as on request from the Office of Student Services, 1100 Dickson Art Center. Students who entered UCLA/SOAA prior to Fall Quarter 1994 are issued a handwritten degree check on request and one quarter prior to graduation. DPRs are not valid for students who entered UCLA/SOAA prior to Fall Quarter 1994.

If you have questions regarding your degree requirements, or whenever you print out a DPR via URSA OnLine, please make an appointment with an adviser in the Office of Student Services. Questions regarding major requirements should be referred to your departmental counselor.

**School of Engineering and Applied Science.** Students at a high sophomore level and above must submit a "satisfied" Academic Program Proposal to the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, 6426 Boelter Hall. All Engineering students may pick up a Graduation Evaluation Report at 6426 Boelter Hall. The report outlines each category requirement for an engineering degree and the courses you have completed for each category. You may also schedule an appointment at the Office of Academic and Student Affairs to have an official degree check completed one term prior to your graduation term.

**School of Nursing.** Students may initiate a request for an updated degree check by contacting the student services coordinator in the Student Affairs Office, 2-200 Factor Building.

**School of Theater, Film, and Television.** Students entering as freshmen receive a written degree check upon achieving junior standing. Students entering as juniors receive a degree check upon entry. Students may initiate or request an updated degree check by making an appointment with their departmental counselor in the Student Services Office, 103 East Melnitz Building.

### Transfer Credit

If you plan to take courses at a college or university other than UCLA, you should first check the Articulation Agreements to determine how the courses will transfer, or consult a counselor if no Articulation Agreement exists. Articulation Agreements are lists of transferable courses from some institutions other than UCLA. To discuss Articulation Agreements, consult your college or school.

When you have completed the course(s), you must have the other institution send a copy of your transcript to the UCLA Office of Undergraduate Admissions and Relations with Schools (UARS), 1147 Murphy Hall, Box 951436, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1436. You must also go to UARS to submit a Transcript Locator Card (also known as a Transfer Credit Evaluation Request) to initiate a credit evaluation. If you are a transfer student (one who attended another college or university prior to attending UCLA), discuss transfer credit with your college or school counselor and/or your departmental adviser.

### Declaration of Candidacy

In order to initiate the steps leading to the award of a bachelor's degree, you must identify the term you expect to complete degree requirements through URSA Telephone (option 6# on the Student Records Menu). **This must be done by the time you complete 160 units (172 units for Engineering students) or a \$13 late candidacy fee will be charged to your BAR account.** The identified term

must fall within the academic year (four quarters) subsequent to the term in which you reach or expect to reach the 160- or 172-unit mark. Once you have completed 160/172 or more units, a fee will be assessed each time you change your "degree expected term" through URSA Telephone.

If you are a current-term or a past-term candidate over the unit limit, you must purchase the UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form (available from any UCLA Store) and file at 1113 Murphy Hall.

The last day to declare candidacy for the current term (with fee depending on units completed) is **Friday of the second week**. Declaration of candidacy after the second week may result in a degree award date for the following term and additional candidacy penalty fees.

You may check your degree expected term (as identified by you, the student) at any time on URSA Telephone. Your degree expected term also appears on the URSA OnLine DPR and Study List. If you still have questions about your degree candidacy status, inquire as follows: Letters and Science at 1113 Murphy Hall; Arts and Architecture/Theater, Film, and Television/Engineering/Nursing at your respective school office. A photo I.D. is required for this service. Declaring candidacy is NOT a guarantee of graduation. **Current term candidates are not assigned enrollment appointments for the following term.**

### In Absentia Graduation

If you intend to complete degree requirements as a nonregistered student (take a course through UCLA Extension or at another institution, remove an Incomplete grade, and so on), you must file a request to graduate "in absentia" with your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall by the second-week candidacy deadline. Students graduating "in absentia" are assessed the undergraduate in absentia degree service fee in addition to the declaration of candidacy fee.

### Minors

L&S students must petition to enter a minor through the department/office administering the program. School of Arts and Architecture, Theater Film and Television, and Nursing students must also obtain the approval of their school. Students in the School of Engineering and Applied Science may not be admitted to minors. The last day to obtain the required approval(s) is Friday of the second week of your degree expected term. Late entry to a minor may result in a degree award date for the following term.

Satisfactory completion of the requirements for a minor is reflected on the final transcript and diploma.

### Final Degree Audits and Graduation

Degree auditors in the Registrar's Office for Letters and Science students (1100 Dickson Art Center for Arts and Architecture students, 6426 Boelter Hall for Engineering students, 2-200 Factor Building for Nursing students, and 103 East Melnitz Building for Theater, Film, and Television students) are responsible for verifying each candidate's eligibility for a bachelor's degree. Your degree auditor has information pertaining to your graduation only if you have declared candidacy and completed 160 quarter units (172 units for Engineering students).

During your graduating term, inform your degree auditor of any changes to requirements for your degree (such as grade changes, petitions for substitutions or exemptions, or transfer credit). If your graduation eligibility cannot be verified, your degree auditor notifies you of any requirements still outstanding and any other problems in completing your degree.

Degree auditor telephone numbers are listed in the "Student Services Guide" in "Student Services." Contact your degree auditor only if you have questions or concerns about your degree audit. Do not call your degree auditor with questions regarding Commencement ceremonies.

For information on graduation ceremony procedures, contact your college or school. Your major department may also have information regarding awards and receptions.

If you request through URSA OnLine that no public information, including your name, be released, your name will not appear in the program booklet for Commencement ceremonies. You may check and/or change your privacy release status at any time on URSA OnLine (during operating hours; see "URSA" section for more details).

## Honors

### Honors at Graduation

Your college or school awards honors according to your overall GPA at graduation; these honors are reflected on official transcripts and your diploma. **To be eligible you must have completed at least 90 (98 for the School of Nursing) University of California units for a letter grade.** The levels of honors are *summa cum laude*, *magna cum laude*, and *cum laude*. The minimum GPA requirements for the 1998-99 academic year are as follows:

- **School of the Arts and Architecture:** 3.851 for *summa cum laude*, 3.797 for *magna cum laude*, 3.700 for *cum laude*
- **College of Letters and Science/School of Nursing:** 3.810 for *summa cum laude*, 3.706 for *magna cum laude*, 3.545 for *cum laude*
- **School of Engineering and Applied Science:** Contact the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, 6426 Boelter Hall, for specific information.
- **School of Theater, Film, and Television:** 3.844 for *summa cum laude*, 3.800 for *magna cum laude*, 3.687 for *cum laude*

To inquire about these requirements, which are subject to yearly change and other eligibility restrictions, contact your college or school.

