USIE Spring Seminars

Tentative Course Listings

Undergraduate Student Initiated Education (USIE) is an innovative program designed to provide a select group of juniors and seniors in the College of Letters and Science with the opportunity to develop and facilitate, under close faculty supervision, a lower division seminar for their peers. The application and selection period is during Fall Quarter. During Winter Quarter, facilitators work closely with their faculty sponsors through a two-unit independent study focused on the content area of their proposed course, and participate in a two-unit pedagogy seminar with other student facilitators. Through these studies, student facilitators develop for review and approval a formal syllabus for their spring seminars. Mentorship with faculty sponsors continues during the Spring Quarter as students conduct their seminars.

The student-facilitated Spring seminars are 1-unit and graded on a Passed/Not Passed basis. They are offered under the 88S course number series. The following seminars are scheduled for Spring Quarter. Enrollment for the seminars is through URSA and is expected to open in late March. Each seminar is capped at no more than 20 students. Students can enroll in a USIE seminar only twice in their undergraduate careers.

Note: Units earned in USIE seminars do not count toward the College's 216 maximum unit limit. Units do count toward Minimum Progress and Expected Cumulative Progress.

Registration

Registration consists of paying fees and enrolling in classes.

1. Registration fees and other University charges are due the 20th of each month. BruinBill accounts can be viewed through URSA
2. Enrollment in classes is completed through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> (see the Enrollment section and the URSA section for full details)

Complete both processes by the established deadlines (see the Calendar section) to be officially registered and enrolled for the term.

Student Responsibilities

Address, Mobile Telephone, and E-mail Changes

Students must keep their UCLA mailing and e-mail addresses and mobile telephone numbers up to date, and may change them on URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>. Keeping this information current allows students to be reached through the BruinAlert system.

Three times each year, student mailing addresses are updated from the change-of-address list on file with the U.S. Postal Service. Students must, however, still inform UCLA when they change addresses and verify that their addresses are correct in URSA.

Declaring Nonattendance

A student may declare nonattendance if he or she is not planning to attend UCLA for a term and registration fees have not been paid for that term. If the student uses this option on URSA, be sure to consult the Academic Policies section in this *Schedule* for readmission information.

For a graduate student, declaring nonattendance does not place the student on an official leave of absence. That status requires submission of a leave of absence form, obtained from the individual department, for department and Graduate Division approval.

Fee Disclaimer

Fees shown represent the amounts currently estimated for this quarter. Every effort will be made to keep fees at this level for the term. However, given continuing budget uncertainties, circumstances may require an adjustment in these amounts during the term.

Paying Fees

Payments can be paid by e-check or credit card through URSA, mailed, or deposited in the Administrative Main Cashier drop slot (1125 Murphy Hall).

Mandatory fees including tuition, the student services fee, professional degree supplemental tuition, and nonresident supplemental tuition—as well as UCLA campus-based fees assessed to all full-time students—are flat fees based on enrollment status (e.g., undergraduate, graduate student, professional school student), not on the number of enrolled units. They do not include additional course or unit-based fees such as the IEI Fee or course materials fees that may be assessed for enrollment in selected courses, room and board costs for living on campus, or books and supplies.

BruinPay Plan

The BruinPay Plan (BPP) permits a student on the quarter calendar to make three monthly payments for quarterly charges, and a student on the semester calendar to make four monthly payments for semester charges. Students must re-enroll in BPP each term to use this payment method. The first installment and a nonrefundable administrative fee are due at the time of enrollment in the BruinPay Plan. Payments are made through e-check transactions, with automatic deductions taken from the student's checking account. As banks have different format requirements, students should check with their bank for accurate routing and account numbers. Registration Confirmation

Check registration status on URSA to confirm that registration fees payments have been processed. It is especially important to do this prior to the deadline for dropping classes due to nonpayment of registration fees (see the Calendar section for current deadlines).

Student Health Insurance

Insurance is a condition of registration at the University of California. As such, the cost of the University of California Student Health Insurance Plan (UCSHIP) is billed along with other UCLA fees each academic term. The UCSHIP fee is waivable if a waiver is submitted by the fee payment deadline for each term. Waiving UCSHIP is an online process.

UCSHIP fulfills all of the requirements mandated for qualified medical/health insurance as defined by the University. The Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center is the primary health care provider for UCSHIP and is where all nonemergency medical care must be initiated for UCSHIP claim payment consideration. Waiving UCSHIP

Students may waive UCSHIP if they (1) maintain active enrollment in a qualified medical/health insurance plan that meets all established requirements, (2) apply for a UCSHIP waiver each term within established deadlines, and (3) correctly complete the online UCSHIP waiver form.

Students must apply for a UCSHIP waiver online. See the Ashe Center website for details, including a definition of qualified private medical/health insurance. Select the "UCSHIP Insurance Info" tab on <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>. Then choose the "Waive Student Health Insurance Plan (UCSHIP)" option from the list and follow the prompts. When waiving UCSHIP, students are responsible for knowing the benefits of and local providers for their medical plan.

Deadlines for Waiving UCSHIP

Third-party individuals may not waive UCSHIP for a student. Waivers must be submitted by the stated deadlines whether or not fees have been paid by that date. Deadlines are strictly enforced.

The above information serves as official notice of the UCLA mandatory medical/health insurance requirement. All students are responsible for providing complete and accurate information that must be submitted by the stated deadlines. Nonresident Supplemental Tuition Exemptions

The following categories of students may be entitled to an exemption from nonresident supplemental tuition: (1) active duty member of the U.S. military stationed in California for non-educational purposes; (2) dependent children, stepchildren, spouses, or registered domestic partners of an active duty member of the military stationed in California; (3) unmarried dependent children under age 21, spouses, or registered domestic partners of members of the UC faculty who are members of the Academic Senate; (4) unmarried dependent children, spouses, or registered domestic partners of full-time UC employees who are assigned to work outside of California; (5) children, spouses, or registered domestic partners of deceased public law enforcement or fire suppression employees killed in the course of their official duties who were California residents at the time of their death; (6) dependent children of California residents; (7) graduates of a California high school operated by the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs; (8) credentialed employees of a California public school; (9) amateur student athletes training at the U.S. Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista; (10) students who attended high school in California for three years and graduated from a California high school (or attained the equivalent), except students who are nonimmigrant aliens; (11) surviving dependents of California residents killed in the 9/11/01 terrorist attacks; (12) recipients of the Congressional Medal of Honor and their children under age 27.

Students who believe they are entitled to one of these exemptions must apply for it before registering. Without this authorization, students are not permitted to register without paying the entire fee. Graduate and undergraduate students should apply for a fee exemption at the Registrar's Office. Doctoral Candidates

Nonresident graduate doctoral students who have advanced to candidacy are eligible for a 100 percent reduction in their annual nonresident supplemental tuition. See the Academic Policies section for requirements.

Reduced Fee Programs

Fee assessment for reduction in fees is based on total units enrolled (10 units or less) as of Friday of the third week of classes.

Undergraduates

Certain undergraduate students, when properly approved by the dean of their College/school for enrollment in 10 units or less, may be eligible for a one-half reduction in the tuition portion of registration fees. File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week. Except for these qualified and approved part-time students, there is no reduction in the student services fee, tuition, or student union or Undergraduate Students Association fees.

Undergraduate nonresident students with College/school approval for enrollment in 10 units or less pay only half the nonresident supplemental tuition. File a Request for Fee Reduction with the academic dean's office by Friday of the second week of classes for the applicable term.

Graduate Students

For graduate students there is no reduction in the student services fee, tuition, nonresident supplemental tuition, or student union or Graduate Students Association fees for less than full-time programs.

Graduate students may be eligible for and billed the filing fee (half the full amount of the student services fee) in lieu of full registration fees for the term in which they expect to complete final degree requirements. See the Academic Policies section for requirements.

Graduate students taking research or coursework leaves of absence outside California may be eligible for in absentia registration and reduction of the student services fee and tuition. See the Academic Policies section for more information, or visit <http://www.gdnet.ucla.edu/gasaa/library/degreeinfo.htm#Petitions>.

University Employees

Full-time University employees may apply for a reduction of the student services fee and tuition at their Campus Human Resources office. Applications are available on the Campus Human Resources website at <http://www.chr.ucla.edu>. Students who receive the part-time fee reduction from their academic dean may not also use the UC employee reduction; students must use one or the other.

Late Payment

A late payment fee is assessed to all students paying registration fees after the deadline. Late registration is complete once students pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

After Friday of the Second Week

Students who enroll in classes and pay registration fees after Friday of the second week of classes are assessed both the late Study List fee and the late registration fee, resulting in extra costs to register and enroll.

Undergraduate students must obtain the instructor's signature for each course listed and obtain approval from the academic College or school.

Graduate students (GD college code) must obtain approval from their authorized departmental adviser.

Dentistry, Law, and Medicine students must have the written approval of their respective Student Affairs Office.

File the Enrollment Petition at 1113 Murphy Hall after paying fees for the term. Late registration is complete when students pay registration fees and enroll in classes.

Fee Waiver Requests

Late registration, processing, and penalty fees are waivable on request in writing to the office assessing the fees only if they were incurred through the fault of the University or because a student suffered sudden and debilitating injury or accident.

Holds

Students may have holds placed on their student records which could affect registration, enrollment, financial aid, campus services, and/or release of academic transcripts for the following reasons:

1. Failure to comply with admission or academic provisions
2. Failure to settle financial obligations with the University
3. Failure to respond to official notices

Each student who becomes subject to a hold action is given advance notice and ample time to respond. The hold must be released by the initiating office before a student may enroll in classes or receive various campus services. Obtain information on holds through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>.

Refunds and Reductions

Under the conditions described below, some UCLA students may be eligible for a full or partial refund of fees paid.

Cancellation of Registration

Prior to the first day of instruction, students may cancel registration by completing and submitting a Cancellation of Registration form, available at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. Refund is as follows: new students receive a 100 percent refund for fees paid except for the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and a service fee; all other students receive a 100 percent refund for fees paid minus the service fee. (See "Miscellaneous Fees" for service fee information.)

New students who cancel must file for admission if they wish to return to UCLA.

Withdrawal

Students who withdraw from the University once instruction begins must file an acceptable Notice of Withdrawal form. Undergraduates

may obtain this form at the office of the academic dean. Graduate students may obtain it from their respective departments.

Failing to attend classes, neglecting courses, or stopping payment on checks tendered for registration does not constitute notice of withdrawal. A fine is assessed if any check for registration fees payment is returned by a bank for any reason, including stopped payment or insufficient funds. If no credit for courses is received, a full refund of the student services fee for the regular session is granted to all students entering the armed forces prior to the end of the sixth week of the term, with no refund thereafter.

Schedule of Refunds

A percentage of the registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Notice of Withdrawal or Leave of Absence form is submitted to the academic dean.

Service Fee and Nonrefundable Fees. A service fee is deducted from all 100 percent refunds. For new students, the schedule of refunds is applied to the fees paid minus the nonrefundable acceptance of admission fee and the service fee. Fees paid by new Dentistry, J.D., M.B.A., and S.J.D. students are refunded except for their respective nonrefundable acceptance of admissions deposit. Registration fee refunds take one to two weeks to process. See "Miscellaneous Fees" for service fee information.

UCSHIP Benefits. There is no automatic refund of the UCSHIP fee. Students who cancel registration and receive a 100 percent refund and who purchased UCSHIP lose all UCSHIP coverage and benefits for the entire term. For students who withdraw, the UCSHIP policy remains in effect for the remainder of the term and refunds are calculated on the remainder of their registration fees minus the UCSHIP fee.

To request a full UCSHIP refund, contact the Ashe Student Health Center insurance office at insurshs@ashe.ucla.edu before the end of the current term. Include the student's full name, UID number, date of birth, and reason for the refund request. The UCSHIP office will verify that no benefits have been accessed and no plan services have been used before any refund is considered. This process may take up to 30 days to complete. No refund of UCSHIP fees will be granted if any claim has been paid.

Sponsored Students, Deferrals, and Waivers. If a sponsored student (on financial aid) pays registration fees with personal funds, a refund is initiated automatically through BruinBill. Students who initially pay registration fees with financial aid, a fee deferral, or a fee waiver, and subsequently cancel or withdraw, do not receive a cash refund.

Graduate Students

Graduate Leaves of Absence. For graduate students on official leave of absence, a percentage of registration fees paid is refunded according to the calendar date on which the official Request for Leave of Absence is submitted to the Graduate Division. If fees are paid by departmental funds, students may end up owing fees if the

leave of absence petition is filed after the first day of classes. See refund chart above.

In Absentia Registration. Graduate students taking research or coursework leaves of absence outside California may be eligible for in absentia registration, and reduction of the student services fee and tuition.

Filing Fee. Graduate students may be eligible for the filing fee in lieu of full registration fees.

Fee Deferrals. Academic apprentice personnel are eligible to receive a fee deferral for part or all of the registration fees assessed during the term in which they serve as an academic apprentice. Students are responsible for paying fees by the deferred payment deadline, which is generally two months after the standard term due date. Whether students attend UCLA, take a leave of absence, or withdraw from the University, they are responsible for the registration fees assessed but may be eligible to receive a partial fee refund, according to the refund schedule above. Fees not paid by the deadline are subject to the late fee charge.

Doctoral Candidates. Nonresident doctoral candidates are eligible for a reduction in nonresident supplemental tuition.

Course Materials and Services Fees

The College of Letters and Science and the UCLA professional schools assess course materials and services fees to cover the cost of equipment and to help offset the costs of providing course websites and computer laboratories. Depending on how the fees were approved, they are assessed with registration fees or after Friday of the fourth week of the quarter.

The Materials Use fee (sometimes known as a lab fee) and Instructional Enhancement Initiative fee (IEI) are course materials and services fees that are assessed by course unit at the end of the fourth week of the quarter. Students are responsible for ensuring that all

Study List errors and omissions are corrected prior to the end of the second week. Students are assessed these fees regardless of major. Students who are approved for "Late Add" enrollment after the third week of classes are required to pay course materials and services fees. The fees are billed once a quarter through BruinBill and are non-refundable once assessed.

Education Abroad Program reciprocity students and CAPPP (Washington Internship) students are exempt from the IEI fee. Fee Disclaimer

Fees shown represent the amounts currently estimated for this quarter. Every effort will be made to keep fees at this level for the term. However, given continuing budget uncertainties, circumstances may require an adjustment in these amounts during the term.

BruinBill Accounts and Charges

All students are assigned a BruinBill account. A BruinBill account records all charges and payments associated with housing, transportation, and registration, along with other service charges that are assessed to students. Accounts are administered through an electronic e-bill.

Students must pay all charges in full by the 20th of the month following the posting date of the charge. Registration fees payment deadlines are as follows:

Fall Term	September 20
Winter Term	December 20
Spring Term	March 20

If the 20th falls on a weekend or holiday, the in-person due date is the last business day prior to the 20th. Electronic payments may be made through the 20th. After the 20th, students are assessed a delinquent fee. There are no extensions. Please make payments early to avoid problems, especially if payment is made by check.

If registration fees are not paid in full by the payment deadline, a late registration fee is assessed, and classes are dropped in accordance with the drop class deadline (see the Calendar section). Note: The University of California Student Health Insurance Plan (UCSHIP) fee is part of registration fees and is due and payable at the time registration fees are paid. For information about waiving UCSHIP, see the Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center website at <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

Failure to settle financial obligations with the University may result in a hold being placed on the student's record. Such a hold could affect registration, enrollment, financial aid, campus services, and release of academic transcripts. See the Registration section for additional information about holds.

Students, and third parties given access by the student, with a valid e-mail address established in URSA receive twice-monthly courtesy e-mail reminders prior to payment deadlines.

Students can give select URSA access to parents, guardians, or other third parties whom they want to view their student information and even make BruinBill payments. This access gives the University permission to discuss details of the student's bill with the third party. See the URSA section for more information. If the third party is given access to make BruinBill payments, he or she also will receive the twice-monthly courtesy e-mail reminders.

Methods of Payment

e-bill

BruinBill accounts are administered electronically (e-bill) through URSA. Financial activity is displayed for the current term, as well as account activity for the last 24 months. URSA also provides a link to important communications from the university regarding registration

and university policies. Students can pay their BruinBill account electronically using electronic checks with no charge, or American Express, Discover, and MasterCard credit cards for a fee. UCLA converts checks into electronic payments. Those who wish to opt out of this process should send e-mail to Student Financial Services at asksfs@finance.ucla.edu.

Online Payment

Payment to a student's BruinBill account can be made online.

1. **BruinPay Plan (BPP)** is available to a student who wishes to establish a per-term monthly payment option through his or her bank account. A student may sign up for BPP prior to the registration fees payment deadline each term by accessing his or her BruinBill account and checking eligibility for BPP from the My Accounts page (see the My BruinPay Plan box). BPP payments are made monthly by electronic check. An administrative fee is assessed for this payment type. Students with three or more returned checks are not eligible for BPP.
2. **Electronic check (e-check)** is an easy way to pay directly from the student's checking or savings account. As banks have different format requirements, students should check with their bank for accurate routing and account numbers. Payment is made on the BruinBill My Accounts page and results in a direct payment from the bank account to UCLA for the amount specified. There is no fee for this payment method.
3. **Credit card:** UCLA accepts payment by American Express, Discover, and MasterCard. Due to current VISA regulations, UCLA is no longer allowed to accept this card type. Payment by credit card is subject to a 2.75% convenience fee.
4. **Travellex** international payments are a new option for international payments. Processing through Travellex, the student logs into his or her BruinBill account and chooses the foreign currency payment link. The process generates a letter that the student prints and takes to his or her bank within 72 hours. A pending payment shows on the student's account but DOES NOT prevent courses from being dropped, release holds, or relieve the responsibility of making payment on the account. If the student pays within 72 hours, the BruinBill account is updated and the pending payment is removed. Payments not made within 72 hours may not fully cover the amount owed.

In-Person Payment

Students may make payments in person with cash only at the Administrative Main Cashier Office located at 1125 Murphy Hall, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays. Check payments may be placed in the dropbox for same-day processing. Fax payments are not accepted.

Returned Check Policy

Returned Check Fine. The returned check fee is \$25. An accounting hold is placed on the account when a check is returned.

Cash Only Policy for Returned Check Writers. Any person who has more than two checks returned unpaid to the university is placed on a cash-only basis (i.e., cash, credit card, cashier's check, or money order) for all future transactions. A letter will be mailed to the current mailing/billing address on file if this threshold is met, and no future checks will be accepted. The Student Financial Services is

not responsible for delivery of mail or the accuracy of the address on file.

Enforcement of Cash-Only Policy. Check payments mailed to the Administrative Main Cashier by customers on a cash-only basis will be accepted, but credit will not be posted to their BruinBill account for two weeks.

Financial Aid Distribution

The Financial Aid System automatically credits the BruinBill account of students who receive financial aid. Registration fees and other outstanding UCLA debts, such as student health or laboratory fees, are deducted. Students must be enrolled at least half time to receive financial aid disbursements. See the Financial Support section.

BruinDirect

BruinDirect is the fastest, most secure refund method, allowing refunds to be deposited electronically to student bank accounts. Direct deposit of financial aid refunds is mandated by federal regulation. Students are notified of transactions by e-mail before each deposit is made.

Students not currently enrolled in BruinDirect may enroll and manage their accounts online through URSA. Students can also update their banking information through URSA. As banks have different format requirements, students should check with their bank for accurate routing and account numbers.

Medical Insurance Waivers

As a condition of registration, UCLA requires all students to have qualified medical insurance. The University of California Student Health Insurance Plan (UCSHIP) fulfills this requirement and its fee is billed through BruinBill. Students who are already covered by a qualified health insurance policy may have this fee waived if qualifying information is submitted by the fee payment deadline each term. All UCSHIP waivers must be submitted through the Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center website at <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

An annual waiver can be completed only during the Fall waiver period. Otherwise, a UCSHIP waiver must be completed each academic term. If a student misses the deadline, no late waivers are given. Students should pay careful attention to meeting the waiver deadline to ensure that they do not incur unplanned expenses. There are no refunds after the deadline.

Financial Support

Financial support at UCLA is handled by the Financial Aid Office, Loan Services Office, and graduate Fellowships and Financial Services Office. Students and their families should also be aware of tax benefits that could help offset the cost of fees and tuition.

At the Financial Aid Office students can

1. Obtain information on grants, loans, need-based undergraduate scholarships, and work-study
2. Get counseling on how to prepare the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and supporting documents
3. Report changes in their financial situation
4. Pick up petition and revision forms
5. Submit all requested documentation for financial aid consideration
6. Appeal financial aid consideration based on special circumstances

Financial Aid Application

To apply for financial aid, students must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at <http://www.fafsa.gov>. Applications are available in early January and the priority filing deadline is March 2. Applicants completing the FAFSA after the March 2 deadline will be considered for limited funding.