### Departmental Honors

Some departments in the College of Letters and Science award honors to graduates of their programs which are reflected on official transcripts and the diploma. To inquire about the availability of these honors, consult your department office.

## Tips For Graduating Seniors

20. Make sure that your degree expected term is correct by using URSA Telephone (option 6# on the Student Records Menu). Your degree expected term also appears on the URSA OnLine Degree Progress Report (DPR) and Study List. If your degree expected term is incorrect, change it via URSA Telephone or by filing a UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form (available for purchase in the school supplies section at any UCLA Store) at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of your last quarter.
21. Check your URSA OnLine Degree Progress Report/Grade Report during your final term to make sure that it reflects the correct major(s), minor(s), and specialization(s). If any information is in error, contact the appropriate office or your degree auditor.
22. If you are finishing your degree requirements without being enrolled at UCLA in your final term (for example, you are removing Incomplete grades, adding or dropping courses, attending another institution), you must file a request to graduate "in absentia" at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of your degree expected term.
23. If you are completing course work at another institution, including UCLA Extension, your official transcripts (with grades) must be received by your degree auditor in the Registrar's Office no later than three weeks after the end of your degree expected term.
24. Students completing their work in Spring Quarter through the Education Abroad Program should declare for Summer graduation. Make sure that you have checked with your Honors counselor and your major department regarding any necessary petitions before you go abroad.
25. Students must satisfy all outstanding requirements before graduating. Any petitions to amend your records must be filed no later than the last day of your degree expected term.
26. In your final term, be sure to keep the Registrar's Office informed

of changes in your mailing address. An address change can be initiated on URSA OnLine, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or on your monthly BAR statement. If you are planning to move at the end of your degree expected term and will not have access to URSA OnLine, you should file an address change, identifying a future mailing address and effective date, before leaving.

27. Upon degree conferral, your undergraduate record is closed. You may not graduate in one term and then retroactively add majors, minors, or specializations or add and drop courses, and so forth.
28. The name on your records is the name that appears on your diploma. Submit name changes to Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall, by the last day of your degree expected term in order to be reflected on your diploma. Inform the Registrar's Office of any special accents or punctuation in your name that you would like to have reflected on your diploma.

### Master's Degrees

If you expect to complete your master's degree requirements, you should submit an Advancement to Candidacy form to your department no later than the Friday of the second week of classes. See the "Calendar" section for deadline dates.

After you complete all course requirements and the comprehensive examination or the thesis, the Registrar's Office reviews your courses and grades in order to confirm the awarding of your degree. Once the process is completed (approximately six weeks after the end of the term), your degree is recorded on your record and appears on any official transcript that you order.

In your final term, keep the Registrar's Office informed of changes in your address. An address change can be initiated on URSA OnLine, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or on your monthly BAR statement.

### Transcripts/Diplomas

For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. If you require earlier proof of graduation, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall and request a certificate of completion. The first certificate of completion is free of charge. A \$5 fee is charged to your BAR account for each additional copy. An additional \$21 processing fee may be assessed if

1. The request for a certificate is made before grades are posted for the term, and
2. The auditor must take special action to verify a grade or grades, expedite a transfer credit evaluation, or obtain other documentation necessary to clear you for the degree

Diplomas for both undergraduate and graduate students are available approximately three to four months after the degree award date. Information about obtaining your diploma in person (no fee) or by mail (with fee) is sent to your mailing address approximately seven weeks after the end of your final term. To expedite receipt of your diploma, you are encouraged to return the diploma mailer form and remit the mailing fee. A diploma hot line with current recorded diploma information (310-825-8883) is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day. The Registrar's Office retains diplomas for five years from graduation date.

To be reflected on your diploma, name changes must be submitted to Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall, by the last day of your degree expected term. Students submitting name changes after that date must request a replacement diploma at 1113 Murphy Hall. The special order diploma fee is assessed.

If your original diploma is destroyed, a duplicate may be ordered from the Registrar's Office, Diploma Reorder, 1113 Murphy Hall. There is a fee for the replacement diploma, which bears a reissue date and the signatures of the current officials of the state and University.

## Class Levels

Your class level is based on completed and any in-progress units. If you are an undergraduate student, your level determines the URSA Telephone enrollment appointment you are assigned (obtainable through URSA OnLine or URSA Telephone). If you believe the appointment you are assigned reflects an incorrect classification, inquire at 1113 Murphy Hall concerning your level.

**7A. Urban Poverty and Public Policy in the U.S.** Lecture, four hours; discussion, one hour. Focus on social welfare in the U.S., providing historical overview of poverty and the social programs that have attempted to deal with it and addressing current debate on the subject. P/NP or letter grading. J. Vigil

**7B. Urban Poverty and Public Policy in the U.S.** Optional fieldwork and tutorial. Enforced corequisite: course 7A. Instructor consent. Field studies in social policy. P/NP or letter grading. J. Vigil

**21. Rise and Fall of Modernism.** (6 units) Seminar, three hours; writing seminar, two hours. Study of early and middle 20th-century's attempt to construct significance in a general climate of disillusionment by way of literature, literary criticism, and other intellectual movements. P/NP or letter grading. R. Creese

**37A. Ethnicity, Social Class, and Social Mobility in the U.S. and Other Societies.** Seminar, three hours; outside study, nine hours. Study of the U.S. and other nations in terms of social class, social mobility, ethnicity, and absorption of immigrants, with emphasis on manipulation and analysis of data sets from census and survey data provided through instructional software. P/NP or letter grading. W. Mason

**45. State, Nation, and Nationalism in Modern and Contemporary Europe.** (Formerly numbered M115.) Seminar, four hours; outside study, eight hours. Department consent. Examination of state, nation, and nationalism in Europe in theoretical, comparative, and historical perspective. P/NP or letter grading. Staff

**54. Human Lives: Psychocultural Perspective.** Seminar, three hours; outside study, nine hours. Examination of human life course in psychocultural perspective, following observations of Kluckhohn and Murray, including investigations of (1) psychobiological underpinnings of human life, (2) human life as shaped by social and cultural processes, and (3) humanistic perspective defining uniqueness. P/NP or letter grading. D. Hollan

**62. Community and Self-Interest in History of American Culture.** (6 units) Lecture, four hours; discussion, one hour. Exploration of historical origins of the frequently contradictory values which inform American thought and culture: hierarchy and equality, institutional constraints and voluntarism, collective sense of mission and belief in the autonomous individual. P/NP or letter grading. R. Bloch

**71. History through Clothes.** (Not the same as course 71 prior to Fall Quarter 1998.) Seminar, three hours; outside study, nine hours. Exploration of what clothes mean and what they tell us about life in the past, including historical constructions of sexual, social, and political identity. Focus on clothes of Western Europe, especially those of France, with study of clothes in other parts of the world included. P/NP or letter grading. K. Norberg

**73. Elementary Particles in the Universe.** Lecture, two hours; discussion, 90 minutes. No special mathematical knowledge required. Examination of elementary particle physics, including status of its current study in laboratories around the world and its role in assessing the early evolution of the universe. P/NP or letter grading. D. Cline

**82. Community and Labor Development from Ground Up.** Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour; outside study, eight hours. Introduction to practical applications of community development and outreach efforts in Los Angeles area, with projects from Community Outreach Partnership Center within School of Public Policy and Social Research. P/NP or letter grading. J. Leavitt

**92. Genes, Genomics, and Internet.** (Not the same as course 92 prior to Fall Quarter 1998.) Lecture, two hours; computer laboratory, three hours; outside study, seven hours. New science of genomics (computer analysis of genetic information), dealing with issues related to basic genetics, medicine, biotechnology, evolution, information technology, and their societal impact. P/NP or letter grading. D. Nierlich

**110. Marxist and Post-Marxist Approaches to Cultural Studies.** Seminar, four hours; outside study, eight hours. Examination of Marxist and post-Marxist approaches to study of culture, including classic texts, theoretical and empirical works, and the Marxist roots of post-modernism. P/NP or letter grading. R. Emigh

**111. Stress and Coping.** (Formerly numbered 93.) Seminar, four hours; outside study, eight hours. Limited to juniors/seniors. Examination of research and theory on stress and coping, with emphasis on physical and mental consequences of stress and moderators of both social support and personality in coping strategies. P/NP or letter grading. C. Dunkel-Schetter

**112. Inner and Outer Worlds of Children: Perspectives on Social Policies toward Children and Schooling.** Seminar, three hours; outside study, nine hours. Study of two important components of schooling and parenting: (1) preparation of students for outer world of work, academic attainment, and placement in society and (2) their preparation for relationship they have with themselves. Critique of social policies in light of these observations. P/NP or letter grading. J. Bruno

**114. Darwin and *The Origin of Species*.** Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour; outside study, eight hours. Reading of Darwin's *The Origin of Species* in original text, then using it as springboard to investigate history of his period, what influenced him, and how future scientists have used him. P/NP or letter grading. A. Gibson

# Distance Learning at UCLA

UCLA students and faculty may participate in distance learning courses with other UC campuses. Each distance learning course combines an expert instructor, a rich subject area, and interaction between students from one or more locations to provide a learning experience based on sound pedagogy and state-of-the-art technologies. Instruction is supported by electronic communication, site visits by instructors, and video conferencing with instructors and fellow students.

Distance learning classrooms are in 62-073 Center for the Health Sciences (CHS) and 285 Powell Library. The CHS facility houses a 40-seat classroom. Powell Library offers a comfortable meeting room for small classes or research projects. Instructors and students have the flexibility of media classrooms and real-time interaction with remote sites via the UC Videoconferencing Network. UCLA students can see and be seen by a number of remote class sites at once while instruction is provided from UCLA or other campuses. At press time, no distance learning courses are scheduled for Fall Quarter 1998.

**98J. Legal Education and Legal Rhetoric.** Seminar, three hours; outside study, nine hours. Preparation: satisfaction of Subject A requirement. Historical and critical examination of purposes, practices, and effect on society of American law schools and allied institutions, designed for students thinking about law school or who just want to ponder the meaning of "education." K. Graham

## Management

**98. Management Strategies in a Changing World.** Seminar, three hours. Preparation: satisfaction of Subject A requirement. Requisite: Economics 1. Environment in which managers function has become far more complex. Identification of challenges to management as we approach the 21st century, using case method approach to investigate how social sciences disciplines have provided managers with theories and insights that lead toward successful management strategies. T. Andersen

## Psychiatry and Biobehavioral Sciences

**98B. Madness in the Enlightenment: Care and Cure of Mental Illness in the Age of Reason.** Seminar, four hours; outside study, eight hours. Preparation: satisfaction of Subject A requirement. Exploration of writings of physicians and reformers of the Enlightenment who studied the mentally ill, treated them, and recorded their theories, findings, and recommendations between ca. 1750 and 1850. Topics include impact of "Enlightened" thought on aspects as diverse as hospital architecture, patient management, and legal concepts of insanity. Consideration of seminar theme in context of social, intellectual, and cultural history of the time; comparative study includes Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, and the U.S. D. Weiner

**98D. Violence in America.** Seminar, three hours. Preparation: satisfaction of Subject A requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Survey of scope and variety of violence in the U.S., including comparisons with other developed countries. Epidemiology of various life-threatening behaviors; consideration of possible causes and potential approaches to reduction, intervention, and prevention of both interpersonal and collective violence. **98C. Planning and Designing for Living Environments.** Seminar, four hours; outside study, eight hours. Preparation: satisfaction of Subject A requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Actual design of one's ideal home, design for various client groups with different social and psychological needs. P. Kamnitzer



**SEC — SECTION NUMBER**

A course may have multiple class types that must be taken together, such as lecture and discussion or lecture and laboratory. These class types are linked and are identified by the sequence printed and numbering schemes below:

- Primary (lecture, seminar) sections are numbered sequentially (1-99). If a course has secondary sections belonging to a specific primary section (i.e., a compound class), they are numbered with the corresponding primary section number followed by a letter (A to Z). For example, for Chem 11A lecture section 1, you must choose from discussion sections 1A to 1Z. The class is listed as:

- Any section type that may be associated with several other section types is indicated by the section number prefixed with a capital M. Combinations include
  - A course with secondary (discussion, laboratory, quiz) sections associated with any of several primary sections (e.g., Chinese 2).
  - A course with multiple primary (lecture) sections and multiple secondary (both laboratory and discussion required) sections, with the laboratory section associated with any of the primary sections, such as Physics 6. These courses may have text which identifies the section type (lecture, laboratory, discussion), which is the ENROLLMENT SECTION.