Students attending UCLA Summer Sessions and in need of financial aid must submit a summer financial aid application in addition to the FAFSA. Applications are available at <http://www.fao.ucla.edu> on April 1, and must be submitted by April 30 for on-time consideration.

Financial aid applications for summer travel and summer UC cross-enrollment are separate from the UCLA Summer Sessions application and have different deadlines. Please check the FAO website for all summer programs information.

Financial Aid Online Services

The Financial Aid Office website (<http://www.fao.ucla.edu>) provides full service information to students. In addition to information about applying for, evaluating, and awarding financial aid, the website allows students to access and print important publications and required forms. Students can also use the site to access MyFAO which houses their electronic Financial Aid Notification (eFAN), financial aid file status information, missing information requests, summer financial aid applications, and renewal scholarship application. An electronic bulletin board highlighting important events and upcoming deadlines also appears on the website, as well as important links to grants, scholarships, and loan programs.

The Financial Aid Office uses e-mail to communicate with students. Students will be notified electronically if additional documentation is required to complete their file, when they have been awarded financial aid and have an eFAN available for review, and for other important events that require student interaction. To ensure that students

receive all important notifications, it is imperative to maintain a valid e-mail address on URSA.

Eligibility for Aid

Based on the information provided on the FAFSA, the Financial Aid Office will determine the student's eligibility for grants, work-study, and loans that will be available to help him or her cover educational costs. A Financial Aid Notification (eFAN) is made available and reflects the student's eligibility for aid. An *eFAN Guide* that explains the financial aid process is also provided.

Financial Aid Distribution through BruinBill

UCLA uses the BruinBill system to process bills and payments, including financial aid. Each student is assigned an individual BruinBill account. See the Billing section for methods of payment. Statements list charges, such as registration fees, health insurance, or outstanding debts, and may include anticipated financial aid activity and the amount of funds available for a refund.

The Financial Aid System automatically credits BruinBill accounts with students' financial aid. Students must be enrolled at least half-time (6 units for undergraduate and 4 units for graduate students) for financial aid to be credited to their BruinBill account. Certain holds may also prevent disbursement of aid to BruinBill.

BruinBill uses financial aid as a credit to pay student registration fees and most other outstanding UCLA debts (such as student health visits or recreational fees).

BruinDirect

With BruinDirect students may have their financial aid refund electronically transferred to a personal checking or savings account. After financial aid is disbursed to cover posted charges (such as tuition, UCSHIP, etc.) remaining funds are forwarded to the student's designated bank account through BruinDirect.

BruinDirect enrollment information is available in the Administrative Main Cashier Office and Student Accounts Office. Students can sign up for BruinDirect online through URSA. BruinDirect is not available to students if they selected a nonelectronic lender for their private loans.

Scholarships for Undergraduate Students

The Undergraduate Scholarship Program at UCLA rewards academic excellence and promise, and provides assistance to students in need. A scholarship is expected to create opportunities for further academic growth and development.

Each scholarship is awarded for one academic year. A scholarship renewal application must be submitted yearly. See <http://www.fao.ucla.edu> to complete the application online. The application is available on the Web in early January, and must be submitted by March 2 for the following academic year. Students must also apply for financial aid by submitting a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>. Semifinalists in the Regents Scholarship competition are given preference for these awards.

Scholarship Resource Center. The Scholarship Resource Center (SRC) helps undergraduate students search for scholarship information. The SRC is open to all UCLA undergraduates, regardless of financial aid eligibility. The center provides referrals and serves as an information base for scholarships, fellowships, and endowments. The SRC works in conjunction with the Division of Honors and Undergraduate Programs, the Financial Aid Office, and the UCLA community.

Special features of the SRC include counseling for students in the application process, a small library of current scholarship books, a proofreading service for scholarship applications, computer access to various scholarship listings, and workshops and general information sessions. 233 Covell Commons, (310) 206-2875, <http://www.college.ucla.edu/up/SRC/>.

Unit Requirements

The Financial Aid Office checks units on the census date at the end of the third week of classes. Enrollment below half time on that date results in cancellation of aid and billing for funds received. Once aid is reduced or cancelled, it is not reinstated automatically if the unit count increases after the census date. Federal Pell Grants are not reinstated if the unit count increases after the census date.

For undergraduate students, half-time enrollment is 6 units. Some undergraduate awards (Federal Pell Grant, Cal Grant) require full-time enrollment (12 units) to maintain maximum eligibility.

For graduate students, half-time enrollment is 4 units.

Maintaining Satisfactory Progress

Federal regulations require UCLA to establish, publish, and apply standards of satisfactory academic progress for financial aid eligibility. Students who fail to meet the standards become ineligible to receive financial aid until they are in compliance with these requirements. For more information, see *A Guide to Satisfactory Academic Progress*, available from the Financial Aid Office and online at <http://www.fao.ucla.edu> under the FAO Publications link.

Withdrawal and Cancellation

Students who decide not to enroll for one or more terms must notify the Financial Aid Office. Students are not entitled to receive financial aid for those terms.

For students who withdraw for a term, the Return of Federal Aid policy determines the amount of financial aid they are eligible to keep for that term. The calculation is based on the date students submit the official withdrawal form to their College/school or department.

The amount of financial aid students are entitled to keep is prorated based on the number of days they were in attendance. Any financial aid received in excess of the prorated eligibility must be repaid. Students who have completed 60 percent of the enrollment period at the time they withdraw are considered to have earned 100% of their federal aid for the term.

For more information about the exact amount of financial aid students are eligible to keep after withdrawal, see the *Guide to the Return of Federal Aid*, available in the Financial Aid Office and online at <http://www.fao.ucla.edu>.

For students who receive an administrative cancellation for a term, all financial aid for the effected term is cancelled. They are not entitled to receive any funds for the term and are expected to repay any amount received.

Students who withdraw or are cancelled for a term may have to reapply for direct loans for future terms. They should contact the Financial Aid Office and indicate the term they plan on returning to UCLA.

Services offered by the Loan Services Office include

1. Direct Loan Program loan disbursement and reconciliation
2. Disbursement of auxiliary/private loan paper checks
3. Processing and disbursement of short-term loans 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays
4. Debt management session/exam and loan exit interview administration

Unit Requirement for Loans

According to federal regulations, undergraduate students must be enrolled in at least 6 units and graduate students in at least 4 units continuously throughout the stated loan period to receive loan funds. This information is verified before loans are distributed. If a student withdraws or carries insufficient units during the stated loan period, any remaining loan funds are returned to the lender, the remaining portion of the loan is cancelled, and the student may be billed for funds already received. If reinstatement of the loan is desired, the student must reapply for a new loan that reflects the new loan period. For more information, contact the Financial Aid Office.

William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program

Direct Loan Program loans are issued each term based on the student's application date.

Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) loans under this program are disbursed through BruinBill. Current registration and all outstanding University debts are deducted from the student's loan funds before the remaining balance (or refund) is distributed. See "BruinDirect" in this section concerning direct deposit of BruinBill refunds.

Auxiliary/Private Loan Distribution

Auxiliary/private loan funds eligible for Electronic Fund Transfer (EFT) are disbursed through BruinBill. Current registration and all outstanding University debts are deducted from the student's loan funds before the remaining balance (or refund) is distributed. See "BruinDirect" concerning BruinBill refunds.

Paper auxiliary/private loan checks are available at or after the beginning of each term at the Loan Services Office. Such checks are held for pick-up for thirty (30) days, then returned to the lender.

Students who wish to pick up a paper loan check must present a valid driver's license, state ID card, military ID, or passport and have no outstanding financial holds on their records in order to receive the check.

Change of Student Information

Students must notify the Registrar, the Loan Services Office, and their student loan lender(s) in writing within 10 days if they

1. Drop below half-time status, withdraw from UCLA, or transfer to another school
2. Change their address or telephone number, graduation date, name, and/or Social Security number (notify the Registrar's Office through URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> or in person at 1113 Murphy Hall)

UCLA Borrower Requirement

Federal regulations governing the student loan programs require that anyone borrowing student loans at UCLA must complete a debt management session/exam prior to receiving loan funds. This online session/exam explains the rights and responsibilities associated with loans and provides solutions for minimizing debt. Until this requirement is fulfilled, a University hold will prevent loan funds from being disbursed. For more information, see the Debt Management link at <http://www.loans.ucla.edu>.

Exit Interview Requirement

Students who have received one or more (federal or university) long-term student loans while attending UCLA and are about to graduate, transfer, withdraw, or take a leave of absence from UCLA are required to complete a loan exit interview with the Loan Services Office, A227 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-9864. See the exit interview link at <http://www.loans.ucla.edu> for more details.

Short-Term Loans

Interest-free loans are available in the Loan Services Office. Applications are accepted in person only. To qualify for such loans, students must be currently enrolled at UCLA with sufficient accepted funding to cover current quarter or semester registration fees, and have no record of a defaulted short-term loan within the past year. Applicants must present a valid BruinCard. Three loan types are currently available:

1. **Emergency Loan:** A loan of up to \$200 for those who meet the above criteria.
2. **Living Expense Loan:** A loan of up to \$350 for those who meet the above criteria and are employed. Written employment verification must be submitted. Verification must be on company letterhead, show weekly hours worked, and be signed by the employed student's supervisor. Students employed by UCLA may use their current pay statement. If self-employed, the student's business license must be submitted.
3. **Financial Aid Advance:** A loan to bridge the gap between the awarding of current-term financial aid and the actual receipt of funds. Loans are generally made against delayed current-term federal Direct, Stafford, or Perkins; University; and approved electronically-disbursed federal PLUS (parent) loan disbursements.

A short-term loan must be repaid on time or a late fee is assessed. The defaulted loan may be subject to further collection actions, and future loan eligibility may be jeopardized. Past-due short-term loans must be paid with cash, money order, or cashier's check in order to receive University services.

Merit-Based Awards

Merit-based awards funded by the Graduate Division take the form of stipend, fee, and/or nonresident supplemental tuition awards. To receive these awards, students must return a signed offer letter and necessary supporting documentation to the Fellowships and Financial Services Office.

Fee Remissions

As a result of employment in an eligible academic apprentice personnel title, graduate students may receive certain fee remissions. Eligibility is determined by the following criteria:

1. Appointment(s) must be at least 25 percent time, not to exceed 50 percent time, and only under eligible title codes (students should see their departments or the *Academic Apprentice Personnel Manual for Students* at <http://www.gdnet.ucla.edu/gss/appm/aapmstudent.pdf> for specific details).
2. Students must work at least 25 percent time during the term.
3. Students must register and enroll in a minimum of 12 units no later than the third week of instruction.
4. Cumulative GPA must be 3.0 or better.

Fee Deferrals

Academic apprentice personnel can obtain a fee deferral from their department to extend the student services fee and nonresident supplemental tuition payment deadline by approximately two months. It is the students' responsibility to pay back the deferral with either personal funds or a fee award credited to their accounts. Students who do not meet the extended deadline are charged a late fee.

Medical Insurance Plan Premiums

The mandatory insurance premium is paid for all eligible academic apprentice personnel. Students should not waive health insurance if they want the premium paid as part of their employment. To waive UCSHIP, submit the online waiver before the original registration fees payment deadline. A waiver cannot be reversed during the term even if students have been given a fee deferral.

Extramural Support

The Graduate and Postdoctoral Extramural Support (GRAPES) database contains information on over 500 awards for graduate study, dissertation research, travel grants, and postdoctoral research. GRAPES is available at <http://www.gdnet.ucla.edu/grpinst.htm> or from the Fellowships and Financial Services Office, (310) 825-3521.

Educational Tax Benefits

A number of educational tax benefits may have an impact on the federal income tax liability of students and their families. To assist the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) monitor eligibility for tax credits, UCLA must provide certain information to the IRS on its students. A brief summary of the provisions that may apply to students in attendance at UCLA follows:

Hope Scholarship Tax Credit is a nonrefundable tax credit up to a maximum amount of \$2,500 for qualified tuition and fees paid by or on behalf of a student. The credit is generally available for students in their first two years enrolled at least half time in coursework leading to a recognized degree or certificate.

Lifetime Learning Credit is a nonrefundable credit equal to 20 percent of the first \$10,000 of qualified tuition and fees paid by or on behalf of a student in years in which the Hope Scholarship Credit is not claimed. The credit is generally available for students enrolled in coursework leading to a recognized degree or certificate. Individuals enrolled in coursework to acquire or improve job skills may also be eligible for the Lifetime Learning Credit.

Student Loan Interest Deduction is a federal income tax deduction for an amount up to \$2,500 in interest paid on loans incurred to pay qualified education expenses.

As required by law, UCLA will report to the IRS the identity of students who have paid educational fees that may be eligible for the

Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning Credit. The university must report the following:

1. student social security number, name, street address, city, state, and ZIP code
2. billed amount for qualified tuition and related expenses
3. adjustments to qualified tuition and related expenses for a prior year
4. scholarships or grants
5. adjustments to scholarships or grants for a prior year
6. half-time student status
7. graduate student status

On or before February 1 of the current tax year, students will receive a corresponding report. Any questions regarding information printed on this form should be directed to TCRS, the University of California's education tax credit reporting service, at their toll free number (877) 467-3821, or see <http://www.tcrs.com>.

Enrollment

Enrolling in Classes

See the Class Listings section for class times, rooms, instructors, and other enrollment information. For updated listings, see the online *Schedule of Classes*. See the Class Listings section and your school or College advisers (listed in the Academic Counseling section) to assemble a program of courses.

Plan two or three alternate programs in case your first choice of courses is not available. Do not choose two courses in the same final examination group (see the final examination chart in the Class Listings section) or select classes that conflict in meeting times. If conflicts are unavoidable, consult with the instructor of each course at the first class meeting.

Hepatitis B Vaccine Requirement

California law requires students 18 years and younger to provide proof of immunity to Hepatitis B prior to entering and enrolling at the University of California. The Hepatitis B vaccine is a three-shot series. If students have already received the series in their lifetime, there is no need to repeat it. To satisfy the requirement, all students must submit their information at <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>. The link is located under the New Bruins section.

Students who have not yet completed the series are granted a two-term grace period to comply. Failure to satisfy the requirement by the third term results in a hold on student records, whereby students cannot enroll in classes or use any University services.

URSA Enrollment

University Records System Access (URSA) enables UCLA students to acquire information from their University academic records and to enroll in classes. Use URSA at <http://www.ursa.ucla.edu> to determine assigned appointment periods; enroll in classes; add, drop, exchange, or change the grading basis of classes; join a wait list; view and download Study Lists; and set up third-party views. Students enroll during appointment times which they obtain through URSA.

See the URSA section for more information on services and features.

Enrollment Appointments

Enrollment appointments are based on class level and assigned within the time and dates shown on the chart at the end of this section or at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/soc/enrollappt.htm>.

Current-term degree candidates must redeclare candidacy for a later term to receive enrollment appointment times for future terms.

Undergraduate Student Enrollment

A two-pass system is used for UCLA's 26,000 undergraduates to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to enroll in required premajor, major, and GE courses and to graduate.

Undergraduates eligible to enroll for the next term enroll on URSA during two randomly-assigned appointments, which fall within pass periods that are prioritized as follows:

1. Students in priority groups
2. Seniors with 160 completed units who have declared candidacy to graduate within the next two terms

3. Seniors with 160 or more units who have not declared candidacy
4. New and reentering students eligible for advance payment and/or enrollment
5. Seniors with less than 160 units (135–159.9 units)
6. Juniors with less than 135 units (90–134.9 units)
7. Sophomores with less than 90 units (45–89.9 units)
8. Freshmen with less than 45 units (0–44.9 units)

When determining class level, a student's current term units are included and enrollment appointment times are assigned based on that projected classification. Projected class level is also used if course enrollment is restricted to a certain class level. Projected class level is indicated on URSA when a student checks his or her individual enrollment appointment times.

URSA does not allow students to enroll before their specified time and informs them of their correct appointment day and time.

Changes in the appointment sequence are made only to correct an appointment based on an incorrect class level. To request an appointment change, go to the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall prior to the assigned appointment.

PRIORITY PASS. During their priority pass, students **may only enroll in 10 units** unless otherwise noted by their priority group. Students in a priority group who do not enroll during their priority pass appointment period must wait until their first pass appointment to enroll. Enrollment is not guaranteed during priority pass appointments.

Priority enrollment groups include Regents Scholars, athletes in NCAA sports, qualified veterans, and students served by the Office for Students with Disabilities. Sections are carefully monitored during each priority group pass to ensure that any one group does not exceed 30 percent and that all groups do not exceed 50 percent of a section's spaces, in accordance with recommendations of a task force appointed by the Committee on Educational Policy.

NOTE: Priority pass students may only enroll in a **total** of 10 units during their priority *and* first passes.

FIRST PASS. During their first pass, students **may only enroll in 10 units**. This gives all undergraduates a better chance to obtain at least two courses needed toward graduation. Students who do not enroll during their first pass appointment period must wait until their second pass appointment to enroll.

SECOND PASS. During their second pass, students can add courses up to the maximum units allowed by their College or school. They can enroll from the beginning of the specified appointment day and time through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes, when wait lists are eliminated and Study Lists of enrolled courses become official. Students should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by that date to avoid paying the late Study List filing fee and obtaining instructor signatures and College/school approval on Enrollment Petitions (for more details, see "Official Study Lists").

After second pass appointments begin, undergraduates may

1. Use a Permission to Enroll (PTE) number (see "Enrollment in Restricted Classes") to enroll through URSA for restricted or closed classes.
2. Submit approved petitions for contract courses
3. Request enrollment in Passed/Not Passed (P/NP) courses over the eligible limit of units (URSA informs students if this applies)
4. Submit approval for an **excess unit** Study List

Graduate Student Enrollment

Law, Medicine, and Dentistry students enroll as instructed by their respective Student Affairs Offices.

All other graduate students eligible to enroll for the next term are randomly assigned one appointment time or pass and can use URSA from the beginning of the specified appointment time through midnight on Friday of the second week of classes. Students should be enrolled in courses with unit credit by the deadline to avoid the late filing of Study List fee and to avoid having to obtain instructor signatures.

Study List Limits

Study list maximums are

College of Letters and Science	19 units
School of Engineering	21 units
School of Nursing	20 units
School of the Arts and Architecture	20 units
School of Theater, Film, and Television	19 units

To enroll in more units than the maximum allowed, see the appropriate College or school office to make an Excess Study List request.

Wait Lists

Wait lists are maintained through Friday of the second week of classes unless a department deletes them earlier. This may happen on the first day of classes for some sections, especially laboratories. Check the notes under the course listing in the *Schedule of Classes*. Students should not assume they will be added to a class or dropped from a class (if, for example, they are number one or number 100 on the wait list). Students must drop themselves before the official Study List deadline if they do not want the class.

A wait-list position within 10 percent of enrollment capacity (for example, number five for a class of 50) indicates a good chance of being enrolled. Many students drop classes after the first meeting, at which point other students may enroll in the class or advance on the wait list. Sometimes departments increase the enrollment capacity of the class, which automatically enrolls additional students from the wait list. Check URSA before Friday of the second week of classes to determine wait-list status.

Students may move backward on wait lists if a class is overenrolled through the use of PTE numbers. For example, a student who is first on the wait list for a course that has an enrollment capacity of 100 and is not overenrolled may move from position 101/100 to 105/100 if four students with PTE numbers enroll. The student cannot be enrolled until five people drop the course and the enrolled number is less than the enrollment capacity.

Enrollment in Restricted Classes

Students may enroll through URSA in a restricted class if they get a five-digit PTE number. A PTE number is issued at the discretion of the instructor or department offering the class. When used with the nine-digit course ID, it guarantees enrollment through URSA. Inquire at the respective departmental office regarding any internal department procedures for receiving a PTE number.

PTE numbers may be issued in the following cases:

1. The department/instructor offering the class may authorize **selective enrollment** if the enrollment capacity is filled. This is

at the instructor's discretion and may only be approved based on criteria established by the instructor and/or department

2. As an exception to published **restrictions** (consent of instructor, department consent, specified majors, class levels—freshmen only, juniors or above) in the *Schedule of Classes*
3. **Closed classes** (enrollment capacity reached). When the enrollment capacity is reached, students may choose to be on a wait list. They are moved into the class as enrolled students drop out or if the department increases the enrollment capacity

If the instructor/department assigns a PTE number through MyUCLA, use the link in the MyUCLA notice to enroll in the class. If the PTE is assigned manually, use the nine-digit course ID and PTE number to enroll through URSA.

Enforced Requisites

Undergraduate students are prevented from enrolling in lower division Letters and Science courses with enforced requisites (as listed in the *UCLA General Catalog* or the online *Schedule of Classes*) if those requisites have not been met. Some courses with requisites may be in warning status, which allows enrollment but informs students that the course requisite has not been met. In the Class Listings section, courses with enforced requisites are notated with a Y in the ENF REQ column, located after the course title.