**FEE — MATERIALS USE FEE**

The Materials Use Fee is assessed in addition to term fees for each course that you are enrolled in as of the fourth week of classes. Multiple-part class series (such as lecture, lab, and discussion), list the fee with the primary section only. It covers the price of materials and supplies used in the course and appears on your BAR statement.

Courses begin and end at the time listed. Minimum class meeting time is 50 minutes. Sometimes sections have more than one meeting time, which are listed on separate lines.

**BUILDING/ROOM**

The meeting location of a section is indicated by the building name abbreviation followed by the room number. Multiple meeting locations are listed on separate lines.

**INSTRUCTOR**

The faculty member responsible for a course is listed with last name and first initial. "The Staff" indicates an instructor was not assigned as of publication. URSA Telephone spells out instructors' names.

**ENRL CAP — ENROLLMENT CAPACITY**

Enrollment capacity indicates the number of students allowed to enroll in the section and is subject to departmental change. When you

attempt to enroll and the capacity is full, you are informed of the wait-list size and your possible wait-list position.

**XC — EXAMINATION CODE**

The code number indicates the examination period for the course final, which is generally based on the meeting time of the lecture section (see "Final Examinations" later in this section). Examination code information is available through URSA Telephone. Be sure to check your examination codes prior to finals week.

Do not enroll in courses that have conflicting meeting times as this creates a conflict in examination times. You must discuss any conflict with both instructors and may have to change sections or drop the course to avoid the conflict. Faculty members may use their discretion to establish ground rules for attendance, missed examinations, late term papers, or any other means of evaluation for the course.

**CR TP — CREDIT TYPE**

Credit type is indicated by the following grading detail codes:

- G — Letter grade only
- PN — Passed/Not Passed
- SU — Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory
- T1, T2, T3, T4 — A two-, three-, or four-term course (In Progress) in which no credit is granted until the completion of the series.
- TP — A multiterm course with a final grade of Passed or Not Passed.
- TS — A multiterm course with a final grade of Satisfactory or Unsatisfactory.

**UNITS**

Unit value is the workload credit given for a course. It is generally the same as credit toward a degree, except that some courses, such as English A, AP, 2P, 3P, may have less degree credit and/or no credit toward a degree (check the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*). **The unit value of a multiple-part class series is listed with the primary section.**

**RESTRICT — RESTRICTIONS**

Course restrictions **print on the line following the section entry when enrollment is restricted to certain designations** of students:

- Department Consent or Instructor Consent.** A PTE # or an approved PTE form is required. **NOTE:** Consent of department or instructor is no longer listed in the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*. Such a restriction is subject to change by individual instructors and is only noted in the *Schedule of Classes*.
- Level.** Only students as indicated by the class level may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE # or an approved PTE form is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Levels are indicated as follows:  
 FR — Freshmen only  
 SO — Sophomores and above  
 JR — Juniors and above  
 SR — Seniors and above  
 GR — Graduate students only  
 See "Class Levels" in the "Academic Policies" section for unit breakdown for each level.
- College and/or Major.** Only students with the noted college and/or major(s) may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE # or an approved PTE form is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Thus, if a restriction reads "MATH/APP, ECON BUSINESS, BUS-ECON," the course is restricted to the specified majors.

## Final Examination Policies

Final examinations, unless otherwise announced by the instructor, are held in the same room as class meetings. Examination codes are listed for each course in the print and online editions of the *Schedule of Classes*, in the Study List selections of URSA Telephone and URSA OnLine, and on the printouts of updates that are available in the forms area counter next to 1104 Murphy Hall.

An instructor's method of evaluation must be announced at the beginning of the course. Final written examinations may not exceed three hours' duration and are given only at the times and places established and published by the department chair and the Registrar's Office (Senate Regulation A-332A). No student shall be excused from assigned final examinations except as provided in the following paragraphs.

### Policy on Alternate Examination Dates

In compliance with Section 92640(a) of the California Education Code, the University must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. This requirement does not apply in the event that administering the test or examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably be avoided.

Accommodation for alternate examination dates are worked out directly and on an individual basis between the student and the faculty member involved.

1. In general, students should make such requests of the instructor during the first two weeks of any given academic term, or as soon as possible after a particular examination date is announced by the instructor.
2. Students unable to reach a satisfactory arrangement with their instructor should contact the Campus Ombuds Office, 1172 Career Center, or the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall, for assistance.
3. Instructors who have questions or who wish to verify the nature of the religious event or practice involved should contact the Campus Ombuds Office or the Office of the Dean of Students for assistance.

This policy has been reviewed and approved by the Academic Senate Undergraduate Council. Faculty members should remember that while it is fully in their discretion to make arrangements with individual students for alternate examination times, including final examinations, faculty members must conduct the scheduled final examination for the class as a whole at the times and places established by the department chair and the Registrar's Office.

Chinese

All undergraduate courses, except independent studies and other similar courses without webpages, are subject to the Instructional Enhancement Fee. See Course Materials Fees under "Miscellaneous Fees" in the "Registration" section.

Students who can speak some Mandarin, can read and write some characters, and intend to enroll in Chinese 1-3R in 1996-97 must take the Elementary Level Placement Test (a 60-minute written exam followed by a 5-minute interview).

IF YOU CANNOT READ CHINESE CHARACTERS, DO NOT TAKE THE TEST.

Students who pass the Elementary Level Placement Test will have fulfilled the one-year foreign language requirement. Those who do not pass will be placed in Chinese 1, 1A, 2, 2A, 3, 3R or according to their scores.