Students with transfer or AP credit that was not evaluated as equivalent to a specific requisite should consult the department offering the course for review of the transfer or AP credit as shown on their DPR. Decisions by the department concerning meeting requisites are final.

Impacted Courses

Courses that meet the criteria below and have been approved by the Faculty Executive Committee of the College or schools are designated as "impacted" courses.

1. Meet once a week and are difficult to complete if a student has not attended by the end of the second week of classes
2. Have high enrollment demand that deny qualified students enrollment because of limited resources
3. Have high instructor/student ratios, and/or
4. Involve large commitments of other resources

Each impacted course is clearly indicated in the Class Listings section by a Y in the IM (Impacted) column. In the online *Schedule of Classes*, the designation is listed under "Crs Info" or the "ID Number" which links to expanded information about a course.

A complete list of impacted courses is available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/soc/impact.htm>.

Undergraduate students cannot drop an impacted course after Friday of the second week of a term for other than exceptionally extenuating circumstances as described in "Drop Procedures."

Enrollment in Contract Courses

Students use MyUCLA to initiate a petition to enroll in a contract course. To start the process and obtain contract forms, students log in to MyUCLA, click on "Features" in the navigation bar, select "Academic" from the fly-out menu, and then select "Contract Courses." Contract forms are available for the following course

numbers: Honors Contracts (89HC, 189HC), Student Research Program (99), USIE contracts (188SA, 188SB), and upper division tutorials (195-199). See the sample contract at <https://be.my.ucla.edu/contractcourses/CC.asp>.

Each form is customized for a specific course number. Before filling out the form, students need to prepare a short description of the proposed course of study, the nature of the faculty supervision, and the type of tangible evidence of work completed that will be presented at the conclusion of the course. The name of the faculty mentor who is to supervise the course is also needed at the time the form is filled out. After this information is entered, print the form and obtain the necessary signatures.

For students pursuing an internship (course 195), consult with either a departmental adviser or the Center for Community Learning (A265 Murphy Hall) to determine which unit coordinates the internship. Internships coordinated through the Center for Community Learning require a site supervisor's signature.

After obtaining the signatures of the instructor and the instructor's department chair, students must check with the department of the course in which they are enrolling, or with their College or school, to confirm which of the following options to use to complete enrollment in the course:

1. Through the department by leaving the form for processing
2. Through the appropriate school by taking the form to
 - a. 6426 Boelter Hall for the Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science
 - b. 103 East Melnitz Building for the School of Theater, Film, and Television
 - c. 2-137 Factor Building for the School of Nursing
4. Through the Registrar's Office by taking the form to 1113 Murphy Hall

Note: Students setting up contracts with instructors in one of the 19 School of Medicine departments must (1) obtain the instructor's signature, (2) take the form to the instructor's department where a staff person will obtain the chair's (or chair designee's) signature, and (3) bring the completed form to the Registrar's Office for enrollment processing.

The deadline to enroll in a contract course without a fee is Friday of the second week of classes; to enroll with a fee, the deadline is Friday of the third week of classes.

Once a contract is processed, students can print out their Study List which serves as a record of enrollment.

Official Study Lists

A Study List is a record of all courses a student is enrolled in for a term. A registered student's Study List of enrolled courses becomes official at midnight on Friday of the second week of classes and all wait lists are eliminated at that time.

Student Responsibility

Each student is responsible for all courses and the grading basis for each course, as listed on URSA, and cannot receive credit for courses not listed. Errors or omissions should be corrected before the College or school deadline for changes by petition. Unapproved withdrawal from or neglect of a course entered on the Study List results in a failing grade. URSA enrollment deadlines end at midnight on the published date (see the URSA appointment times chart below and the Calendar section). Study Lists should be checked through URSA after all enrollment transactions.

In planning courses for a term, students are responsible for avoiding class conflicts and avoiding conflicting or multiple same-day final examinations. See "Final Examination Policies" in the Class Listings section.

Study List Changes on URSA

Fees for adds and changes on URSA are automatically charged to a student's BruinBill account on a per-transaction basis. Anything submitted or requested as an exception to a published deadline is subject to a penalty fee. Approved retroactive enrollment requests are assessed a per-transaction fee. See the Calendar section for deadlines and see "Miscellaneous Fees" in the Registration section for all course transaction fees.

Undergraduate Study List Changes

Undergraduate students can make changes to their Study List through Friday of the second week without a fee. After Friday of the second week, when the Study List becomes official, undergraduate students are charged a fee to make changes. The fees are assessed through BruinBill. See "Study List Changes on URSA."

Add a Course

Undergraduate students adding courses during the third week are assessed a per-course change fee. For courses added after the official add deadline of Friday of the third week, they are assessed a per-course change fee plus a per-course penalty fee. A PTE number is required if the class is closed or restricted. After week three, Col-

lege or school approval is required to add a class. See "Miscellaneous Fees" for fee information.

Change Variable Units

Undergraduate students changing units through URSA on a variable unit class during third and fourth week are assessed a per-course change fee. After fourth week, students are assessed a per-course change fee plus a per-course penalty fee. After week four, College or school approval is required to make changes. See "Miscellaneous Fees" for fee information.

Drop a Course

Drop deadlines vary by College or school and the type of course (impacted or nonimpacted). See "Drop Procedures" and the drop reference chart below for more detailed information.

Note: Student athletes may not drop a class after the first day of class without their counselor's approval.

Change the Grading Basis of a Course

Undergraduate students changing the grading basis of an optionally graded course through URSA during weeks three through six are assessed a per-course change fee. Changes after Friday of sixth week require a petition; if approved, students are assessed a per-course change fee plus a per-course penalty fee. See "Changing Grading Basis" below for more detailed information; see "Miscellaneous Fees" for service fee information.

Graduate Study List Changes

Graduate students can use URSA to add, drop, change grading basis, or change variable units through the end of the last day of instruction. Fees are assessed through BruinBill after Friday of second week. See "Study List Changes on URSA" above.

Graduate students are assessed a per-course change fee when adding a course during the third week. They are also assessed a per-course change fee when dropping a course, changing variable units, or changing grading basis through Friday of tenth week. The official graduate add deadline is Friday of third week. For courses added after this date, graduate students are assessed a per-course change fee plus a per-course penalty fee and the enrollments are not counted toward departmental budget allocations. A PTE number is required if the class is closed or restricted.

Late Study Lists

Registered students who are not officially enrolled in courses for credit as of Friday of the second week of instruction must file a late Study List. Use an Enrollment Petition for this process.

A fee is charged for filing a late Study List after Friday of the second week of instruction as described under "Late Payment" in the Registration section. See "Miscellaneous Fees" for fee information. Fees are assessed through BruinBill.

1. Obtain the appropriate form: undergraduate students from the College or school advising unit; graduate students from a department adviser.
2. Obtain the necessary signatures and file the approved form at the processing locations noted on the Enrollment Petition form. Students are given a receipt of the approved/processed Study List and are responsible for all courses and grading basis as recorded.

Drop Procedures

Dropping a course may reduce a Study List below minimums required for full-time status, financial aid, the minimum progress requirement, and eligibility for residence halls and other services that require a specific enrollment status. The drop form reminds students about these requirements and the consequences that may be triggered if the petition is processed. It is each student's responsibility to meet enrollment unit requirements.

Dropping Nonimpacted Courses

Nonimpacted courses constitute the vast majority of courses and may be dropped on or before Friday of second week through URSA with no fee or transcript notation. Nonimpacted courses may be dropped during the third and fourth week through URSA with no transcript notation and a per-course change fee. Drops after Friday of fourth week are assessed a per-course change fee plus a per-course penalty fee. Drops after fourth week incur a transcript notation noting the week the class was dropped. See "Miscellaneous Fees" for fee information.

The drop periods for classes vary by College or school. See the drop reference chart.

Students in the College of Letters and Science can drop non-impacted courses through URSA without a transcript notation through Friday of fourth week. In weeks five through seven, students in the College can drop courses through URSA without an instructor's signature. During weeks eight through ten, students are restricted to three approved drops in their academic career. For drops after seventh week, an instructor's signature and College approval is required.

For students in the Henry Samueli School of Engineering, the School of the Arts and Architecture, and the School of Theater, Film, and Television, students can drop courses through URSA without a transcript notation through Friday of fourth week. After fourth week, they must obtain a drop petition from their academic deans' office.

Dropping Impacted Courses

Impacted courses may be dropped on or before Friday of second week through URSA with no fee or transcript notation. Each impacted course is indicated by a Y in the IM (impacted) column in the class listings of the *Schedule of Classes*.

Impacted Course Drop Policy

After Friday of second week, undergraduate students who need to request a drop of an impacted course should consult the course instructor and explore academic options other than dropping the course. Impacted courses may be dropped after the second-week deadline only under extraordinary circumstances (such as severe illness).

To drop an impacted course, undergraduate students should pick up a Late Impacted Course Drop Petition or Retroactive Drop Petition form from their counseling unit:

College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall
 Honors Programs Office, A311 Murphy Hall
 AAP Counseling Office, 1209 Campbell Hall
 Athletic Counseling Office, Morgan Center
 School of Engineering and Applied Science, 6426 Boelter Hall

Follow the instructions on the form. A detailed explanation of the reason for dropping the course must be given, and the course instructor's signature must be obtained.

For College of Letters and Science students, requests to drop an impacted course are referred by College counseling units to a subcommittee of the Faculty Executive Committee. For School of Engineering students, requests are submitted to the Associate Dean. If the request is approved, the dropped course appears on the student's transcript with a notation indicating the date and week of the

term in which the drop petition was filed, and the late drop fee is assessed.

Transcript Notation for Late Drops

Drops of impacted courses processed after Friday of second week and drops of nonimpacted courses processed after Friday of fourth week are recorded on the permanent undergraduate transcript. The entry records the week the course was dropped using the following format:

Changing Grading Basis**Courses with Optional Grading Basis**

Courses with an optional grading basis allow students (not instructors) to choose either a Letter grade or a Passed/Not Passed grade (for undergraduates) or Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory grade (for graduate students). In URSA and the *Schedule of Classes*, the grade type for classes with an optional grading basis is displayed as SO (Student Option)—which appears in the grade type column. The default grading basis for such classes is LG (Letter Grade).

Undergraduate students in good academic standing can change the grading basis on these courses through URSA. The deadline for undergraduates to make changes is Friday of sixth week. Graduate students can make changes through the last day of instruction. In the online *Schedule of Classes*, on the class listing page, click on

"Crs Info" to determine if a course has optional grading, or see the course description in the catalog at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/catalog/updates/>.

Courses with Mandatory Grading Basis

Courses with a mandatory (nonoptional) grading basis (e.g., Letter Grade only, Passed/Not Passed, Satisfactory/Not Satisfactory) are designated LG, PN, or SU in URSA. The grading basis of these courses cannot be changed through URSA. Undergraduate students in good academic standing must petition to request a change in grading basis. The deadline for undergraduates to petition for change is Friday of sixth week. Graduate students can petition for change through the last day of instruction.

1. Using a Student Petition form, obtain approval to change grading basis from the department offering the class.
2. If departmental approval is granted, file the petition with the College or school counseling unit if you are an undergraduate student or with Graduate Division if you are a graduate student.
3. If the request is approved by the College, school, or Graduate Division, the petition is sent to the Registrar's Office, and the change in grading basis is recorded on the Study List.

(Engineering students at 6426 Boelter Hall; Letters and Science honors students at Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; AAP students at AAP Counseling, 1209 Campbell Hall; athletes at the Morgan Center; all other Letters and Science students at College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall; Schools of Arts and Architecture, Theater, Film, and Television, and Nursing at their respective student affairs offices).

Special Programs Enrollment

Concurrent Enrollment

Concurrent enrollment—defined as taking courses during regular sessions (Fall, Spring, and Spring Quarters) for credit at UCLA and, at the same time, at another non-UC institution, including UCLA Extension—is not permitted except in extraordinary circumstances, and no credit is given for such courses unless the approval of the UCLA College or school has been obtained by petition prior to enrollment.

Intersegmental Cross-Enrollment

At the discretion of the appropriate campus authorities on both campuses, the California Education Code allows undergraduate students enrolled in any campus of the California community colleges, the California State University, or the University of California to enroll without formal admission in a maximum of one course per academic term at a campus of either of the other systems on a space-available basis. Enrollment in precollege courses is excluded.

UCLA students qualify for intersegmental cross-enrollment if they meet all the following requirements:

1. Complete at least one term at UCLA as a matriculated student
2. Enroll for a minimum of 6 units for the current term
3. Earn a grade-point average of 2.0 (C) for work completed
4. Pay appropriate registration fees at UCLA for the current term
5. Complete appropriate academic preparation as determined by the host campus
6. Have California resident status

Obtain a concurrent enrollment application from the College or school. An administration fee is charged for each academic term such enrollment is requested.

Intercampus Visitor Program

Undergraduates enrolled at one campus of the University of California may have the opportunity to attend another UC campus for one quarter or semester on the Intercampus Visitor Program. UCLA students obtain applications from the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall. Observe the deadlines and enrollment restrictions on the application. Applications are reviewed by a student's College or school. Letters and Science students should contact College Academic Counseling in A316 Murphy Hall; Arts and Architecture students should contact the Student Services Office in 2200 Broad Art Center; Theater, Film, and Television students should contact the Student Services Office in 103 East Melnitz Building; Engineering students should contact the Student Services Office in 6426 Boelter Hall.

Simultaneous UC Enrollment

Undergraduate students may enroll simultaneously in courses offered by another UC campus. Eligible students must be registered (fees paid), in good standing, and enrolled in at least 12 units at UCLA. Students may simultaneously enroll in no more than one UC host-campus course not to exceed 6 units. Before attending the host campus, both campuses must give approval. Approval to enroll simultaneously on another UC campus does not guarantee credit toward specific degree or General Education requirements. Application of host-campus courses to UCLA graduation requirements is determined by the College or school. Details are on the application form. Obtain applications and directions for submitting forms from the following offices: honors students, A311 Murphy Hall; student athletes, Morgan Center; AAP students, 1209 Campbell Hall; all other Letters and Science students, College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall; Arts and Architecture, Theater, Film, and Television, Engineering and Applied Science, and Nursing students, their respective student affairs offices. The form is also available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>.

University Records System Access (URSA) gives UCLA students, and those who have been students within the past 10 years, real-time access to their official University academic records. In addition, students may set up and manage third-party access for others to access their data and BruinBill account.

URSA is available Sunday night from 6 p.m. through Tuesday at 1 a.m. and Tuesday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 1 a.m., including holidays.

With its intuitive visual interface, URSA is the easiest way to enroll in classes and to gain real-time access to academic, financial, and personal records.

URSA is a secure encrypted site; records are confidential. Users access URSA by using their UCLA Logon ID and password. This personal logon information should not be given to anyone. Tampering with another student's enrollment or personal data is subject to disciplinary action up to and including suspension.

Users create and manage their individual UCLA Logon ID and password at <https://logon.ucla.edu>. Passwords can be changed and reset, and security questions can be set up to help users remember their passwords.


Third-Party Access

Students can authorize third parties to have view-only access to their student records and direct access to their BruinBill account. A third party establishes his or her own separate UCLA Logon ID and password, communicates this information (name and UCLA Logon ID) directly to the student, and the student selects which URSA features the third party can view or access. Students may revoke access, or change access features, at any time.

Students are advised of their FERPA rights, and they must check a box indicating that they understand they are waiving FERPA for student-designated third parties. Third parties must use URSA to access the features selected by the student. With the exception of financial information, no other non-public student information may be released to third parties by any University staff over the phone or in person.

UCLA Online

BruinAlert

The BruinAlert messaging service communicates official information during an emergency or crisis situation that disrupts normal operation of the UCLA campus or threatens the health or safety of campus community members. BruinAlert sends messages to student subscribers on a “best effort” basis to e-mail and text-capable wireless devices such as mobile telephones.

Students with current e-mail addresses in URSA are automatically enrolled in BruinAlert and receive e-mail messages in the event of an emergency. Short Message Service (SMS) text messaging is also available to students on a voluntary basis; students may subscribe to SMS through the BruinAlert website at <https://www.transportation.ucla.edu/bruinalert/>.

Bruin OnLine (BOL) is a collection of software and services that provide UCLA students, faculty, and staff with access to e-mail, campus network services, and the Internet. Services include dialup access using PPP at speeds up to 56 kbps and wireless access to the campus network, along with wired connections through Ethernet ports.

Accessing Bruin OnLine Services

On campus, BOL services are available anywhere there is network access, including campus computing laboratories, libraries, and campus residence hall rooms; and anywhere there is wireless network coverage.

BOL can be accessed from off campus by

1. Using the BOL modem pool (310 area code). Users pay all telephone charges for toll or long-distance access (310 area code)
2. Using your own Internet Service Provider (ISP), connect through the BOL proxy server to access UCLA restricted resources such as software and library journals. See <http://www.bol.ucla.edu/services/proxy/> for more information

Access for Persons with Disabilities

The Academic Technology Services (ATS) Disabilities and Computing Program (DCP) provides adaptive technology to help persons with disabilities who use BOL-supported software. DCP can assist with configuration and training for screen reader, voice recognition, reading aid, and other software programs. Wireless Access

Wireless Internet access is available in select locations on campus for UCLA Logon ID holders with their own 802.11a/g/n-compliant laptop or handheld computer. Getting Started

To use BOL services, you need a UCLA Logon ID and password, and a computer that connects to the UCLA network. You can access BOL services from many locations throughout campus or from home. Personalized assistance is also available from the BOL Help Desk.

UCLA Logon

A UCLA Logon ID allows authentication for a variety of online campus services, networks, and materials. With this ID, users can

1. Access class webpages and discussion groups
2. Search the UCLA Library and online databases
3. Create e-mail mailing lists
4. Download Internet browsers, anti-virus software, e-mail clients, and FTP programs
5. Create personal webpages
6. Check e-mail
7. Authenticate to use the BOL Proxy Server
8. Access the UCLA wireless network and VPN server

Campus Computer Laboratories

Student computer laboratories are supported through Academic Technology Services (ATS) and the College Library Instructional Computing Commons (CLICC), a collaborative effort between ATS, Center for Digital Humanities, Social Sciences Computing, Office of Instructional Development, and College Library. Some 15 computer laboratories are available throughout campus, each with computers, peripherals, software, and services that cater to specific areas of study.

Access to the laboratories varies; departmental laboratories may require enrollment in either the major or a class. General purpose laboratories merely require a UCLA Logon ID and password, which is available free of charge to UCLA students, faculty, and staff. Kiosks to set up an account are available at several locations.

Electronic Mailing Lists (Listservs)

Bruin OnLine offers a mailing list service that manages electronic mail discussion and e-newsletter distribution to list subscribers. Mailing lists are available for any academic purpose; new list requests from students require verification of faculty sponsorship. Instructional Enhancement Initiative

Students enrolled in most undergraduate courses are assessed a per-unit course materials fee, called the Instructional Enhancement Initiative (IEI) fee. For fee amounts, see the Miscellaneous Fee chart in the Registration section or online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/fees/>. Fee assessment through BruinBill is based on actual enrollment at the end of the fourth week of the quarter. IEI fees apply to all students except Education Abroad Program reciprocity students and CAPPP (Washington internship) students.

The Instructional Enhancement Initiative (IEI) supports undergraduate education through

1. Online course websites with instant access to syllabi, course documents and files, interactive tools; instructional websites and online software; and other aspects of online learning including chat rooms, online office hours, media presentations, quizzes, and so forth.
2. Computer Labs and Wireless access, including curated workstations in staffed labs, divisional labs, helpdesks, printing, and contributions to CLICC.
3. Course software, including popular creative, scientific, math, statistics packages and online products.
4. Staffing, including technology experts who support faculty, teaching assistants, or students regarding creation of online course content and use of tools to produce that content, as well as course website and computer lab staff.

MyUCLA

MyUCLA at <http://my.ucla.edu> is a secure, personalized gateway to a variety of online information and campus services tailored to student needs. Features of MyUCLA include

1. WebMail including previews, address book import/export, e-mail address look-up from personal and campus directories, text features, and batch reply mailing
2. Calendar pre-populated with 15 categories of events including class schedules, finals, counseling appointments, workshops, student elections, and enrollment periods
3. Class Planner where class schedules can be created, printed, saved, and shared with counselors; and, through links with URSA, used to streamline the enrollment process
4. Study List showing classes and class information for current and previous quarters, including links to course websites, grades, library reserves, textbooks, the *Schedule of Classes*, TurnItIn, and participating classmates
5. Personalized notices concerning research and scholarship opportunities, Commencement, MyUCLA group events, and more
6. Student elections voting
7. Workshop sign-ups for sessions that help students meet academic and professional goals
8. Student forums in categories including academics, world issues, and dating
9. Internship search
10. Academic tools such as GPA calculator, virtual counseling, and contract courses

Newsgroups

Usenet is a worldwide discussion system of newsgroups classified by subject. Newsgroups available on news.ucla.edu include the [ucla.*](http://news.ucla.edu) hierarchy which is dedicated to topics specific to UCLA and is not transmitted outside of UCLA.

Bruin OnLine has its own newsgroups, for example, that post announcements about its service and where students can ask questions about computer software and hardware ([ucla.bol.announce](http://news.ucla.edu), [ucla.bol.general](http://news.ucla.edu), and [ucla.bol.webpages](http://news.ucla.edu)). Other newsgroups help with platform questions ([ucla.pc](http://news.ucla.edu) and [ucla.mac](http://news.ucla.edu)), while still others post announcements and offer forums (for example, [ucla.general](http://news.ucla.edu), [ucla.announce](http://news.ucla.edu), [ucla.rumor](http://news.ucla.edu), and [ucla.forsale](http://news.ucla.edu)). Some classes have their own newsgroups as well (see [ucla.classes.*](http://news.ucla.edu) hierarchy).

Newsgroups offered by news.ucla.edu can be accessed through a newsreader client such as Outlook Express, Mozilla, or Netscape. For more information, see <http://www.bol.ucla.edu/services/news/>.

Online Directory

The UCLA Campus Directory offers directory information about faculty, staff, students, and departments. Student listings in the online directory are generated through URSA and are updated nightly (excluding weekends) by the Registrar's Office, which administers student privacy rights for release of student information. A student may change address, telephone number, e-mail address, and privacy options through URSA. Changes to address and privacy options may also be submitted using a Name Change or Correction form, available in the Murphy Hall northwest lobby or at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>, and filed at 1113 Murphy Hall. Student Technology Center

The Student Technology Center coordinates computing connectivity to the campus network for students living in on-campus housing, including network card purchase and installation, and technical support. The center houses a computer laboratory with Macintosh and Windows computers. It also offers fax, shipping, copying, and printing services. Located opposite Covel Commons at 330 De Neve Drive, (310) 825-3400; see <http://map.ais.ucla.edu/go/1001545>.

UCLA Homepage

The UCLA homepage (<http://www.ucla.edu>) offers a gateway for access to information on campus teaching, research, and service. Its main menu links to sites for prospective and current students; arts, museums, and athletic events; and academic, library, and research information. It also offers access to the Online Directory and pages for alumni. In addition, the current students link connects to URSA, MyUCLA, student services, computing laboratories, and campus news. A search feature allows for easy browsing through the thousands of webpages that comprise the UCLA site, including those for departments, programs, and services.

UCLA Library Electronic Resources

While continuing to develop and manage collections of traditional printed materials, the UCLA Library also purchases or licenses access to many digital resources which are available through its website, <http://www.library.ucla.edu>. Resources include electronic journals, books, reference works, periodical indexes, and abstracts.

The online UCLA Library Catalog contains records for all library holdings and other campus collections, including the Film and Television Archive, Ethnomusicology Archive, and ethnic studies center libraries. It also shows library item location and circulation status, and allows users to request document delivery services and SRLF items.

The online Melvyl Catalog contains information on all University of California campus holdings as well as a number of other collections. Through Melvyl, users can request items from other campuses and have them delivered to UCLA.

Librarians and trained staff are available in the libraries, online, and by telephone to answer questions about using online systems, and to provide assistance with reference and research topics.

Student Services

Student Services support the teaching, research, and public service functions of the University while they promote the academic success of UCLA students and enhance the quality of campus life.

Registrar's Office Services

In addition to enrollment services, the Registrar's Office helps students determine residence status, change names on official records, and obtain transcripts and degrees. See the Registrar's Services Directory for a complete list of services.

Establishing Residence for Tuition Purposes

Specific criteria for establishing residence for tuition purposes are included in the Appendix of the current *UCLA General Catalog* and in the Registrar's Office website at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/residence/>. Direct inquiries about residence requirements to the Residence Deputy, 1113 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-3447. No other University personnel are authorized to supply information about residence requirements for tuition purposes.

The Petition for Residence Classification is obtained on the Registrar's Office website and filed at 1113 Murphy Hall prior to the late registration period for the term in which the student is eligible for classification from nonresident to resident status. Documentation of residence will be requested at that time.

Name Change

To change their names on official University records, or to identify capitalization, punctuation, or accent marks (for their diploma) that computer files do not accommodate, students must obtain and file (no fee) the UCLA Name Change or Correction form at the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall. Proof of former and new name must be submitted with the form. Forms are available in the Murphy Hall northwest lobby and at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. A new BruinCard must be obtained at 123 Kerckhoff Hall for a replacement fee.

Official Transcripts

Two versions of official UCLA student records are available from the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall. These are the academic transcript and the verification transcript. Each is designed to meet specific needs.

Official UCLA transcripts are printed on security paper to safeguard against unauthorized duplication, alteration, and misrepresentation. The paper has a multicolor security background with a faint background design and a border with the words "University of California, Los Angeles." Authentication details are located in the lower right hand corner of the transcript, and the transcript legend is located on the reverse of the document. Official transcripts are not available electronically.

The Registrar's Office provides transcripts for regular and summer sessions. For UCLA Extension courses, order transcripts from UCLA Extension, P.O. Box 24901, Los Angeles, CA 90024 or online at <http://www.uclaextension.edu>. For professional school transcripts, contact the school or see <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/faq/transcriptfaq.htm>.

Student Copy. A student may obtain an unofficial transcript, in person only, at the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall, during regular business hours. A photo ID is required. The unofficial transcript is printed on plain paper and does not carry the Registrar's seal. One copy of the unofficial transcript, which may be photocopied as needed, is supplied per visit at no charge.

Academic Transcript

The academic transcript is a student's complete academic record, including a listing of courses taken, transfer credit, units, grades, grade-point average (GPA), earned UCLA degrees, and in-progress term information, which includes a list of the courses that student enrolled in during the term the document was requested, and other in-progress information such as a change in major or the removal of an I grade.

Grades for completed terms are processed immediately following the conclusion of final examinations. Complete academic transcripts are available approximately two weeks after the last day of the term. For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. If you require earlier proof of graduation, contact your degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall. A fee is charged for this service.

The minimum period required for processing and issuing academic transcripts for both registered and former students is three working days. Expedited service (processing within 24 hours) is available for an additional charge per addressee.

Verification Transcript

The verification transcript certifies registration (fee payment), enrollment status, and degrees. This includes verification for auto insurance "good student" discounts. The verification transcript can be attached to the insurance form. The verification fee is required for this service. Verification transcripts confirm student status only after registration fees have been paid for the term. Verification of student workload is based on actual enrolled units and does not consider wait-listed units or list courses for a term.

Verification of degree can be issued after the degree has been posted to the student's record approximately seven weeks after the term ends. If verification is required before the degree is posted, students may contact their degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall.

The fee for a verification transcript is waived if requested for loan or student aid verifications (proof of request required). Students may obtain this free official verification at 1113 Murphy Hall. Most enrollment verifications for loans and creditors, however, are processed for the University by National Student Clearinghouse.

Third-Party Verifications

UCLA has authorized National Student Clearinghouse to act as its agent for all third-party verifications of student enrollment and degrees. Degree verification for the most recent term is available approximately eight weeks after the term ends. The Clearinghouse abides by all provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). See <http://www.studentclearinghouse.org>.

Ordering Transcripts

Current students *must* order official academic and verification transcripts online through URSA or by mail using the Transcript Order form, available in the Murphy Hall northwest lobby or at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. Students requiring special handling or services, or non-current students, may order academic and verification transcripts in person at 1113 Murphy Hall.

Students using the Transcript Order form should mail it to the UCLA Registrar's Office, Attn: [Academic or Verification] Transcripts, 1105 Murphy Hall, Box 951429, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1429.

Requests using the Transcript Order form should include

1. The name under which you were registered at UCLA
2. Your dates of attendance
3. Your date of birth
4. Your 9-digit student ID number, if available
5. Your complete address and telephone number
6. The number of copies you need
7. Detailed mailing instructions including any special handling
8. Your full signature

Fees and Payment

See the Miscellaneous Fees chart for transcript fees and services. For online orders, a Discover, MasterCard, Pulse, or Star card is required. Mail orders must be accompanied by a check or money order payable to Regents-UC. For in-person orders, current students' transcript fees are billed to their BruinBill account. BruinBill accounts are administered electronically (e-bill) through URSA. Cash or check payments are processed by the Administrative Main Cashier Office.

In some cases, additional fees may apply. Forms that must be completed by the Registrar's Office and envelopes that require official signatures are charged a special handling fee. Expedited service (processing within 24 hours) is available for an additional fee per addressee. Express Mail or Federal Express services are also available; consult the Registrar's Office for special mailing fees.

Transcripts can be faxed with payment of an additional fees for domestic and international faxes. Transcripts that are faxed are generally not considered official, and confidentiality can not be guaranteed.

Transcript requests are not processed for anyone with outstanding obligations to the University. Fees are subject to change at any time.

Veterans Affairs

The Registrar's veterans affairs coordinator provides information for veterans and their eligible dependents about U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) educational benefits and tutorial assistance. The coordinator also issues fee waivers to dependents of California veterans who are deceased or disabled due to service-related injuries and who meet income restrictions pursuant to California Education Code section 10652. The veterans affairs coordinator is located at 1113 Murphy Hall, (310) 825-5391. More information about these and other veterans services on campus can be found on the Registrar's Office website at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/faq/veteranfaq.htm>.

Other Student Services

Programs and services are geared to supporting the mental, social, and physical development needs of students in a healthy, safe, and intellectually challenging environment.

Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center

The Arthur Ashe Student Health and Wellness Center is a full-service medical clinic available to all registered UCLA students. Its clinical staff of physicians, nurse practitioners, and nurses is board-certified. It offers primary care, specialty clinics, and physical and occupational therapy. The center has its own pharmacy, optometry, radiology, and laboratory. Visit, core laboratory test, X-ray fees, and preventive immunizations are all pre-paid for students with the University of California Student Health Insurance Plan (UCSHIP). Students with UCSHIP pay lower co-pays for prescriptions filled at the Ashe Center pharmacy. UCSHIP students are expected to begin all non-emergency medical care at the Ashe Center, after which they may be referred (as medically necessary) to an outside participating Anthem network provider.

For emergency care when the Ashe Center is closed, students may call nurse line telephone triage services at (877) 351-3457 (open 24 hours a day, seven days a week), or obtain treatment at the UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room, the nearest emergency room, or a network urgent-care provider. It is the student's responsibility to have insurance billed. A student with UCSHIP must have follow-up visits, after emergencies, in the Ashe Center. If care cannot be provided in the Ashe Center, the Ashe Center clinician will give the student a written referral to a network provider.

For specific UCSHIP benefits and coverage information, see the Ashe Center website and select "UCSHIP Information," send e-mail to shsinsurance@ashe.ucla.edu, or call (310) 825-4073.

The Ashe Center website processes students' proof of immunity to Hepatitis B prior to enrollment. Information about this requirement is available on the Ashe website; for questions, send e-mail to shshepb@ashe.ucla.edu.

The plan year deductible is waived for services provided at the Ashe Center and for payable emergency room visits, urgent care visits, and network provider office visits.

All fees incurred at the Ashe Center are billed directly to students' BruinBill accounts. The cost of services received outside the Ashe Center is each student's financial responsibility. Students who waive UCSHIP need to ensure that they are enrolled in a plan qualified to cover expenses incurred outside of the Ashe Center, and are responsible for knowing the benefits of and local providers for their medical plan.

If a student withdraws, is dismissed, has registration fees cancelled, or takes a leave of absence during a term, he or she continues to be eligible for health services for the remainder of the term at full cost. If a student with UCSHIP withdraws with a less than 100% refund, UCSHIP continues through the remainder of the term.

Office hours during the academic year are weekdays 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. except Friday, when service begins at 9 a.m. Located at 221 Westwood Plaza (next to John Wooden Center), (310) 825-4073; see <http://www.studenthealth.ucla.edu>.

BruinCard

The UCLA BruinCard is a mandatory campuswide identification card that can electronically confirm student status and eligibility for services. A BruinCard is issued only upon presentation of supporting photo identification: a driver's license or state ID, passport, or military ID.

BruinCard features and functions include:

1. Official university ID used to gain admission to campus events, and to verify identification for health care at the Ashe center, examinations, and voting in student elections

2. EasyPay pre-paid debit card feature for purchases at campus stores and restaurants, and at select local merchants
3. Library card for materials check-out, copies, and printing
4. Campus gym and recreational facilities pass
5. Residence hall access key and meal card for residence dining halls and select campus restaurants
6. Laundry card at all university housing laundry facilities
7. Transportation card for discounted fares on Santa Monica and Culver City bus lines

Students with holds from an office with which they have an outstanding obligation (financial, academic, or administrative) may not receive services until the hold is released by the initiating office. To make a deposit, check account balance, view recent transactions, and report lost or stolen cards, see the BruinCard website at <http://www.bruincard.ucla.edu>.

The BruinCard center in 123 Kerckhoff Hall is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., (310) 825-2336.

Bruin Resource Center

The Bruin Resource Center (BRC) helps students transition into UCLA. Even the most capable students can, at times, feel confused and intimidated by the size and complexity of UCLA. To assist them in navigating the university, BRC provides students with information, referrals, and support, and connects them with the right campus resources and people. BRC offers specialized services for AB540 students, former foster youth, parent-students, transfer and re-entering students, and veterans (including the Veterans Resource Center). BRC aims to assist all students who might feel lost or disconnected, and help them find their place in the UCLA community.

BRC offers a selection of academic courses, programs, volunteer opportunities, and internships to help students develop practical life skills for success at UCLA and beyond. With its campuswide partners, BRC strives to cultivate an inclusive and nurturing educational environment that promotes lifelong learning, wellbeing, and whole-person development. Career Center

The UCLA Career Center offers services and resources to help students and alumni explore career possibilities, make career plans, develop skills for conducting a successful job search, obtain internships, and secure part- and full-time employment.

Services include career counseling; career laboratory; graduate and professional school planning; letters of reference service; credentials file services; Ph.D. career services; career fairs; information sessions; BruinView™ jobs, internships, and interviews; Bruin Alum-Link™ career counseling for UC eligible alumni; BruinView™ for Alumni; and international internships and other opportunities.

Workshops are offered on a variety of topics, including skills assessment, graduate and professional school preparation, résumé and curriculum vitae writing, mock interviews, international opportunities, and Internet job search strategies.

Career Center hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays. Located in the Strathmore Building second and third floors, 501 Westwood Plaza, (310) 206-1915; see <http://career.ucla.edu>.

Center for Student Programming

The Center for Student Programming (CSP) helps students start a club or join an existing one and serves as the official registry for all campus organizations. Staff members advise activities ranging from greek life to campus retention and student outreach. CSP assists students with program and leadership development and fund-raising, interprets and enforces University rules and regulations, and administers bulletin boards on campus. Located at 105 Kerckhoff Hall; see <http://www.studentactivities.ucla.edu>.

Cultural and Recreational Affairs

The Department of Cultural and Recreational Affairs (UCLA Recreation) coordinates recreational programming and supervises campus recreational activities, facilities, and services. Located at 2131 Wooden Center; see <http://www.recreation.ucla.edu>.

Dean of Students

The Office of the Dean of Students assists students with whatever needs they might have. Direct services include general counseling; sending emergency messages to students; and assisting in understanding University policies and procedures, including grievance procedures regarding student records, discrimination, and student debts. Dashew Center for International Students and Scholars

The Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender (LGBT) Campus Resource Center provides education, information, and advocacy services for the UCLA community. The center offers support groups, educational workshops, training seminars, and social activities. It maintains a library of 4,000 books, periodicals, and films; a computer facility; and social space. The staff supports students, faculty, and staff who wish to connect to the campus LGBT community, feel they have experienced harassment or discrimination, or simply are looking for a welcoming space. Libraries

The UCLA Library, a physical and virtual network of libraries serving programs of study and research in many fields, is among the top research libraries in the U.S. The total collections number more than 9 million volumes, more than 100,000 serial titles, and some 370,000 electronic resources.

Undergraduates are encouraged to use the College Library, which features collections and services in support of the undergraduate curriculum. The Arts Library, Louise M. Darling Biomedical Library, Richard C. Rudolph East Asian Library, Hugh and Hazel Darling Law Library, Eugene and Maxine Rosenfeld Management Library, Music Library, Charles E. Young Research Library, and Science and Engineering Library serve scholarly and research needs of undergraduate and graduate students and faculty. Additional materials are stored at the Southern Regional Library Facility (SRLF).

On the library website, users can search for collections, services, holdings, and information systems at UCLA, the UC system, and libraries worldwide; get help from a librarian online, by e-mail, or by telephone; find library hours and locations; and more. See <http://www.library.ucla.edu>.

Mental Health Services

Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) offers students short-term personal counseling and psychotherapy at 221 Westwood Plaza (Wooden West), (310) 825-0768. Psychologists, clinical social workers, and psychiatrists assist with situational stresses and

emotional problems that may include problems with interpersonal relationships, academic stress, loneliness, difficult decisions, sexual issues, anxiety, depression, or other concerns affecting the personal growth of students. See <http://www.counseling.ucla.edu>.

Services are confidential and available to regularly enrolled students. Students are seen individually or may choose from a number of groups offered each term. Appointments are made weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Emergency and walk-in counseling are also available. There are fees for all individual clinical services. If a student is enrolled in UCSHIP, these clinical fees are paid by UCSHIP. Students may access CAPS 24 hours a day for crisis counseling by calling (310) 825-0768.

Office for Students with Disabilities

The Office for Students with Disabilities (OSD) is the only campus entity authorized to determine a student's eligibility for disability-related accommodations and services. Academic support services are determined for each regularly enrolled student with documented permanent or temporary disabilities based on specific disability-based requirements. OSD policies and practices comply with all applicable federal and state laws, including Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, and are consistent with University policy.

Services include campus orientation and accessibility, note takers, reader service, sign language interpreters, Learning Disability Program, registration assistance, test-taking facilitation, special parking assistance, real-time captioning, assistive listening devices, on-campus transportation, adaptive equipment, support groups and workshops, tutorial referral, special materials, housing appeals, referral to UCLA's Disabilities and Computing Program, and processing of California Department of Rehabilitation authorizations. There is no fee for any of these services. All contacts and assistance are handled confidentially. Office of Ombuds Services

Parking and Commuter Services

Commuter Assistance—Ridesharing

The Commuter Services and Information (CSI) Office informs students about commuting and transportation options. Learn more online or at the CSI office, located at 100 Strathmore Building (Strathmore Drive and Westwood Plaza), 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, (310) 794-RIDE. See <http://www.transportation.ucla.edu>.

Many students form or join existing UCLA carpools or vanpools. Students can use Zimride, a Facebook application, to find one-time rides or create a carpool with fellow Facebook users. More than 160 vanpools commute to UCLA from over 80 Southern California communities. Full- and part-time vanpool riding opportunities are available. Registered two- and three-person student carpools are given top priority to receive parking (see below).

Discount fare options cover nearly all public transit coming to campus. *BruinGo!* offers a 50-cent fare on the Santa Monica Big Blue Bus and Culver CityBus lines (BruinCard required). The *Go Metro* quarterly pass offers half-price fares on all Metro Bus and Metro Rail lines. Students can also purchase half-price monthly passes to ride

on LADOT Commuter Express, City of Santa Clarita Transit, and Antelope Valley Transit Authority commuter bus routes.

Parking Permits

Due to limited availability, parking at UCLA is offered to students who demonstrate the greatest need. Student parking permits are assigned through a point system that considers class standing, commute distance, employment, dependent children, and professional school obligations. Students are encouraged to apply on time and follow all application and payment guidelines in order to increase their chances of receiving a permit. Permits are not guaranteed.

All students whose residence is located in ZIP code 90024 and residence hall students (excluding Regents' Scholars) without an off-campus job, must file an appeal to obtain parking. For parking appeal forms and deadline dates, see <http://www.transportation.ucla.edu>.

When assigning parking permits to students, UCLA Parking Services gives the highest priority to carpools. All qualified two- and three-person student carpool groups that apply on time are given priority for carpool permits. Student carpool members share a discounted permit rate. To find someone with whom they can carpool, students may call (310) 794-RIDE.

Commuter student permits are assigned for the academic year and can be paid for annually or quarterly. Carpool and residence-hall permits must be applied for and purchased quarterly. Students who are not offered a parking assignment during a given term need to reapply the following quarter.

Student Parking Request forms, along with important quarterly due dates and information on how to apply for a parking permit, are available online, by calling (310) 825-6918, or in person weekdays from 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Parking Services. Students are encouraged to complete and submit parking applications online at <http://www.parking.ucla.edu> and, if approved for parking, pay for their permit through BruinBill on URSA.