There are no official sign-ups for the test; just show up at the correct time and place and bring your UCLA ID and proof of enrollment. The placement test will be given on Monday, January 11, 1999, 4-6 p.m., in Bunche 2209A.

Students who did not take elementary Chinese courses (1, 1A, 2, 2A, 3, 3R) at UCLA but wish to enroll in intermediate Chinese (4-6R) should take the Intermediate Level Test (a 60-minute written exam followed by a 5-minute oral interview).

Students who pass the test will meet two years of the foreign language requirement. Those who do not pass the test will be placed in Chinese 4, 4A, 5, 5A, 6, 6R according to their scores.

The Second Year Placement Test will be given on Monday, January 11, 1999, 4-6 p.m., in Bunche 1209B.

Enrollment in French 1 through 6 is contingent on proper placement, as determined by the results of the departmental placement exam to be given on November 11, 1998, from 4-6 p.m., in 220 Haines Hall.

1) Students with one or more years of high school French MUST present a placement exam score on the first day of class.

2) Students who have taken the AP exam and received a score of 3 or higher need not take the departmental placement exam, but should consult the UCLA General Catalog for credit equivalencies.

3) Students who have never had high school French may pre-enroll in French 1 without taking the placement exam, but should consult the UCLA General Catalog for credit equivalencies.

4) Transfer students who have had French at another college should check their degree progress report for credit equivalencies granted on admission (see counselors at A316 Murphy Hall or call 825-1687).

For those who miss the placement exam on November 11, it will be offered again ONCE on January 11, 1999, 4-6 p.m., in 190 Royce Hall. After that date, the next exam will be offered for Spring 1999 enrollment.

## Student Conduct Policies

Students are members of both society and the academic community with attendant rights and responsibilities. Students are expected to comply with the general law, University policies, and campus regulations.

### A. Jurisdiction

The University shall have jurisdiction over student conduct that occurs on University property, or in connection with official University functions whether on or off University property. Although the University will not routinely invoke its disciplinary processes over student conduct that occurs off campus except in connection with an official University function, the University shall have discretion to exercise jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus and that would violate student conduct and discipline policies or regulations if the conduct had occurred on campus when:

1. The alleged misconduct indicates the student poses a threat to the safety or security of any member(s) of the University community; or
2. The alleged misconduct involves academic work or the forgery, alteration, misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification.

Specifically, the University may choose to exercise jurisdiction over off-campus incidents under section (1) above where the alleged misconduct involves:

- a. Physical abuse, including but not limited to, rape, sexual assault, sex offenses, and other physical assault; threats of violence; or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person;
- b. Stalking (as defined in Section 102.10 of the University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students);
- c. Sexual harassment (as defined in Section 102.09 of the University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students);
- d. Hazing or any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a campus organization or any activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization which causes, or is likely to cause, bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm to any student or other person.

In determining whether or not to exercise off-campus jurisdiction in cases under section (1) above, the University will consider the seriousness of the alleged misconduct; whether the alleged victim is a member of the campus community; the ability of the University to gather evidence, including the testimony of witnesses; or whether the off-campus conduct is part of a series of actions that occurred both on and off campus.

This section is intended only to provide guidance for the exercise of discretion by the University in invoking its jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus. It may not be relied upon by any student charged under this section to create any rights, substantive or procedural, or as a basis for a challenge to the exercise of the University's jurisdiction.

### B. Grounds for Discipline

The Chancellor may impose discipline for violation of, or an attempt to violate any University policies or campus regulations. The lack of intent to commit a violation is not a factor in determining if a violation occurred; however, the lack of intent may be considered a mitigating factor in determining the appropriate sanction if it has been determined that a violation has occurred. Violations or attempted violations include, but are not limited to, the following types of misconduct (note that the following section numbers 102.01 through 102.25 are adapted from the University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students):

### C. Types of Misconduct

**102.01: Academic Dishonesty.** All forms of academic misconduct, including but not limited to, cheating, fabrication, plagiarism, or facilitating academic dishonesty.

For the purposes of this Code, the following definitions apply:

**102.01a: Cheating.** Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the use of unauthorized materials, information or study aids in any academic exercise; or, helping another student commit an act of academic fraud; or, the failure to observe the expressed procedures or instructions of an academic exercise, e.g., examination instructions regarding alternate seating or conversation during an examination.

**102.01b: Fabrication.** Fabrication includes, but is not limited to, falsification or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise.

**102.01c: Plagiarism.** Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the use of another's words or ideas as if they were one's own; including, but not limited to representing, either with the intent to deceive or by the omission of the true source, part of or an entire work produced by someone other than the student, obtained by purchase or otherwise, as the student's original work; or, representing the identifiable but altered ideas, data or writing of another person as if those ideas, data or writing were the student's original work.

**102.01d: Multiple Submissions.** Multiple submissions includes, but is not limited to, the resubmission by a student of any work which has been previously submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a second course, without the informed permission/consent of the instructor of the second course; or, the submission by a student of any work submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a concurrent course, without the permission/consent of the instructors of both courses.

**102.02: Other Forms of Dishonesty.** Other forms of dishonesty, including but not limited to, fabricating information or knowingly furnishing false information or reporting a false emergency to the University or to University officials acting in the performance of their duties.

**102.03: Forgery.** Forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification. Section 102.03 applies to any individual for whom the University maintains records, regardless of current student status.

**102.04: Theft.** Theft of, conversion of, misappropriation of, or damage to or destruction of, any property of the University or property of others while on University premises or at official University functions; or possession of any property of the University or others stolen while on University premises or at official University functions.

**102.05: Computers.** Theft or other abuse of computing facilities or computer time, including but not limited to: unauthorized entry into a file to use, read, or change the contents or for any other purpose; unauthorized transfer of a file; unauthorized use of another individual's identification or password; use of computing facilities to interfere with the work of another student, faculty member, or University official; use of computing facilities to interfere with a University computing system.

Violation of the University of California Electronic Mail Policy (available on the internet at: <http://www.ucop.edu/ucophome/policies/email/>), or of any UCLA acceptable or allowable use policy, will also be considered a violation of Section 102.05.

**102.06: Unauthorized Conduct.** Unauthorized possession of, receipt of, duplication of, or use of the University's name, insignia, or seal. Unauthorized entry to, possession of, receipt of, or use of any University properties, equipment, resources, or services.

Selling or distributing course lecture notes, handouts, readers or other information provided by an instructor, or using them for any commercial purpose, without the express permission of the instructor.

**102.07: University-Owned Housing.** Violation of policies, regulations, or rules governing University-owned or -operated housing facilities or leased housing facilities located on University property.

**102.08: Physical Abuse.** Physical abuse, including but not limited to, rape, sexual assault, sex offenses, and other physical assault; threats of violence; or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person.

**102.08a: Rape.** For the purposes of this Code, rape refers to "rape" as defined by the California Penal Code (as it may be amended from time to time). Among other acts, the Penal Code prohibits the following acts, which are summarized below:

1. Sexual intercourse against a person's will accomplished by force or threats of bodily injury.

2. Sexual intercourse against a person's will where the person has reasonable fear that she (or he) or another will be injured if she (or he) does not submit to the intercourse.

3. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of giving consent, or is prevented from resisting, due to alcohol or drugs, and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused.

4. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of resisting because she (or he), at the time, is unconscious or asleep, and this is known to the accused.

**102.08b: Sexual Assault.** The act of sexual assault includes: forced sodomy (anal intercourse); forced oral copulation (oral-genital contact); rape by foreign object (forced penetration by a foreign object, including a finger); and sexual battery (the unwanted touching of an intimate part of another person for the purpose of sexual arousal). These also include situations when the accused sexually assaults a complainant incapable of giving consent, including where the complainant is prevented from resisting due to alcohol or drugs and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused.

NOTE: For the purpose of this regulation, students should understand that:

1. Forced intercourse, or other unwanted sexual contact, is defined as rape or sexual assault whether the assailant is a stranger or an acquaintance of the complainant.
2. Intoxication of the assailant shall not diminish the assailant's responsibility for sexual assault.

**102.09: Sexual Harassment.** Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute sexual harassment when:

- a. submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of instruction, employment, or participation in other University activity;
- b. submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as a basis for evaluation in making academic or personnel decisions affecting an individual; or
- c. such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive University environment.

In determining whether the alleged conduct constitutes sexual harassment, consideration shall be given to the record of the incident as a whole and to the totality of the circumstances, including the context in which the alleged incidents occurred.

**102.10: Stalking.** Stalking behavior in which an individual willfully, maliciously, and repeatedly engages in a knowing course of conduct directed at a specific person which reasonably and seriously alarms, torments, or terrorizes the person, and which serves no legitimate purpose.

**102.11: "Fighting Words."** The use of "fighting words" by students to harass any person(s) on University property, on other property to which these policies apply, or in connection with official University functions or University-sponsored programs.

"Fighting words" are those personally abusive epithets which, when directly addressed to any ordinary person are, in the context used and as a matter of common knowledge, inherently likely to provoke a violent reaction whether or not they actually do so. Such words include, but are not limited to, those terms widely recognized to be derogatory references to race, ethnicity, religion, sex, sexual orientation, disability, and other personal characteristics. "Fighting words" constitute "harassment" when the circumstances of their utterance create a hostile and intimidating environment which the student uttering them should reasonably know will interfere with the victim's ability to pursue effectively his or her education or otherwise to participate fully in University programs and activities.

**102.12: Hazing.** Hazing or any method of initiation or pre-initiation into a campus organization or any activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization which causes, or is likely to



cause, bodily danger, physical harm, or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in physical or mental harm to any student or other person.

**102.13: Obstruction or Disruption.** Obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures, or other University activities.

**102.14: Disorderly Conduct.** Disorderly or lewd conduct.

**102.15: Disturbing the Peace.** Participation in a disturbance of the peace or unlawful assembly.

**102.16: Failure to Comply.** Failure to identify oneself to, or comply with directions of, a University official or other public official acting in the performance of their duties while on University property or at official University functions, or resisting or obstructing such University or other public officials in the performance of or the attempt to perform their duties.

**102.17: Controlled Substances.** Unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of controlled substances, identified in Federal and State law or regulations.

**102.18: Alcohol.** Manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of alcohol which is unlawful or otherwise prohibited by, or not in compliance with, University policy or campus regulations.

**102.19: Destructive Devices.** Possession, use, storage, or manufacture of explosives, firebombs, or other destructive devices.

**102.20: Weapons.** Except as expressly permitted by law, possession, use, storage, or manufacture of a firearm or other weapon capable of causing bodily injury.

**102.21: Violation of Disciplinary Conditions.** Violation of the conditions contained in the terms of a disciplinary action imposed under this Code.

**102.22: Violation of Emergency or Interim Suspension Conditions.** Violation of the conditions contained in a written Notice of Emergency or Interim Suspension issued pursuant to Section IV. of this Code.

**102.23: Violation of Campus Restraining Order.** Violation of the conditions contained in a written Campus Restraining Order issued pursuant to Section III.A.2.a.(1) of this Code.

**102.24: University Properties.** Using University properties for the purpose of organizing or carrying out unlawful activity.

**102.25: Violations of Law.** Violation of Federal, State or local laws.

## Disclosure of Student Records

Pursuant to the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, the California Education Code, and the University of California Policies Applying to the Disclosure of Information from Student Records, students at UCLA have the right to

1. Inspect and review records pertaining to themselves in their capacity as students, except as the right may be waived or qualified under Federal and State Laws and University Policies
2. Have withheld from disclosure, absent their prior consent for release, personally identifiable information from their student records, except as provided by the Federal and State Laws and the University Policies
3. Inspect records maintained by UCLA of disclosures of personally identifiable information from their student records
4. Seek correction of their student records through a request to amend the records or, if such request is denied, through a hearing
5. File complaints with the U.S. Department of Education regarding alleged violations of the rights accorded them by the Federal Act

UCLA, in accordance with the Federal and State Laws and the University Policies, has designated the following categories of personally identifiable information as "public information" which UCLA may release and publish without the student's prior consent: name, address

(local/mailling, permanent, and/or E-mail), telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, number of course units in which enrolled, degrees and honors received, the most recent previous educational institution attended, participation in officially recognized activities (including intercollegiate athletics), and the name, weight, and height of participants on intercollegiate athletic teams.