Students with permanent disabilities who have disabled persons' placards or DMV-issued disabled persons' license plates, and students with short-term disabilities, may apply to the Office for Students with Disabilities, (310) 825-1501, for parking assignments and on-campus transportation assistance.

Parking permits and access cards to campus lots and structures are not transferable and may be purchased only from UCLA Parking

Services. Resale is prohibited and subjects both buyer and seller to disciplinary action.

Student Legal Services

Currently registered and enrolled students with legal problems or questions about their legal rights can get assistance from experienced attorneys who help students resolve legal problems, including those related to landlord/tenant relations; accident and injury problems; criminal matters; domestic violence and harassment; divorces and other family law matters; automobile purchase, repair, and insurance problems; health care, credit, and financial aid issues; consumer problems; and University-related problems. 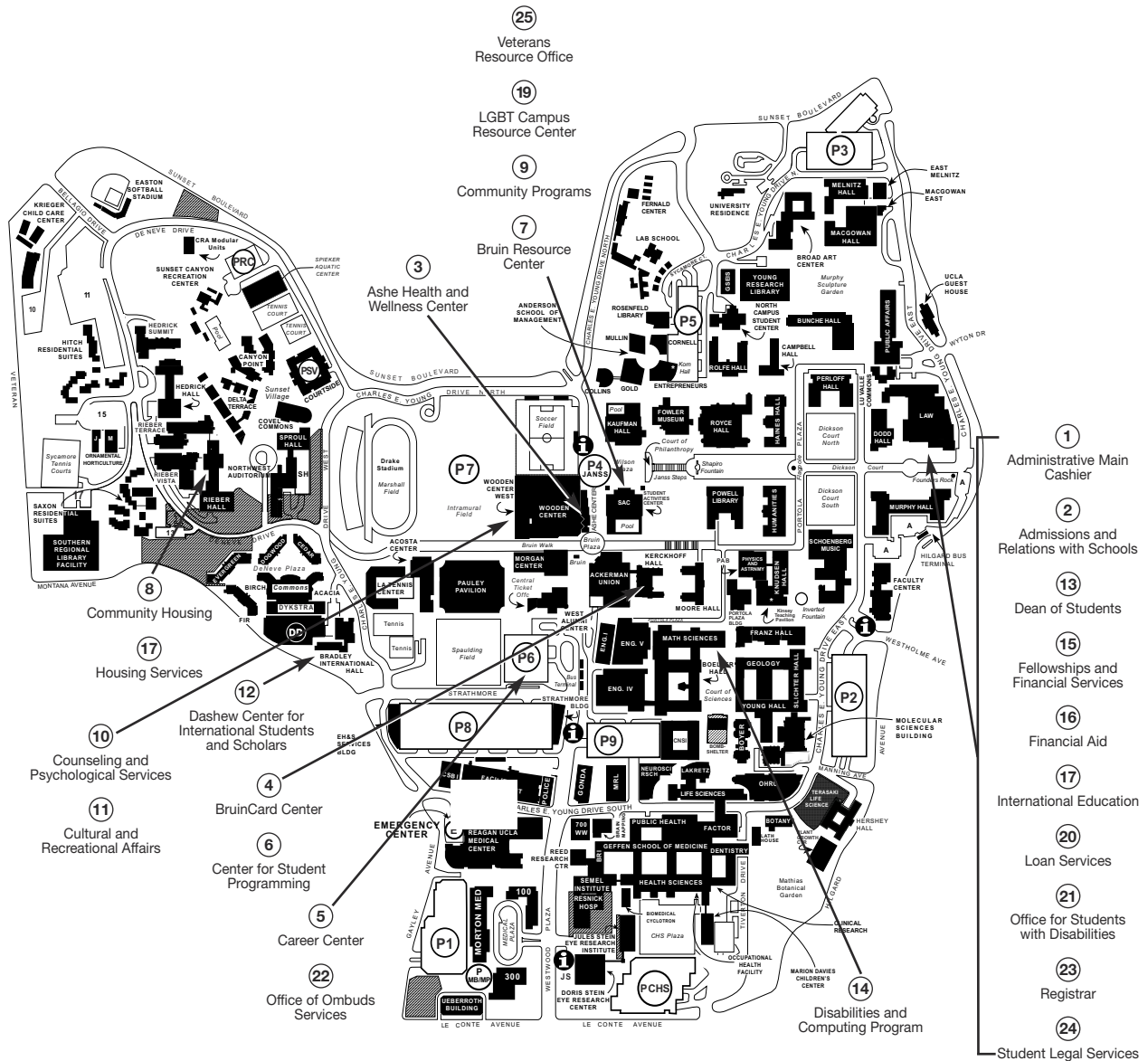

Academic Policies

Admission Policies

An application for admission must be submitted and accepted in accordance with the schedule specified in the Calendar section before a new student may register at the University. Preliminary information about registering is given to new students when the Statement of Intent to Register is submitted online. Please note: Your admission to the University is only guaranteed for the term you are admitted. If you do not register for this “admit” term, you must apply for admission again.

Undergraduate Readmission

One-Term Absence

Students who complete a term (Fall, Spring, Spring), and do not register the following term, may return to UCLA the subsequent term as a continuing student and be eligible to register and enroll in advance.

Planned Academic Leave (PAL) for International Travel

Students who plan to participate in a study abroad program sponsored by an institution other than UC are required to take a planned academic leave of absence (PAL) from UCLA. After they are accepted into a program, students must register their program with the UCLA International Education Office (IEO), B300 Murphy Hall. Registering the program also generates the student application for the leave of absence.

Requirements for programs and registration can be found on the IEO website at <http://www.ieo.ucla.edu/nonucprograms/>.

Students returning from an approved leave of absence for participation in a registered non-UC study abroad program are not required to seek readmission, but must provide official transcripts for coursework evaluation.

Re-entering Students

To return to the University after an absence of more than one term, students—except for those on PAL for non-UC study abroad—must complete an Undergraduate Application for Readmission form and file it with the Registrar’s Office. A nonrefundable fee applies (see “Miscellaneous Fees” in the Registration section).

To obtain a readmission application

1. Call 310-825-1091, option 6, and request that one be sent by mail
2. Send e-mail to webfback@registrar.ucla.edu and request that one be sent by mail

Deadlines for filing the application for readmission are shown below. If a deadline falls on a Saturday or Sunday, it is extended to the next business day. Students are encouraged to apply at least four weeks prior to the deadline. Applications received after the deadline are assessed a late readmission fee and, if applicable, a late registration fee (see “Miscellaneous Fees”).

Students who have attended any educational institution—including another University of California campus or UCLA Extension—since their last attendance at UCLA must submit official transcripts from those schools with their application (unless work is being completed

abroad). Students admitted prior to Fall 1988 who have not been registered at UCLA for the last five years are required to resubmit official transcripts of *all* work completed outside UCLA. Action taken on the application is contingent upon receipt and evaluation of these transcripts. Graduate Registration and Readmission

Continuous Registration Policy

Graduate students must be either registered and enrolled or on an official leave of absence every term until their degrees are awarded. As an exception, certain graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee (see below). Failure to register or be on an official leave of absence for any term (Fall, Spring, Spring) constitutes withdrawal from UCLA.

Filing Fee

Graduate students may be eligible to pay the filing fee (half the student services fee) in lieu of full registration fees for the term in which they expect to complete final degree requirements and receive their degree. Doctoral students are not eligible to pay the filing fee unless registered in the immediately preceding term. International students must pay the filing fee by the deadline for registration at the beginning of a term.

Students who pay the filing fee are not eligible for University services beyond a maximum of 12 hours of faculty and staff time required to complete degree requirements and are not considered in the same status as registered students.

Graduate Leave of Absence

Continuing graduate students in good standing (3.0 GPA or above) who have completed at least one term of UCLA graduate work may, with the support of their department and the approval of the Graduate Division, be eligible for leaves of absence. Graduate students are allowed a maximum of six quarters of official leave of absence. International students must consult with the Dashew Center for International Students and Scholars before applying for a leave of absence. Federal policy governing students on F-1 and J-1 visas restricts leaves of absence to certain conditions. Therefore, the Dashew Center, in consultation with the Graduate Division, individually evaluates each international graduate student request for a leave of absence to determine that it meets federal (and university) eligibility criteria.

Students on approved leave of absence are not permitted to use faculty time or make use of University facilities for more than 12 hours since their last registration and are not eligible for apprentice personnel employment or other services normally available to registered students. There is no need to apply for readmission, since the approved leave is for readmission to a specific term. The Registrar’s Office notifies students about registration information when their leave is due to expire.

Students obtain a Request for Leave of Absence form from their academic department. See the Calendar section for the filing deadline.

In Absentia Registration. Graduate students taking leaves of absence outside California for research or coursework related to their degree program may be eligible for in absentia registration. Students registered in absentia pay 15% of tuition and the student services fee, but pay the full amounts of other mandatory fees such as UCSHIP, campus-based fees, nonresident supplemental tuition, and professional degree supplemental tuition (as applicable). In absentia registration and fee reductions may be used for a maximum of six quarters or four semesters for academic doctoral students, and up to three quarters or two semesters for master's and graduate professional students. Readmission

Students who fail to register or take an official leave of absence are required to apply for readmission and are held to any changes in degree program requirements. Complete the online Application for Graduate Admission. A nonrefundable readmission application fee must be paid when the application is filed in accordance with deadlines published in the Calendar section.

Reduced Nonresident Supplemental Tuition for Doctoral Candidates

Nonresident graduate doctoral students who have advanced to candidacy are eligible for a 100 percent reduction in their annual nonresident supplemental tuition. The reduced nonresident supplemental tuition begins with the first academic term following the advancement to candidacy term. Students are eligible for reduced nonresident supplemental tuition for a maximum of three years (includes nonregistered time periods).

Degree Policies

Undergraduate Degrees

To qualify for a bachelor's degree, that is, to graduate in any school or College at UCLA, students must earn at least a C (2.0) average in all courses taken at any UC campus. In addition to the grade-point average requirement, students must satisfy (1) University requirements, (2) College or school requirements, and (3) department requirements. See the *UCLA General Catalog* for details.

Degree Checks

Anytime prior to graduation, students may request a review of degree progress. Official degree checks detail requirements remaining to complete the bachelor's degree. The degree check process varies by College or school:

College of Letters and Science. The Degree Progress Report (DPR) serves as the degree check. The DPR is a computer-generated assessment of all degree requirements and the courses taken to fulfill them. View and print DPRs through URSA or order one at a College counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell Hall; Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall). Students should review their DPR periodically with College and departmental undergraduate counselors to be sure they are on track to graduate.

Students who entered UCLA prior to Fall Quarter 1988 should consult their College counseling office (Academic Advancement Program, 1209 Campbell Hall; Honors Programs, A311 Murphy Hall; College Academic Counseling, A316 Murphy Hall).

School of the Arts and Architecture. Degree Progress Reports (DPRs) are available through URSA and on request from the Office of Student Services, 2200 Broad Art Center. Students should consult an adviser in the Office of Student Services when they have

questions about university or school requirements or if they have questions about their individual DPR. Questions regarding major requirements should be referred to the departmental counselor.

Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science. Students following a catalog year prior to 2006-07 and starting their upper division major field course work must submit a "satisfied" Academic Program Proposal to the Office of Academic and Student Affairs, 6426 Boelter Hall. The Academic Program Planner (APP) is an interactive self-advising system that informs these students if their academic programs meet the requirements for graduation. Students following the 2006-07 and later catalogs will use a program called DARS. Students should obtain an official degree check at least one term prior to their graduation term. For details, see http://www.seasoasa.ucla.edu/degree_check.html.

School of Nursing. Students may initiate a request for an updated degree check by contacting the undergraduate student services coordinator in the Student Affairs Office, 2-137 Factor Building.

School of Theater, Film, and Television. Students entering as freshmen receive a written degree check on achieving junior standing. Students entering as juniors receive a degree check on entry. Students may initiate or request an updated degree check by making an appointment with their departmental counselor in the Student Services Office, 103 East Melnitz Building.

Transfer Credit

Students who take courses at a college or university other than UCLA should first check the Articulation Agreements to determine how the courses will transfer. Articulation Agreements are lists of transferable courses from institutions other than UCLA. For questions, or if no Articulation Agreement exists, consult a counselor.

Once students complete the courses, they must have the other institution send transcripts to UARS, 1147 Murphy Hall, Box 951436, Los Angeles, CA 90095-1436. They must also go to UARS to submit a Transcript Locator Card (also known as a Transfer Credit Evaluation Request) to initiate a credit evaluation. Transfer students (who attended another college or university prior to attending UCLA) should discuss transfer credit with their College or school counselor and/or departmental adviser.

Declaration of Candidacy

To initiate the steps leading to the award of a bachelor's degree, students must identify the term they expect to complete degree requirements through URSA by the time they complete 160 units (172 units for engineering students) to avoid a late candidacy fee. The identified term must fall within the academic year (four quarters) subsequent to the term in which students reach or expect to reach the 160- or 172-unit mark. Once they complete 160/172 or more units, a fee is assessed each time students change the degree expected term.

Current-term or past-term candidates over the unit limit must file a UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form at 1113 Murphy Hall. The form is available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>.

Friday of the second week is the last day to declare candidacy for the current term (with fee depending on units completed). Declaration of candidacy after the second week may result in a degree award date for the following term and additional penalty fees.

Verify the degree expected term through URSA. For questions about degree candidacy status, Letters and Science students may inquire at 1113 Murphy Hall. Arts and Architecture, Engineering, Theater, Film, and Television, and Nursing students should see their school student affairs office. A photo ID is required. Declaring candidacy is not a guarantee of graduation. Current-term candidates are not assigned enrollment appointments for the following term.

In Absentia Graduation

Students who intend to complete degree requirements while non-registered (those who take a course through UCLA Extension or at another institution, remove an Incomplete grade, and so on) must file a request to graduate in absentia with their degree auditor in 1113 Murphy Hall by the second-week candidacy deadline. Students graduating in absentia are assessed the undergraduate in absentia degree service fee in addition to the declaration of candidacy fee if they were also not registered in the term immediately prior to their degree expected term.

Minors

Letters and Science students must petition to enter a minor through the department/office administering the program. School of Arts and Architecture, Engineering, Theater, Film, and Television, and Nursing students must also obtain the approval of their school. The last day to obtain the required approval(s) is Friday of the second week of the degree expected term. Late entry to a minor may result in a degree award date for the following term.

Satisfactory completion of the requirements for a minor is reflected on the final transcript and diploma.

Final Degree Audits and Graduation

Degree auditors in the Registrar's Office for Letters and Science students (2200 Broad Art Center for Arts and Architecture students, 6426 Boelter Hall for Engineering students, 2-137 Factor Building for Nursing students, and 103 East Melnitz Building for Theater, Film, and Television students) are responsible for verifying each candidate's eligibility for a bachelor's degree. Degree auditors have information pertaining to a student's graduation only if that student has declared candidacy and completed 160 quarter units (172 units for engineering students).

During their graduating term, students should inform a degree auditor of grade changes, petitions for substitutions or exemptions, transfer credits, or similar changes that may affect their degree. Degree auditors notify students whose graduation eligibility cannot be verified of any requirements still outstanding and other problems in completing the degree.

Contact degree auditors only for questions about degree audits. Phone numbers are in the Registrar's Services Guide in the Student Services section. For graduation ceremony procedures, contact the College or schools. Names of students who request that no public information be released do not appear in commencement ceremony programs. Students may change their privacy status on URSA.

Honors

Latin Honors

The College and schools award Latin honors according to overall grade-point average (GPA) at graduation. Honors are reflected on official transcripts and diplomas. Eligible students must have completed at least 90 (98 for the School of Nursing) University of California units for a letter grade. The levels of honors are summa cum laude, magna cum laude, and cum laude. The minimum GPA requirements for the current academic year are as follows:

1. **School of the Arts and Architecture:** 3.924 for summa cum laude, 3.858 for magna cum laude, 3.766 for cum laude
2. **College of Letters and Science:** 3.890 for summa cum laude, 3.813 for magna cum laude, 3.684 for cum laude
3. **School of Nursing:** 3.890 for summa cum laude, 3.813 for magna cum laude, 3.684 for cum laude
4. **Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science:** 3.858 for summa cum laude, 3.737 for magna cum laude, 3.583 for cum laude. In addition, the school requires the upper divi-

sion GPA to be 3.858 for summa cum laude, 3.737 for magna cum laude, 3.583 for cum laude; a minimum 3.25 GPA in the major; and at least 80 upper division units completed at UC

5. **School of Theater, Film, and Television:** 3.942 for summa cum laude, 3.886 for magna cum laude, 3.828 for cum laude

Requirements are subject to yearly change and other eligibility restrictions. Contact the College or school for information.

Departmental Honors

Some departments in the College of Letters and Science award honors, which are reflected on official transcripts and the diploma, to graduates of their programs. Inquire about the availability of these honors in the department office.

Tips For Graduating Seniors

1. All students should verify the degree expected term through URSA. If the degree expected term is incorrect, change it through URSA or by filing a UCLA Declaration of Candidacy form (available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>) at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of the last quarter
2. All students should verify majors, minors, and specializations as they appear on the DPR and Grade Report during the final term. If any information is in error, contact the appropriate office or degree auditor
3. Students finishing degree requirements without being enrolled at UCLA in the final term (because, for example, they are removing Incomplete grades, adding or dropping courses, attending another institution) must file a request to graduate in absentia at 1113 Murphy Hall. This must be done before Friday of the second week of the degree expected term
4. Students completing coursework at another institution, including UCLA Extension, must make sure their official transcripts (with grades) are received by the degree auditor in the Registrar's Office no later than three weeks after the end of the degree expected term
5. Students completing their work in Spring Quarter through the Education Abroad Program should declare for Summer graduation. Check with Honors counselors and major departments about necessary petitions before going abroad
6. All students must satisfy any outstanding requirements before graduating. Any petitions to amend records must be filed no later than the last day of the degree expected term
7. Students in their final term should inform the Registrar's Office of postal mail and e-mail address changes. An address change can be initiated on URSA, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or on the monthly BruinBill statement. Students who plan to move at the end of the degree expected term and who will not have access to URSA should file an address change, identifying a future mailing address and effective date, before leaving
8. Students may not graduate in one term and then retroactively add majors, minors, or specializations or add and drop courses, and so forth. On degree conferral, the undergraduate record is closed
9. Students should submit name changes to Student Services, 1113 Murphy Hall, by the last day of the degree expected term for them to appear correctly on the diploma. Inform the Registrar's Office of any special accents or punctuation that should be reflected on the diploma. The name on record is the name that appears on the diploma
10. Students should check their privacy and FERPA options through URSA before they graduate. A student with a FERPA restriction will not appear in UCLA online or print directories, or Commencement publications.

Certain UCLA online access and services expire upon separation from the University. Check the BruinTech "Before You Go" website at <http://map.ais.ucla.edu/go/1003850> for more information.

Master's Degrees

Students who expect to complete master's degree requirements should submit an Advancement to Candidacy form to their department no later than the Friday of the second week of classes. See the Calendar section for deadlines.

After completion of all course requirements and the comprehensive examination or thesis, the Registrar's Office reviews the student's courses and grades in order to confirm the awarding of the degree. Once the process is completed (approximately six weeks after the end of the term), the degree is recorded on the student's record and appears on any official transcript ordered.

During the final term, the student must inform the Registrar's Office of postal mail and e-mail address changes. An address change can be initiated on URSA, at 1113 Murphy Hall, or through the monthly BruinBill statement.

Transcripts and Diplomas

For graduating students, academic transcripts with the graduation date included are available approximately seven weeks after the end of the term. Students requiring earlier proof of graduation may contact degree auditors in 1113 Murphy Hall and request a certificate of completion. The first certificate of completion is free of charge; a fee is charged for each additional copy. An additional special processing fee may be assessed if

1. The request for a certificate is made before grades are posted for the term and
2. The auditor must take special action to verify a grade or grades, expedite a transfer credit evaluation, or obtain other documentation necessary to clear the student for the degree

Diplomas for both undergraduate and graduate students are available approximately two months after the degree award date. Information about obtaining diplomas in person (no fee) or by mail (with fee) is sent to student e-mail addresses approximately four weeks after the end of the final term. To expedite receipt of diplomas, students are encouraged to return the diploma mail request form and remit the mailing fee. The form is available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. A diploma hotline with current recorded diploma information is available seven days a week, 24 hours a day at (310) 825-8883.

To be reflected on the diploma, name changes must be submitted to the Registrar's Office, 1113 Murphy Hall, by the last day of the degree expected term. Students submitting name changes after that date must request a replacement diploma at 1113 Murphy Hall. The special order diploma fee is assessed.