Students who do not wish certain items (i.e., name, local/mailling, permanent, and/or E-mail address, telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, number of course units in which enrolled, and degrees and honors received) of this "public information" released and published may so indicate through URSA OnLine (<http://www.ursa.ucla.edu/>). To restrict the release and publication of the additional items in the category of "public information," complete the Decline to Release form available from the Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall.

Student records which are the subject of the Federal and State Laws and the University Policies may be maintained in a variety of offices, including the Registrar's Office, Office of the Dean of Students, UCLA Career Center, Graduate Division, and the offices of a student's college or school and major department. Students are referred to the *UCLA Campus and CHS Directory* which lists all the offices that may maintain student records, together with their campus address and telephone number. Students have the right to inspect their student records in any such office subject to the terms of the Federal and State Laws and the University Policies. Inspection of student records maintained by the Registrar's Office is by appointment only. Call (310) 206-0482 or inquire at Academic Record Services, 1134 Murphy Hall.

A copy of the Federal and State Laws, the University Policies, and the *UCLA Campus and CHS Directory* may be inspected in the office of the Information Practices Coordinator, 10920 Wilshire Boulevard, Suite 500. Information concerning students' hearing rights may be obtained from that office and from the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall.

In addition to the public information described above, information related to students' Social Security number, sex, and marital status, and the name(s), address(es), and telephone number(s) of their parents or next of kin are made available to the UCLA University Relations Department for use in alumni, development, and public relations activities. To restrict the release of this additional information, complete a Request for University Relations Information Restriction form available from the Enrollment and Degree Services, 1113 Murphy Hall.

## Rape and Other Forms of Sexual Assault

UCLA does not tolerate sexual assault in any form, including acquaintance or date rape. Where there is probable cause to believe that the campus regulations prohibiting sexual assault have been violated, the campus pursues disciplinary actions which may include sanctions up to and including dismissal from the University.

A student charged with sexual assault can be prosecuted under California criminal statutes and disciplined under the campus student conduct policies and regulations. Even if the criminal justice authorities choose not to prosecute, the campus can pursue disciplinary action.

### Definitions

A student who individually, or in concert with others, participates in any of the following misconduct is subject to University discipline (refer to the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students* which is available from the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall, and on the website at <http://www.saonet.ucla.edu/dos/>). The following language describes specific conduct which, at UCLA, may subject a student to University discipline:

Physical abuse, including but not limited to rape, sexual assault, sex offenses, and other physical assault; threats of violence; or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person.

## Rape

For the purposes of this policy, rape refers to "rape" as defined by the California Penal Code (as it may be amended from time to time). The acts summarized below are among the behaviors prohibited by the California Penal Code:

1. Sexual intercourse against a person's will accomplished by force or threats of bodily injury.
2. Sexual intercourse against a person's will where the person has reasonable fear that she (or he) or another will be injured if she (or he) does not submit to the intercourse.
3. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of giving consent, or is prevented from resisting, due to alcohol or drugs, and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused.
4. Sexual intercourse where the person is incapable of resisting because he or she, at the time, is unconscious or asleep, and this is known to the accused.

## Other Forms of Sexual Assault

The act of sexual assault includes forced sodomy (anal intercourse); forced oral copulation (oral-genital contact); rape by foreign object (forced penetration by a foreign object, including a finger); and sexual battery (the unwanted touching of an intimate part of another person for the purpose of sexual arousal). These also include situations where the accused sexually assaults a complainant incapable of giving consent, including where the complainant is prevented from resisting due to alcohol or drugs and this condition was known, or reasonably should have been known by the accused.

Note: For the purpose of this policy, students should understand that

1. Forced intercourse or other unwanted sexual contact is defined as rape or sexual assault whether the assailant is a stranger or an acquaintance of the complainant.
2. Intoxication of the assailant shall not diminish the assailant's responsibility for sexual assault.

## If a Person Has Been Raped or Sexually Assaulted

Those who believe that they are the victims of rape or other forms of sexual assault should

1. **Immediately call the police department.** If possible, call 911 or the UCLA Police Department at (310) 825-1491; see <http://www.ucpd.ucla.edu>.
2. **Get medical attention.** Campus police will provide transportation to the Santa Monica UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room for emergency medical treatment and evidence collection. A counselor from the Santa Monica Rape Treatment Center will be available at that time, free of charge.

Utilize campus and community support services:

1. **Contact a Rape Services Consultant (RSC)** at the Women's Resource Center. RSCs have expertise in working with victims of rape or sexual assault. They can discuss options and alternatives, help identify the most appropriate support services, and provide information about medical care, psychological counseling, academic assistance, legal options, how to file a police report, and how to file a complaint through the Office of the Dean of Students. RSCs are available to assist UCLA faculty, staff, and students regardless of where or when the assault occurred. For assistance, contact the Women's Resource Center at (310) 206-8240 or go to 2 Dodd Hall and ask to speak to an RSC.
2. **Contact the Rape Treatment Center** at Santa Monica UCLA Medical Center (310-319-4000) for free emergency medical treatment and counseling services.

## Campus Discipline Process When the Assailant Is a Student

Those who believe that they are the victims of rape or other forms of sexual assault by a student on University properties or in conjunction with an official University function may file a complaint directly with the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall.

Cases referred to the Office of the Dean of Students will be treated under the hearing procedures set forth in the *UCLA Student Conduct Code*. Where the allegation is of rape or other forms of sexual assault, and the case is referred to the Student Conduct Committee, the following *additional* procedures shall apply:

1. The complainant shall be entitled, for support, to have up to two persons of the complainant's choice accompany the complainant to the hearing. A support person may be called as a witness, and the fact that he or she is to act as a witness shall not preclude that person's attendance throughout the entire hearing. If a support person is also a witness, the committee chair (or the hearing officer) may require him or her to testify before the complainant. Neither of these persons shall be entitled to represent or defend the complainant. Similar rights shall be afforded to the accused student.
2. The complainant shall have the right to be present during the entire hearing, notwithstanding the fact that the complainant is to be called as a witness.
3. Evidence of the complainant's past sexual history, including opinion evidence, reputation evidence, and evidence of specific instances of the complainant's sexual conduct, shall not be admissible by the accused student unless the committee chair or hearing officer makes a specific finding of relevance after an offer of proof by the accused student. Under no circumstances is past sexual history admissible to prove consent. The offer of proof must be made and resolved by the panel before the complainant testifies.
4. The hearing shall be closed to spectators.