If an original diploma is destroyed, a duplicate may be ordered from the Registrar's Office, Diploma Reorder, 1113 Murphy Hall. The duplicate diploma request form is also available online at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/>. There is a fee for the replacement diploma, and it bears a reissue date and the signatures of the current officials of the state and University.

Closure of Student Record

Student records are closed to revisions in enrollment, grading, and academic actions upon award of a degree. Students are responsible

for requesting review of their record prior to award of their degree. See UCLA Procedure 220.1 Student Grievances Regarding Challenge to Content of Student Records Under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, which may be found at <http://www.admin.policies.ucla.edu/app/Default.aspx?&id=220-1>.

Changes requested by an individual after award of a degree are considered by the College or school only under extraordinary circumstances. Supportive documentation is required. Upon action of the academic dean, a statement of the request for revision and a note of the change may be recorded only in the memoranda section of the transcript.

Quarter in Washington, DC

The Center for American Politics and Public Policy (CAPPP) selects undergraduate students each fall, Spring, and spring to participate in its Quarter in Washington Program. The program offers an exciting opportunity to combine UCLA courses with research and field experience. Students live at the UC Washington Center for up to 12 weeks, dividing their time between coursework and a part-time internship placement. Survey of transgenderism from anthropological perspective to introduce students to concepts, theories, and ethnographic studies of gender variance, gender-nonconformity, and alternative gender roles that challenge Western/Euro-American binary model of sex and gender. 98T. Considering Space: Society, Politics, and Poetics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Consideration of space as topic with social, political, and even poetic significance. Rather than accepting space as pre-given factuality or as mere container to be filled by beings and objects, exploration of different conceptions of space and how these conceptions impact and interact with artistic, architectural, and other disciplines, including political science, sociology, and psychology. Film and Television

98T. Women's Television. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Illumination of numerous ways in which women have shaped and been shaped by television throughout medium's history, exploring their roles not only as receivers of television texts, but as active participants in their creation and (re)mediation. Letter grading. E. Hill (**GE Foundation – Arts and Humanities: Visual and Performance Arts Analysis and Practice**)

M98T. Staging Realness: Performance and Reality Television. (5) (Same as Theater M98T.) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Examination of reality television as performance. Engagement with scholarship on media and televisuality to investigate how realness and authenticity are staged in reality television and what it means to consider these notions in terms of performance. Microbiology, Immunology, and Molecular Genetics

98T. Spread of Drug-Resistant Infections: Causes and Response. (4) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Drug-resistant pathogens have led to more deaths than AIDS in recent years. Discussion of history of infectious diseases, development of antimicrobial agents, rise and causes of drug-resistant microbes, and possible countermeasures. Letter grading. E.C. Becket (**GE Foundation – Scientific Inquiry: Life Sciences**)

Philosophy

98T. Infinity in Philosophy. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Exploration of philosophical history of concept of infinity. Consideration of different notions of infinity in writings of intellectual giants like Aristotle, Aquinas, and Bertrand Russell on topics like space, God, and numbers. Letter grading. E. Nutting (**GE Foundation – Arts and Humanities: Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis**)

Theater

M98T. Staging Realness: Performance and Reality Television. (5) (Same as Film and Television M98T.) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: satisfaction of Entry-Level Writing requirement. Freshmen/sophomores preferred. Examination of reality television as performance. Engagement with scholarship on media and televisuality to investigate how realness and authenticity are staged in reality television and what it means to consider these notions in terms of performance. Letter grading. L. Hunter (**GE Foundation – Society and Culture: Social Analysis**)

Distance Learning for Less Commonly Taught Languages

In order to make the most of language resources available at the University of California campuses, the UC Consortium for Language Learning and Teaching encourages the use of distance learning to promote access to the less commonly taught languages. Through UC Simultaneous Enrollment, students can enroll in language courses that use videoconferencing to bring students and faculty members from different campuses together.

Other UC Campuses Incoming Videoconferencing Courses

In 2011-12, UC Berkeley is offering language courses in elementary Chichewa, beginning and intermediate Danish, beginning Finnish, intermediate Khmer, advanced Swahili, and elementary and intermediate Wolof via videoconference. Each class session is transmitted via Internet videoconferencing to UCLA so that students at UCLA can participate and interact in real time with students in the UCB classroom. UCLA videoconferencing sessions are held in the Instructional Media Laboratory, 270 Powell Library Building.

UCLA undergraduate students can request enrollment in the UCB classes using the Simultaneous UC Enrollment Undergraduate Application. Applications are available at <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/forms/> or from the student affairs advising offices in the College and schools. Graduate students may enroll through the

Intercampus Exchange Program; applications are available at Graduate Admissions/Student and Academic Affairs, 1255 Murphy Hall. Grades and units are entered as transfer credit from UCB.

African American Studies

7B. Elementary Wolof. (4 semester units) Lecture, four hours; laboratory, one hour. Requisite: course 7A. Not open to native or heritage speakers of Wolof. Introduction to speaking, listening, reading, and writing in Wolof, with emphasis on developing student ability to create and to communicate with basic Wolof structures and vocabulary in culturally and socially appropriate context. Development of speaking and listening abilities through oral exercises, class discussions, and recordings available from Berkeley Language Center. Reading and writing development through in-class exercises, independent reading projects, and compositions. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer P. Sow Tuesday and Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

8B. Intermediate Wolof. (4 semester units) Lecture, four hours; laboratory, one hour. Requisite: course 8A. Review and expansion of student knowledge of fundamental structures from elementary Wolof and appropriate cultural contexts of these in oral and written communication. Grammar and vocabulary in culturally and socially appropriate context. Speaking ability expanded through oral exercises, individual reports, class discussions, and recordings available at Berkeley Language Center. Writing and reading expanded through compositions, written exercises, and independent reading projects with texts available through Berkeley's African Library Collection and supplemented by instructor's materials. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer P. Sow Tuesday and Thursday from 1 to 3 p.m. and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

15B. Advanced Swahili. (4 semester units) Lecture, four hours; laboratory, one hour. Requisites: courses 1A, 1B, 10A, 10B, 15A. Review and expansion of student knowledge from intermediate Swahili. Presentation of oral and written communication in appropriate cultural contexts. Development and expansion of oral language skills through individual presentations, class discussions, and recordings available at Berkeley Language Center. Writing, grammar, vocabulary, and reading expansion through compositions, written exercises, and independent reading projects. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer J. Omwamba Tuesday and Thursday from 5 to 7 p.m. and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

30B. Elementary Chichewa. (4 semester units) Lecture, four hours; laboratory, one hour. Requisite: course 30A. Not open to native or heritage speakers of Chichewa. Introduction to speaking, listening, reading, and writing in Chichewa, with emphasis on developing student ability to create and to communicate with basic Chichewa structures and vocabulary in culturally and socially appropriate context. Development of speaking and listening abilities through oral exercises, class discussions, and recordings available from Berkeley Language Center. Reading and writing development through in-class exercises, independent reading projects, and compositions. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer S. Mchombo and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

Khmer

100B. Intermediate Khmer. (5 semester units) Lecture, five hours. Requisite: course 100A. Reading of roadside signs, scholarly articles, and entire Khmer novel. Topics include current events in Cambodia, Cambodian history and politics, and basic overview of traditional Khmer literature. Work on projects in groups with other students, such as preparation and performance of play based on sections of modern Khmer novel. Independent research project on topic of student choice and presentation of research to peers, entirely in Khmer. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer F. Smith Monday and Wednesday from 4 to 5:30 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday at 4 p.m. and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

Scandinavian

2B. Beginning Finnish. (4 semester units) Language instruction, three hours; computer laboratory, one hour. Requisite: course 2A. Development of basic elements of communicative competence in both spoken and written language within cultural context. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer S. Tuomainen Tuesday and Thursday from 2 to 3:30 p.m. and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

4B. Intermediate Danish. (4 semester units) Language instruction, three hours; computer laboratory, one hour. Requisite: course 4A. Development of basic elements of communicative competence in both spoken and written language within cultural context. P/NP or letter grading. Taught by UCB lecturer K. Moller Tuesday and Thursday from 2 to 3:30 p.m. and videoconferenced to 270 Powell Library Building.

10W. Jerusalem: Holy City. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Survey of religious, political, and cultural history of Jerusalem over three millennia as symbolic focus of three faiths: Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. Transformation of sacred space as reflected by literary and archaeological evidence through examination of testimony of artifacts, architecture, and iconography in relation to written word. Study of creation of mythic Jerusalem through event and experience. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis)**

Applied Linguistics

30W. Language and Social Interaction. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 30. Exploration of range of topics related to study of language and social interaction in both mundane and professional settings, particularly how language affects social lives and how social organization affects use of language. Topics include different approaches to study of language in social interaction (theories and research methodologies), issues regarding language and social identity (such as socioeconomic status, race, gender, and situational identity), and issues concerning language and culture (such as cross-cultural misunderstanding and language socialization). Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis; Society and Culture: Social Analysis)**

40W. Language and Gender: Introduction to Gender and Stereotypes. (5) (Formerly numbered M40W.) Lecture, four hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 40 or former course M40 or M40W. Prior knowledge of foreign languages not required. Introduction to language from sociological perspective of gender. Use of research and examples in English and other languages to explore nature of male and female “genderlects” and gendered language, as reflected in lexicon, language behavior, phonetics and intonation, and language acquisition and linguistic change. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis; Society and Culture: Social Analysis)**

102W. Nature of Learning. (5) Lecture, four hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Exploration of learning via examination of second language acquisition. All normal children acquire language of their family and community (i.e., first language acquisition is ubiquitous). Success in second language acquisition is radically variable, and many learners, in spite of substantial opportunity and ability, achieve proficiencies that fall far below that of native speakers. Examination of interaction of emotion and cognition and nature of aptitude and motivation in learning. Primary vehicle for investigation to be autobiographies of second language learners. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(Not approved for GE Foundations)**

Chinese

70W. Classics of Chinese Literature. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 70. Prior knowledge of Chinese culture, literature, or language not required. Introduction to pre-20th-century Chinese literary traditions, including selections from poetry, prose, fiction, and drama. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

Comparative Literature

2CW. Survey of Literature: Age of Enlightenment to 20th Century. (5) Lecture, two hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1C or 4CW. Study of selected texts from Age of Enlightenment to 20th century, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts may include works by authors such as Swift, Voltaire, Diderot, Rousseau, Goethe, Flaubert, Ibsen, Strindberg, M. Shelley, Dostoevsky, Kafka, James Joyce, Garcia Marquez, and Jamaica Kincaid. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

2DW. Survey of Literature: Great Books from World at Large. (5) Lecture, two hours; discussion, two hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1D or 4DW. Study of major literary texts usually overlooked in courses that focus only on canon of Western literature, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts from at least three of following areas read in any given term: African, Caribbean, East Asian, Latin American, and Middle Eastern literature. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

4CW. Literature and Writing: Age of Enlightenment to 20th Century. (5) Discussion, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1C or 2CW. Study and discussion of selected texts from Age of Enlightenment to 20th century, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts may include works by authors such as Swift, Voltaire, Diderot, Rousseau, Goethe, M. Shelley, Flaubert, Ibsen, Strindberg, Dostoevsky, Gogol, Kafka, Joyce, Beckett, L. Hughes, and Garcia Marquez. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

4DW. Literature and Writing: Great Books from World at Large. (5) Discussion, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 1D or 2DW. Study and discussion of major literary texts usually overlooked in courses that focus only on canon of Western literature, with emphasis on literary analysis and expository writing. Texts from at least three of following areas read in any given term: African, Caribbean, East Asian, Latin American, and Middle Eastern literature. Texts may include works by authors such as Ngugi, Desai, Kincaid, Emecheta, El Saadawi, Achebe, Pak, Can Xue, Neruda, and Rushdie. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

Engineering

183EW. Engineering and Society. (4) (Formerly numbered 183.) Lecture, four hours; discussion, three hours; outside study, five hours. Limited to sophomore/junior/senior engineering students. Professional and ethical considerations in practice of engineering. Impact of technology on society and on development of moral and ethical values. Contemporary environmental, biological, legal, and other issues created by new technologies. Emphasis on research and writing within engineering environments. Writing and revision of about 20 pages total, including two individual technical essays and one team-written research report. Readings address technical issues and writing form. Satisfies engineering writing requirement. Letter grading. **(Not approved for GE Foundations)**

185EW. Art of Engineering Endeavors. (4) (Formerly numbered 185.) Lecture, four hours; discussion, three hours; outside study, five hours. Designed for juniors/senior engineering students. Nontechnical skills and experiences necessary for engineering career success. Importance of group dynamics in engineering practice. Teamwork and effective group skills in engineering environments. Organization and control of multidisciplinary complex engineering projects. Forms of leadership and qualities and characteristics of effective leaders. How engineering, computer sciences, and technology relate to major ethical and social issues. Societal demands on practice of engineering. Emphasis on research and writing in engineering environments. Satisfies engineering writing requirement. Letter grading. **(Not approved for GE Foundations)**

English

4HW. Critical Reading and Writing (Honors). (5) Lecture, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Introduction to literary analysis, with close reading and carefully written exposition of selections from principal modes of literature: poetry, prose fiction, and drama. Minimum of four papers (three to five pages each) and two in-class essays. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(Not approved for GE Foundations)**

4W. Critical Reading and Writing. (5) Lecture, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Introduction to literary analysis, with close reading and carefully written exposition of selections from principal modes of literature: poetry, prose fiction, and drama. Minimum of four papers (three to five pages each) and two in-class essays. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(Not approved for GE Foundations)**

English Composition

5W. Literature, Culture, and Critical Inquiry. (5) Lecture, four hours. Enforced requisite: course 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Use of analysis of literary works within cultural context to engage students in critical thinking and writing about issues important to academic inquiry and responsible citizenship. Minimum of 15 to 20 pages of revised text required in addition to regular informal writing exercises. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

Environment

M1CW. Global Environment: Special Topics. (5) (Same as GE Clusters M1CW.) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course M1B. Examination of specialized environmental topics such as air and water, global warming, and feeding Earth's population. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Society and Culture: Social Analysis, Social Analysis; Scientific Inquiry: Life Sciences, Physical Sciences)**

French

14W. Introduction to French Culture and Civilization in English. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 14. Study of contemporary French institutions and issues in cultural, political, and socioeconomic realms. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

21CW. History of Modern Thought: Special Topics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 21B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Examination of cross-section of classical and modern social theories and debates that shape them. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis, Social Analysis, Social Analysis)**

M24CW. Work, Labor, and Social Justice in U.S.: Special Topics. (5) (Same as Labor and Workplace Studies M1CW.) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course M24B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Topics include labor law/history, gender, race, and workplace. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis, Social Analysis)**

30CW. Never-Ending Stories: Multidisciplinary Perspectives on Myth — Special Topics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 30B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Topics may include myth and modern art (including literature, music, and film), myth and ritual, oral tradition and orality, myth and political ideology, myth and science, hero and trickster, and myths of creation. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis, Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis, Social Analysis)**

60CW. America in Sixties: Politics, Society, and Culture, 1954 to 1974 — Special Topics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 60B. Limited to first-year freshmen. In-depth examination of political and cultural issues affecting U.S. society from 1954 to 1974. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis, Visual and Performance Arts Analysis and Practice; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis, Social Analysis)**

70CW. Evolution of Cosmos and Life: Special Topics in Life Sciences. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 70B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 70DW. Examination in depth of various issues of evolution in cosmos from life sciences perspective. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Scientific Inquiry: Life Sciences, Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Physical Sciences)**

72CW. Sex from Biology to Gendered Society: Special Topics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 72B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Topics may include politics of reproduction, sexuality, sexual identity, social construction of gender, and reproductive technologies. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Society and Culture: Social Analysis, Social Analysis; Scientific Inquiry: Life Sciences, Life Sciences)**

80CW. Frontiers in Human Aging: Biomedical, Social, and Policy Perspectives — Special Topics. (5) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course 80B. Limited to first-year freshmen. In-depth examination of gender and aging, cellular aging, cancer, and aging of the brain. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Society and Culture: Social Analysis, Social Analysis; Scientific Inquiry: Life Sciences, Life Sciences)**

Honors Collegium

11W. Postmodern Culture. (5) Seminar, four hours. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Exploration of theories and art (literature, music, film, fine art) that emerged after World War II in what has come to be known as postmodern era. Art criticizes master narratives of earlier age and fosters fragmentation, skepticism toward universal truth, commodification of knowledge, media creating reality, and globalization in industry and society. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

Labor and Workplace Studies

M1CW. Work, Labor, and Social Justice in U.S.: Special Topics (5) (Same as GE Clusters M24CW.) Seminar, three hours. Enforced requisite: course M1B. Limited to first-year freshmen. Topics include labor law/history, gender, race, and workplace. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundations — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis; Society and Culture: Historical Analysis, Social Analysis)**

Philosophy

22W. Introduction to Ethical Theory. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 22. Introduction to major ethical theories in Western thought. Examination of works of Plato, Aristotle, Hume, Kant, and Mill. Topics include ideas of virtue, obligation, egoism, relativism, and foundations of morals. Four papers required. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Philosophical and Linguistic Analysis)**

Russian

90BW. Russian Civilization in 20th Century. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 90B. Survey of literature, theater, cinema, television, press, music, and arts. Emphasis on contemporary period, with constant reference to Russian and early Soviet antecedents. Weekly discussions focus on varied approaches to writing addressing class topics. Five short papers required. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

Scandinavian

50W. Introduction to Scandinavian Literatures and Cultures. (5) Lecture, three hours; discussion, one hour. Enforced requisite: English Composition 3 or 3H or English as a Second Language 36. Not open for credit to students with credit for course 50. Designed for students in general and for those wishing to prepare for more advanced and specialized studies in Scandinavian literature and culture. Selected works from literatures of Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Iceland, and Finland, ranging from myth, national epic, saga, and folktale through modern novel, poem, play, short story, and film, read in English and critically discussed. Satisfies Writing II requirement. Letter grading. **(GE Foundation — Arts and Humanities: Literary and Cultural Analysis)**

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Official Notices

The Office of the Dean of Students publishes Official Notices in the *Daily Bruin* at various times during the year. Such notices are important, and all students are held responsible for the information in them.

Auditing Classes

With the consent of the instructor, registered students and interested individuals are permitted to audit classes. Arrangements are made directly with the faculty member under any rules the faculty member may establish, and those auditing ordinarily do not participate in discussions, examinations, or written papers. Audited classes are not recorded on the Study List or on transcripts for regular session courses.

Cell Phone and Pager Policy

Any disruption of a class due to the audible beeping or use of cell phones or pagers will be treated as a violation of Section 102.13 of the *UCLA Student Conduct Code* and will subject a student to sanctions up to and including suspension or dismissal. Cell phones and pagers must be turned off while in classes, libraries, or other quiet areas.

Class Attendance

Class rosters, which identify enrolled or wait-listed students, are available online to each instructor through MyUCLA. Attendance in UCLA classes is limited to duly enrolled regular session or concurrent University Extension students. Guests may attend lectures only with the approval of the instructor. Students may be dropped from a course for academic reasons such as lacking the approved requisites and requirements (SR542). If attendance is an academic requirement established by the instructor, students may be dropped from a course because of excessive absences.

Class Notes

Notes or recordings made by students are for purposes of individual or group study or for other noncommercial purposes reasonably arising from the student's membership in the class or the University. Permission to make notes or recordings falls within the instructor's discretion as informed by instructional purposes, classroom order, property interests, or other reasonable issues arising in the academic context. Notes and recordings may not be exchanged or distributed for commercial purposes, for compensation, or for any other purpose other than study, either between students or between a student(s) and a third party. Unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the instructor, commercial use of class notes or recordings constitutes an unauthorized commercial activity in violation of the *UCLA Regulations on Activities, Registered Organizations, and Use of Properties*, Section IV, Paragraph A (<http://www.studentactivities.ucla.edu>). Students who violate this policy are subject to University discipline.

Further, AB1773 was signed into law on September 23, 2000, to be effective January 1, 2001. This State law amended the California Education Code as follows:

66450. (a) Except as authorized by policies developed by the University in accordance with subdivision (a) of Section 66452, no business, agency, or person, including, but not necessarily limited to, an enrolled student shall prepare, cause to be prepared, give, sell, transfer, or otherwise distribute or publish, for any commercial purpose, any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction by an instructor of record. The prohibition applies to a recording made in any medium, including but not necessarily limited to, handwritten or typewritten class notes.

The full text of AB1773, including a description of civil penalties and the legal and financial remedies available to the University and an individual instructor for violations of this State law, can be found at <http://www.leginfo.ca.gov>. This notice has been prepared for distribution to all UCLA students as requested by AB1773.

Individual instructors retain intellectual property rights in lecture material, pursuant to U.S. copyright law and California Civil Code 980(a)(1). Misuse of course notes derived from lecture material may also subject an individual to legal proceedings brought by the instructor.

Pursuant to the guidelines reviewed by the UCLA Academic Senate (1973), lecture note subscription services are permitted, if authorized in advance by the University and if approved by the instructor. The Lecture Notes service offered by the Associated Students UCLA is currently authorized by the University to provide a course notes subscription service for particular classes. For such classes, the note taker is approved in advance by the instructor, and the instructor may review the notes before their distribution and sale through the UCLA Store Lecture Notes office in Ackerman Union. The list of classes with such a subscription service is available in Ackerman Union.

Nothing in this policy precludes an instructor from posting the course lecture notes, which they prepare or authorize to be prepared, on the UCLA-provided course website for the class, which the instructor controls. Students who are permitted by the instructor to review such course lecture notes are reminded that these policies apply to their use of any such course lecture notes posted on the course website by the instructor.

Disclosure of Student Records

Pursuant to the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), the California Information Practices Act, and the *University of California Policies Applying to the Disclosure of Information from Student Records*, students at UCLA have the right to

1. Inspect and review records pertaining to themselves in their capacity as students, except as the right may be waived or qualified under federal and state laws and University policies
2. Have withheld from disclosure, absent their prior written consent for release, personally identifiable information from their student records, except as provided by federal and state laws and University policies
3. Inspect records maintained by UCLA of disclosures of personally identifiable information from their student records
4. Seek correction of their student records through a request to amend the records or, if such request is denied, through a hearing (see UCLA Procedure 220.1)

- File complaints with the U.S. Department of Education regarding alleged violations of the rights accorded them by the FERPA

UCLA, in accordance with federal and state laws and University policies, has designated the following categories of personally identifiable information as “public information” which UCLA may release and publish without the student’s prior consent: name, address (mailing, permanent, and e-mail), telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, enrollment status, number of course units in which enrolled, degrees and honors received, the most recent previous educational institution attended, participation in officially recognized activities (including intercollegiate athletics), and the name, weight, and height of participants on intercollegiate athletic teams.

As a matter of practice, UCLA does not publish student addresses or telephone numbers in the campus electronic directory unless released by the student. The term “public information” in this policy is synonymous with the term “directory information” in FERPA.

Students who do not wish certain items (i.e., name, mailing, permanent, and e-mail address, telephone numbers, major field of study, dates of attendance, number of course units in which enrolled, and degrees and honors received) of this “public information” released and published may so indicate through URSA (<http://www.ursa.ucla.edu>). To restrict the release and publication of the additional items in the category of “public information,” complete the UCLA FERPA Restriction Request form available from the Registrar’s Office, 1113 Murphy Hall.

Student records which are the subject of federal and state laws and University policies may be maintained in a variety of offices, including the Registrar’s Office, Office of the Dean of Students, UCLA Career Center, UCLA External Affairs, Graduate Division, and the offices of a student’s College or school and major department. Students are referred to the online *UCLA Campus Directory* which lists all the offices that may maintain student records, together with their campus address and telephone number. Students have the right to inspect their student records in any such office subject to the terms of federal and state laws and University policies. Inspection of student records maintained by the Registrar’s Office is by appointment only and must be arranged three working days in advance. Call (310) 825-1091 option 6, or inquire at the Registrar’s Office, 1113 Murphy Hall.

A copy of federal and state laws, University policies, and the print *UCLA Telephone Directory* may be inspected in the office of the Information Practices Coordinator, 500 UCLA Wilshire Center. Information concerning students’ hearing rights may be obtained from the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall. To see the complete text of UCLA Policy 220, Disclosure of Information from Student Records, see <http://www.adminpolicies.ucla.edu/app/Default.aspx?id=220>.

In addition to the “public information” described above, information related to students’ sex and marital status, and the name(s), address(es), and telephone number(s) of their parents or next of kin, are made available to the UCLA External Affairs Department for use in alumni, development, and public relations activities. To restrict the release of this additional information, complete an External Affairs Information Restriction Request form available from the Registrar’s Office, 1113 Murphy Hall.

Emergencies

Students should be familiar with safety instructions posted in classrooms, laboratories, and other campus facilities. Be prepared to respond safely and appropriately to a fire, earthquake, toxic spill, or accident.

At UCLA, 911 is the “all-purpose” emergency phone number. You do not need to call an outside line from a campus phone, and you do not need any coins to call 911 from a pay phone. If you are calling from off campus or from a mobile phone, call (310) 825-1491. When you call 911, try to remain calm and do not hang up until you answer all of the operator’s questions.

You may also obtain general instructions during a major emergency by calling the 24-hour emergency hot line at (800) 900-UCLA and by listening to the UCLA emergency radio at AM1630. See <http://www.ehs.ucla.edu> for more information.

Here are some general guidelines for specific emergencies:

Accident and Injury

Call 911 immediately to get assistance. If you are qualified to do so, give first aid to injured persons. Do not attempt to move the seriously injured.

Basic emergency care training is available through the UCLA Office of Environment, Health, and Safety (EHS). For further information about emergency preparedness and training, call (310) 825-5689 or see <http://www.ehs.ucla.edu>.

All work-related injuries must be reported to your supervisor. In addition, any serious injuries (including fatalities) must be reported to Cal/OSHA. Report the injury to EHS on the 24-hour injuries report hot line at (310) 825-9797. EHS will notify Cal/OSHA.

Earthquake

When an earthquake hits, take cover immediately. If you are indoors, get under a desk or table, or between seating rows in a lecture hall. DO NOT RUN OUTSIDE. If you are in a hallway or if you are outside, move to an open area quickly and drop to the ground, covering your head and neck as best you can. If you are in your car, stop carefully and stay in the car.

After the shaking stops, check for injuries. Do not use telephones for personal calls, as this overloads phone lines and prevents emergency personnel from reporting injuries. After a severe quake at UCLA, department heads and emergency coordinators will lead building evacuations. Do not use elevators. Go to campus evacuation areas, which are wide open spaces like the quads, athletic fields, and uncovered parking lots. Wait for instructions before entering buildings or parking structures. Refrain from spreading rumors and do not go sightseeing. Remain calm and help others.

Fire

If you see a fire, close the door where the fire is located, activate the nearest alarm, and call 911 from a campus phone or (310) 825-1491 from off campus or a mobile phone. When you sound the alarm or hear the alarm signal, get out of the building as quickly and calmly as possible. Do not use the elevators. Do not reenter the building until the all-clear signal has been given by emergency personnel.

UCLA does not expect students or employees to fight fires. Use a fire extinguisher only if you have had the training and you feel it is safe to do so. Be aware of campus fire alarm and extinguisher locations before a fire occurs.

Hazardous Spill

Do not attempt to clean up any hazardous material spill involving chemical, radioactive, infectious, or flammable materials unless you have suitable training. If a spill occurs in a classroom or laboratory, alert the supervisor or laboratory manager. If the spill happens outdoors or in an unsupervised area, call EHS at (310) 825-5689 or 911 from a campus telephone or (310) 825-1491 from a campus phone or (310) 825-1491 from off campus or a mobile phone.

Examination Policies

Midterm Examinations

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 6: Midterm examinations are expected to be held during regularly scheduled class meeting times. However, large classes with multiple sections requiring a common midterm examination can schedule examinations outside regular class meeting times on a space-available basis with the following limitations:

- a. Notice of the midterm dates and times must be published in the *Schedule of Classes* and URSA before enrollment begins. Late requests will not be scheduled.
- b. Instructors must put the midterm examination dates in the course syllabus.
- c. Instructors must announce the midterm dates on the 1st day of class and inform students that it is acceptable to request alternate times.
- d. Instructors should make a good faith effort to accommodate alternate examinations times for students with course conflicts.
- e. To comply with Section 92640 of the California Education Code, instructors must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. See UCLA Policy 870, Section II (B) 8, Alternate Examination Dates.

Final Examinations

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 7: An instructor's method of evaluation must be announced at the beginning of the Course. Final written examinations may not exceed three hours' duration and are given only at the times and places established and published by the department chair and the Registrar's Office. See UCLA Senate Regulation A-332 (A) for the policy on final examinations. Instructors must submit grades no later than 10 days after the last day of finals for Fall, Spring, and Spring terms, and no later than 10 days after the last day of any given Summer Session.

Final examinations are generally held in the same room as Class meetings; however, by prior arrangement with the Registrar's Office, common final examinations can be scheduled and extra room locations may be booked on a space-available basis. Changes in classroom location must be arranged through the Registrar's Office. Examination codes, times, and locations are listed in the online *Schedule of Classes* and URSA.

Alternate Examination Dates

UCLA Policy 870, II (B) 8: No student shall be excused from assigned final examinations except as provided in Senate Regulation A332 or in Section 92640 of the California Education Code policy on alternate examinations. The University must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. This requirement does

not apply in the event that administering the test or examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably be avoided. Accommodation for alternate examination dates are worked out directly and on an individual basis between the student and the faculty member involved.

Faculty members should remember that while it is fully at their discretion to make arrangements with individual students for alternate examination times, including final examinations, they must conduct the scheduled final examination for the Class as a whole at the times and places established by the department chair and the Registrar's Office.

Harassment

Sexual Harassment

The University of California is committed to creating and maintaining a community where all persons who participate in University programs and activities can work and learn together in an atmosphere free from all forms of harassment, exploitation, or intimidation. Every member of the University community should be aware that the University is strongly opposed to sexual harassment, and that such behavior is prohibited both by law and by University policy. The University will respond promptly and effectively to reports of sexual harassment, and will take appropriate action to prevent, to correct, and if necessary, to discipline behavior that violates this policy. See <http://www.sexualharassment.ucla.edu>.

Definitions

For detailed definitions of **sexual harassment**, refer to Section 102.09 of the *UCLA Student Conduct Code*.

Complaint Resolution

Experience has demonstrated that many complaints of sexual harassment can be effectively resolved through informal intervention. Individuals who experience what they consider to be sexual harassment are advised to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly.

Additionally, an individual who believes that she or he has been sexually harassed may contact the Sexual Harassment Coordinator or a Sexual Harassment Information Center counselor for help and information regarding sexual harassment complaint resolution or grievance procedures, or may file a complaint of harassment directly with the appropriate Complaint Resolutions Officer. The appropriate Complaint Resolutions Officer is determined by the status of the accused harasser. For further details contact the Sexual Harassment Coordinator, Pamela Thompson, at 310-206-3417, 2241 Murphy Hall.

Other Forms of Harassment

The University strives to create an environment which fosters the values of mutual respect and tolerance and is free from discrimination based on race, ethnicity, sex, religion, sexual orientation, disability, age, and other personal characteristics. Certainly harassment, in its many forms, works against those values and often corrodes a person's sense of worth and interferes with one's ability to participate in University programs or activities. While the University is committed to the free exchange of ideas and the full protection of free expression, the University also recognizes that words can be used in such a way that they no longer express an idea, but rather injure and intimidate, thus undermining the ability of individuals to participate in the University community. The *UCLA Student Conduct Code* (hereafter referred to as *Code*) presently prohibits a variety of conduct by students which, in certain contexts, may be

regarded as harassment. For detailed definitions of harassment, refer to Section 102.11 of the *Code*.

Harassing expression which is accompanied by physical abuse, threats of violence, or conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person on University property or in connection with official University functions may subject an offending student to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.08 of the *Code*.

Similarly, harassing conduct, including symbolic expression, which also involves conduct resulting in damage to or destruction of any property of the University or property of others while on University premises may subject a student violator to University discipline under the provisions of Section 102.04 of the *Code*.

Further, under specific circumstances described in Section 102.11 of the *Code*, students may be subject to University discipline for misconduct which may consist solely of expression. Complaint Resolution

One of the necessary measures in our efforts to assure an atmosphere of civility and mutual respect is the establishment of procedures which provide effective informal and formal mechanisms for those who believe that they have been victims of any of the above misconduct.

Many incidents of harassment and intimidation can be effectively resolved through informal means. For example, an individual may wish to confront the alleged offender immediately and firmly. An individual who chooses not to confront the alleged offender and who wishes help, advice, or information is urged to contact any of the Harassment Information Centers listed immediately above.

In addition to providing support for those who believe they have been victims of harassment, Harassment Information Centers offer persons the opportunity to learn about the phenomena of harassment and intimidation; to understand the formal and informal mechanisms by which misunderstandings may be corrected and, when appropriate, student perpetrators may be disciplined; and to consider which of the available options is the most useful for the particular circumstances.

With regard to section 102.11 of the *Code*, complainants should be aware that not all conduct which is offensive may be regarded as a violation of this *Code* and may, in fact, be protected expression. Thus, the application of formal institutional discipline to such protected expression may not be legally permissible. Nevertheless, the University is committed to reviewing any complaint of harassing or intimidating conduct by a student and intervening on behalf of the complainant to the extent possible.

Nondiscrimination

The University of California, in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and University policies, does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity, pregnancy (including pregnancy, childbirth, and medical conditions related to pregnancy and childbirth), physical or mental disability, medical condition (cancer-related or genetic characteristics), ancestry, marital status, age, sexual orientation, citizenship, or service in the uniformed services (including membership, application for membership, performance of service, application for service, or obligation for service in the uniformed services). The University also prohibits sexual harassment. This nondiscrimination policy covers admission, access, and treatment in University programs and activities.

Refer to UCLA Procedure 230.1 (available in 1206 Murphy Hall or at <http://www.adminpolicies.ucla.edu>) for further information and procedures.

Official Publications

Students are responsible for observing procedures and deadlines published by the Registrar's Office in the following publications:

1. *UCLA General Catalog*. The catalog includes courses and programs approved by the UCLA Academic Senate. There is no longer a print edition of the *Catalog*. There are two archival editions of the *Catalog*: a PDF version and an HTML version. Real-time updates to course descriptions are provided in a separate update section. The update section also lists current GE courses. See <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/catalog/>.
2. *Schedule of Classes*. The *Schedule* lists classes offered each term. It includes fee charts, academic calendars with key deadline dates, academic policies and procedures, registration, enrollment and billing information, and official notices. There is no longer a print edition of the *Schedule*. There are two online versions: an archival PDF and a real-time edition that displays updated class status (open, closed, waitlist, cancelled) and enrollment capacities. The real-time edition also features customized class searches for GE, Fiat Lux, USIE, class units, and instructors. See <http://www.registrar.ucla.edu/schedule/>.

Plagiarism and Student Copyright

Plagiarism of any form is a violation of *UCLA Student Conduct Code* Section 102.01—Academic Dishonesty. Instructors are permitted to use one or more plagiarism-detection services to assist in the confirmation that the academic work submitted by a student is original work and has not been duplicated from an existing work.

All class assignments are expected to be original works submitted by individual students or, if directed by the instructor, by students working in a team. Should a student purchase or otherwise acquire a document from a third party (such as <http://www.term-paper-example.com>) and submit such a document as original work for the class assignment, such action is plagiarism and a violation of the code.

Instructors may require that all students enrolled in the class submit their work for confirmation by a plagiarism-detection service designated by the instructor. Failure by a student to submit assigned work is the equivalent, at the discretion of the instructor, to the student failing to submit the paper for grading.

Students retain full copyright ownership to their academic work (UCLA Policy 965; see <http://www.adminpolicies.ucla.edu/app/default.aspx?id=965>). However, if the plagiarism-detection service used by the instructor includes a protocol that the vendor retains a copy of the submitted work, such practice is approved by UCLA for the vendor's sole purpose of comparison with other academic work subsequently submitted by others. The vendor may not use academic work submitted by UCLA students for any other purpose.

Instructors are encouraged to indicate to all students at the start of the academic term whether (a) a plagiarism-detection service will be used in the class for academic assignments; and (b) whether the service will be applied to all students enrolled in the class or on a spot-check basis. Nonetheless, instructors may decide to use a plagiarism-detection service after the start of the academic term, either on an across-the-board or spot-check basis. The instructor's discretion in such matters is final and not subject to appeal.

Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the *UCLA Student Conduct Code*. This and other relevant documents are available on the website of the Office of the Dean of Students at <http://www.deanofstudents.ucla.edu>.

The grading process for a student suspected of having engaged in plagiarism or other form of cheating is described in the Academic Senate Manual Regulations, Section 4, Paragraphs A-306 and A-315 (see <http://www.senate.ucla.edu>).

Sexual Assault and Sexual Misconduct

UCLA does not tolerate sexual assault or sexual misconduct. Where there is probable cause to believe a student has committed a sexual assault or has engaged in sexual misconduct, disciplinary action will be pursued under Sections 102.08 and 102.09 of the *UCLA Student Conduct Code*. Sanctions may include dismissal from the University.

If a Person Has Been Sexually Assaulted

Those who believe that they are the victims of sexual assault should

1. **Immediately call the police department.** If possible, call the UCLA Police Department at (310) 825-1491 or 911
2. **Get medical attention.** Campus police will provide transportation to the Santa Monica-UCLA Medical Center Emergency Room for emergency medical treatment and evidence collection. A counselor from the Rape Treatment Center will be available at that time, free of charge

Utilize campus and community support services:

1. **Contact a Campus Assault Resources and Education (CARE) Counselor** at Counseling and Psychological Services. CARE counselors have expertise in working with people who have been sexually assaulted. They can discuss options and alternatives, help identify the most appropriate support services, and provide information about medical care, psychological counseling, academic assistance, legal options, how to file

a police report, and how to file a complaint through the Office of the Dean of Students. CARE counselors are available to assist any UCLA student regardless of where or when the assault occurred. For assistance, contact Counseling and Psychological Services at (310) 825-0768 or go to Wooden West and ask to speak to a CARE counselor.

2. **Contact the Rape Treatment Center** at Santa Monica-UCLA Medical Center (310-319-4000) for free emergency medical treatment and counseling services. See <http://www.911rape.org>.

Caring assistance is available for persons who have been subjected to sexual assault or sexual misconduct. They are encouraged in the strongest terms to make a report.

Student Conduct Policies

Students are members of both society and the academic community with attendant rights and responsibilities. Students are expected to make themselves aware of and comply with the law, and with University and campus policies and regulations. While many of UCLA's policies and regulations parallel federal, state, and local laws, UCLA's standards may be set higher. The *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students (UC Policies)* have been incorporated into the *UCLA Student Conduct Code* either by adapting or inserting verbatim the language of the policies. The complete *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students* is available at <http://www.ucop.edu/ucophome/coordrev/ucpolicies/aos/toc.html>. Students may contact the Office of the Dean of Students or Student Legal Services for advice concerning these policies.

A. Jurisdiction

The University has jurisdiction over student conduct that occurs on University property, or in connection with official University functions whether on or off University property. Although the University will not routinely invoke its disciplinary processes over student conduct that occurs off campus except in connection with an official University function, the University has discretion to exercise jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus and that would violate student conduct and discipline policies or regulations if the conduct had occurred on campus when (1) the alleged misconduct indicates the student poses a threat to the safety or security of any member(s) of the University community or (2) the alleged misconduct involves academic work or the forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification.

Specifically, the University may choose to exercise jurisdiction over off-campus incidents under alternative A.1 above where the alleged misconduct involves

- a. Conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person, including oneself. This conduct includes, but is not limited to, physical assault, sexual assault, sexual misconduct, domestic violence, threats that cause a person reasonably to be in sustained fear for one's own safety or the safety of her or his immediate family, incidents involving the use or display of a weapon likely to cause great bodily harm, and intoxication or impairment through the use of alcohol or controlled substances to the point one is unable to exercise care for one's own safety;
- b. Stalking (as defined in Section 102.10 of the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*);
- c. Sexual harassment (as defined in Section 160.00 et seq. of the *University of California Policies Applying to Campus Activities, Organizations, and Students*);

- d. Participation in hazing or any method of initiation or preinitiation into a campus organization or other activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization at any time that causes, or is likely to cause, physical injury or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in psychological harm to any student or other person.

In determining whether or not to exercise off-campus jurisdiction in cases under alternative A.1 above, the University will consider the seriousness of the alleged misconduct; whether the alleged victim is a member of the campus community; the ability of the University to gather information, including the testimony of witnesses; or whether the off-campus conduct is part of a series of actions that occurred both on and off campus.

This section is intended only to provide guidance for the exercise of discretion by the University in invoking its jurisdiction over conduct that occurs off campus. It may not be relied upon by any student charged under this section to create any rights, substantive or procedural, or as a basis for a challenge to the exercise of the University's jurisdiction.

B. Types of Misconduct

Students may be disciplined for violations or attempted violations (including aiding, abetting, or participating in the planning of an act that would be in violation of the *UCLA Code*, whether or not the individual who carries out that act is a student). Violations include the following types of misconduct:

102.01: Academic Dishonesty. All forms of academic misconduct or research misconduct, including but not limited to cheating, fabrication or falsification, plagiarism, multiple submissions, or facilitating academic misconduct. For the purposes of the *UCLA Code*, the following definitions apply:

102.01a: Cheating. Cheating includes, but is not limited to, the use of unauthorized materials, information, or study aids in any academic exercise; the alteration of any answers on a graded document before submitting it for regrading; or the failure to observe the expressed procedures or instructions of an academic exercise (e.g., examination instructions regarding alternate seating or conversation during an examination).