## Harassment

### Sexual Harassment

Every member of the campus community should be aware that the University is strongly opposed to sexual harassment and that such behavior is prohibited both by law and by University policy.

### Definition

Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute sexual harassment when

1. Submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of instruction, employment, or participation in other University activity;
2. Submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as a basis for evaluation in making academic or personnel decisions affecting an individual; OR
3. Such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive University environment.

In determining whether the alleged conduct constitutes sexual harassment, consideration will be given to the record of the incident as a whole and to the totality of the circumstances, including the nature of the sexual advances and the context in which the alleged incidents occurred (*University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*, Section 160.00).

### Complaint Resolution

Experience has demonstrated that many complaints of sexual harassment can be effectively resolved through informal intervention. Individuals who experience what they consider to be sexual harass-

ment are advised to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly.

Additionally, an individual who believes that she or he has been sexually harassed may contact the alleged offender's supervisor and/or a Sexual Harassment Information Center counselor for help and information regarding sexual harassment complaint resolution or grievance procedures at one of the locations listed below as determined by the complainant's status at the University at the time of the alleged incident:

## Other Forms of Harassment

The University strives to create an environment which fosters the values of mutual respect and tolerance and is free from discrimination based on race, ethnicity, sex, religion, sexual orientation, disability, age, and other personal characteristics. Certainly harassment, in its many forms, works against those values and often corrodes a person's sense of worth and interferes with one's ability to participate in University programs or activities. While the University is committed to the free exchange of ideas and the full protection of free expression, the University also recognizes that words can be used in such a way that they no longer express an idea, but rather injure and intimidate, thus undermining the ability of individuals to participate in the University community. The *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students* (hereafter referred to as *Policies*) presently prohibit a variety of conduct by students which, in certain contexts, may be regarded as harassment or intimidation.

For example, harassing expression which is accompanied by physical abuse, threats of violence, or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person on University property or in connection with official University functions may subject an offending student to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.08 of the *Policies*.

Similarly, harassing conduct, including symbolic expression, which also involves conduct resulting in damage to or destruction of any property of the University or property of others while on University premises may subject a student violator to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.04 of the *Policies*.

Further, under specific circumstances described in the *University-wide Student Conduct Harassment Policy*, students may be subject to University discipline for misconduct which may consist solely of expression. Copies of this *Policy* are available in the Office of the Dean

## Complaint Resolution

One of the necessary measures in our efforts to assure an atmosphere of civility and mutual respect is the establishment of procedures which provide effective informal and formal mechanisms for those who believe that they have been victims of any of the above misconduct.

Many incidents of harassment and intimidation can be effectively resolved through informal means. For example, an individual may wish to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly. An individual who chooses not to confront the alleged offender and who wishes help, advice, or information is urged to contact any of the Harassment Information Centers listed immediately above.

In addition to providing support for those who believe they have been victims of harassment, Harassment Information Centers offer persons the opportunity to learn about the phenomena of harassment and intimidation; to understand the formal and informal mechanisms by which misunderstandings may be corrected and, when appropriate, student perpetrators may be disciplined; and to consider which of the available options is the most useful for the particular circumstances.

With regard to the *Universitywide Student Conduct Harassment Policy*, complainants should be aware that not all conduct which is offensive may be regarded as a violation of this *Policy* and may, in fact, be protected expression. Thus, the application of formal institutional discipline to such protected expression may not be legally permissible. Nevertheless, the University is committed to reviewing any complaint of harassing or intimidating conduct by a student and intervening on behalf of the complainant to the extent possible.

## Emergencies

You should become familiar with safety instructions posted in classrooms, labs, and other campus facilities. Be prepared to respond safely and appropriately to a fire, earthquake, toxic spill, or accident.

At UCLA, 911 is the "all-purpose" emergency phone number. You do not need to dial an outside line from a campus phone, and you do not need any coins to dial 911 from a pay phone. When you call 911, try to remain calm and do not hang up until you answer all of the operator's questions.

Here are some general guidelines for specific emergencies:

### Earthquake

When an earthquake hits, take cover immediately. If you are indoors, get under a desk or table, or between seating rows in a lecture hall. DO NOT RUN OUTSIDE. If you are in a hallway or if you are outside, move to an open area quickly and drop to the ground, covering your head and neck as best you can. If you are in your car, stop carefully and stay in the car.

After the shaking stops, check for injuries. Do not use telephones for personal calls, as this overloads phone lines and prevents emergency personnel from reporting injuries. After a severe quake at UCLA, department heads and emergency coordinators will lead building evacuations. Do not use elevators. Go to campus evacuation

areas, which are wide open spaces like the quads, athletic fields, and uncovered parking lots (see Campus Evacuation Map on next page). Wait for instructions before entering buildings or parking structures. Refrain from spreading rumors and do not go sightseeing. Remain calm and help others.

## **Fire**

If you see a fire, close the door where the fire is located, activate the nearest alarm, and call 911. When you sound the alarm or hear the alarm signal, get out of the building as quickly and calmly as possible. Do not use the elevators. Do not reenter the building until the all-clear signal has been given by emergency personnel.

UCLA does not expect students or employees to fight fires. Use a fire extinguisher only if you have had the training and you feel it is safe to do so. Be aware of campus fire alarm and extinguisher locations before a fire occurs.

## **Hazardous Spills**

Noxious odors may or may not indicate a toxic spill. Do not attempt to clean up any hazardous material spill involving toxic, chemical, radioactive, infectious, or flammable materials. If a spill occurs in a classroom or lab, alert the supervisor or lab manager. Call 825-5689 (UCLA Office of Environment, Health, and Safety), or 911 (after hours) if the spill happens outdoors or in an unsupervised area.

## **Accidents**

Call 911 immediately to get assistance. If you are qualified to do so, give first aid to injured persons. Do not attempt to move the seriously injured.