102.01b: Fabrication. Fabrication includes, but is not limited to, falsification or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise, including fabrication or falsification of research.

102.01c: Plagiarism. Plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the use of another person's work (including words, ideas, designs, or data) without giving proper attribution or citation. This includes, but is not limited to, representing, with or without the intent to deceive, part or all of an entire work, obtained by purchase or otherwise, as the student's original work; or representing an altered but identifiable work of another person or the student's own previous work as if it were the student's original work.

102.01d: Multiple Submissions. Multiple submissions includes, but is not limited to, the resubmission by a student of any work which has been previously submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a second course, without the informed permission/consent of the instructor of the second course; or the submission by a student of any work submitted for credit in identical or similar form in one course to fulfill the requirements of a concurrent course, without the permission/consent of the instructors of both courses.

102.01e: Facilitating Academic Dishonesty. Facilitating academic dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, knowingly helping another student commit an act of academic misconduct (e.g., cheating, fabrication, plagiarism, multiple submissions).

102.01f: Coercion Regarding Grading or Evaluation of Coursework. Threatening personal or professional repercussions or discipline against an instructor to coerce the instructor to change a grade or otherwise evaluate the student's work by criteria not directly reflective of coursework.

102.02: Other Forms of Dishonesty. Other forms of dishonesty, including but not limited to fabricating information or knowingly furnishing false information or reporting a false emergency to the University.

102.03: Forgery. Forgery, alteration, or misuse of any University document, record, key, electronic device, or identification.

102.04: Theft, Damage, or Destruction of Property.

102.04a: Theft includes taking without expressed permission or misappropriation of any property of the University or property of others while on University premises or at official University functions; or possession of any property that the student had knowledge or reasonably should have had knowledge was stolen.

102.04b: Damage or destruction of any University property or property of others while on University premises or at official University functions.

102.05: Computer Misuse. Theft or abuse of University computers and other University electronic communications facilities, systems, and services. Abuses include, but are not limited to, unauthorized entry, use, transfer, or tampering with the communications of others; interference with the work of others or with the operation of computer or electronic communications facilities, systems, or services; or violations of copyright laws, whether by theft, unauthorized sharing, or other misuse of copyrighted materials such as songs, movies, software, photos, or text. Violation of the UCLA E-Mail Policy and Guidelines (available at <http://www.adminpolicies.ucla.edu/app/default.aspx?id=455>), of the *University of California Electronic Communications Policy* (available at <http://www.ucop.edu/ucop/home/policies/ec/>), or of any other University acceptable or allowable use policy is also considered a violation of Section 102.05.

102.06: Unauthorized Use of University Resources or Name. Unauthorized entry to, possession of, receipt of, or use of any University services, equipment, resources, or properties, including the University's name, insignia, or seal.

102.07: Violations of University Policy. Students may be subject to discipline for violation of any University policy.

102.07a: University Housing. Violations of policy regarding University-owned, -operated, or -leased housing facilities or other housing facilities on University property.

102.07b: University Parking. Violations of policy regarding University parking services or University-owned or -operated parking facilities.

102.07c: University Recreation. Violations of policy regarding University recreation services, programs, or within University-owned or -operated recreation facilities.

102.07d: University Identification Card (BruinCard). Violations of policies, regulations, or rules governing use of official University identification cards, including manufacturing or possession of false identification cards, using another person's BruinCard to obtain services or establish identity, facilitating the misuse of one's BruinCard by another person to obtain services or establish identity, or other misuse of the BruinCard.

102.08: Conduct that Threatens Health or Safety. Conduct that threatens the health or safety of any person, including oneself. This includes, but is not limited to, physical assault, sexual assault, sexual misconduct, domestic violence, threats that cause a person reasonably to be in sustained fear for one's own safety or the safety of her or his immediate family, incidents involving the use or display of a weapon likely to cause great bodily harm, and intoxication or impair-

ment through the use of alcohol or controlled substances to the point one is unable to exercise care for one's own safety.

Sexual Assault occurs when a person knowingly causes another person to engage in a sexual act by (a) physical force, violence, threat, intimidation, and/or coercion; (b) ignoring the objections of the other person; (c) causing the other's intoxication or impairment through the use of drugs or alcohol; or (d) taking advantage of the other person's incapacitation, state of intimidation, helplessness, or other inability to consent. Situations involving physical force, violence, threat, intimidation, and/or coercion fall under the definition of Sexual Assault.

Sexual Misconduct occurs when a person, having failed to take appropriate steps to gain effective consent, engages in a sexual act with another under the unreasonable belief that effective consent had been obtained. NOTE: For the purpose of this regulation, the following apply:

1. "Effective consent" referenced in the terms above means words or actions that show a voluntary agreement to engage in a mutually agreed-upon sexual activity.
2. "Sexual act" referenced in the terms above includes, but is not limited to, sexual intercourse, sodomy, oral-genital contact, or sexual penetration with a foreign object (including a finger), the touching of a person's intimate parts (defined as genitalia, groin, breast, or buttocks, or clothing covering them), or compelling a person to touch her or his own or another person's intimate parts without effective consent.
3. Intoxication of the accused will not diminish her or his responsibility for any violations of this section.

102.09: Sexual Harassment.

Student Employees: When employed by the University of California, and acting within the course and scope of that employment, students are subject to the *University of California Policy on Sexual Harassment for employees* (<http://www.ucop.edu/ucophome/coordrev/policy/PP021006Policy.pdf>). Otherwise, the applicable standard for sexual harassment by students is conduct that is so severe and/or pervasive, and objectively offensive, in that so substantially impairs a person's access to University programs or activities, that the person is effectively denied equal access to the University's resources and opportunities.

In compliance with UCLA Procedure 630.1, cases involving allegations of sexual harassment must be either resolved by the Dean or heard before the Student Conduct Committee within 60 days of the referral of the complaint. This deadline may be extended on approval from the Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs.

102.10: Stalking. Stalking behavior in which a student repeatedly engages in a course of conduct directed at another person and makes a credible threat with the intent to place that person in reasonable fear for her or his safety, or the safety of her or his family; where the threat is reasonably determined by the University to seriously alarm, torment, or terrorize the person; and where the threat is additionally determined by the University to serve no legitimate purpose.

102.11: Harassment. Harassment is defined as conduct that is so severe and/or pervasive, and objectively offensive, in that so substantially impairs a person's access to University programs or activities, that the person is effectively denied equal access to the University's resources and opportunities.

Student and/or employee sexual harassment is governed by the Policy on Sexual Harassment and the Procedures for Responding to Sexual Harassment. See section 102.09.

Sanctions may be enhanced where an individual was selected for harassment because of the individual's race, color, national or ethnic origin, citizenship, sex, religion, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, pregnancy, marital status, ancestry, service in the uniformed ser-

vices, physical or mental disability, or perceived membership in any of these classifications.

102.12: Hazing. Participation in hazing or any method of initiation or preinitiation into a campus organization or other activity engaged in by the organization or members of the organization at any time that causes, or is likely to cause, physical injury or personal degradation or disgrace resulting in psychological harm to any student or other person.

102.13: Obstruction or Disruption. Obstruction or disruption of teaching, research, administration, disciplinary procedures, or other University activities.

102.14: Disorderly Behavior. Engaging in disorderly or lewd conduct.

102.15: Disturbing the Peace. Participation in a disturbance of the peace or unlawful assembly.

102.16: Failure to Comply. Failure to identify oneself to, or comply with directions of, a University official or other public official acting in the performance of her or his duties while on University property or at official University functions, or resisting or obstructing such University or other public officials in the performance of or the attempt to perform their duties.

102.17: Controlled Substances. Unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of controlled substances (including medicinal marijuana), identified in Federal and State laws or regulations, or being unable to exercise care for one's own safety because one is under the influence of controlled substances. NOTE: This provision shall not apply to circumstances wherein the person under the influence was given a controlled substance without her or his knowledge and permission.

102.18: Alcohol. Manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, or sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of alcohol which is unlawful or otherwise prohibited by, or not in compliance with, University policy or campus regulations, or being unable to exercise care for one's own safety because one is under the influence of alcohol. NOTE: This provision shall not apply to circumstances wherein the person under the influence was given alcohol without her or his knowledge and permission.

102.19: Destructive Devices. Possession, use, storage, or manufacture of explosives, firebombs, or other destructive devices.

102.20: Weapons and Replica Weapons.

102.20a: Weapons. Except as expressly permitted by law, possession, use, storage, or manufacture of a firearm or other weapon capable of causing bodily injury is prohibited.

102.20b: Replica Weapons. Except as expressly permitted by UCPD policy, possession, use, storage, or manufacture of replicas of firearms or other weapons is prohibited.

102.21: Violation of Disciplinary Conditions. Violation of the conditions contained in the terms of a disciplinary action imposed under the *UCLA Code*.

102.22: Violation of Interim or Emergency Suspension Conditions. Violation of the conditions contained in a written Notice of Interim or Emergency Suspension issued pursuant to Section IV of the *UCLA Code*.

102.23: Unauthorized Use or Sale of University Materials. Except as provided herein, no student shall give, sell, or otherwise distribute to others or publish any recording made during any course presentation without the written consent of the University and the instructor/presenter. This policy is applicable to any recording in any medium, including handwritten or typed notes.

Any distribution of a recording of a course presentation at UCLA that captures the actual sounds and/or images of that course presenta-

tion, in any medium, must consider not only the rights of the instructor and the University, but also those of other parties. Examples include the privacy rights of students enrolled in the course, the rights of guest lecturers, and the copyright interests in materials authored by others that are displayed or presented during the course presentation. In addition to the consent of the University and the instructor/presenter, it may be necessary to secure permission from these other parties before any recording, distribution, publication, or communication is legally permitted.

102.23a: Selling Academic Materials. Selling, preparing, or distributing for any commercial purpose academic materials including but not limited to written, video, or audio recordings recordings of any course unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the course instructor in writing. The unauthorized sale or commercial distribution of academic materials including but not limited to recordings by a student is a violation of the *UCLA Code* whether or not it was the student or someone else who prepared the materials. This policy is applicable to any recording in any medium, including handwritten or typed notes.

102.23b: Copying Course Notes. Copying for any commercial purpose handouts, readers, or other course materials provided by an instructor as part of a University of California course unless authorized by the University in advance and explicitly permitted by the course instructor or the copyright holder in writing (if the instructor is not the copyright holder). Students currently enrolled in a course may provide a copy of their own notes or recordings to other currently enrolled students for noncommercial purposes reasonably arising from participation in the course, including individual or group study.

102.23c: Commencement Tickets. Selling commencement tickets.

102.24: Misuse of University Property. Organizing or carrying out unlawful activity on University properties.

102.25: Violations of Law. Students may be subject to discipline on the basis of a conviction under any federal, California state, or local criminal law, when the conviction constitutes reasonable cause to believe that the student poses a threat to the health or safety of any person, or to the security of any property, on University premises or at official University functions, or to the orderly operation of the campus.

102.26: Terrorizing Conduct. Conduct where the actor means to communicate a serious expression of intent to terrorize, or acts in reckless disregard of the risk of terrorizing, one or more University students, faculty, or staff. Terrorize means to cause a reasonable person to fear bodily harm or death, perpetrated by the actor or those acting under his/her control. Reckless disregard means consciously disregarding a substantial risk. This section applies without regard to whether the conduct is motivated by race, ethnicity, personal animosity, or other reasons. This section does not apply to conduct that constitutes the lawful defense of oneself, of another, or of property.

102.27: Unwanted Personal Contact. Contact (whether physical, verbal, written, face-to-face, telephonic, electronic, or by other means) that

1. a student knows or should know is unwanted
2. is communicated directly to one or more specific students, faculty, or staff
3. constitutes severe and/or pervasive, and objectively offensive, conducts
4. does not constitute speech protected by the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution (e.g., speech in a public forum on a matter of public concern).

102.28: Expectation of Privacy. The following are prohibited:

Making a video recording, audio recording, taking photographs, or streaming audio/video of any person in a private location without that person's knowledge and express consent.

Looking through a hole or opening into, or otherwise viewing, by means of any instrumentality, the interior of a private location without the subject's knowledge and express consent.

Photographs and recordings made in private locations of sexual activity or that contain nudity may not be posted online or otherwise shared or distributed in any manner without the knowledge and express consent of all recorded parties, even if the photograph or recording was originally made with the knowledge and express consent of those parties.

"Nudity" means the absence of an opaque covering which covers the genitals, pubic hair, buttocks, perineum, anus or anal region of any person, or any portion of the breast at or below the areola thereof of any female persons.

"Private locations" are settings where the person reasonably expected privacy. For example, in most cases the following are considered private locations: residential living quarters, bathrooms, locker rooms, and personal offices.

"Private, non-public conversations and/or meetings" include any communication carried on in circumstances that reasonably indicate that any party wants the communication to be confined to the parties, but excludes a communication made in a public gathering, or in any other circumstance in which the parties to the communication may reasonably expect that the communication may be overheard or recorded.

"Express consent" is clear, unmistakable, and voluntary consent that may be in written, oral, or nonverbal form.

These provisions do not extend to public events or discussions, nor to lawful official law or policy enforcement activities. These provisions may not be utilized to impinge upon the lawful exercise of constitutionally protected rights of freedom of speech or assembly.

10. QIZ (Quiz): Students participate in sessions designed to review and test their understanding of course material
11. REC (Recitation): Students take part in oral presentations and exhibitions involving substantial class participation
12. RGP (Research Group Meeting): Students participate in graduate research group meetings
13. SEM (Seminar): Students and faculty interact through small classroom sessions that involve substantial class participation
14. STU (Studio): Students develop technical or creative skills such as painting, music, drama, or design
15. TUT (Tutorial): Students meet individually with faculty to review work that each student conducts independently
16. TVI (Televised Instruction): Students view material that has been prerecorded

SEC — Section Number

A course may have multiple class types that must be taken together, such as lecture and discussion or lecture and laboratory. These class types are linked and are identified by the sequence printed and numbering schemes below:

1. Primary (lecture, seminar) sections are numbered sequentially (1-99). If a course has secondary sections belonging to a specific primary section (i.e., a compound class), they are numbered with the corresponding primary section number followed by a letter (A to Z). For example, for Chem 11A lecture section 1, you must choose from discussion sections 1A to 1Z. The class is listed as:

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2. Any section type that may be associated with several other section types is indicated by the section number prefixed with a capital M. Combinations include
 - a. A course with secondary (discussion, laboratory, quiz) sections associated with any of several primary sections (e.g., Chinese 2)
 - b. A course with multiple primary (lecture) sections and multiple secondary (both laboratory and discussion required) sections, with the laboratory section associated with any of the primary sections, such as Physics 6. These courses identify the section type (lecture, laboratory, discussion), which is the ENROLLMENT SECTION

FEE — Materials Use Fee

The Materials Use Fee is assessed in addition to term fees for each course that you are enrolled in as of the fourth week of classes. Multiple-part class series (such as lecture, laboratory, and discussion) list the fee with the primary section only. It covers the price of materials and supplies used in the course and appears on your Bruin Bill statement.

TBA — To be arranged (time was not available at publication;

VAR — Class meetings vary throughout the week and quarter consult the instructor)

TIME

Courses begin and end at the time listed. Minimum class meeting time is 50 minutes. Sometimes sections have more than one meeting time, which are listed on separate lines.

BUILDING/ROOM

The meeting location of a section is indicated by the building name abbreviation followed by the room number. Multiple meeting locations are listed on separate lines.

MS 4000A—Math Sciences 4000A
PUB POL 1343—Public Policy Building 1343

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See “University Buildings” for building names and locations.

INSTRUCTOR

The faculty member responsible for a course is listed with last name and first initial. “The Staff” indicates that an instructor was not assigned as of publication.

ENRL CAP — Enrollment Capacity

Enrollment capacity indicates the number of students allowed to enroll in the section and is subject to departmental change. When you attempt to enroll and the capacity is full, you are informed of the wait-list size and your possible wait-list position.

XC — Examination Code

The code number indicates the examination period for the course final, which is generally based on the meeting time of the lecture section (see “Final Examinations” chart). Examination code information is available through URSA. Be sure to check your examination codes prior to finals week.

Do not enroll in courses that have conflicting meeting times as this creates a conflict in examination times. You must discuss any conflict with both instructors and may have to change sections or drop the course to avoid the conflict. Faculty members may use their discretion to establish ground rules for attendance, missed examinations, late term papers, or any other means of evaluation for the course.

GD TP — Class Grade Type

Grade type is indicated by the following grading detail codes:

1. SO — Student Option: Letter grade or Passed/Not Passed for undergraduate students and Letter grade or Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory for graduate students. (In the *Schedule of Classes* and URSA, classes with an optional grading basis default to SO [Student Option], which appears in the grade type column. See the Enrollment section for regulations on changing grading basis.)
2. LG — Letter grade only
3. NG — Non-graded section of a multiple-part course
4. PN — Passed/Not Passed
5. SU — Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory

UNITS

Unit value is the workload credit given for a course. It is generally the same as credit toward a degree, except that some courses (e.g., English A, AP, 2P, 3P) may have less degree credit and/or no credit toward a degree (check the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*). **The unit value of a multiple-part class series is listed with the primary section.**

RESTRICT — Restrictions

Course restrictions **print on the line following the section entry when enrollment is restricted to certain designations** of students:

- Department Consent or Instructor Consent.** A PTE number is required. Consent of department or instructor is no longer listed in the course description in the *UCLA General Catalog*. Such a restriction is subject to change by individual instructors and is only noted in the *Schedule of Classes*
- Level.** Only students as indicated by the class level may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE number is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Levels are indicated as follows:
FR— Freshmen only
SO— Sophomores and above
- College and/or Major.** Only students with the noted college and/or major(s) may enroll. (If the restriction is satisfied, a PTE number is not required when the section capacity has available spaces.) Thus, if a restriction reads “MATH/APP, ECON BUSINESS, BUS-ECON,” the course is restricted to the specified majors/University Buildings

JR— Juniors and above
SR— Seniors and above
GR— Graduate students only
See “Class Levels” in the Academic Policies section for unit breakdown for each level

University Buildings

Final Examination Policies

Final examinations, unless otherwise announced by the instructor, are held in the same room as class meetings. Examination codes are listed for each course in the *Schedule of Classes* and in the Study List selections on URSA.

An instructor's method of evaluation must be announced at the beginning of the course. Final written examinations may not exceed three hours' duration and are given only at the times and places established and published by the department chair and the Registrar's Office (Senate Regulation A-332A). Instructors must submit grades no later than 10 days after the last day of finals for Fall, Winter, and Spring terms, and no later than 10 days after the last day of any given Summer Session.

In planning courses for a term, students are responsible for avoiding class conflicts and avoiding conflicting or multiple same-day final examinations. No student shall be excused from assigned final examinations except as provided in the following paragraphs.

Policy on Alternate Examination Dates

In compliance with Section 92640 of the California Education Code, the University must accommodate requests for alternate examination dates for any test or examination at a time when that activity would not violate a student's religious creed. This requirement does not apply in the event that administering the test or examination at an alternate time would impose an undue hardship which could not reasonably be avoided.

Accommodation for alternate examination dates are worked out directly and on an individual basis between the student and the faculty member involved.

1. In general, students should make such requests of the instructor during the first two weeks of any given academic term, or as soon as possible after a particular examination date is announced by the instructor

2. Students unable to reach a satisfactory arrangement with their instructor should contact the Office of Ombuds Services, 105 Strathmore Building, or the Office of the Dean of Students, 1206 Murphy Hall, for assistance
3. Instructors who have questions or who wish to verify the nature of the religious event or practice involved should contact the Office of Ombuds Services or the Office of the Dean of Students for assistance

This policy has been reviewed and approved by the Academic Senate Undergraduate Council. Faculty members should remember that while it is fully in their discretion to make arrangements with individual students for alternate examination times, including final examinations, faculty members must conduct the scheduled final examination for the class as a whole at the times and places established by the department chair and the Registrar's Office.

For those who miss the placement examination on February 6, it will be offered again Monday, April 2, 2012, from 2 to 4 p.m. in location to be determined (photo ID required). (1) Students with one or more years of high school French MUST present a placement examination score on the first day of class. (2) Students who have taken the AP examination and received a score of 3 or higher need not take the departmental placement examination but should consult the UCLA General Catalog for credit equivalencies. (3) Students who have never had high school French may pre-enroll in French 1 without taking the placement examination but should consult the UCLA General Catalog for credit equivalencies. (4) Transfer students who have had French at another college should check their degree progress report for credit equivalencies granted on admission (see counselors in A316 Murphy Hall or call 310-825-3382).
